OAKLAND UNIVERSITY



In 1957, the late Alfred G. and Matilda Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre Meadow Brook estate to Michigan State University to establish a college in Oakland County.

Oakland University was founded in 1957 as a branch campus of MSU, with 570 first-year students. By the mid-1960s, it had evolved into a medium-sized university and in 1970 became an independent, state-assisted university. It now offers more than 70 undergraduate programs and more than 30 graduate programs and enrolls about 12,000 students.

OU's distinct instructional programs — the college of Arts and Sciences, School of Economics and Management, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Health Sciences, School of Human and Education Services and School of Nursing — offers a diverse curricula of general education and career preparation courses. Virtually all of these courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants.

The Honors College, a division of the College of Arts and Sciences, meets the educational needs of highly motivated students. The Division of Continuing Education meets the needs of nontraditional adult learners through evening and extension programs.

Academic support facilities include such notable entities as the Eye Research Institute, the only major eye research center in the United States not affiliated with a medical school; the Meadowbrook Health Enhancement Center, which provides health maintenance/health improvement and cardiac rehabilitation community outreach programs; and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, a unit of the school of Engineering and Computer Science that utilizes high technology manufacturing methods.

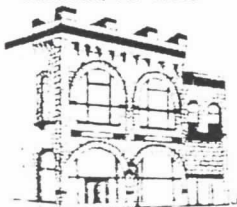
And OU's professional arts programs annually attract thousands to the campus. OU has received national recognition and local kudos for its Meadow Brook Theatre, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, Meadow Brook Hall and Meadow Brook Music Festival, the summer home of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

OU is located 25 miles north of Detroit, in the small town of Rochester. OU's modern campus, which houses the university's many academic and public service programs, is located on a beautifully wooded site — much of it still undeveloped.

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OU ATHLETIC STAFF

DR. PAUL HARTMAN

Athletic Director



The Oakland University athletic programs have risen to heights of nosebleed proportions under the guidance of Dr. Paul Hartman. This is not a new feat for the veteran athletic administrator. The eight-year chief of Pioneer athletics has taken four different athletic programs to new levels of success in an administrative career that has spanned four decades.

The OU athletic program has flourished under Hartman. Last year three winter teams placed in the top four nationally, including the champion women's swimming unit. Those three, men's swimming, women's basketball, and the women's swimmers, won GLIAC titles, and were joined by the soccer team in post-season play. In 1988-89 Oakland equalled its best finish ever in the President's Cup, the all-sports trophy in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. The Pioneers finished third in the Cup standings with just 10 league sports, and had the highest average of points per sport of any GLIAC school. OU won four GLIAC Championships that year, and eight of the 10 league teams finished no lower than third. Men's and women's swimming won league titles and finished in the top three nationally. Women's basketball and women's volleyball also won league crowns, with the hoopsters advancing to the NCAA tournament. Soccer, Oakland's only non-GLIAC sport, was defeated in the national semi-finals.

Hartman has made a number of changes since arriving at OU. The department has brought back a Varsity "O" Club for former athletes, brought back baseball as a varsity sport, and made a number of improvements in the Lepley Sports Center, ranging

from the refurbishing of the locker rooms and equipment area to renovation of offices and playing facilities. The department has also added the Pioneer Lounge, which is used for conferences and athletic receptions.

Previously Hartman had developed additional summer camp programs, created a new season ticket plan, instituted a Hall of Honor for exceptional Pioneer athletes, and introduced the first athletic team banquet.

The OU athletic director also made a large impact in his previous posts. At Plymouth State College in New Hampshire, his first post, Hartman started a football program with enthusiastic student support. Fifteen years later, a running back named Joe Dudek put that program on the map with a bid for the Heisman Trophy. In his second post, at Florida International University, Hartman began a women's golf program. One of the first women's scholarship award winners was Pat Bradley, who later became the first \$2 million winner on the Ladies Pro Golf Association tour. Hartman did not begin the basketball program at his next stop, the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, but one of his athletes there, Terry Porter, drew national attention as an NBA draftee from a non-scholarship school, and is now a outstanding point guard for the 1990 Western Conference Champion Portland Trailblazers.

A graduate of Ohio State University and a native of Columbus, Ohio, Hartman lives in Rochester with his wife, Jane. He is the third OU director, succeeding Corey Van Fleet in June of 1983. The only other AD was OU's founding father of athletics, Hollie Lepley.

The program has seen improved records, improved attendance, and improved camp numbers since Hartman's arrival in 1983, but the optimistic Pioneer athletic director is still sure the best is yet to come.

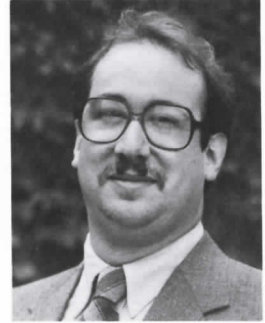

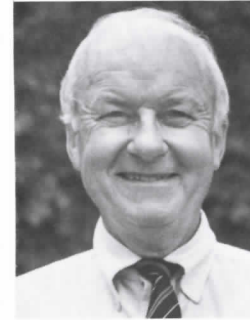

MEET THE COACHES





BOB TAYLOR

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH

When Bob Taylor came to Oakland University, he had the reputation as a program builder. In three years Taylor turned the Lake Superior State College women's program into a Midwest power, and it was hoped he could do the same at OU. He not only turned the Pioneers into a regional power, but a national championship contender.

The Pioneers captured their second straight GLIAC title and a second consecutive bid to the NCAA Tournament last year. That earned Taylor the GLIAC Coach of the Year award, as well as state women's basketball Coach of the Year laurels as selected by the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan. OU's three tournament wins sent it to the final four for the first time since 1982, and it finished with a final record of 27-6 to go along with a 14-2 league record. Two years ago OU sprinted to the GLIAC championship with a 16-0 league mark. Its 26-4 record was the finest in school history and earned it the first NCAA Tournament bid since 1983. The OU coach led his squad to a 21-7 record in his first season, 1986-87, an improvement of eight games over the previous year. The Pioneers also showed a seven game improvement in the GLIAC standings, rising from seventh to third with a record of 11-5. Three years ago OU ran up a 24-4 record for an .857 winning percentage, and tied for second place in the GLIAC at 13-3. OU is 98-21 in four years under Taylor, running his seven-year coaching mark to 150-53.

The 33-year-old Taylor has guided teams to the best record in the school's history every place he has been. He was the head coach at Lake Superior State for three years prior to coming to OU, guiding the Soo Lakers to a 52-32 mark. In 1985-86, LSSC was 24-5 overall, 14-2 and second behind Saginaw Valley in the GLIAC. Taylor's squad was the number one seeded team in the Great Lakes Region in the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Tournament and finished the season as the seventh ranked team in the country. At LSSC Taylor took a program that had never finished higher than seventh in the GLIAC and guided it to 13-15 and 15-12 seasons in his first two years. In his seven years as a head coach Taylor has had just one sub-.500 season, and has won 20 or more games in five of those years.

Taylor is a native of Sparta, Michigan and attended Sparta High School where he starred in both basketball and tennis. He earned two letters apiece in both sports at Grand Rapids Junior College and Arkansas Tech, where he also earned a bachelor of science degree in social science in 1980 and began his coaching career as an assistant coach. He then became the head coach at Boyne City High School, where he helped the Ramblers to a two-year mark of 37-10 and a spot in the Michigan Class C top ten.

Taylor, who has been involved in camps for both men and women, is co-director of the Michigan All-State Basketball Camp for girls held in Traverse City. The college division representative of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan is single and lives in Auburn Hills.

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QUOTING COACH TAYLOR

REFLECT BACK ON WHAT THOSE FIVE SENIORS MEANT TO YOU AND THE PROGRAM.

Their value to the program is unmeasurable. They set great examples of how hard work can make you a better person and a better player. They represented our program well on campus as both people and students. They were ambassadors of women's basketball on our campus. When you consider that these people were a part of our program, you can't help but think good thoughts about Oakland basketball.

HOW DO YOU SEE THE GLIAC RACE?

I think Northern Michigan, Grand Valley, and Michigan Tech will be the favorites along with us. A lot of people think we lost a lot of players and it's their turn, but with a lot of extra commitment we can take that feeling away from them. People will be looking to knock us off, but we would rather be in that position than not.

WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO WITHOUT A GO-TO PLAYER LIKE DEBBIE DELIE?

You hope that someone steps up and becomes a go-to player. Jennifer Golen could have been that kind of player last year, but she played a secondary role. She could be that player this year. We are going to look to develop someone who can score inside.

WHY DO YOU LIKE COACHING AT OAKLAND?

I like the environment at Oakland. I can recruit a young woman and tell her that since there is no NBA for women, the best thing you can do is get a good education at a good school, and that's Oakland. We tell people that you can be a big fish in a small pond, and we have proven that to be true. We can compete for a national championship, and we can be a consistent GLIAC contender. And we have proven that we can do that with good student-athletes.



DAWN LICHTY

Assistant Coach

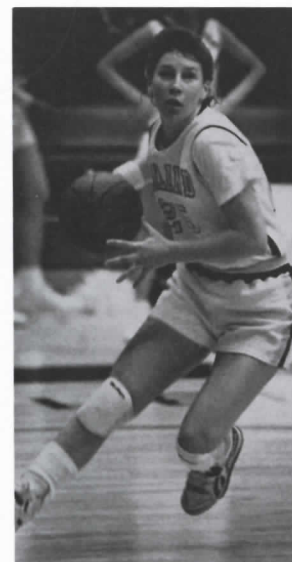
Four-year standout guard Dawn Lichty joins the Oakland University coaching staff this year as Bob Taylor's top assistant coach. Lichty replaces Shawn Clemons on an interim basis while Clemons takes a one-year maternity leave.

After two years as OU's third guard, Lichty became a starter as a junior on OU's undefeated GLIAC Champion and NCAA regional finalist squad. That team posted the best record in school history at 26-4. Last season Lichty returned from a pre-season knee injury to help lead the team to a school-record equalling 27 wins and a trip to the final four. She tied the school single-game assist record with 17 in the regional championship victory over St. Joseph's and was selected to the All-Tournament team. An All-GLIAC and All-Defense selection, Dawn led the GLIAC in assists last year.

Lichty is Oakland's single-season and career leader in three-point field goal percentage, and her 430 career assists is second to former teammate Ann Serra on the all-time OU list.

As a prepster Lichty was a Class D All-State selection in Michigan at Troy Zion Christian High School. She led her squad to a pair of Michigan Independent Athletic Conference titles.

Lichty, who will also direct OU's intramural program, earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in mathematics last year. The former Academic All-GLIAC selection is single and lives in Southfield.



DEB ANDERSON

Graduate Assistant Coach

Back for her second year on the Oakland University women's basketball coaching staff is Deb Anderson, who returns as the OU graduate assistant.

Anderson was a valuable four-year letterwinner at Aquinas College. In her four years in the Saints backcourt, the squads won over 80 games and advanced to four straight NAIA District 23 Championship games. Anderson was a third-team Class A All-Stater at Traverse City High School where she played for her father, Jim Anderson.

Anderson, who is single, is studying for her Master's of Science degree in Exercise Science. She is also serving as a graduate assistant in the School of Health Sciences. Among her duties in that position are teaching classes and working in the University's Health Enhancement Institute.

TAYLOR'S PIONEERS WILL BE PRESSING FOR A THREE—PEAT

If the old adage, "the more things change, the more they remain the same" holds true, the changing Oakland University women's basketball team could be looking at the same result in late February and early March of 1991.

There is no question that a lot of things are changing for OU this year. The first change comes in personnel. Six players off of last year's 27-6 final four squad are gone, including All-Americans Debbie Delie and Ann Serra and the bulk of the Bomb Squad, which gave Oakland one of the most potent offenses in the nation a year ago. Another change is in the style of play. The Pioneers will abandon the half court offense that made last year's team so successful for the pressing, perimeter shot style that highlighted Taylor's first two years at Oakland. The third change is in the GLIAC itself. The league has an automatic bid for women's basketball this year, but to earn a third straight title and that bid a team must place in the GLIAC's top four during the regular season and come out on top in the new league post-season tournament.

"We are going back to the press a lot more this year," Taylor said. "We have always been a team that wants to score off the break and off of our defense. This year we will be a little more up-tempo than in the past, and try to force more mistakes."

The Pioneers' lone senior is Janice Kosman, a 5-10 forward/guard who will graduate from super-sub to starter this year. Kosman averaged almost 10 points and five boards per game last year, shooting almost 48 percent from the floor. The talented Kosman will team with junior Jennifer Golen in OU's backcourt. Golen made a tremendous impact on the OU program after transferring from Lake Superior State. The native of Rochester averaged 14.3 points per game and was second in the GLIAC and 21st nationally in field goal percentage. She earned second-team All-GLIAC honors and was co-MVP with Delie in the NCAA Great Lakes Regional. Long-time friends, Kosman and Golen will form a non-traditional guard tandem for Oakland.

"We are going to more of a two-guard set," Taylor said. "No one thought UNLV could win the Division I men's title last year because they didn't have a true point guard. What they did have was three players who could push the ball down the floor, and we will try to use the same concept."

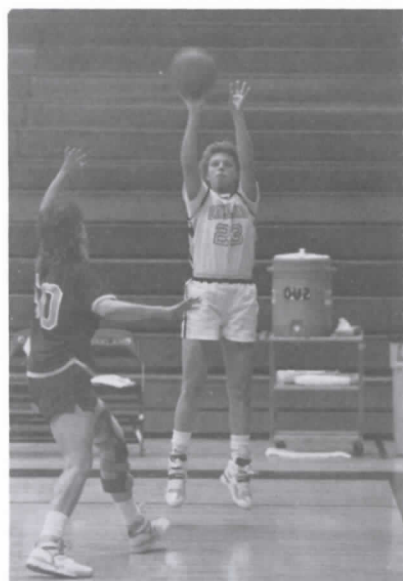
OU's third player pushing the ball down the floor could be junior Jessie Powell. Powell was averaging five points and six boards per game coming off the bench before being felled by a season-ending knee injury in the 11th game. Powell was Oakland's defensive stopper before her injury, and possessed the most quickness on the squad.

"The comeback of Jessie Powell will be a key for us," Taylor said. "People don't realize that we were undefeated with Jessie last year. She was the most improved player on the team before her injury."

Sophomore forwards Stacy Lamphere and Nicole Leigh return with last year's final four experience under their belts. Both were major contributors off the bench during the Pioneers' stretch run, and will see a major share of playing time this year. Lamphere averaged just over five points per game last year, shooting almost 60% from the floor. The 5-10 Lamphere runs the floor well and will play a big role in the pressing game. A bruiser, Leigh averaged three points and three boards in relief of Delie last year. Both should see their playing time double this year. Leshia Sadler, a 6-0 redshirt freshman who can score inside and out, will also be in the hunt for playing time up front this year.

Sophomores Roni McGregory and Mary Miles return to add depth to the OU backcourt. McGregory is a scoring guard, who played in 20 games as a freshman and averaged just over two points per game. Miles is more of a point guard, and had 19 games worth of experience last year.

Taylor added to Oakland's athleticism with four newcomers, two transfers and two freshmen. The key to Oakland's press could be the basket protector, 6-0 Regina Woodard. Woodard is a transfer from Oakland Community College who was a junior college All-American and led the nation in rebounding in 1989. An outstanding shot blocker, Woodard could provide excellent interior defense for OU. OU's other transfer is 5-10 sophomore Katie Kalahar, who comes to Oakland from Eastern Kentucky and Flint Powers. Kalahar is a Kosman-type player who could play either guard or either forward spot. The two freshmen are Michigan high school All-Staters Alisa Niederstadt from Saginaw Valley Lutheran and Doreen Belkowski from Sterling Heights Stevenson. Both scored over 1,000 prep points, and are excellent athletes who can play anywhere on the floor. The 5-10 Niederstadt is a strong post-up scorer, while Belkowski is an excellent rebounder at 5-8 who could see backcourt time.

"Our four new players are all good athletes, and when you run and press a lot you play a lot of people," Taylor said. "With Regina Woodard on the back of the press, we are going to dare people to take the back to the basket."

Regional finalist St. Josephs. NCAA Division III Champion Hope College. Division II tourney first-round victim Indiana-Purdue at Ft. Wayne. Four in-season tournaments, and the GLIAC. OU's schedule reads like a who's who of Midwest small college basketball. A tough in-season schedule was the key to the Pioneers post-season run, and this young group will get plenty of maturity tests during 1990-91.

"We will be more athletic than we have ever been, quickness-wise and strength-wise," Taylor said. "But we need to find an inside scorer. We also need some leadership to make up for our loss of five seniors. Offensively we have a lot of question marks, but we will try to make up for our offensive drawbacks with a little more athleticism."

The Pioneers will have a different look in 1990-91, but with Taylor at the controls it should still be the look of a winner. The women's basketball Coach of the Year in Michigan and his squad will have to be at their best in these changing times if they hope to pull off a GLIAC title and NCAA tournament appearance three-peat.

Had another solid year as OU's super-sub in 1989-90, averaging 9.8 points and 4.8 boards coming off the bench... shot 48% from the field and 74% from the foul line... had a season-high 18 points twice and grabbed a career-best 11 boards against Saginaw Valley... twice had a career-high eight assists... has 839 career points... was a solid sixth player for the Pioneers as a sophomore, averaging 8.9 points and 4.3 rebounds... had a career-high 25 points and added nine rebounds against nationally ranked North Dakota State... had the biggest three-pointer of the year, one that sent the NCAA Tournament win over Northern Kentucky into overtime... can play either forward or either guard spot... made a tremendous impact as a freshman, averaging 8.9 points and 3.9 boards per contest as OU's top reserve... cracked double-figures in scoring 13 times off the bench, including a high of 18 against Kalamazoo College... had several clutch performances, including a 13 point, 10 rebound, four steal effort in OU's double-overtime win at Lake Superior State... the 10 boards were her season high... was as All-State, All-County and All-Conference player at Romeo High School... played on Romeo's three straight district championship squads from 1984-86... earned identical individual honors in volleyball, where she helped Romeo to the district crown as a senior... also All-League and All-County in track as a prepster.

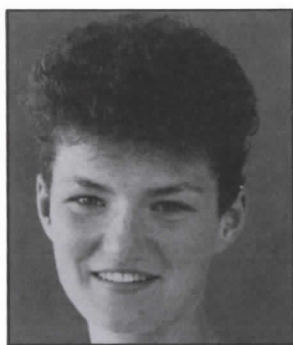

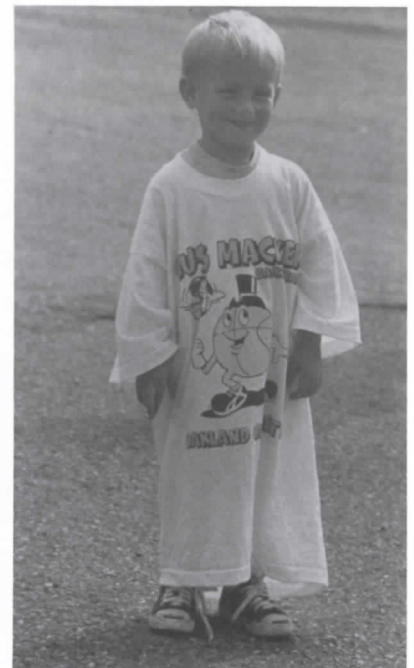
