

By the Rocket's Red Glare



ON THIS patriotic holiday, when all America does honor to the nation, that phrase, "the rocket's red glare," has a new meaning.

When Francis Scott Key wrote the words that later became part of the fabric of our patriotism, they meant something different. They referred to rockets all right—crude forerunners of the ones which soar the skies today.

But they were Congreve rockets, a new military device being used by the British in their quarrel with the young American nation in the War of 1812.

They looked something like the rocket which was to become one of the major symbols of celebrating the Fourth of July—the "skyrocket." This later piece of fireworks, its tubular body

filled with powder and its stick to be poked into the ground, made many a dad a rocket expert in the early years of this century.

Our modern rockets which have us on the threshold of the Space Age could hardly have been imagined by the British tars who touched off the Congreve rockets aimed at Ft. McHenry in the attack

witnessed by Francis Scott Key who wrote "The Star Spangled Banner."

But today, with regularity, tremendous American rockets course through the emptiness of limitless space. They bring a new symbol into being, representing the inspiration, the ingenuity and the courage of the Land of Freedom—born in this world July 4, 1776.

Holiday Death Toll Mounting Steadily

Safety experts grimly watched the nation's highways today, desperately hoping that somehow the predicted record July 4th holiday traffic toll could be averted.

The National Safety Council forecast 410 highway deaths before the

holiday officially ends at midnight Sunday. The council said 12,000 persons would be injured by then.

The 410 figure tops the previous three-day Independence Day holiday record, set in 1955 when United Press International recorded 391 highway deaths.

The all-time July 4th death mark occurred in the four-day 1950 holiday weekend, when 591 persons were killed on the roads.

The council said its forecast of 410 deaths meant 80 more persons

would die this weekend than during a normal non-holiday three-day weekend period.

Police across the nation mobilized full efforts in an attempt to at least slow down the highway death rate. Virtually all available patrolmen were called out and warnings against speed, drinking drivers and carelessness came from almost every possible source.

A St. Louis, Mo., radio station teamed with a dairy and said it would give a free ice cream bar to everyone in the state if Missouri's highways stayed death-free this weekend.

As yet, no Missouri fatality had been recorded. A radio station at Winston-Salem, N. C., said it would pay funeral costs for Forsyth County's first holiday traffic death. The station said it hoped this would "be a contest with no winners."

Hospital Council Considers Plea by St. Joseph

A hospital spokesman said yesterday that council and hospital officials met in Dearborn in an attempt to resolve their differences over St. Joseph's proposed 200-bed addition to existing 330-bed facility.

The hospital says the addition is needed to meet an increasing demand for hospital beds in an area where demands already exceed capacity.

Probers Call Goldfine Shrewd

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Peter F. Mack (D-Ill.) said today there has been a well-organized public relations effort to make Bernard Goldfine appear to be more naive than he really is.

Rep. John B. Bennett (R-Mich.), another member of the House subcommittee which is looking into the Boston millionaire's relations with presidential aide Sherman

Adams and others, said he considers Goldfine "anything but naive — a very brilliant business man."

Rep. Morgan M. Moulder (D-Mo.) said in another interview that "any man who has been as successful as he has been both in his enterprises and in securing influence is bound to be a very shrewd person."

The rosy-cheeked Boston industrialist has stressed his humble beginning as an 8-year-old immigrant boy from Russia, and his fascination at meeting important people.

And when the subcommittee disclosed what Goldfine described as Christmas gifts "that we send to some poor workers in different offices," Goldfine commented that "if that is something that is bad, I would like to be told about it."

The subcommittee recessed until next Tuesday its questioning of Goldfine after disclosing that he sent checks of from \$35 to \$75 each to 33 persons it said were present or former employees of the White House and congressional offices—both Democratic and Republican.

checks. One, Miss Laura G. Sherman, said she had received a \$75 check last Christmas. Press secretary James C. Hagerty said Miss Sherman, whose home is at Franconia, N.H., had been at the White House about a year and formerly was on the staff of Sen. Norris Cotton (R-NH). She now is No. 2 secretary to Sherman Adams, whose acceptance of favors from Goldfine has been aired by the subcommittee.

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Report Rebels Now Hedging About Release

Believe Navy's Airlift Halted to Keep Secret Castro's Positions

HAVANA, Cuba — Forty-three Americans spent the Fourth of July in rebel camps of eastern Cuba today waiting for their own Independence Day.

Some informants said the rebels appeared now to be hedging on their release after turning loose four Americans and one Canadian.

The U. S. naval base at Guantanamo was reported to have reached an answer to the mysterious snag which stopped the rescue of the 45 captives.

It was believed the 45 men, including 30 U. S. Marines and sailors, might start walking out of the rebel-held hills today. A U. S. Navy airlift by helicopter halted abruptly yesterday, apparently for fear the craft would give away rebel positions to the Cuban army.

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Hoffa Builds His Power as Transport Unions Unite

WASHINGTON (AP)—James R. Hoffa, whose Teamsters Union has been cast out of the AFL-CIO, is rapidly wooing other unions to his side and further building his already tremendous power.

Hoffa's new partners include some of the same AFL-CIO leaders who voted only a little more than six months ago to oust the Hoffa-led truck union from the federation on sensational corruption charges.

If there were any doubts of what the fast-moving Hoffa is up to, they could be laid to rest with his announcement yesterday of a plan to link all the nation's transportation unions into a mutual aid alliance.

Already in a position, with his 1½-million-member Teamsters Union, to call the shots on the coast, Hoffa envisioned the new alliance as embracing all workers in air-land-sea transport.

Hoffa counted as initial members of the alliance the International Longshoremen's Assn. and National Maritime Union. The ILA, like the Teamsters Union, was expelled from the main body of organized labor on grounds it was infested with hoodlums.

The NMU is headed by Joe Curran, an AFL-CIO vice president and member of the federation's Ethical Practices Committee. Curran said he couldn't recall whether the AFL-CIO rules prohibit, as they do, an affiliated union from dealing with ousted unions like the Teamsters and ILA.

Hoffa said he was confident of another alliance signer in Paul Hall, president of the AFL-CIO's Seafarers International Union. With Hall in his camp, Hoffa will have lined up most of the AFL-CIO Maritime Trades Department which Curran contended wasn't accomplishing anything anyway.

All transport unions, including those in the railroad and aviation industries, will be invited here in August to learn about the "Permanent Conference on Transportation Unity" and to join up, Hoffa said. He will preside as temporary chairman and underwrite expenses.

Dulles to Meet With De Gaulle

Flies to Paris for Talks on France's Position in NATO, Atomic Power

PARIS (UPI) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles flies today for weekend talks with Gen. Charles de Gaulle on France's determination to become an atomic power and western hopes that France will become a stronger NATO member.

The United States was reported reluctant to see France enter the list of atomic powers because of added complications to the already complicated problem of world disarmament—and fearful that the A-bomb might not be controlled by any future unstable government.

Dulles was arriving this afternoon (10 a.m. EST instead of 9 a.m. EST) and conferring with De Gaulle on Saturday, their first meeting since 1947, when neither held office. De Gaulle met last week with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

De Gaulle returned last night from a three-day visit to Algeria and called his top foreign affairs aides in this morning for a final briefing for tomorrow's encounter.

Informed sources said De Gaulle was likely to ask Dulles for U. S. shipments of "pure" plutonium. Lack of this vital atomic fuel is reported to be blocking French plans for an early atomic bomb test. France has the know-how but not the material, the sources said.

France has some plutonium but needs greater quantities for successful bomb testing. Estimates here are that it will take France from six months to two years to develop enough plutonium for its own uses and it would like to speed up the process.

Canada's Trade Soars

OTTAWA — More than half of Canada's exports are sent to the United States and nearly two thirds of its total imports come from the States. Canada has nearly doubled its share of world trade since 1938.

Fourth of July Wet for Most of Nation

The weather put a damper on Fourth of July outings today with scattered showers and thunderstorms ranging from the Rocky Mountains to the East Coast.

The only areas expected to escape the rain today were the Lower Mississippi Valley, the New England states and the Far West.

Heavy rains continued to fall during the night in the central portion of the country, including the flood-stricken section of southwestern Iowa.

The Iowa floods, which began Tuesday night, have claimed 19 lives and caused damage in the millions of dollars. Continued rains threatened more severe flooding in the area.

Floods also swept parts of northern Missouri and Kansas, but damage was confined largely to farmlands.

Tornado funnels were sighted near Chadron, Neb., and at Salina, Kan., last night, but they apparently did not touch ground.

May Get Worse Yet

Fear 19 Die in Iowa Floods

AUDUBON, Iowa (UPI)—Rivers and creeks again surged over their banks today in flood-battered sections of southwestern Iowa, hampering the search for victims of the rampaging waters.

The unofficial death count in the siege of flash floods climbed to 19, including two persons still missing and presumed dead.

Authorities feared more bodies might be found when the water subsides and a new search is begun of baysou choked with mud and debris.

Heavy rains triggered new flooding in nearby Exira and Atlantic last night and early today. Authorities said the situation was not serious yet, but warned flood-weary residents it could get worse if predicted rains continue.

At Exira, the hardest hit community, debris caught against a bridge formed a dam and backed up the floodwaters. A highway patrolman warned if the water gets by Exira, then the community of Atlantic downstream is "really going to get it."

The worst flooding was along the Nishnabotna River which created yesterday afternoon at 84 feet at Red Oak, inundating about 100 families in the city of 7,000 population to flee.

The flood crest on the Nishnabotna was expected to hit the downstream community of Hamburg today and 600 persons were alerted to flee on a moment's notice.

Elsewhere in Iowa, the Racoon River crested at Des Moines, flooding some low-lying sections of the city, but causing no serious damage.

The floods, which began Tuesday night, have left about 1,100 persons homeless, destroyed or damaged 285 homes and washed away thousands of acres of crops.

Four bodies were recovered yesterday by about 600 rescue workers before new rains and darkness forced them to end their search for the night.

The flood area was threatened by still another danger—disease. Officials feared debris and dead livestock deposited by the floodwaters might start an epidemic.

Okinawa 50th State?

TOKYO (UPI) — Radio Moscow, in a broadcast beamed to Japanese listeners Thursday night, accused the United States of planning to make Okinawa its 50th state.

Expect Quick Ike Reply on Defense Study

U. S. Seems Ready to Meet Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and its NATO allies appeared likely to accept, with conditions, a Soviet proposal that military experts study ways of preventing a "surprise attack."

The proposal for a conference was made by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in a letter to President Eisenhower Wednesday. Eisenhower is expected to reply promptly after completion of consultations already started with NATO nations.

Advance indications of conditional agreement came both from Secretary of State Dulles and from unofficial comments by British officials. Both Eisenhower and British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd have made similar suggestions in the past.

They hope that Soviet leaders are seriously interested in coming to some practical agreements on a problem, the solution of which would go a long way toward reducing the dangers of an outbreak of war and mark the beginning of disarmament.

However, authorities do not rule out the possibility that the Soviet government may be trying to repair its peace propaganda position. This has been badly damaged in the last few weeks by such things as the breakdown of summit conference negotiations in Moscow, the execution of former Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy and the threat not to attend nuclear test talks at Geneva.

Another purpose, officials said, may be to inject new steam into Khrushchev's eight-month-old drive for a summit conference.

Dulles told reporters that the long exchange between Eisenhower and Soviet leaders over the need to do something about preventing surprise attack might now result in technical talks on the question of what practical steps can be taken.

Check for Ailing Cornices

Property owners in Pontiac must cooperate to prevent falling cornice stone incidents such as occurred in Detroit recently, said Carl Alt, city building inspector.

"It is the property owners who are primarily responsible for the good condition of their buildings, although the city makes regular checks for danger points," said Alt.

Alt said that regular inspection, plus luck, "have nevertheless combined in Pontiac's favor in recent years."

As he recalled, the last time a cornice stone fell to the sidewalk was about three years ago in the S. Saginaw street district.

NONE HURT YET

"No one was hurt, nor was the incident considered serious," Alt said.

Even with more manpower, Alt said, repeated, minute inspection would be necessary to detect danger spots as soon as they develop.

But the Pontiac inspection department, with only two men available to inspect all buildings and new construction, cannot afford to do this, he said.

Most commercial buildings get checked once-a-year at least, when the department makes its annual inspection of signs, according to Alt. "In addition we're constantly on the alert to detect signs of weakness during the year."

This system of inspection has resulted in repairs to seven or eight buildings so far this year, he noted.

OWNERS RESPONSIBLE

Property owners are legally compelled to make repairs, Alt said, under the city's building code, thus maintaining public health and safety.

A bright spot in the picture, he feels, is the proposed urban renewal of the S. Saginaw street area, where many of the past danger spots have existed and others are expected to crop up.

"If the project gets under way," Alt said, "many of these buildings may be eliminated completely."

"Frost, plus old age, are the chief factors behind falling cornice cracks, then expands when the weather turns cold, cracking the cement," Alt said.

This is the same action that helps break up concrete roadways, he said.

Plane Crew's Letter Regarded as a Hoax

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Little Evidence of Syrian Troops

U.N. Observes Report on Lebanon Scene After Charges of Infiltration

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The United Nations observation group in Lebanon reported today it had found little evidence of Syrian troops entering Lebanon to fight in the simmering Lebanese insurrection. Lebanon has charged "massive infiltration."

The first fact-finding report of the three-man team, comprising Gale Plaza of Ecuador, Maj. Gen. Odd Bull of Norway and Rajeshwar Dayal of India, detailed operations of the 100-man field force in the first two weeks of its existence.

It reached no definite conclusion but reported the investigation of some rebel strongholds and cases of "Syrians" fighting with the insurgents and reported by the Lebanese authorities.

In the area of Chouf, the stronghold of rebel leader Kamal Jumblatt, observers saw "large groupings amounting to several hundred armed men," the report said.

"The arms seen consisted mostly of a varied assortment of rifles of British, French and Italian makes. Mines seen near the Baalbek area were of British and French makes. It has not been possible to establish from where these arms were acquired."

"Nor was it possible to establish if any of the armed men observed had infiltrated from outside; there is little doubt, however, that the vast majority was in any case composed of Lebanese."

Hotel Owners in Italy Facing Ire of Tourists

ROME (UPI) — Italian hotel proprietors are bewildered. They have done their best to modernize their premises in order to make them functional, only to find out that many tourists do not like neon lights and modern furniture.

One hotel proprietor in Florence showed around his small hotel a German couple, proudly pointing out all the modernization and new functional furniture.

The two Germans, old clients of the hotel, bluntly told him that next year they would not reserve their room at his hotel because they liked much more the old-time pension.

According to hotel proprietors, American tourists are the least concerned with Italian romantic pensions. Usually the Americans care for good, de luxe hotels. Only a few artists still look for 19th century atmosphere.

The Germans are specialists in another kind of tourism—camping. Many German men know this country well as a result of World War II service here, and they come with all their equipment and set up their own camps. This doesn't make the hotel owners happy, of course.

Baldwin School Repairs Is Major Summer Project

BIRMINGHAM—Renovation and repairs to the Baldwin Elementary School costing an estimated \$100,000 will be the major project in the summer construction program of the Birmingham School District, according to Norman Wolff, assistant superintendent in charge of maintenance.

Work will include replacing the entire roof of the building, as well as the walls down to windowtop level on the second floor.

The roof has leaked for several years despite continued repairs, causing considerable damage to walls and ceilings, he said.

In addition to replacing part of the upper floor, the entire outside of the school will be sandblasted and all the wooden area repainted.

Interior work will include new toilet fixtures and plumbing, tile walls and floors. The heating plant will be changed over from coal to oil use.

"The building is in good condition basically," Wolff said, "and while the cost of the repairs may sound high, the amount is far below the expense of building a new school."

Other school district construction will be the expansion of the science portion of Birmingham High School to provide for two chemistry rooms and two additional biology rooms.

The bus garage is being enlarged to provide more space for storage and bus maintenance. The balance of the work will include routine repairs and cleaning at all schools, Wolff said.

With the first week of the Baldwin Public Library summer schedule for children drawing to a close, about 100 boys and girls have been enrolled in the Book Club.

To be eligible, children from the third grade up must read at least two books, fiction or non-fiction, and make oral reports to the children's librarian, Miss Dorothy O'Neil.

The club has three divisions—pages, squires and knights. To achieve knighthood, a youngster must take home, read and report on a minimum of 12 books prior to the July 31 deadline.

A special ceremony is planned after the club closes to bestow proper recognition on the knights. The story hour for the pre-school and kindergarten set is held each Tuesday in July from 3 to 3:30 p.m.

Grace Baptist Church of Birmingham will conduct its first daily vacation Bible School Monday through Friday next week from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

Seaway Called Boon to Europe

France Sees Method of Evening Dollar Gap With U.S., Canada

TOLEDO, Ohio (U.P.)—From across the Atlantic, many Europeans are looking to the St. Lawrence Seaway in trying to chart a course out of their own business and monetary ills.

The trade dollars of the United States and Canada are their objectives.

Toledo Blade writer, Alan F. Schoedel, in a three-week tour of European ports, found France making a particularly well-organized effort to increase its sales to the United States.

Part of the drive is aimed at making French industry break away from the idea that if it sells to New York, it is selling to America.

Thus the seaway, the water link to the middle of America, is important to French interests.

In recent years, France has seen the dollar gap—the difference between its purchase from the U. S. and its sales to the U. S.—go from bad to worse.

Last year, France purchased 300 million dollars worth of American goods but sold only 300 million dollars worth to this nation.

This imbalance produces a serious strain on French reserves in the U.S.-Canadian dollar area.

To help level it off is the purpose of the Comité Franco-Dollar, sponsored jointly by French industry and the French government and known in English as the Committee for the Development of French Exports to North America.

French industry is hard put to keep up with domestic demand for its own products. So why the need to develop new markets in North America?

Alain Rysto, secretary of Comité Franco-Dollar, explained that French industry must buy raw materials, equipment and unfinished goods from the United States. It can't do this unless it also sells goods to North America to provide France with dollar purchasing power.

Rysto's assistant, Michel Casati-Ollier, said the failure of French industry to see past New York is deeply rooted in years of shipping through East Coast ports.

The trouble with that, he said, is that the New York distributors often cover only a limited territory.

Leaders of the Comité Franco-Dollar feel the Lakes ports would have much more to gain by a

cooperative drive for the foreign market than from their present method of competing individually.

The committee is enthusiastic about an idea by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce to have a representative for all the Lakes ports located in Paris. It believes this would prove a boon in opening new markets for France.

Unemployment Still Dropping

93,700 Less Pick Up Jobless Benefits; But New Layoffs Start

WASHINGTON (AP)—Continuing a 10-week decline, unemployment among workers insured for jobless benefits hit another 1958 low during the week ended June 21.

The Labor Department said yesterday the total declined by 93,700 to 2,610,900—the lowest reported so far this year.

However, the department said initial claims for jobless benefits—which reflect new layoffs—rose seasonally by 47,800 during the week ended June 28 to a total of 366,400.

The increase was attributed to new auto industry layoffs, partly due to the beginning of the switch-over to 1959 model production and to plant shutdowns for summer vacations.

Despite the drop in insured unemployment, the department

noted that joblessness in that category still is more than double the 1,268,700 reported for the same week a year ago.

The rate of unemployment among the nation's 43 million insured workers during the week ended June 21 was 6.2 per cent, compared with 6.4 per cent the previous week and 3.1 per cent a year ago.

To Correct Acoustics in Ford Auditorium

DETROIT (U.P.)—Mrs. Edsel B. Ford and other members of the Ford family will donate money to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra to correct acoustical flaws in the Henry and Edsel Ford Auditorium. An orchestra shell, costing between \$75,000 and \$100,000, will be installed on the stage. The symphony will turn the shell over to the city as a permanent installation.

Leelanau County Red Maple Tree Country's Largest

Howard Harvey of Williamsburg, a member of the Northwest Chapter of the Michigan Botanical Society, said the tree — located on the northern tip of Leelanau County — sets a new Michigan record in the red maple classification and it's the largest reported in the country.

Other champion trees discovered on South Manitou Island by the local chapter include a white elm 181½ inches in circumference and about 400 years old, and white cedars estimated to be more than 800 years old with girths ranging from 14 to 17 feet.

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What It Took to Get Goldfine Ready for Congressmen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The hour is late and a chunky millionaire swathed in a richly hued dressing gown lies wearily on his hotel bed. He listens to his dog-tired attorney as the lawyer paces the floor in limp shirt-sleeves and suspenders and reads from a sheaf of suggested testimony.

In the next room of the millionaire's luxurious hotel suite, three locks from the White House, his wife sits, smoking constantly and showing her tension by tugging the diamond-encrusted pendant at her throat.

BOURBON DISHED OUT
Deep down in the basement of the same hotel, the millionaire's public relations staff dishes out bourbon, caviar and sheets of mimeographed material to reporters.

Harsh floodlights destroy the room's air conditioning as television newsmen cameras are set up to record the words of the wealthy tycoon talking about his income tax deductions.

This is the present world of Bernard Goldfine and what it takes to tell Congress and the public about his deep and ardent friendship for Sherman Adams.

No fighter since Sugar Ray Robinson has traveled with a heavier stable of camp followers, comforters and professional guides.

The Goldfine organization for his current appearances before the House subcommittee on legislative oversight consists of his wife Charlotte, their two sons Solomon and Horace, seven attorneys, three public relations men, two secretaries, typists, mimeograph operators, photostat operators and an endless stream of bellboys.

The setting—several suites in the Sheraton Carlton Hotel for the Goldfine family and some of the attorneys, plus a large suite across Washington's busy K Street at the Statler Hilton.

"It's almost like covering a candidate's headquarters at a national convention," observed a reporter in the hallway outside Goldfine's suite.

Presiding over the public relations side of the operation was Tex McCrary, former foreign correspondent, TV personality and now head of a large New York public relations office. McCrary said he was here in response to a plea for help from

Roger Robb, Goldfine's chief Washington attorney.

McCrary assigned two of his staff members, William Safire and George Britt, to the task of getting information from Goldfine and his battery of lawyers and relaying it to reporters.

McCrary's television background crops out when he refers to Goldfine's prepared texts as "the scripts."

McCrary says he is here serving without fee or compensation for expenses, and purely because of his longstanding friendship with Robb. It might also be noted, however, that McCrary has been one of Sherman Adams' most ardent supporters and admirers since the 1952 presidential campaign which first carried Dwight D. Eisenhower to political success.

A prime example of McCrary at work was the 25-page document Goldfine read to the subcommittee Wednesday as his opening testimony. Here is the unvarnished story of how the document came into existence.

When it was determined, Goldfine would have to appear before

the House members, Lawrence Cohen of Boston, family attorney for the Goldfines, began to put together the essential facts. Samuel Sears, also of Boston and an attorney for Goldfine's companies, joined in the preparation.

Robb joined the advance guard in work on the testimony with his specialist's eye on Washington angles. When the Goldfines came to Washington last Sunday they were joined by other attorneys including former Judge Sol Gelb of New York who was on the staff of Thomas E. Dewey when Dewey was New York district attorney. Gelb is a specialist in cross-examination and coached Goldfine on what to expect.

On Tuesday night the testimony was virtually complete. Robb spent long hours talking with Goldfine. Armed with technical and financial data from Cohen, Sears and James Kelleher, another Boston attorney, Robb then sat down and put on paper Goldfine's words and style of phrasing.

Later Tuesday night, not many

hours before Goldfine made his debut before the committee, the textile manufacturer read the final draft aloud. McCrary listened, watched and made notes, taking care to remember each time Goldfine pounded his fist on a bedside table for emphasis.

Then a final-final or "reading" copy for Goldfine was prepared and here McCrary went to work. He followed his television training and "scored" the testimony, underlining in heavy red pencil each point—a word or a phrase—where Goldfine had pounded for emphasis.

He explained to Goldfine the red underlines meant those words were to be "punched" or accented.

McCrary also noted that after reading for a few minutes Goldfine's voice began to crack. In red pencil he wrote into the script at appropriate points, "Glass of water."

One line McCrary recognized as a laugh producer, but thought Goldfine should remain serious. Text wrote between the lines, "Don't laugh."

When the script was "scored" it was well after midnight and Goldfine was asleep.

Robb confided to McCrary his firm belief Goldfine's massive inner strength would see him through the tribulations of the congressional inquiry. In fact he thought Goldfine would be great.

McCrary smiled, reached for the script and fished out his crayon. Across the top of the first sheet McCrary wrote in firm red letters, "You will be great."

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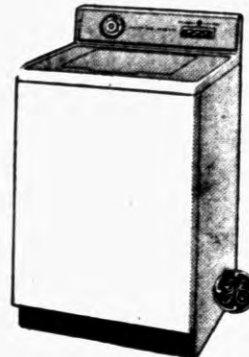
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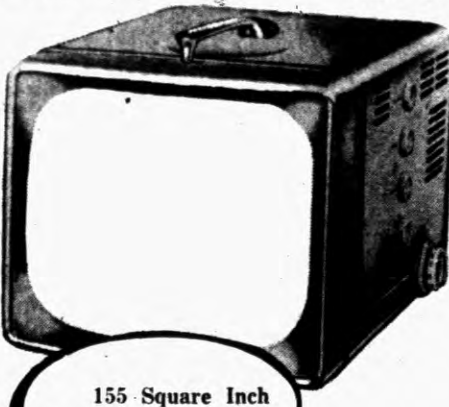
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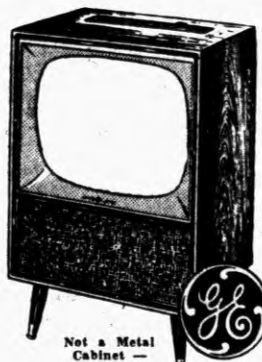


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U.S. SIXTH FLEET

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Tiddlywinks Suddenly Becoming Popular

LONDON (AP)—Tiddlywinks used to be for kids. But in Britain lately the game has caught the interest of muscular athletes, intellectuals, and even the royal family. To play tiddlywinks you take a firm hold of a bone or plastic disk and snap other disks around a table. At Cambridge University there is talk, admittedly on the sophomore side, of making tiddlywinks an event of the Olympic Games.

Why the sudden upsurge in the popularity of the humble little game? No one really knows; but possibly the lazy weather of recent weeks has something to do with it. It's more fun than irregular verbs. Tiddlywinks, a very old game not figuring conspicuously on the sports pages, got lifted into the academic atmosphere at Cambridge, where students idled away some spare time snapping the disks. Cambridge organized a team — Peter Downes, captain — and claimed the world's tiddlywinks championship. There being no other known contender, Cambridge's claim was secure until the University of Oxford challenged.

There was a noisy match, and Oxford won by an eyebrow, 113 to 111. So presumably Oxford holds the championship, but Cambridge protested that the play was an unimportant preliminary to serious, official tiddlywinks competition. Oxford received a challenge from the University of Pennsylvania and the Oxford captain Elliott Langford, agreed to take his mates to America next year if they can raise the fare for the journey.

Then the Goons, popular troupe of entertainers, challenged Cambridge and invited a conspicuous

athlete, Prince Philip, to join their team. From Buckingham Palace the prince issued a light-hearted statement saying: "While practicing secretly I pulled an important muscle in the second, or tiddly, joint of my winking finger."

Being partial to polo, the prince

indicated that tiddlywinks must take a secondary place in his esteem, and added: "This is naturally very disappointing, but at least it gives my side (the Goons) a much better chance to win." Then Oxford challenged the House of Commons. Lawrence

Taylor, who represents Oxford in Parliament, agreed to organize a team of tiddlywinks-lawmakers.

So tiddlywinks is snowballing, and there are indications that there will have to be a world convention to lay down some rules. The kids, who up to now have

monopolized the game, play it without umpires, or precise laws. But in Britain there is a rudimentary literature of tiddlywinks, and one manual says:

"Take an egg cup, and set it in the center of a blanket spread taut on a table."

Then competitors each get five winks, the little disks which they lay on the blanket, and press down on them with the tiddly, the shooter disk, in such a clever manner that the winks are snapped and made to jump into the egg cup. The wink is prone to kiss the lip, as in golf, and then dunder off somewhere else.

Less expert players, the manual suggests, might start off with a somewhat larger target, like a beer stein or a bowler derby hat.

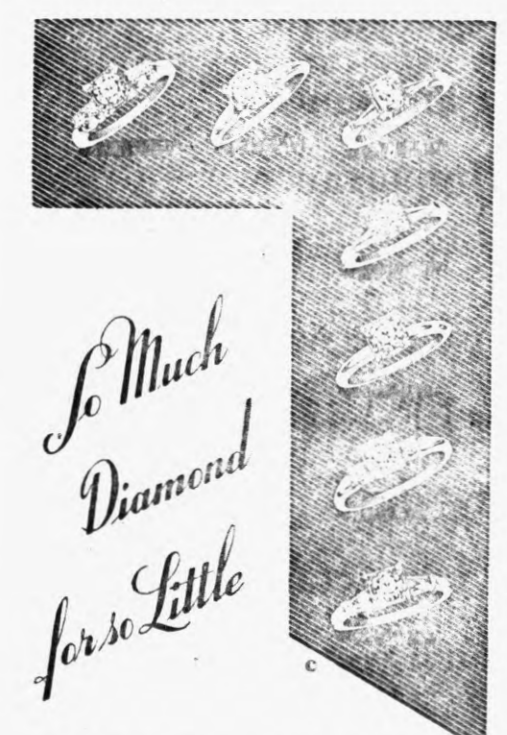
