State Traffic Toll Just 9 for Holiday

Michigan started the new year on one bright note—a very light holiday weekend traffic toll.

Only nine persons were killed in Michigan traffic in the period from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight Sunday. Only four traffic deaths were reported for Jan. 1, compared with 14 for the same day a week ago.

Not a single traffic death was reported for Monday, the official New Year's Day holiday.

The year 1960 saw 1,566 persons die in Michigan traffic, including 135 in the month of December. The toll was the highest since 1,716 died in 1956.

The nation's traffic death toll for the New Year's weekend, some 150 less than at Christmas, today appeared likely to equal or surpass the preholiday estimate of 140.

Deaths in traffic accidents reported thus far numbered 333.

The death rate eased during the closing hours of the long New Year weekend, apparently averting what safety experts feared would be a record for a three-day celebration of the holiday. The record toll was 374 traffic fatalities a year ago.

Nine candidates have filed petitions for election of two Waterford Township justice of the peace posts in the Feb. 20 primary. The deadline for filing was 4 p.m. yesterday.

Lincoln Street Home Full of God and Love

Tucked in the corner of a mirror on the dining room wall of a frame house at 75 Lincoln St. is the following handwritten note.

"Pray for a poor memory when people are unkind; Be ye kind to one another."

The kindly little lady who wrote these words was not told until late this morning that two of her four sons were murdered last night in that same house.

Late last night a neighbor, Mrs. Jack W. Gilbert of 75 Lincoln St., softly spoke the words that told her one of her sons had been killed.

Near collapse, she was kept under sedation.

This morning the brave little woman heard those words again. Mrs. Frederick Smith Sr. was immediately placed under a doctor's care.

She and her husband are deeply religious people. It was while they were attending a revival service that their son-in-law Keith Hamilton admitted firing the shots from a rifle that killed their sons, Melvin, 24, and William, 25.

The simple warmth that makes a home a home" was pierced by the cold stillness of tragedy.

There were scripture quotations scattered throughout the home on tables and dressers. A framed Bible lay on a table in the living room and a picture on the wall pleaded, "God Bless Our Home."

Another Bible on a dining room table belonged to Keith Hamilton. He held a preacher's license from the Wesleyan Holiness Association.

In the kitchen was a dead man. In the bathroom, another.

"Both boys were loved by everyone who knew them," said Lewis Carver, of 3424 Hill Road, Orion Township. Carver was their brother-in-law.

But others became alarmed at the mention of Hamilton.

This alarm was voiced by those who Hamilton allegedly threatened last night after racing wildly from the Smith home, rifle in hand.

"It was quite an ordeal! We didn't get much sleep," said Mrs. Walter R. Eberle of 38 Frank St. Hamilton's wife.

Gives Self Up 3 Hours Later to Owosso Police

Brothers-in-Law Shot to Death in Home on Lincoln Street

"I had an impulse." Keith I. Hamilton, 25, told Pontiac police he shot and killed two of his brothers-in-law last night in their home at 75 Lincoln St. on an impulse.

It was the closest thing to a reason for the grisly slayings that Hamilton volunteered to officers after he surrendered at the police station in Owosso three and a half hours later.

The victims, William R. Smith, 25, and Melvin Smith, 24, were both killed instantly by single shots fired into their heads at close range with a deer rifle.

Hamilton admitted the slayings in a formal statement to Oakland County Assistant Prosecutor Robert Templin Jr.

"I don't know why it happened," said Hamilton. "I'm the sorriest guy ever saw. I had had money on me."

There were no witnesses to the shooting, police said.

A third brother, Stanley Smith, 28, was returning from a nearby restaurant at 7 p.m. when he met Hamilton at the door of the home. Smith said his brother-in-law told him, "You better get in there; your brother's in a pool of blood — I killed him."

Smith found his brother William dead on the kitchen floor. A neighbor was summoned by the surviving brother's screams and telephoned police. In the meantime, Hamilton had disappeared.

Officers found a freshly broken ammunition box with only six remaining cartridges in the house and assumed Hamilton was still armed.

At 8 p.m. Mrs. Walter R. Eberle of 38 Frank St. informed police that she had received a telephone call from Hamilton in which he threatened to kill her husband, the Rev. Eberle.

Patrol cars swarmed through Pontiac, but Hamilton was not one of the passing cars was stopped by Mrs. Eberle McDonald, 47, in front of her home at 200 Mount Clemens St.

TAKEN BY AT GUNPOINT She told the officers Hamilton had been at her home and took \$15 from her at gunpoint.

She quoted Hamilton as saying, "I've just killed a man, and I don't want to have to kill you. I give me 20 minutes; I'm going to Detroit."

A check of stolen cars in Pontiac uncovered one missing from a used car lot at 649 Orchard Lake Ave., where Hamilton was employed.

State police and sheriff's deputies were immediately alerted, and launched an all points search for Hamilton, who was described by Pontiac police as a "mental case and dangerous."

Pontiac police located other members of the Smith family and Hamilton's wife at a revival meeting (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

Nikita to Come to New York Again?

Inside Comment on Russia and Europe

London diplomats are predicting that Soviet Premier Khrushchev will turn up in New York again early in the new year, possibly in the last half of March.

They say Khrushchev wants to meet with President-Elect John F. Kennedy and may attempt to maneuver it through the United Nations.

Western diplomats have the impression that Khrushchev is not counting on a summit meeting before summer but wants to see Kennedy first.

TREAD SOFTLY:

Western diplomats also predict that Russia is likely to try to persuade Fidel Castro to moderate his attacks on the United States in coming weeks. The Russians do not want Castro to change his anti-American tone but neither do they want to be embarrassed by Cuba at a time when they are preparing the ground for a renewal of contacts with the United States. These same reasons also apply to Berlin where the Soviets are not expected to precipitate any new crisis at least until spring of summer.

RED BATTER:

Look for the Russians to launch another bitter attack against a re-armed West Germany if, as now seems likely, Lt. Gen. Friedrich Voertsch is named the new inspector general of the West German armed forces. Voertsch has been deputy chief of staff for plans and policy, SHAPE, Paris, since last January. The Russians once sentenced him to 25 years in prison as a war criminal but released him in 1955 after Chancellor Konrad Adenauer went to Moscow and entered diplomatic relations with the Soviets. Three months after his repatriation, Voertsch was back in the armed forces as a major general.

AT THE CONFERENCE TABLE:

In Paris, it is predicted that President De Gaulle early this year will make a determined move for a resumption of negotiations with Algerian rebel FLN leaders which were broken off last June. Those close to the French president say De Gaulle might even seek a personal meeting with rebel Premier Ferhat Abbas. The meeting could be held regardless of how the Jan. 8 referendum on Algerian independence comes out.

New Orleans School Boycott Still Tough

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—The white boycott of New Orleans integrated schools weakened only a little today after the 10-day holiday vacation.

Twelve white children and one Negro girl attended classes at William Frantz School. Only eight white children attended prior to the Christmas vacation.

But, at McDonough No. 19 school three Negro girls had the three-story school to themselves—just as it was before Christmas.

U. S. Deputy marshals still escorted children into the two schools. There were no demonstrations in the 40-plus degree cold.

With the holidays over, the New Orleans school board renewed its struggle to find money to pay teachers, who have missed one of the last two paychecks.

Spellman Would Finance Mental Care for Castro

NEW YORK (UPI)—Francis Cardinal Spellman offered Sunday to pay for mental hospital treatment for Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

"I think he needs it," Spellman said when told he has been criticized for giving \$10,000 to aid Cuban refugees.

HOLY CATS / MICE TRACKS

Q. What causes cats or kittens to look their sight? The black part of their eyes gets real big and blots out the yellow part. Tommie Walker, Bay City.

A. Fortunately the condition you describe is not too common. It is undoubtedly due to some brain damage, especially if both eyes are affected.

The brain damage could have been hereditary, caused by a blow on the head, or be due to some type of poisoning. Without a series of complex tests, it would be difficult to determine the origin. I doubt very much whether the animal suffers any pain.

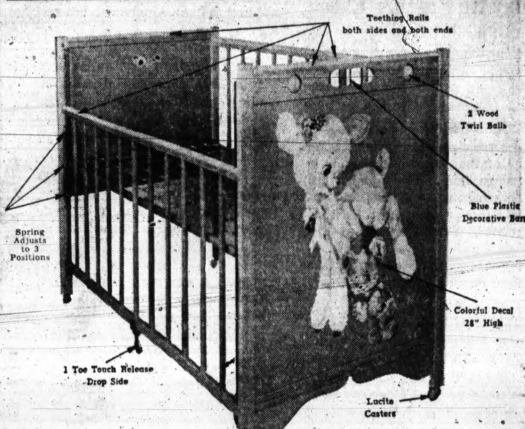
It is, however, well to bear in mind that cats are much more dependent upon their eyes than are dogs. While a blind dog can still live a happy life, a blind cat is a pathetic sight. I feel that an incurably blind cat should be spared any further suffering.

Service Families Order May Be Further Eased

Last month's drastic order reducing the number of service dependents overseas has been greatly modified and it now appears that there will be little immediate change.

As originally proposed the order would have gradually returned all of the 487,000 dependents in foreign lands. That number has been reduced to 243,000 and certain foreign areas have been exempted. Those servicemen who had already received overseas orders are being permitted to take their families with them.

The move was part of the Eisenhower Administration's effort to reduce the U.S. imbalance of payments and the outflow of gold. But that effect could be neutralized by shorter tours of overseas cold war duty, added expense for greater turnover and problems of morale for men without their families.

In the wake of reports that U.S. dependents would be sent home, a West German government publication, The Bulletin, recorded the reaction in that country's newspapers. The consensus is that American women by and large have been ambassadors of good will to large segments of the West German population.

A leading Munich newspaper, the Sueddeutsche Zeitung, conceded that the relative prosperity of American dependents had caused some inconvenience but that their purchasing power would be missed by the business community. Quite apart from that, however, says the newspaper, their departure "involves at least a little emotion for us all. . . In short — we shall miss them, these American women."

Perhaps the new Administration will find a less disruptive way to help redress the imbalance of payments.

U.S. Traitors Warn Their Adopted Country

U.S. and Canada to Join in Western Co-operation

The new Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) will succeed the Organization for European Economic Co-operation (OEEC) as soon as a treaty signed in Paris earlier this month is ratified by the various governments.

Twenty nations, including the United States and Canada are creating a new economic organization to give less developed countries the kind of help that put Europe's war shattered economy back on its feet. Conditions brought about by a now prosperous Europe call for more aid — co-operation and less U.S. over-

Both the U.S. and Canada had held only observer status in OEEC organized to administer the Marshall Plan which salvaged Western European economies after World War II. The

new organization is primarily aimed at giving economic and technical assistance to Latin America, Africa and Asia.

OECD will start work on Sept. 30 with several special committees including one for economic policy, one for development aid and one for trade. The latter will have the all important task of co-ordinating policies with the European Common Market and the British led Free Trade Association. Merger of these two blocs is being discussed and would be most desirable.

Perhaps OECD's greatest contribution may be in providing a common ground for discussing problems and in enlarging the area of co-operation. More than ever the West is being challenged by communism's onward sweep and the ability of Khrushchev to decide and implement policies overnight. Marshaling the free world's economic forces for quicker action is good news if some what delayed.

Did the U.S. Apologize for the U2?

WASHINGTON — Soviet Premier Khrushchev considers that the American people by their vote last November "apologized" for the U2 incident. He publicly rejoices that, as he describes it, the Eisenhower administration was repudiated at the polls.

This is what was predicted by some writers during the campaign as likely to be Khrushchev's boast in the event of a Kennedy victory in the presidential election.

Did the more than 34 million voters in the United States who supported Kennedy really agree with the Democratic nominee when he said that America should have expressed "regrets" to Khrushchev over the U2 incident? Did the more than 34 million who supported Nixon feel that he was right when he criticized the Kennedy comment as unrepresentative of American public opinion? There were approximately 112,000,000 votes cast for Kennedy that year for Nixon, but the opposition vote, when the minor parties are included, exceeded the vote given by the Democratic nominee.

How then does the Soviet premier justify his formal acceptance of an alleged apology by the American people for the U2 incident? The answer is that he doubts that he doesn't have to look beyond the speeches and statements of prominent Democratic leaders.

Why is all this important now? Because the Soviet premier, taking advantage of the transition period in the American political system, feels he can do his own interpreting of the U2 incident and cover up his erratic course in breaking up the "summit" meeting last May.

Why is all this important now? Khrushchev apparently is quite willing now, even at this late date, to construct Kennedy's original proposal for an expression of regret over the U2 incident as having been "in effect, adopted by the American people in the election. The exact words of the Soviet premier as uttered in a speech at a New York banquet given in the Kremlin are important to note for future reference. They are reported by the Reuters News Service in a Moscow dispatch as follows:

"I hope that the installation of the new president will bring a fresh wind in United States-Soviet relations. I hope that the going out of the old year and an old president will bring an improvement in our relations."

Relations deteriorated due to the U2 and I consider that the American people's vote for Mr. Kennedy was against Nixon, the U2 and the cold war policy.

I reveal that Mr. Kennedy said during the election campaign that if he had been president he would have apologized. Had this been

done, it would not have been necessary to raise the question in the United Nations. We will not raise the question in the United Nations in order not to hurt the newly good with the recently bad."

"But Khrushchev made no reference whatsoever to the shooting down of the RB-47, an American unarmed plane, over the open sea nor to the fact that the Soviet government has refused to release the two American airmen who survived the attack."

No expression of regret or apology has come from the Soviet premier or his government concerning the wanton assault on us as a form of American plane traveling over international waters where it had every legal right to be. Will the Kennedy administration promptly demand release of the airmen?

It could be that the Soviet premier is getting ready anyway to release the imprisoned flies-including perhaps Francis Powers, the U2 pilot—as a so-called "gesture of good will" and as a means of winning a "summit" conference with the new American president.

It will doubtless look many glibly Americans who will view it as a "relaxation of tensions." But the whole artificial furor over the U2 was undoubtedly contrived as a piece of political maneuvering by the Soviet government.

U.S. Has a Problem... Three Ex-Presidents!

By JAMES MARLOW Associated Press News Analyst WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation will have three ex-presidents in the White House Jan. 20.

The three former presidents—Eisenhower, 70, Truman, 78, and Hoover, 86—have had vast governmental experience. It has been argued the country could well use that experience. That's debatable.

WONT CALL ON 'EM President Kennedy almost certainly won't call on the three former presidents.

Richard M. Nixon, 47; Henry Wallace, 72; and John Nance Garner, 92. His reasons in each case would be different.

Kennedy, a practical politician who may be looking for re-election in 1964, is not likely to build up the prestige of Nixon, who ran against him in 1960 and may run again.

Wallace, who served one term under President Roosevelt, has been unattractive to Democrats since he broke with them in 1948 to run on the Progressive ticket for president against Truman.

Garner, too, old for vigorous activity, has been out of the political picture since 1941 when he retired to his Texas farm after two terms under Roosevelt.

Both Truman and Eisenhower used Hoover to head commissions for reorganizing the government. Both men got on well with him.

But neither assignment required any advice from Hoover on broad White House problems.

AVOIDED TRUMAN Eisenhower not only made no use of Truman, who blasted him in the 1952 presidential campaign, but carefully avoided any contact with him.

Kennedy may ask Eisenhower to undertake some goodwill missions abroad. But he can hardly ask advice from the man whose two administrations he called jumpy.

It is doubtful, because of Hoover's advanced age, that Kennedy will want to burden him anymore.

As for Truman—Kennedy has no particular reason to leave the man from Missouri.

Truman roiled for him in the later stages of the 1960 campaign. But the former president tried to wreck Kennedy's White House chances before the Democratic convention.

Still there's the question: Shouldn't some way be found to use the experience of ex-presidents? There has been a suggestion that they should automatically become Senators.

They would have no vote but could speak their minds since they would have insight into government which the experience of no senator could match.

Nothing ever came of this notion. There are arguments on the other side, that when a man becomes an ex-president the nation should thank him for his services but say goodbye to his opinion.

Quesada Implies Pilot at Fault

Should Have Radioed for Ground Help, Says Aviation Chief

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal aviation chief E. R. Quesada says at the time two airliners collided Dec. 16 over New York another plane was assisted to a safe landing in spite of navigational trouble similar to that of the jet liner involved in the crash.

Quesada, administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency, implied the crash might have been prevented had the pilot of the United Airlines jet asked for ground help before it collided with a Trans World Airlines plane, killing 134 persons.

"At that very moment a Pan American 707 landed at Idlewild having experienced somewhat similar trouble," Quesada said Sunday night on a television interview program.

"He lost part of his airborne navigation equipment and he told us so and asked us to lead him by the hand into the airport and we did so and were in fact doing it while this accident occurred," Quesada said.

He said such assistance was extended to airline pilots frequently. Quesada said the United Airlines pilot had reported on the company's radio frequency that he had lost part of his navigational equipment but "we had no knowledge whatsoever to the effect that he had lost any of his normal navigation ability."

Quesada added, "Navigation lies in the hands of the pilot." When asked if he was saying the Dec. 16 disaster — worst in aviation history — was due to pilot error, he replied, "I'm not saying that, you are."

U.S. Hospital Ship in Popular Demand

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American hospital ship HOPE has been invited to visit Viet Nam, Cambodia, Thailand and Korea this year. The HOPE now is in Indonesia.

Dr. William B. Walsh, president and founder of Project HOPE, said the organization will try to meet these requests if it gets enough support from the American public. The hospital ship is supported by voluntary contributions.

Requests for other kinds of service and aid have come from Pakistan and Brazil, and from additional areas in Indonesia.

"These requests," Dr. Walsh said in a year-end statement, "prove that our medical personnel abroad the HOPE have conveyed to the world the fact that Americans are willing to work for peace. We find these new tasks challenging and exciting. We propose to undertake them as soon as public support permits."

The HOPE's initials stand for "Health Opportunity for People Everywhere." It has a permanent regular medical crew of 60, augmented by teams of volunteers who serve for periods up to four months.

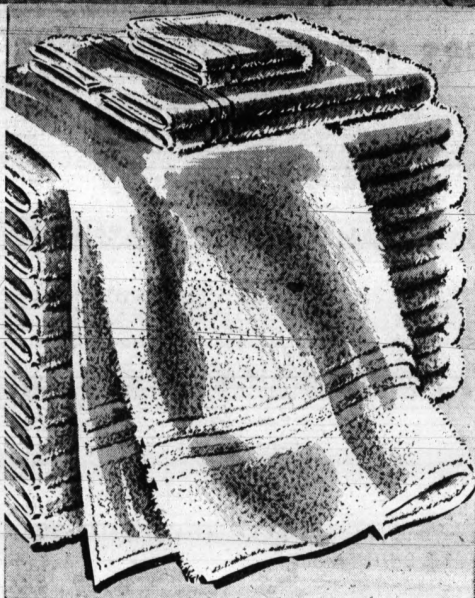

Canada Returns Famous Hidden Art to Poland

MONTREAL, Que. (AP) — A multimillion dollar art treasure was on its way back to Poland today after being moved out of it out of the hands of the Nazis and then the Communists.

Deadweight security surrounded the famous collection, worth \$50 million or more, until it was nearly out of Canada.

Poland's Communist government has been trying to get custody of the tapestries, golden coronation robes of Polish kings, jeweled swords and other items, including a gold saddle, for more than a dozen years.

Antoine Roy, Quebec Province archivist, finally signed an agreement last Saturday for the return of the treasure to the National Polish State Museum at Cracow.

The agreement was announced Monday night by the executive committee of Polish National Unity, an organization of Poles abroad.

Detroit Training 30 Patrolmen

Police Start Program to Fight Negro Crime Wave on East Side

DETROIT (UPI) — Detroit police today began training 30 recruits to bolster their crackdown on major crime in this fifth largest city in the nation.

The recruits will undergo a 10-week training program after which they will join the police force as patrolmen.

Police Commissioner Herbert Harbo, who ordered the crackdown after a 25-year-old runaway, said he was fatally beaten by a police officer in the shadows of Children's Hospital, said, "These men will give us much needed strength at the patrolman level where we must have increased surveillance to meet the urgent needs of our community."

The crackdown is centered on Detroit's near East Side where there is a large Negro community.

Three murders in the past month, including the fatal beating of Mrs. Betty James, the nurse's aide, have been attributed to Negroes.

Mrs. James was beaten late last month by a stocky Negro who walked from a bus stop to the hospital.

A 23-year-old stenographer, Marilyn Donohue, was stabbed to death by a Negro Dec. 7 while alone in her office.

And a 13-year-old man, Cyril R. Campbell, was beaten fatally and robbed Friday night after stepping off a bus near his home. Witnesses saw three Negro youths running from the scene.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and other community groups have proposed that a committee of nationally recognized experts be selected to study Detroit's crime problem.

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Knee-Length Fashions Fine for Sun

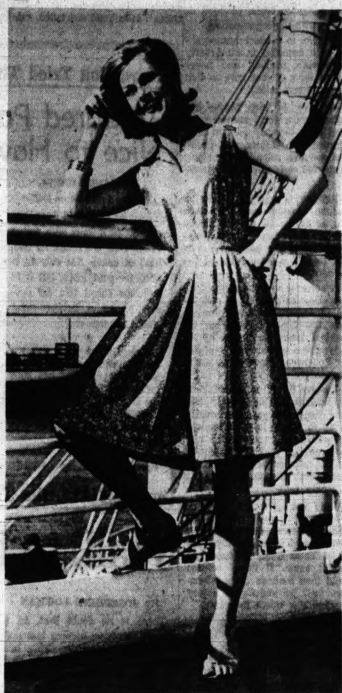

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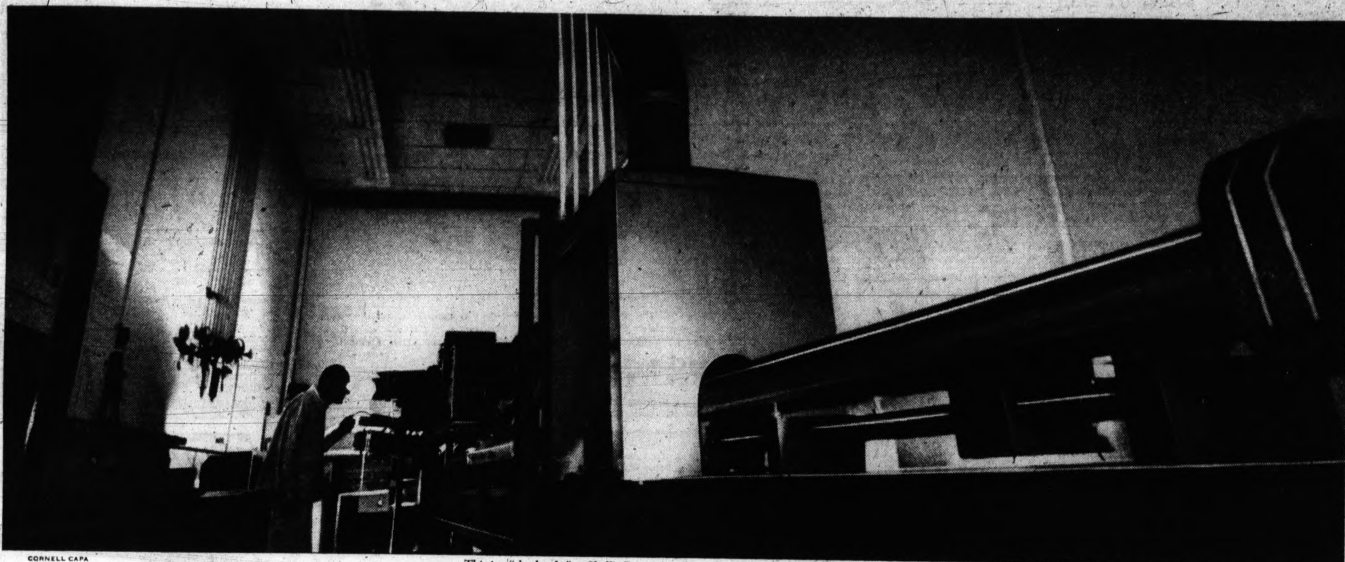

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Washington Wins Roses Surprises, Speed and Schloredt

Big 1st Half Paces

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Washington's Huskies, a team of surprises, speed and Schloredt, Minnesota's national champions where they weren't looking.

With a 17-7 victory in the Rose Bowl on Saturday, Washington emerged as the most successful Western Rose Bowl of the post-war era, a team untried by Big Ten reputations.

The Huskies did it with the same clutch-playing stars of their 44-7 victory last year over Wisconsin. Bob Schloredt, Don McKeta, George Fleming, et al., plus some wringing the Gophers didn't expect.

The Big Ten co-champions aren't looking for Schloredt—their 1959 All-America playing in the first game since Minnesota's offense came up and speed 31 yards on a simple quarterback sneak.

They didn't expect to be damaged by the middle, the strong side of their defensive line, to see Washington pitch out and swing to the outside so often, or to see a 17-minute double wing offense.

Above all, they didn't think they'd be shaken up so badly in the first half. They were for the game-winning first half. Once recovered, they played with their customary ease and fury. Ultimately they won on most of the statistics.

"We just got the daylight beat out of us in the first half," said a Gopher coaching aid. "We came back like the good football team we are in the second half, it was too late."

There were two football games in the sun-drenched bowl. The crowd of 77,314 roared to the speed and diversity of a Washington attack that rolled up a 170 first half yard and a defense that outmanned and outplayed by bigger Minnesota linemen.

And it seemed in admiration for Minnesota second half rally that the Huskies hanging on for a while, although never in serious jeopardy. "This was our best defensive game," said a Gopher coaching aid. "We made two of the biggest defensive plays."

The first game with some six minutes of the game remaining when Gopher quarterback only Stephens rolling out to the left, McKeta crashed in to nail him for a 13-yard loss to the Husky.

On the next play, with Stephens sitting on a fake field goal, McKeta intercepted the ball on the all line and put the Huskies out of danger.

Washington speed and Schloredt's generalship were the chief instruments of the Husky first half. A 17-yard Fleming punt turned out the Huskies in position for Fleming's 44-yard first period field goal, longest in the school's history and in the bowl.

The strikes of Ray Jackson and Charlie Mitchell got Washington going again later in the first period, and Schloredt scored a 4-yard touchdown pass to Brent Wooten on fourth down early in the second period.

It was Schloredt, again, in route to his second year as Rose Bowl most valuable, sweeping 31 yards on a quarterback sneak to set his touchdown.

Minnesota grabbed the initiative in the third period and held it—out marshaled only one touchdown on a 13-yard run by Bill Murray after a pitchout from Stephens.

Duke, Ole Miss and Tigers Victors

Twenty-one years of frustration, during which it sent six teams to football bowl games, were at an end for Missouri today.

The Big Eight champions rolled back a spiraling Navy team 21-14 in the 27th annual Orange Bowl classic yesterday, as President-elect John F. Kennedy, an ex-Navy PT boat commander in World War II looked on with 71,217 other spectators and tried bravely not to be partial.

Duke answered critics of its selection as a Cotton Bowl participant by upsetting Arkansas 14-6. Mississippi struck fast and had enough defensively to hold off speedy Rice 14-7 in the Sugar Bowl 14-7 and nearly 400,000 watched the four bowl games in person and millions more sat glued to the tube of their TV sets.

So impregnable was the Missouri barrier against running plays that Navy wound up with a net of minus eight yards rushing. Its great All-America back Joe Bellino, had a net of only four yards in eight carries, although he provided one of the major thrills with his end zone catch of a 27-yard Hal Spooner pass from the second Middle touchdown.

Earlier the Tigers had to snap back from a 36-yard run by end Greg Mather with an intercepted lateral.

They countered with a 50-yard run by Norm Beal with an intercepted pass when Navy again threatened. A subsequent extra point by Bill Tobin put Missouri ahead for good.

Navy Coach Wayne Hardin said afterward that Beal's touchdown run turned the tide. "They'd never have caught us if we had gone in and scored," he said.

Dan Devine, Missouri coach, was sure "we could stop Bealino and we were not concerned about his running. . . . We were more worried about his pass-catching. That TD catch was the greatest I've ever seen."

Donnie Smith and Ron Taylor scored the other Missouri touchdowns in a game played before 71,217.

Jake Gibbs, Mississippi's All-America quarterback, scored both Mississippi touchdowns—the first before the game was five minutes old.

"If we hadn't let 'em get that first one so easy it might have been a different story," Rice Coach Jess Neely admitted later. His team stiffened and held Ole

Miss at bay until the last period, but couldn't dent the Rebels' defenses, except for Butch Blume's scoring plunge in the third period. Twice the Owls were thwarted by interceptions, and won the battle of statistics before a crowd of 82,351.

Duke's lonesome end, Tee Moorman, was alone in the Cotton Bowl end zone and quarterback Don Altman hit him with a nine-yard scoring toss in the final minutes as 74,000 looked on in Dallas.

"It was expected to throw to the halfback but Moorman was wide open—I couldn't believe it," Altman said.

"I was supposed to go straight down but when (Arkansas halfback) Larry Alworth moved with the play, I cut back into the open," Moorman said.

Alworth's 40-yard punt return got Arkansas' only score. The Altman-Moorman scoring combo, plus the extra point by Art Browning gave the Blue Devils the last laugh on those who said defeats in the last two regular season games made them a poor choice against the Southwest Conference Champions.

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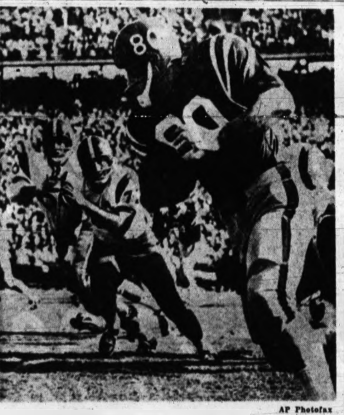

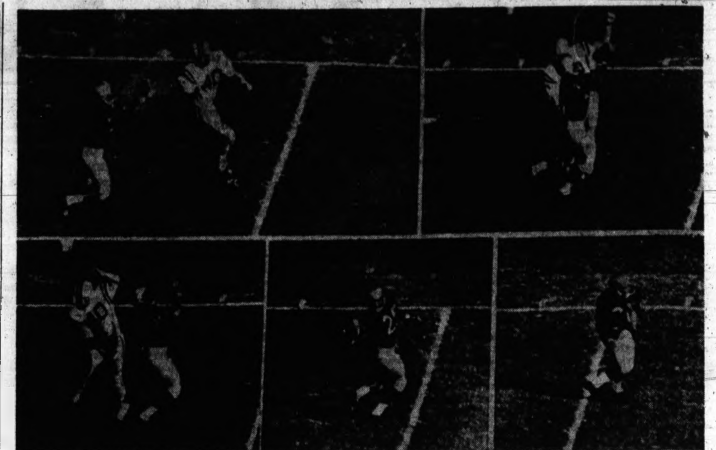

Bill Introduced by Broomfield

Oakland Man Puts Up Plan to Permit Popular Presidential Elections

A proposed constitutional amendment to permit the popular election of the president and vice president was introduced at the opening of the new session of Congress today by Congressman William S. Broomfield, R-Oakland, Calif.

Broomfield said the present indirect election of the two top positions by the electoral college system is "undesirable" and has "long ago outlived its usefulness."

He urged quick approval of the change by Congress and early ratification by state legislatures. Three-fourths of the states would have to approve the proposed constitutional change before it would become law, Broomfield said.

Broomfield said the closeness of the last presidential election, in which Sen. John F. Kennedy won over his opponent, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, by only 112,000 votes out of more than 68 million cast, shows that "it is possible for a man to be elected president for his nation, even though he may lose substantially in the amount of votes he receives."

"This is not democracy in my opinion, and I believe we should change the basic law of our land to make it more responsive to the will of the people," Broomfield said.

Belgian Strikers Erupt in March

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — A march by 10,000 strikers exploded into riot and looting in Antwerp today as Socialist unions staged new mass demonstrations to accompany the reopening of Belgium's Parliament.

The barrage from the Antwerp marchers smashed nearly 100 windows in the first few minutes. Socialist strike leaders had appealed repeatedly for peaceful demonstrations, but police in Antwerp said Communists took over leadership of the parade.

In Brussels a march of more than 5,000 was proceeding through the city without violence. At one point some of the marchers threw firecrackers toward a squad of mounted police, but the police did not retaliate.

PEACEFUL MARCH — Three thousand marched peacefully in Ghent.

Soldiers with rifles and sub-machineguns were on duty at every strategic point in the country. Power plants, railroads and public buildings all had their quota of uniformed men, determined to prevent any sabotage by striking Socialist workers.

With their nationwide strike now entering its third week, the Socialists called for mass rallies in every city in the country in a new bid to force Premier Gaston Eyskens' Catholic-Conservative government to withdraw its austerity bill raising taxes and cutting social services.

UBOES STRIKES — All metal workers also were called on strike today, and Brussels streets were due to stop again.

A 4-hour Valkeneers, secretary general of Belgium's Union of Public Service Workers, raised clenched fist at the Socialist Party meeting in Brussels Monday as he urged strikers to pour into the streets today for a massive demonstration of strength against the government. Valkeneers' union is one of Belgium's biggest unions.

The port of Antwerp was crippled as were most large plants in south Belgium, the French-speaking Walloon area where the Socialists are strongest.

Adding to the threat of violence, the burial of Francois van der Strappen, a bystander, killed last week during a clash between demonstrators and police in Brussels, also was scheduled for today.

The guard in the capital was particularly heavy around the Parliament area and the royal palace, a zone forbidden to demonstrators.

Socialist leaders appealed for calm, orderly demonstrations. Such appeals were ignored last week, when the strikers charged through Brussels' streets, hurling and battling with police who tried to keep them away from business houses.

The agency first said the men had taken to a lifeboat but later reported rescue teams found only "all kinds of wreckage" when they reached the area.

The salvage men went aboard the burning Indian Navigator from a sister ship Monday when the Navigator's crew abandoned her 110 miles off the southwest coast of England. A fleet of tugboats had been standing by the 7,660-ton ship, preparing to claim her as prize of the high seas.

One of the original crewmen was lost. Rescue vessels saved the others. The Indian Navigator was sailed out of Calcutta.

At the Bitter-Sweet End

Cabinet Facing Vacations

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower's retiring cabinet is a markedly different shuffle from the original group that, after the addition of Welfare Secretary Oveta Culp Hobby, became known as "nine millionaires with a hobby."

Only two of the starters—Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield and Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson—will be stayed in office to the bitter-sweet ending of the Eisenhower administration on Jan. 20.

Few of the new comers are independently wealthy, and most will have to return to the prosaic business of earning a living.

In a competitive world that has not stood still while they have been subsiding on substandard government paychecks.

Taken in the order of precedence, here are the plans (or lack of plans) of the 10 men who are about to hand over great power, prestige and protocol rank to Kennedy-appointed successors.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, painfully crippled by arthritis, will take a much-needed rest at Cheeka-Cumbarie, his plantation on the South Carolina coast south of Charleston. Since his wife is a Standard Oil heiress, the 65-year-old diplomat will probably retire and work on his memoirs.

Treasury Secretary Robert Anderson is planning a 30-day golfing vacation in the southern sunbelt, after which he will return to the family home in Greenwich, Conn., while deciding what to do for a living. He is weighing numerous offers.

Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. is planning to spend close to his chest, but is expected to return to Drexel & Co., the Philadelphia investment banking firm of which he is a partner. Gates was on his way back to that connection, after resigning as deputy secretary, when Ike tapped him as the top defense post last December.

LOW CALLING

Attorney General William P. Rogers claims he has not yet determined his future course, but he reportedly plans to join an already established law firm with offices in New York and Washington, and make reciprocal arrangements with his close friend, Richard M. Nixon, who expects to join a law firm on the West Coast.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield and his wife, Nellie, are planning a two to three months vacation in Miami, with side trips to Key Largo and the Bahamas aboard their private yacht.

They will retain their Washington apartment at the Sheraton-Park, and after a complete rest the self-made millionaire, a former Chevrolet dealer, will decide what business to enter. He positively refuses to "retire."

Interior Secretary Fred A. Seaton has had no trouble deciding what to do. Without so much as an intervening vacation, he will return to the management of an impressive string of newspapers, radio stations and publications in Nebraska, South Dakota, Kansas, Wyoming and Colorado. The Seaton family will live in the family home at Hastings.

Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson also has his future work out for him. One of the Twelve Apostles of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints, he will rejoin the governing body which manages the Mormon Church's vast holdings in insurance, banks, hotels, ranches, sugar beet plantations, warehouses and the several thousand buildings now under construction around the world.

Commerce Secretary Frederick J. Mueller, a widower who sold out his Grand Rapids furniture business before joining the Cabinet, plans a brief golfing vacation in the sun, and then will probably return to Grand Rapids.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell, after a brief vacation in the Miami area, will open his own business consulting firm in New York Feb. 15. He has already lined up several clients, is shopping for office space, and will specialize in labor-management and personnel problems.

Health Education and Welfare Secretary Arthur S. Flemming, who gave up the presidency of Ohio Wesleyan University to join the Eisenhower team, is considering the presidency of the University of Oregon and a couple of other tempting offers in the educational field.

The retiring boss of this Bluegrass team will be off to Gettysburg the moment that his presidential successor says "I do" on the Capitol steps.

Shortly thereafter, he will fly to Palm Springs, Calif., for an interrupted month of golfing in the desert sun.

Dag Flays Away at Belgians

Protests Aid to Forces of Mobutu by Access to Neighboring Territory

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld in a sharp protest has called on Belgium again to stay out of the Congo's internal strife.

Hammarskjöld published a note to Belgian Ambassador Walter Loxton Monday protesting that Belgium aided Col. Joseph Mobutu's troops by letting them pass through the Belgian-administered trust territory of Ruanda-Urundi to go at rebels in neighboring Kivu Province.

The secretary-general said Belgium's action had violated the U.N. resolution calling on all nations to keep hands off the Congo and leave peacekeeping there to the U.N. force.

Hammarskjöld demanded Belgium "take immediate and effective measures to insure that there will be no possibility of Belgian authorities in the 'trust territory' of Ruanda-Urundi or elsewhere lending support directly or indirectly to military action by Congolese troops."

Rajeshwar Dayal of India, Hammarskjöld's special Congo representative, said about 100 Congolese troops were landed at an airfield in Ruanda-Urundi and marched against the Kivu rebels early Sunday. They were met by Mobutu in an attempt to bring the rebellious province under the Leopoldville government's control.

The rebels, partisans of ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba, claimed that after four hours of sporadic shooting, they had captured 60 of the attackers and driven the rest back into Ruanda-Urundi. Twenty-three of the Mobutu men were reported injured.

French Fleet to Mass Near Algiers During Vote

PARIS (AP)—The French navy is sending 15 units of the French fleet to today's vote on the Algerian referendum and recalled that the fleet will sail for the Algerian coast just prior to the Algerian referendum this weekend.

Rouge Councilman Quits

Report Nixon Blames 'Biased' News for Loss

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—The Minneapolis Tribune says Vice President Richard Nixon believes "biased campaign reporting" cost him the presidential election.

Nixon "has made it clear in private talks with friends that he thinks a pro-Kennedy attitude by reporters covering the campaign provided Sen. John Kennedy with his narrow victory margin," the Tribune said Sunday.

A front-page dispatch by Washington correspondent Fletcher Knebel said Nixon "is leaving off with a twinge of resentment against a number of Washington correspondents."

The article said Nixon and his wife Pat "had gone out of their way to be on friendly terms with newspapermen and TV commentators."

It came as somewhat of a shock during the campaign, therefore, to find that a majority of working reporters brought out to favor Kennedy a factor brought out in several polls.

Churchill Favors Closer West Ties

LONDON (UPI)—Sir Winston Churchill said in a New Year's message made public Monday that "the three great forces which sustain the free world—The British Commonwealth and Empire, the United States of America, and Europe—must combine ever closer" in 1961.

"Only then can we march toward a future of limitless expectation," the wartime British prime minister added in a greeting to the Prince of Wales, a conservative group of the public comment since his recent accident when he slipped and broke vertebrae in his back.

Now any self-respecting mother, or for that matter self-revering man, will tell you this. But not Nanette Fabray, girl maven. Nanette met this man, fell in love with him on the first date, and did everything wrong.

I was so helpless. So crazy about him that I made no bones about it. He'd been pursued by geniuses and was definitely not interested in settling down, but one night I backed him up against a door and I just said, 'I don't care whether you love me or not, I'm mine about you.'

It was just awful for him, poor man. What could he do? Marry her, naturally. Four months after he tangled with this beautiful woman with the pathetically bad romantic psychology, Ronald MacDougall was a bridegroom.

And Nanette, "who was one of Broadway's and TV's slickest personalities," was a bride with two stepdaughters (now 19 and 17) and a stepson (now 7).

"My husband's writing it," she said proudly. "He's a very fine writer. I could never af-

ford him if I wasn't married to him."

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Nun Aids Refugees in Miami

Cubans Want Jobs, Not Sympathy

MIAMI (UPI)—Picture any Cuban Joe Smith — Jose Garcia. He arrives in this glittering crossroads of the Caribbean with no money, no job and no English words to find one, and a wife with two children tagging along wearily after hours of questioning by a khaki-suited U.S. immigration officer. Many of the Cuban Jose and Marias arriving here at the rate

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of 1,300 every week face just this situation. They said their journey was cheaply to escape Premier Fidel Castro's police-ruled island. They bought a ticket — or had a friend here buy it — for the 55-minute air hop over the straits of Florida. Cuba allowed them to leave with only \$5.

Jose, Maria and their children will find food, a place to live and at least the hope of a job some day despite the fact that Miami's population is crisscrossed with an estimated 85,000 of their countrymen.

For the Cuban grapevine strung along Flagler, wrapped around the downtown's southwest wall of cheap apartments and hotels and northwest on First Street toward the big postoffice to the airport — has guided their footsteps. Those Cubans to whom life has looked darkest have found their way to Sister Marian, reverently referred to as the Angel of Miami.

The little nun, clad in the white-trimmed black veil of the Dominican Order, presides over the Spanish center of Gesù Roman Catholic Church, a block south of the downtown post office.

For more than a year her soft Spanish has soothed as many as 100 homeless a day. The slight, robed woman has guided the hungry to Famulus House — dingy but smelling of beef stew ladled out by three Brothers of the Good Shepherd.

COMFORT CUBANS

She has guided the ill to the Catholic Medical Center, the children to the two church nurseries that watch them while their parents hunt jobs, and two who can afford the bus fare to the night classes teaching English.

Before the Castro Cuban exodus, Miami held about 50,000 Cubans, fairly well established. Then in 1960 another 65,000 poured in on top of them. The area already was short on jobs. The U.S. government stepped in last month with a team of experts and \$1 million in an attempt to relieve the situation.

"The Cuban community here has reached the saturation point," warned Miami Mayor Robert King High.

Tracy Voorhees, President Eisenhower's designated, fact-finder, agreed. He found that the resident Cuban population had absorbed all it could — as many as four families to a house — that hundreds do not get enough to eat. United Press International found only 1,500 to 2,000 Cuban men had been able to get jobs last year, and about 1,000 Cubans arrived with no place to go.

Before Christmas, thousands of refugees passed patiently through the international refugee center to collect blankets and \$150 to \$600 for a family to have a holiday meal.

But the center officials and Voorhees said they have not had time yet to determine just how much "extensive hardship" exists.

However, had it be, Voorhees added, "The Puerto Ricans in New York are a much greater problem than Miami's Cubans."

The Cubans have created grave school problems. The school board said it had admitted 1,130 Latin American children — most of them Cuban — to its already crowded public schools before Dec. 2. Hundreds more gained entrance to parochial schools.

WAIVE FEE

Each child is supposed to pay a \$50 state fee to attend public schools as a nonresident, but school authorities found some 200 didn't have 35 cents for a school lunch each day nor enough food at home to bring one. Lunches were provided for them and the fee waived.

Somehow each Cuban finds something each day to eat — though it may not be enough — and a place to stay, a shared bed with friends, a cheap hotel room paid for by one of several charitable organizations, or maybe a bright little apartment that offers privacy if not roominess.

Although they are quick to extend charity to each other, their pride makes them reluctant to accept it from outsiders, Sister Miriam said.

"They may be down and out and broke, and many are spiritually apologetic, yet no one asks for money," she said, her bright brown eyes glowing with compassion.

"The only thing they are begging for is a chance to work."

She May Get Hair If Heart Is Broken

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stress may produce hirsutism — hairiness — in some women, report Doctors Arnold M. Moses and Charles W. Lloyd of the University of New York Upstate Medical Center, in Syracuse.

"Some patients become hirsute following emotional stress, such as termination of a love affair, and the stress may trigger some minor but basic adrenal defect," the doctors said at a recent meeting here of the Endocrine Society.

Dog's Best Friends

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — Ambulance driver Bill King got a call for help from B. J. Lewis, a dog lover. "Our dog needs oxygen, will you help?" Lewis asked. King raced to the Lewis home. He and others formed a mask with their hands and gave the 12-year-old mixed spaniel building oxygen. The dog survived.

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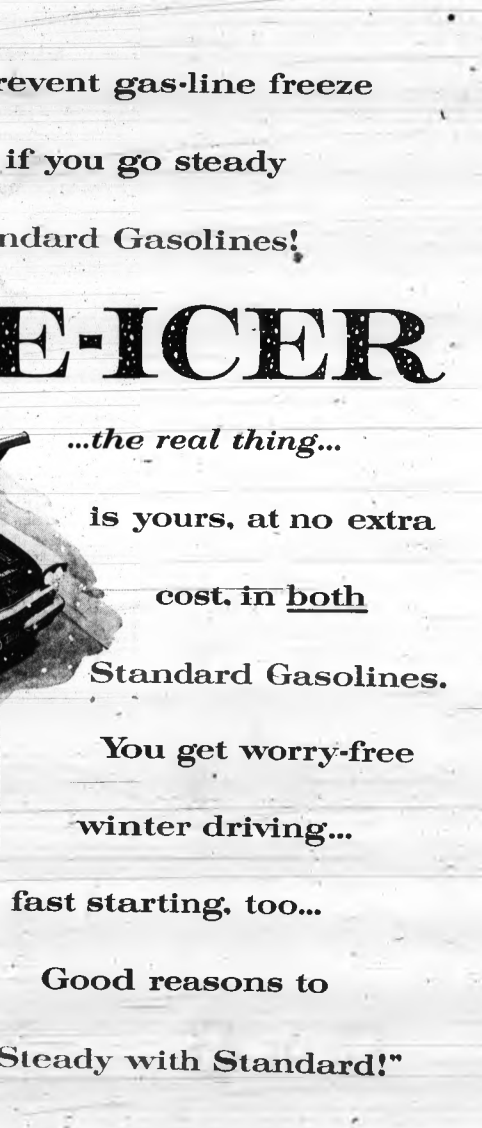

Pro-West Laotians Retake Key City

Must Act Fast, Ike Decided on Crisis in Laos

President Still Hopes for Nonmilitary Solution to Powder-Keg Situation

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today was reported convinced that fast and clear action is the best way to stop the Communists before they become irretrievably committed to a course of aggression in Laos.

The President was said to be still hopeful, despite the seriousness of the situation in Laos, of a solution short of military intervention by outside powers.

This reasoning was given in connection with the series of U.S. government announcements over the holiday weekend while top officials huddled over reports of Communist advances in Laos.

On Saturday, after word arrived here of what the Laotian government said was an invasion by seven battalions from neighboring Communist North Viet Nam, Eisenhower met with his top diplomatic, military and intelligence advisers.

That afternoon the United States issued a public warning to North Viet Nam, Red China and other Communist powers not to intervene in behalf of the Red Pathet Lao rebels. It also referred pointedly to the U.S. obligation in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization for defense of the area.

On Sunday the United States called for a meeting in Bangkok of the council of SEATO, whose members include the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan.

Monday the Pentagon announced—with White House backing—orders to step up the readiness of U.S. forces in the Pacific, including fast-moving air units. The move, the view of the press situation in Laos.

Press secretary James C. Hagerty said Eisenhower had approved the move "in light of the SEATO obligations."

He spoke after the President had finished another White House session with Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Undersecretary Livingston T. Merchant, Acting Secretary of Defense James H. Douglas, Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Central Intelligence Director Allen W. Dulles.

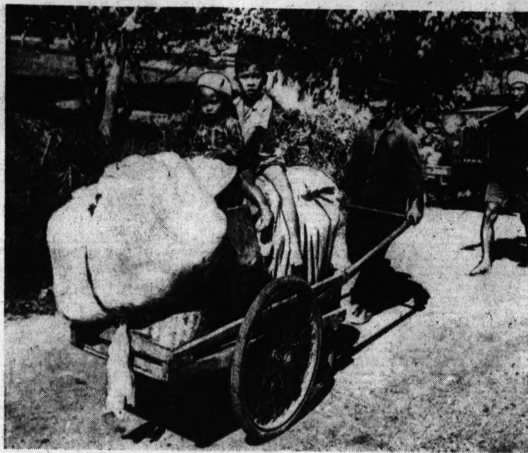
Precipitation will total one to three-tenths of an inch in occasional snow tonight and Wednesday, and a few flurries on other days.

Confidence Vote for Prince Boun Sought by King

Official Action Should Spoil Russia's Excuse for Aiding Rebels

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP)—Premier Prince Boun Oum's government announced today that its forces recaptured the key north-eastern city of Xiengkhouang from pro-Communist rebels Monday night.

Information Minister Bouvan Norasing said the city was retaken by a battalion of paratroopers that jumped 3 1/2 miles east of Xiengkhouang.

This announcement was the government's first admission that the rebels had taken Xiengkhouang.

The minister said Monday troops loyal to his pro-Western government were holding out at Ban Ban, 30 miles northeast of Xiengkhouang, and that as far as he knew the key city had not fallen to the rebels who last week seized the strategic Plain of Jars, with its cross-country highways, and an airfield outside Xiengkhouang.

King Savang Vajiravongkarn convened an extraordinary session of the National Assembly to give a vote of confidence to the provisional government of Premier Prince Boun Oum and Gen. Phoumi Nosavan, the military strong man whose soldiers drove leftist rebels from Vientiane in mid-December.

The move was aimed at placing the government on a constitutional footing and depriving former neutralist Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma of a claim to legitimacy. He fled to Cambodia after his efforts to conciliate leftists and pro-Westerners failed.

Localizing Boun Oum's government through constitutional processes also should help deprive the Soviet Union of a basis for claiming the airbridge of supplies and weapons to the Pathet Lao guerrillas and other leftist troops driven from the capital.

The spokesman said the 200 Americans evacuated from Laos were ad administrators whose activities were hampered by the fighting in central Laos.

State Traffic Toll Only 9 for Holiday

Michigan started the new year on one bright note—a very light holiday weekend traffic toll.

Only nine persons were killed in Michigan traffic in the period from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight Sunday. Only four traffic deaths were reported for Jan. 1, compared with 11 for the same day a week ago.

No single traffic death was reported for Monday, the official New Year's Day holiday.

The year 1960 saw 1,566 persons die in Michigan traffic, including 135 in the month of December. The toll was the highest since 1,746 died in 1956.

The national traffic death toll for the New Year's weekend, some 150 less than at Christmas, today appeared likely to equal or surpass the preholiday estimate of 340.

Deaths in traffic accidents reported there for Sunday were 13. The death rate eased during the closing hours of the long New Year's weekend, apparently averting what safety experts feared would be a record for a three-day celebration of the holiday. Lincoln Street Home Full of God and Love

Tucked in the corner of a mirror on the dining room wall of a frame house at 75 Lincoln St. is the following handwritten note.

"Pray for a poor memory when people are unkind. Be ye kind to one another."

The kindly little lady who wrote these words has not yet been told that two of her four sons were murdered last night in that same house.

Mrs. Fred Smith Sr. has been kept under sedation, away from her home.

She and her husband are deeply religious people. It was while they were attending a revival service that their son-in-law Keith Hamilton admitted firing the shots from a rifle that killed their sons, Melvin, 24, and William, 25.

The simple warmth that makes a house a "home" was pierced by the cold stings of tragedy.

There were scripture quotations scattered throughout the home—on tables and dressers. A framed Bible laid on a table in the living room and a picture on the wall pleaded, "God bless Our Home."

Another bible on a dining room table belonged to Keith Hamilton, who held a preacher's license from the Wesleyan Holiness Association.

In the kitchen was a dead man. In the bathroom, another.

"Both boys were loved by everyone who knew them," said Lewis Carver, of 3421 Hill Road, Orion Township. Carver was their brother-in-law.

But others became alarmed at the mention of Hamilton.

This alarm was voiced by those that Hamilton allegedly threatened last night after racing wildly from the Smith home, rifle in hand.

"It was quite an ordeal. We didn't get much sleep," said Mrs. Walter R. Eberle of 38 Frank St. Hamilton was a prisoner there.

Suspect Claims That He Killed on an Impulse

Surrenders Meekly to Owassee Police After Brothers Are Slain

"I had an impulse," Keith I. Hamilton, 25, told Pontiac police he shot and killed two of his brothers-in-law last night in their home at 75 Lincoln St. on an impulse.

It was the closest thing to a reason for the grisly slayings that Hamilton volunteered to officers after he surrendered at the police station in Owassee three and a half hours later.

The victims, William R. Smith, 25, and Melvin Smith, 24, were both killed instantly by single shots fired into their heads at close range with a high-powered deer rifle.

Hamilton admitted the slayings in a formal statement to Oakland County Assistant Prosecutor Robert Templeton Jr.

"I don't know why it happened," said Hamilton. "I'm the worst guy you ever saw. . . . God have mercy on me."

There were no witnesses to the shootings, police said. A third brother, Stanley Smith, 28, was returning from a nearby restaurant at 7 p.m. when he met Hamilton at the door of the home. Smith said his brother-in-law told him, "You better get in there; your brother's in a pool of blood—I killed him."

Smith found his brother William dead on the kitchen floor. A neighbor was summoned by the surviving brother's screams and telephone calls. In that meantime, Hamilton had disappeared.

Officers found a heavily blanketed body with only six remaining cartridges in the house and assumed Hamilton was still armed.

At 8 p.m. Mrs. Walter R. Eberle of 38 Frank St. informed police that she had received a telephone call from Hamilton in which he threatened to kill her husband, the Rev. Eberle.

Patrol cars swarmed through Pontiac looking for Hamilton. One of the passing cars was stopped by Mrs. Eberle McDonald, 47, in front of her home at 400 Mount Clemens St.

TAKEN 315 AT GUNPOINT
She told the officers Hamilton had just been at her home and took \$15 from her at gunpoint.

She quoted Hamilton as saying, "I've just killed a man, and I don't want to have to kill you. . . . give me 20 minutes. I'm going to Detroit."

A check of stolen cars in Pontiac uncovered one missing from a used car lot at 649 Orchard Lane Avenue, where Hamilton was employed.

State police and sheriff's deputies throughout southern Michigan were immediately alerted, and launched an all-points search for Hamilton, who was described by Pontiac police as a "mental case and dangerous."

Pontiac police located other members of the Smith family and Hamilton's wife at a revival meeting in the Detroit area — all except Melvin Smith.

His body was discovered in the cellar of the Smith home at 10:30 p.m. by another brother-in-law, Lewis Carver of 3421 Hill Road, Orion Township, also notified, police.

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House and Senate Democrats Demanding Changes

Liberal-Conservative Fight Opens the 87th Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The 87th Congress opens today with Democratic insurgents in both Senate and House demanding changes in the way their business is run.

Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., had a resolution ready for a Democratic caucus before the noon opening session. The resolution provides for filling all vacancies on the policy and steering committees by direct vote of senators.

The House controversy involved the stronghold of the conservative Rules Committee has on what legislation can be considered by the House.

Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas Monday agreed that this roadblock to many liberal measures must be broken down—if necessary by purging Rep. William Colmer, D-Miss., from the committee.

Colmer, who did not support President-elect John F. Kennedy in the campaign, and Chairman Howard W. Smith, D-Va., who have voted with four conservative Republican committee members to block the kind of legislation Kennedy is pledged to support.

NOT CERTAIN

It was not at all certain the House Democratic caucus would knock Colmer off the committee, however, so that the entire House would sustain the action if it did.

Gore's resolution in the Senate caucus seemed likely to be resisted by Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., who is scheduled to be elected by the caucus as majority leader, succeeding Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas. Johnson was expected to resign immediately after being sworn in for a new Senate term, in order to become vice president on Jan. 20.

The policy move crossed the lines of an effort by a group of liberal Democrats to revise the Senate's anti-liberal rule. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M., was prepared to move at the opening session for the adoption of a new rule to ease the present requirement for approval by two-thirds of those voting before debate can be cut off.

Anderson's proposal would be to permit 60 per cent of the senators to give a filibuster. Others planned to offer an amendment to let a simple majority accomplish this end.

Gore said he would not support a change in the filibuster rule. Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney, D-Okla., backed Gore's policy move but said he also will oppose changing the debate limitation requirement.

In the upper Mississippi Valley, the Great Lakes region southward through the Ohio Valley and eastward into the Appalachians. Snow on the ground in Pontiac, Mich., measured 20 inches and it was nearly two feet deep in Caribou, Maine.

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Reports Successful Antitrust Year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Assistant Attorney General Robert A. Bickel reports the successful prosecution of "the most significant" price-fixing cases in the history of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act highlighted Justice Department action in this field last year.

Bickel, who heads the department's anti-trust division said in a year-end report to Attorney General William P. Rogers that the government started a post-war high number of more than 80 antitrust suits in 1960.

He said the year's work was highlighted by the government's success in 20 indictments attacking widespread price-fixing conspiracies in the heavy electrical equipment industry.

The indictments involved annual sales of about \$1.8 billion. Most of the defendants pleaded either guilty or "no defense" in federal district court at Philadelphia.

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Romney Admits He Was Wrong

Says No Evidence That
GM Makes Car Parts
for Export to U. S.

DETROIT (AP)—President George Romney of American Motors admits he was wrong in saying General Motors Corp. put up foreign plants to make car parts for export to the United States.

The AMC president retracted his New York press conference statement of Dec. 15 in a public statement Monday in which he conceded making "a seriously inaccurate assertion."

"Such facilities were not established (by GM) for the purpose and there is no evidence of that intention now," Romney said.

The president of American Motors made the statement at the press conference during which he assailed General Motors and the Ford Motor Co. for what he called economic imperialism in their foreign expansion. He said American companies had made "excessive foreign investments."

General Motors denied Romney's statement about the car parts at the time and took issue with him otherwise.

Romney said Monday he also wished to avoid "possible misinterpretation" of another com-

ment he made at the New York press conference.

This one referred to what he had called a decline in Michigan's share of auto industry employment. Romney said he was "not attributing any deliberate action to any single company, large or small. I was simply noting and generally interpreting the statistical fact."

Italian Socialite Wed by Director Minnelli

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Director Vincente Minnelli and Italian socialite Denise Giganti, married Saturday, are honeymooning in this winter resort.

The ceremony was performed by Justice of the Peace Eugene Chervau in the home of Joan Cohn, widow of producer Harry Cohn. Guests included actor Laurence Harvey and director Henry Hathaway.

The marriage is Minnelli's third and Miss Giganti's second. Minnelli was divorced from actress Judy Garland in 1951.

Spellman Would Finance Mental Care for Castro

NEW YORK (UPI) — Francis Cardinal Spellman offered Monday to pay for mental hospital treatment for Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

"I think he needs it," Spellman said when told he has been criticized for giving \$10,000 to aid Cuban refugees.

A. Fortunately the condition you describe is not too common. It is undoubtedly due to some brain damage, especially if both eyes are affected.

The brain damage could have been hereditary, caused by a blow on the head, or be due to some type of poisoning. Without a series of complex tests, it would be difficult to determine the origin. I doubt very much whether the animal suffers any pain.

It is, however, well to bear in mind that cats are much more dependent upon their eyes than are dogs. While a blind dog can still live a happy life, a blind cat is a pathetic sight. I feel that an incurably blind cat should be spared any further suffering.

Soldiers to Fire Atomic 'Rifles'

New Weapon Is Small
Enough to Be Lified
by One Man

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has made public a picture of a new battlefield weapon that will have an atomic bomb small enough to be lifted by one man.

The bulbous bomb has four fins and is about the size of a wastepaper basket. In the picture it is perched at the end of a launching tube mounted on a jeep.

The Army said the weapon, called the Davy Crockett, also can be launched from a tripod that can be carried by two or three soldiers.

The weapon's power is secret. But it is understood to be something less than one kiloton—the equivalent of 1,000 tons of TNT. The first atomic bombs had a power of 20 kilotons and hydrogen bombs can be the equivalent of more than 15 million tons of TNT.

The Army said "the warhead packs a tremendous force yet has a small enough effective radius that using troops, nearby troops and civilian population are not endangered by blasts. Radioactive fallout danger is minimized."

Experts said soldiers can stand only two miles from a Davy Crockett explosion without danger. Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker said "the Davy Crockett dwarfs in firepower anything we have ever known in the immediate area of the battle line." He said it can be carried in any trouble spot in the world in a matter of hours.

Two Groups Progress Toward South Pole

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand (UPI) — Two American groups are heading separately on the ground to the South Pole at a speed of about 30 miles a day.

An eight-man scientific party which left the American base on Ross Island in McMurdo Sound Dec. 10, has now covered some 500 miles of the 1,800-mile journey.

The group led by Alfred P. Crary, chief scientist of the U.S. Antarctic research program is using two 11-ton snowcats towing sleds and roll-tanks — large rubber tires filled with diesel fuel — and also a smaller snowcat carrying ice-drilling equipment.

A tractor train led by Major Antero Havala, which left Byrd Station in Marie Byrd Land Dec. 8 for the pole, has now covered over 475 miles of an 800-mile journey and has passed Horlick Mountains.

The party has three 37-ton tractor sleds and two weasels. The tractors are being delivered to the South Pole for construction work during the next Antarctic summer. There are 11 men in this group which also is doing scientific work.

Scientists Find Secret of Meat Flavor Is in Fat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Department scientists have come up with a discovery about the flavor of meat. It seems that the fat actually provides the distinctive flavor and aroma of pork and beef.

Department chemists report they have isolated flavor extracts from both the fat and lean of beef and pork. They found no difference in taste between the lean meat extracts—but the fat was a different story.

The fat extracts provided the characteristic flavor and aroma of both meats. The experiments are aimed at finding ways to improve the flavor of canned and processed meats.

W. Reich Against Cutting U.S. Forces in Europe

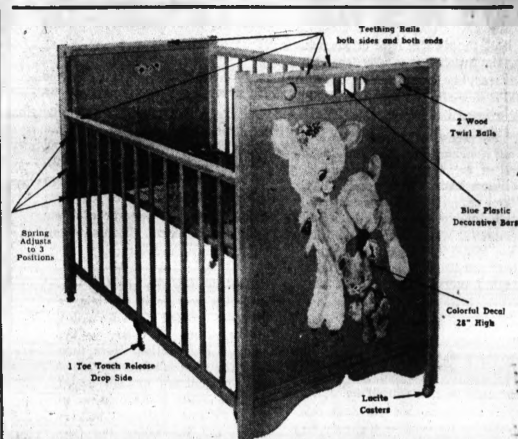

1/2 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup lemon oil
1/2 cup lemon zest
1/2 cup lemon rind
1/2 cup lemon pulp
1/2 cup lemon seeds
Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add lemon juice and flavoring. Stir dry ingredients and add to first mixture.
Grease and line with waxed paper a 12x12x4 loaf pan. Pour in cake batter. Bake 70 minutes at 325 degrees.
There is NO baking powder in this recipe.

The tendency today is to spend the weekend watching sports on TV rather than indulging in outdoor sports or exercise.
Unfortunately, along with this lessened activity, we are more tempted than ever to buy and eat more food. Never has it been so attractively packaged, so easy to prepare or so constantly advertised. In our society hospitality means food.
We do not think of entertaining without offering some sort of refreshment. Few middle-aged folks have scaled their caloric intake to their energy requirements.
It would help some if we would exercise more. Even if you are not going to take time for sports, the walk always is available.
Some physicians feel that three 15-minute periods of brisk walking a day is better than one long walk. Even if you walk up and down the porch or go round and round the block, it is most advantageous.
The brisk walk is so much more valuable than the stroll because it whips up circulation. Walk this way unless there is some reason not to do so. A brisk walk which is maintained is rather strenuous exercise. Check with your doctor about this first.
We should not sit for long periods of time without getting up and walking about for a few minutes anyway.

Bill Introduced by Broomfield

Oakland Man Puts Up Plan to Permit Popular Presidential Elections

A proposed constitutional amendment to permit the popular election of the president and vice president was introduced at the opening of the new session of Congress today by Congressman William S. Broomfield, R-Oakland, Calif.

Broomfield said the present indirect election of the two top positions by the electoral college system is "indefensible" and has "long ago outlived its usefulness."

He urged quick approval of the change by Congress and early ratification by state legislatures. Three-fourths of the states would have to approve the proposed constitutional change before it would become law, Broomfield said.

Broomfield said the closeness of the last presidential election, in which Sen. John F. Kennedy won over his opponent, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, by only 112,000 votes out of more than 68 million cast, shows that "it is possible for a man to be elected president of our nation, even though he may trail substantially in the amount of votes he receives."

"This is not democracy in my opinion, and I believe we should change the basic law of our land to make it more responsive to the will of the people," Broomfield said.

KALAMAZOO (UPI) — Funeral services will be held tomorrow for Mrs. Alice Bobb, who died Monday at Borgess Hospital. She was 84.

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Belgian Strikers Erupt in March

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — A march by 10,000 strikers exploded into brick and stone throwing in Antwerp today as Socialist unions staged new mass demonstrations to accompany the reopening of Belgium's Parliament.

The barrage from the Antwerp marchers smashed nearly 100 windows in the first few minutes. Socialist strike leaders had appealed repeatedly for peaceful demonstrations, but police in Antwerp said Communists took over leadership of the parade.

In Brussels a march of more than 9,000 was proceeding through the city without violence. At one point some of the marchers threw firecrackers toward a squad of mounted police, but the police did not retaliate.

PEACEFUL MARCH — Three thousand marched peacefully in Ghent. Soldiers with rifles and sub-machineguns were on duty at every strategic point in the country. Power plants, railroads and public buildings all had their quota of uniformed men, determined to prevent any sabotage by striking Socialist workers.

With their nationwide strike now entering its third week, the Socialists called for mass rallies in every city in the country in a new bid to force Premier Gaston Eyskens' Catholic-Conservative government to withdraw its austerity bill raising taxes and cutting social services.

URGENT STRIKES — All metal workers also were called on strike today, and Brussels streetcars were due to stop again.

Arthur Valkeneers, secretary general of Belgium's Union of Public Service Workers, raised clenched fist at the Socialist Party meeting in Brussels Monday as he urged strikers to pour into the streets today for a massive demonstration of strength against the government. Valkeneers' union is one of Belgium's largest.

The port of Antwerp was crippled as were most large plants in south Belgium, the French-speaking Walloon area where the Socialists are strongest.

Adding to the threat of violence, the burial of Francois van der Strappen, a bystander killed last week during a clash between demonstrators and police in Brussels, also was scheduled for today.

The guard in the capital was particularly heavy around the Parliament area and the royal palace, a zone forbidden to demonstrators.

Socialist leaders appealed for calm, orderly demonstrations. Such appeals were ignored last week, when the strikers charged through Brussels streets, hurling and battling with police who tried to keep them away from business houses.

Instructor in Suburban Buenos Aires School Rules With Iron Hand

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—You can't tell the teacher without a program? Is no laughing matter at a certain school on the outskirts of Buenos Aires.

And the teacher in question must keep it just that way—no laughing matter.

Fact is that Gabriel Echarin Guerrero is an earnest and serious young man who can't waste time on trivial matters.

Gabriel, fifth and sixth grade teacher at the Model Institute in suburban Moron, now is a merely 20 years old, but was a mere lad of 15 when he embarked on his teaching career a year ago.

Only three or four years older than his pupils, Gabriel despises his youth and short stature, leaves no doubt as to who is boss.

"Good morning, senior," chorused a group of students as they filed in Gabriel's classroom on a recent day. There were pure respect in their voices. Once inside, they seated themselves quietly and attentively opened their books, preparing for a lesson of the life of Lenin.

Gabriel himself was a little confused about the journalistic attention. When it was tactfully explained that there aren't any 16-year-old teachers, Gabriel took it in stride and explained how it happened.
