Rare Books Missing

Oakland University law enforcement officials are investigating a rare book theft from the Kresge Library on campus that could involve as many as 350 volumes worth approximately \$73,000.

The works were taken from the college archives located on the lower level of the library.

OU Public Safety Investigator Mel Gilroy said the theft was discovered March 22 when a set of volumes was determined missing by Dan Ring, college archivist. A subsequent investigation of the archives holdings has

turned up additional missing works. In some cases, the shelf cards for the works were missing as well.

University officials are not disclosing the titles of the works but say that the person or persons responsible went for first editions, the "cream of the crop."

Officials said they are convinced that the works could not have been misplaced or misfiled and that they were stolen.

Because such thefts often involve interstate transportation, Gilroy said he is consulting with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Summer Hours Begin June 6

President Joseph E. Champagne has authorized reinstitution of the summer hours schedule followed the last two summers.

Individual units may make some exceptions to the schedule, but the following policy will be in effect for most of the university.

Beginning June 6, 1983, and ending August 26, 1983, summer hours will be effected for university offices and departments where feasible; i.e., where such offices or departments need not provide services on Friday afternoons.

This summer schedule specifies a Friday work schedule of 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The four-hour reduction in work time on Fridays will be offset by increasing work hours on Mondays through Thursdays by one hour each day, resulting in this schedule: 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., with a one-half hour lunch period. Lunch periods will normally be taken between 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. During the week of July 4th, the Monday holiday will be treated as eight (8) hours; thus, the Friday workday (7/8/83) will be extended for

one hour—until 12:30 p.m.

The summer schedule cannot be implemented for employees who are members of the AFSCME, POAM or FOP unions due to the nature of the duties performed and services provided by these groups of employees.

The supervisors of other offices or units where summer hours are not feasible will review their coverage needs and arrangements with their respective vice presidents.

The changes in work hours should be reflected in any calendars, printed schedules, or other material in which reference is made to hours of operation.

Robot Safety Program

The OU Program in Industrial Health and Safety is sponsoring a UAW/Chrysler Health and Safety Conference April 25-29 and a Robot Safety Conference on June 1-2.

The activities are part of the interaction between the university, area industries and governmental agencies.

The April 25-29 program is co-sponsored by Chrysler Corporation and will address industrial hygiene and safety engineering issues important to the automobile manufacturing industry. Chrysler safety professionals throughout the U.S. will attend the conference as well as UAW health and safety representatives.

The June 1-2 conference is co-sponsored by the Motor Vehicle Manufacturing Association to focus on human health and safety aspects relating to the use of robots and advanced automation in manufacturing. Practical information relevant to the training of maintenance and safety personnel on robot safety and work procedures will be discussed. Attending will be health and safety professionals from General Motors Corporation, Ford Motor Company, Chrysler Corporation, American Motors, International Harvester, V.W. of America, and Volvo. Representatives from academic institutions and the general public would be welcome.
