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ENVIRONMENTAL TEACH-IN SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED

March 18th is the kickoff day for the Oakland Community for Environmental Restoration (RESTORE) Teach-in. The Teach-in is being held for the general community, to alert and educate interested citizens about the environment. During the three-day program, prominent speakers will direct themselves to the issues of public and private involvement concerning air, water and earth pollution, pesticides and the problem of overpopulation. The speakers will include Walter Reuther, U.A.W. President; Frank Kelly, Attorney General; Hon. James Mathews, Oakland County Board of Supervisors; Oakland County Prosecutor Thomas Plunkett; Professor Howard Tanner from Michigan State and chairman of the Department of Natural Resources; Tom Anderson, State Representative; and many biologists, ecologists and economists who are involved with environmental problems. On March 20 Senator Philip Hart and Edward Brigham III, President of the National Audubon Society will speak.

An Environmental Hotline has been set up to enable people to express their concern over environmental problems. The Hotline (377-2000 ext. 2925) will operate throughout the Teach-in and will continue on through April. The Hotline will give information on pollution problems, rent films, offer library services and will bring together groups interested in the same problems. Seats for the lectures may be reserved through the Hotline. Another service of the Teach-in will be a free child care center, operating from 9 - 4 on Wednesday and Thursday, and from 1-5 on Friday.

PARENTS PROGRAM SET

James H. McKay (mathematics) will give a talk on "The Changing Role of Students in the University" during the annual Parents' Day program, to be held on campus Saturday. His lecture will be one of several programs that the parents can attend during the all-day session. Other events scheduled include a concert by the Collegium Musicum, a discussion by a student-faculty panel of the topic of educational reform at OU, a dramatic reading recital by members of the Studio Company of the Academy of Dramatic Art, a student panel discussion on a topic to be announced, and two showings of the film "Meadow Brook Hall." The luncheon program will include an address by Chancellor O'Dowd and a program of light music by the Oakland Singers, under the direction of John Dvaras.

EMINENT HISPANIST TO GIVE TALK IN SPANISH

Professor Eugenio Florit of Barnard College and Columbia University, an eminent poet and critic and former Cuban diplomat, will be guest lecturer at 8 p.m. Wednesday when he will speak in 200 Dodge Hall on "La vida y obra de Federico Garcia Lorca." The talk will be in Spanish. His visit, sponsored by the Spanish division of the department of modern languages and literatures, also will include a luncheon with faculty and students and an afternoon "tertulia" to which colleagues of other disciplines and students will be invited.

Florit worked for many years at Columbia with Francisco Garcia Lorca, brother of the late poet, and he wrote an introduction to an edition of Lorca's collected works. Before entering the field of teaching, Florit was a member of the state department in Havana (1927-40) and was with the Cuban Consulate to the United States (1940-45). He was educated at the Colegio De La Salle of La Habana (B.A. 1922) and the Universidad de la Habana (Ph.D. 1926).

ZPG CHAPTER ORGANIZES

A group of Rochester residents has formed a local chapter of Zero Population Growth, a national organization dedicated to bringing about population stability in the United States. Dr. Paul Tombulian (chemistry) helped organize the group, composed of residents of local communities and university students. A meeting was held recently to outline the activities of the organization. News conferences, a speakers' bureau, pamphlets and other promotional programs are planned.

Haskell (engineering) read a paper recently before the Ann Arbor section of the Optical Society of America on work being done in the OU School of Engineering in the field of holography (lensless three-dimensional photography through the use of laser beams). The paper, entitled "Polarization Effects in Holographic Recording of Birefringence," was written by Haskell and fellow faculty member Joseph Der Hovanesian.

A paper by Adeline Hirschfeld, assistant professor of speech, entitled "Extemporaction: An Approach to Speech Education," has been accepted for publication and is scheduled to appear in the Spring 1970 issue of the *Central States Speech Journal*.

The University Senate will meet at 3 p.m. Thursday in 128-30 Oakland Center to vote on proposals to establish a committee of faculty and staff to consult with the chancellor in the selection of a provost, and to name members of the Summer School Committee. Senators also will consider at first reading proposals to establish a department of linguistics and for modifications of the freshman exploratory program. The Thursday meeting was scheduled originally to be held last week.
