Miss Michigan No Cooking Star

MUSKOGON (AP)—The new Miss Michigan has a honey of a figure and does a first-rate hula, but she says her cooking can stand some improvement.

The state's representative in the 1966 Miss America pageant, 19-year-old Gayle Ann Chancey of Dearborn, was chosen last night after leading the Miss Michigan competition through the week.

Gayle Ann will take to Atlantic City a 5-foot-5, 112-pound frame, plus the silhouette and hula-dancing aptitude that won her the swimsuit and talent competition in the Muskegon pageant.

The blue-eyed, brown-haired beauty measures 34-33-34.

A graduate of Dearborn Community College, she attributes her victory to hard work and the poise she gained in the past year as a professional model—including work with Ford Motor Co. in Michigan and California.

Perhaps ironically, she wins the use of an Oldsmobile for one year—courtesy of General Motors Corp. Other prizes include \$1,650 in scholarships and awards, gifts and prizes worth about \$5,000.

The victorious Miss Dearborn admits to some ability at sewing and housekeeping, but says she has trouble cooking and would like to improve.

She had planned to enroll at Michigan State this fall.

But according to Robert Babb, meteorologist in charge of the U.S. Weather Bureau in Lansing, you might as well forget the averages.

"There is no relief in sight," he said. "What is happening is that the high level wind currents have been blocked in the Ontario and Great Lakes area."

STICKS AROUND

"Once a pattern of this kind develops this time of year, it usually stays for a long time," he added.

The current heat wave be-

gan June 21, and 8 of the last 10 days of the month were over 90. July started out the same way, with a 93 yesterday.

Navy Planes Sink 3 N. Viet Torpedo Boats

Attempted Attack on
Destroyer; U. S. Loses
4 Aircraft Elsewhere

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Firing bombs and rockets, U.S. Navy planes sank three North Vietnamese torpedo boats which made a high speed run at an American destroyer, the U.S. command announced today.

Fourteen aircraft from the aircraft carriers Hancock and Constellation took part in the two-hour engagement 28 miles from North Viet Nam's coast yesterday.

The planes returned fire after antiaircraft guns aboard the Communist craft opened fire.

Navy destroyers in the area picked up 19 North Vietnamese survivors.

The torpedo boats are small ships equipped with torpedoes, cannon and heavy machine-guns. Normally, they are manned by no more than 15 men.

The enemy gunners damaged one American plane, but the pilot made it back safely to the Constellation.

PLANES LOST

In another development, the U.S. Command announced that four U.S. planes were lost in various missions over North Viet Nam yesterday.

2nd Highest June for Cars

Companies Report
on Auto Production

DETROIT (AP)—June auto output wound up at 821,943 cars, second highest ever for that month and topped only by the 899,098 posted in June, 1965.

That was shown yesterday in preliminary production reports from the four U.S. auto companies. Some of the car lines have finished their 1966 model run.

The production clip in the first half of 1966 ran well behind that of a year ago. For Jan. 1-30 this time, the car total was 4,918,870 units compared with 5,158,724 a year ago.

Chrysler was the only auto company whose June output topped that of a year ago as it set a new June high of 139,383 cars, topping the old mark of 134,485 set in June, 1965.

Failure to Rezone Site for Apartments Hit

Pontiac took a backward step in easing a serious housing shortage when city commissioners refused to rezone a site for a \$3-million apartment project, two commissioners who favored the development said today.

"Obviously, I felt it was good planning and the logical use of the land," said Commissioner Robert C. Irwin, who was on the losing end of a 5-2 vote to reclassify 20 acres on the city's far East Side.

Leslie H. Hudson, the other commissioner in the minority and a member of the City Planning Commission which had unanimously recommended approval of the zoning, expressed disappointment in the commission for its reasoning in rejecting the plan.

The commission on Tuesday denied the request of developer Joseph Dreaser to rezone property just north of the Herington Hills Subdivision from single-family residential to multiple dwellings.

Dreaser had planned to build 100 apartment units and later add another 166 when existing sewer facilities in the area are expanded.

The land is between Featherstone and Mount Clemens and immediately east of the Grand Trunk Railroad tracks.

The accident occurred about 7 p.m. She died at 10:15 p.m. at the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

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JFK Jr. Suffers Burns



HONOLULU (AP)—John F. Kennedy Jr. has received "mild burns" from a campfire on a Hawaii beach.

The son of the late President suffered what his mother described as "minor burns on his right hand and buttocks."

John Jr., 5, was reportedly tugging at a sleeping bag when he stumbled and fell into the still-hot coals of a beach campfire Thursday.

The Kennedy's — John, his mother, sister Caroline, 9, and cousin Sidney Lawford — were visiting Parker Ranch on Hawaii Island, 200 miles southeast of Honolulu, when the accident happened.

The picnic was being held on a nearby beach belonging to Mauna Kea Hotel.

TREATMENT

Immediately after the accident, John was treated by Dr. Keith Nesting of Hilo, on Hawaii Island. The family returned to Honolulu yesterday.

After the Kennedy's return, Don Harjo, press secretary to Hawaii Gov. John S. Burns, released this statement:

"I have been instructed by Mrs. John F. Kennedy to report that John Jr. suffered minor burns to his right hand and buttocks at a beach picnic yesterday.

"He was therefore brought to Honolulu and is under the care of Dr. Eileen Dykes."

Pontiac Div. June Output Is Best Ever

Pontiac Motor Division announced yesterday it built more cars last month than in any other month in its 40-year history.

John Z. DeLoorean, a General Motors vice president and general manager of Pontiac Motor Division, said 89,123 Pontiacs and Tempests were assembled last month, surpassing the previous monthly record of 88,903 units built in March of this year.

The division produced 84,473 cars in June 1965 and 82,496 in May of this year, according to a company official.

"We're confident our outstanding performance will continue the remainder of the year," DeLoorean added.

"So far this model year, we have assembled 787,319 cars," said DeLoorean. "This is well ahead of the previous record of 684,153 set in the same period a year ago."

Russians Seen Biggest Winners on De Gaulle Visit

MOSCOW (AP). — Diplomats taking a second look at President Charles de Gaulle's 11-day Soviet visit say he may have helped the Soviets more than they helped him.

De Gaulle returned to Paris Friday after a widely-publicized tour that produced friendly speeches from both sides, but little in the way of major political agreement.

The biggest Soviet gain was De Gaulle's decision, even before his arrival here, to withdraw France from the military arm of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, some diplomats said. The Soviets have long sought to break up the alliance and reduce U. S. influence in Europe.

The Russians also reaped dividends from De Gaulle's speeches here and the Communist regime is expected to make use of them to emphasize French support of Soviet policies.

For example, de Gaulle repeatedly described the Soviet Union as a country with peaceful intentions.

He also backed the Moscow line of peaceful coexistence. He did not mention the apparently contradictory policy of Soviet support for Communist-led wars of national liberation such as in Viet Nam.

The French-Soviet accords signed for cooperation in science and space were also seen as Soviet gains.

Although high French sources said they saw no contradiction, there was some question whether the Soviet-French agreements on scientific and technical cooperation might conflict with similar U. S. French accords.

HAVE TO WAIT

It was understood that the proposed Soviet launching of a French satellite, for example, would have to wait until the French can build an entirely

French satellite with no American components.

De Gaulle received warm welcomes throughout his tour. But when he sat down for formal discussions, he got nowhere on his major proposal for a series of bilateral talks, including Soviet-West German talks, toward easing tensions in divided Europe.

The Russians showed no interest in any direct talks with Bonn. They stressed instead East Bloc security. For the Russians, this means keeping Germany weak.

Despite the deadlock over major international questions, de Gaulle viewed his trip as a step in the right direction. There was no question that at least the atmosphere of Soviet-French relations had improved.

NO CHANGE

But the practical level of relations between the two countries remained largely unchanged. Trade was one example.

Psychiatrists Ponder 2nd 3-Child Killing

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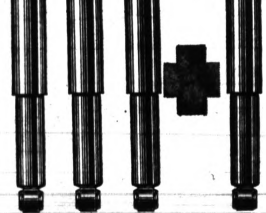
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
