President Donald D. O'Dowd has scheduled two open meetings with the Oakland University employees, one from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 6, in Room 201 Dodge Hall, and one Wednesday, March 7, from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the Gold Room A, B and C of the Oakland Center. The Tuesday meeting will be devoted to a budget and enrollment presentation. The presentation will be repeated Wednesday for those unable to attend the Tuesday session.

## Financial Aid Cuts May Cost OU \$300,000

Oakland University may lose as much as \$300,000 in federal support for financial aid programs if current developments in federal aid to education are approved.

Tom Atkinson, director of administrative services, explains that President Nixon currently plans to replace the National Direct Student Loan and the Education Opportunity Grant Programs with a single program, Basic Opportunity Grants.

Guidelines just established for the BOG program make it evident, Atkinson said, that OU students will receive considerably fewer federal dollars if only the BOG program is funded. Funds from other sources will have to be made available if all of our students who are now receiving financial aid are to continue to receive aid, Atkinson said. The College Work Study program has been funded in the Nixon budget.

The present NDSL program would, in the government proposals, be replaced by a loan program operated and controlled by local banks. It is doubtful if many of our present high need students (\$1,200 plus) will be able to meet the special requirements that are likely to be implemented by participating banks, Atkinson said.

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## Milliken Sends OU Budget to Legislature

Gov. William Milliken has submitted an \$11,568,000 general fund budget recommendation for Oakland University to the legislature. The University had requested \$12,820,000 in general fund support for the 1973-74 fiscal year.

OU had requested \$12,875,000 for the current 1972-73 year and was allocated \$10,394,000.

Added to the Governor's appropriation recommendation for 1973-74 of \$11,568,000 are \$4,544,000 in projected student fee income, and \$530,000 in miscellaneous income for a total of \$16,642,000. The figures are based on a projected fiscal year equated student (FYES) count of 7,875 for 1973-74.

The 1972-73 gross budget included \$10,394,000 in legislative appropriations, \$4,319,000 in student fee income and \$539,000 in miscellaneous income for a total of \$15,252,000, based on 7,500 fiscal year equated students (FYES). The Governor's current budget would thus represent \$1,390,000 in new funds.

The \$1,390,000 in "new money" would be allocated to the following areas: compensation adjustments of 4.4 percent, \$506,000; social security tax increase .5 percent, \$58,000; inflation allowance 2 percent, \$75,000; library book price increases 10 percent, \$24,000; instructional costs based on an increase of 375 FYES students over the 7,500 budgeted for 1972-73 would be \$348,000; academic support services \$65,000; financial aid \$103,000 and institutional support \$156,000. Finally, \$55,000 was budgeted for debt ser-

vice requirements on the Graham Health Center and Sports and Recreation Building.

Not included in the above figures is a capital outlay fund request to the legislature of \$4,054,750. Major items in the request would go for the proposed Classroom-Office Building II, a Public Safety and Services Building, a storm drain system, and expansion of Kresge Library.

## M.S. in Management Approved by Board

A major new academic program, a Master of Science in Management, was approved by the OU Board of Trustees as a highlight of the February 24 meeting on campus.

The new two-year program will be effective with the start of the 1973-74 fall term and administered under the School of Economics and Management.

The OU Senate approved the new master's degree unanimously at its January meeting. It will focus on the education of students for managerial roles in private and public sector enterprises. It will stress the common elements of management rather than concentrating on the traditional narrow subspecialties.

President Donald D. O'Dowd called the new program an "important step in meeting identified student needs."

In other actions, shifts in responsibilities in the Office of Student Affairs and Department of English were approved, as was an amendment to the Constitution of Oakland University and the University Senate.

## Odets' Country Girl At Meadow Brook

"The Country Girl," Clifford Odets' moving study of an alcoholic actor's slipping career and his troubled marriage, is now playing at Meadow Brook Theatre through March 25.

Scottish-born Michael Sinclair, whose latest New York works include "Sweet Charity" with Gwen Verdon and "Coco" with Katharine Hepburn, is directing "The Country Girl," his first play at Meadow Brook.

"Odets saw 'Country Girl,'" says Sinclair, "as a play celebrating not the theatre of romantic illusion, but rather the gritty Broadway world of unemployed actors cajoling tough producers for jobs, against a tawdry background of cheap hotels and makeshift rehearsal conditions." The play, first staged by Odets in 1950, was successfully revived on Broadway last season.

The role of actor Frank Elgin, battling both himself and the bottle, is played by Bill Moor. Mr. Moor was seen recently at the Lyceum Theatre in New York in "The Great God Brown" and "Don Juan".

Cast opposite him as the country girl, Georgie Elgin, is Elisabeth Orion. A member of the Meadow Brook Company for five years, Miss Orion was seen in several of last season's productions.

Jean-Pierre Stewart is making his first appearance at Meadow Brook playing the role of Bernie Dodd, the director who builds his play's success on his dogged faith in Frank Elgin.

Producer Phil Cook will be portrayed by James D. O'Reilly and Debra Mooney is cast as actress Nancy Stoddard. Other members of the cast include Ivar Brogger as Larry, Fred Thompson as Paul Unger, and David Kroll as Ralph.

Performances for the play are on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday at 8:30 p.m.; matinee on Wednesday at 2 p.m.; Saturday at 6 p.m. and 9:30 p.m.; and Sunday at 6:30 p.m. The theatre is dark on Mondays.

## Sculpture Shown

Critically acclaimed metal sculptor Louis R. Torres of Saginaw will exhibit his works in the ADA Studio Theatre lobby during the run of "The Insect Comedy."

If the potential \$300,000 reduction is realized, it would adversely affect overall university enrollments and hence tuition fee income and residency hall occupancy.

Atkinson cited the following financial aid statistics: 22 percent of all Oakland University regular undergraduates receive financial aid (1972-73, 1,325 of 5,294); 66 percent of all resident hall students receive financial aid (1972-73, 820 of 1,241); our financial aid programs received \$780,402 in direct support from the federal government in 1972-73; our financial aid program requested \$913,661 from the federal government to support the financial aid programs for 1973-74; 78 percent of all the dollars available for financial aid are awarded to resident students, \$1,167,750 of \$1,499,500.

He also compared average total financial aid awarded to resident students at OU for the present year (freshmen \$1,385, sophomores \$1,540, juniors \$1,434, and seniors \$1,281) with the maximum grant to an OU student under the proposed BOG guidelines. The proposed maximum new award would be \$1,134 as present guidelines now stand.

## Insect Drama Views Man Against World

The Studio Company of OU's Academy of Dramatic Art offers a frighteningly real look at life in the classic fantasy, "The Insect Comedy," by Josef and Karel Capek, that opens Friday, March 9 in the Studio Theatre, Varner Hall. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m. nightly and 6:30 p.m. on Sundays.

Directing this tragic-comic human drama is Academy chairman Paul Lee. Lee describes "The Insect Comedy" as a stylized concept of the problems of man against the world as mirrored in the lives of insects. The butterflies flutter and make violent love. The beetles hoard their money and live selfishly. The parasites devour greedily, and the black ants and the yellow ants wage ruthless war for the right to travel between two blades of grass.

All members of the Studio Company will play many roles as human beings with insect characteristics. They have been cast according to personalities, and the coloring of their costumes will suggest the insects they represent.

## OU Receives \$71,000 In Gifts and Grants

Gifts and grants totaling \$71,806 were accepted by the OU Board of Trustees at the Saturday, Feb. 24 meeting on campus.

The funds have been received since the Board's January meeting.

The major gifts and grants include: \$40,800 from the U.S. Army Natick Laboratories for research on a "Moiré Foot Contourer," principal investigator, Joseph derHovanesian, School of Engineering; \$10,000 from the National Endowment for the Arts for production support of Meadow Brook Theatre, grant director, David Robert Kanter.

Also, \$7,132 from the National Science Foundation for an additional instructional grant in science, grant director, Frederick W. Obeir, provost and academic vice-president; \$5,500 from the National Science Foundation for research entitled "Regulation of Nitrate Reductase Formation," principal investigator, Paul A. Ketchum, Department of Biological Sciences; and \$5,000 from the Lula C. Wilson Trust of Detroit in support of the Meadow Brook Music Festival.

In addition, miscellaneous donors contributed \$983 to the Friends of Kresge Library Book Fund, \$928 to the Friends of the Kresge Library, and \$453 to the Isaac Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund.
