BLACK GUIDELINES CLARIFIED

The Senate resolution of May 12 asks that all efforts be made to insure that "at least 15 per cent of all new freshman students are black," and not that "at least 15 percent of all new students (freshmen and transfer) are black," as reported in last week's bulletin. The word "transfers" was striken from the final proposal after a discussion on the scarcity at this time of potential black transfer students in the area community colleges. The Senate then passed a proposal stating that "the Chancellor and the appropriate administrative officers shall work with the community colleges in the development of cooperative programs and arrangements for the purpose of increasing the opportunities in higher education for culturally disadvantaged students: the priorities set under this legislation shall be periodically reexamined in the light of the success of such programs and arrangements!"

O'DOWD TO SPEAK

Chancellor O'Dowd will participate in a community discussion on the war's impact around the world and at home on Tuesday May 26 at 8:30 p.m. at the Birmingham Unitarian Church, 651 N. Woodward, Bloomfield Hills. Mark Ethridge, Jr., editor of the *Detroit Free Press*, will also participate. The program will include a question and answer period, an outline of future community programs and a discussion of what each citizen can do. The program is sponsored by Citizens for Responsible Expression.
