HISTORY CONFERENCE SET FOR OCTOBER 4

"Teaching History in the 1970's" is the title of a fall conference to be held Friday, Oct. 4, at the Orchard Ridge Campus of Oakland Community College.

Eleven two-year and 13 four-year institutions in the greater Detroit area have been invited to attend.

The conference was prompted in part by previous meetings held between historians at OCC, OU and Macomb County Community College. These institutions had discussed a common goal-survival and growth of history in college and university curricula.

The program will allow teachers at two and four year institutions to share their experiences. A possible coordination of efforts could result.
