Nixon Reacts to LBJ Blast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans have reacted sharply to President Johnson's slashing attack on Richard M. Nixon — the man often mentioned as a possible contender for the presidency in 1968.
Employing former President Harry S. Truman's familiar "give 'em hell" tactics, Johnson told a televised news conference yesterday that Nixon is a "chronic campaigner" who "doesn't serve his country well" by raising doubts about American intentions in Viet Nam.
The former vice president promptly accused Johnson of making "a personal, partisan assault" in a "shocking display of temper."
Nixon said he would make a more detailed reply to Johnson on nationwide television tomorrow.
House Republican leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan said Johnson's remarks were "a vicious personal attack" on Nixon.

Car Kills Man in Waterford; 3 Die in Crash

A Pontiac man was killed early today when struck by a car in Waterford Township and three other persons were fatally injured, when their car collided with a truck yesterday afternoon near Romo.
Killed while walking along Elizabeth Lake Road near Fernbury at 2:22 a.m. today was Robert E. Eason, 26, of 637 Desota.
The driver of the car that struck Eason, Lynn D. Steinheper, 19, of 886 Spence, told police that he didn't see the pedestrian in time to avoid striking him.
Steinheper, who was driving east, said that the accident victim was in the center of the eastbound lane.
Eason was dressed in dark clothing, according to police.

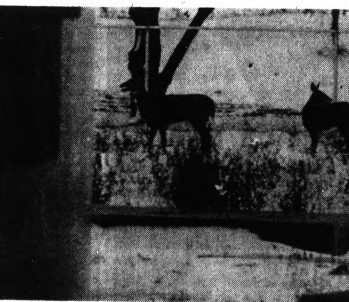

Viet Battle Rages; 8 Dead on Carrier

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Communist troops counterattacked viciously today against a large American infantry force that had overrun enemy bunkers in the jungles near Tay Ninh Province entered its third day.
Pitched battles have erupted in three places in the past three days in the province which borders Cambodia and serves as a main infiltration route into the heart of Viet Nam.
The pattern of enemy at-

tacks indicated a whole Communist division may be engaged.
Elsewhere, eight U.S. servicemen died and 14 others were injured last night in a flash fire aboard the aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt off North Viet Nam.
A Navy spokesman said the fire caused no functional problems and the carrier will stay on station in the Gulf of Tonkin. It was the second U.S. carrier fire in 10 days.
In the air war over North

Viet Nam, two more U.S. war planes were downed yesterday bringing the total reported lost in the north to 418, a U.S. spokesman said.
There was no letup in the Tay Ninh fighting today, a spokesman said.
Several battalions of American infantrymen holding the Communist bunker complex they overran yesterday were attacked six times this morning and early afternoon.
A civilian irregular defense

force comprised mainly of Nung tribesmen and their American officers was still fighting for its life to the west.
A U.S. spokesman said "multitribal" forces of Americans are now involved in the Tay Ninh fighting. This could be as many as 10,000 infantrymen.
Elsewhere in Viet Nam, the ground war was quiet, with only the U.S. 4th Division reporting any contact. Troops from this unit engaged a North Vietnamese platoon today near Plei Djereng, killing six.

Texas Confab May Influence Tax Increase

McNamara, and LBJ Discuss Troop Needs, Defense Spending

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, holding some of the keys to a possible wartime tax increase, discusses defense spending and Viet Nam troop needs with President Johnson today at the President's ranch.
The Texas White House said Johnson wanted to meet with McNamara to review the Manila conference to talk about diplomatic efforts to arrange a Viet Nam peace and to consider the most recent reports from Gen. William C. Westmoreland, U.S. commander in the war-torn country.

Westmoreland's requests for additional troops, and the war's impact on defense outlays, seemed certain to dominate the conversation, however.

Johnson has said repeatedly, most recently at his news conference yesterday, that McNamara's efforts to hold down military spending, despite the war, will play a big part in the tax decision.

Another element is the level of appropriations passed by the now-adjourned Congress, a matter which Johnson said is being studied.

Former Governor of Pennsylvania Lies Near Death

PITTSBURGH (AP) — David L. Lawrence, Democratic kingpin whose behind-the-scenes power helped elect presidents, lingered near death today after suffering a heart attack while addressing a political rally.

Lawrence, 77, former governor of Pennsylvania, was in critical condition in Presbyterian University Hospital.

He slumped to the floor before an audience of some 3,000 last night just as he was starting a speech.

Elated UF Chairman Hails Response by Community

The luncheon was sponsored by 36 businesses who had donated money towards meals sponsorship during the 1966 campaign.

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Rampaging Waters Recede in Italy

FLORENCE, Italy (AP) — The waters of the worst floods in Florence and Venice since the Middle Ages receded today, leaving the two museum cities blackened with mud and without vital public services.

Thousands of rescue workers struggled through slime dotted with debris and stained with fuel oil. Streets became bogs and buildings were coated with mud below the second-floor level.

As the Arno River settled back into its bed at Florence and Adriatic Sea waters flowed out of Venice, other Italian cities remained inundated or became flooded.

Landslides, violent winds and floods — part of a huge storm that battered all Western Europe — took more than 40 lives in Italy alone.

NO INFORMATION

The U.S. Embassy in Rome said it had no information about Americans in the flooded areas but added that there was no indication so far that any foreigners were among the victims.

In southern Austria, floods killed at least 11 persons. Dozens were missing and feared dead in the European storm and hundreds were injured. Destruction was incalculable.

As the floods began ebbing at dawn, authorities in Florence, the Renaissance art center of 450,000, and Venice began adding up what they feared was immense and irreparable damage to priceless cultural relics.

Some 50,000 relief workers, aided by dry weather after almost two days of rain, joined local volunteers to aid more than 100,000 Italians left homeless. The storm struck especially hard at north and central Italy.

Annexation Proposal to Get Hearing

A public hearing on proposed annexation by the Village of Holly of 418 acres of Holly Township will be conducted early next month by the boundaries committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors.

The committee yesterday directed Holly Township Supervisor Seeley Tinsman to establish an early December meeting date.

Proposed for annexation by the Village Council Sept. 13 was land directly north of the village limits with a population of about 300 persons.

Provision for the orderly growth of the village was one reason cited in the annexation petition.

Following the public hearing next month, the boundaries committee will make a recommendation on the proposed annexation and refer it to the full Board of Supervisors.

ANOTHER HEARING

The supervisors will hold another public hearing before ruling on the annexation.

The 1886 act, under which the Village of Holly was incorporated, rules out an election procedure for annexation of adjacent land.

Thomas, 25, was apprehended with a man identified by police as his brother, Jerome Thomas of Chicago.

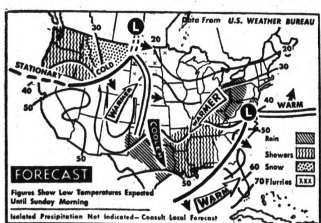
Benlon Heights police said they will also question the pair in connection with the armed robbery last night of a grocery store there.

Police Pay Unrest in State Is Spreading

Police unrest over wages spread yesterday to Grand Rapids and Lansing, Michigan's second and fourth largest cities, in the wake of a police "sick call" job boycott and strike threat in Pontiac.

Pontiac's policemen patrolled their beats yesterday, the first full day of a truce in which a stalemate over police pay was thrown in the lap of a state mediator.

The mediator's "fact-finding" hearings were scheduled to begin Nov. 3.

In Lansing, the state capital city of 115,000 residents, a citizens' vote next Tuesday on whether firemen's pay should be boosted to match that of policemen threatened to touch off mass resignations.

At least 20 of the city's 220 policemen reportedly promised to quit if voters approve the "parity pay" proposal.

About 20 of Lansing's 267 firemen said they would resign if the proposal is defeated. Lansing policemen now get \$550 a year more than firemen.

Seeks Short Term for Judge

Attorney Daniel C. Devine announced today that he is seeking election to the short-term Oakland County Circuit Court judge's post in Tuesday's election.

Devine, 32, of 743 Harmon, Birmingham, said that he has 10,000 name stickers in circulation that can be used by voters. The unexpired term of the late Circuit Court Judge Stanton G. Dondoro will be filled by write-in or sticker vote because no candidate was nominated for the vacancy in the August primary.

Devine said that the short-term winner probably would take office two weeks after the election when the vote is certified and serve until next Jan. 1.

Married, with five children, Devine is a member of the law firm of Condit, Denison, Devine, Porter and Bartush, and is a former assistant Oakland County prosecutor.

Cite Dem Literature 5 GOP Hopefuls File Charges

Five Oakland County Republican candidates last night filed complaints with the Fair Campaign Practices Committee in Detroit.

Raymond Hoffman, trustee candidate in White Lake Township, and Elmer Johnson, candidate for supervisor in Waterford Township, complained that their opponents who were appointed to office in mid-term are using the term "reelect" in campaign literature.

Johnson is opposing Mrs. Dorothy Olson and Hoffman is facing Raymond Stepien in the election.

George Kuhn, candidate for a state senator in the 14th District, has claimed that his opponent, Paul Livingston, is using campaign material that purports to be excerpts from three news papers.

One of the excerpts accuses Kuhn of verbally attacking Gov. Romney before the governor's election. Kuhn denies such charges.

'STATE EXPENSE'

Donald Bishop, opponent of Robert J. Slingerland in the 63rd State Legislative District, has alleged that Slingerland is using a legislative report as campaign material that was printed and mailed at state expense.

Bishop also claims that a letter from Durwood Varner, chancellor of Oakland University, was included in the Slingerland mailing and that it was not authorized by Varner.

The letter thanks Slingerland for assisting the university in the State Legislature.

The final complaint was made by James Reid, candidate for

supervisor in White Lake Township.

He alleges that his opponent, Edward Cheyz is using a letter written in 1964 by the township GOP director, Jay Lee, which praises the township government. No date is affixed to the letter used as campaign material.

Action on the complaints probably won't be forthcoming until after the election, according to Bruce Franklin, attorney for the Oakland County Republican Committee.

The Coast Guard has enlisted the aid of hunters in an attempt to locate a 43-year-old Waterford Township duck hunter missing at Saginaw Bay since Wednesday.

A 12-foot boat belonging to Gerald Stinson, 2093 Briggs, was found late Thursday along the shoreline about a mile south of his car which was parked at the end of Geiger Road between Bayport and Sebewaing.

An air search yesterday failed to turn up the missing hunter, and the Coast Guard was air-lifting hunters by helicopter this morning from the mainland to the off-shore islands near where Stinson was reported hunting alone.

State police of the Bad Axe post said a blinding snowstorm with winds up to 50 miles an hour hit the Bay Wednesday. The marsh area around shore is covered with ice today making it impossible to launch boats.

JAKARTA, Indonesia (U-P) — A ferryboat carrying 28 persons to the outer islands off Sumatra capsized Oct. 23 and 20 persons, including four Catholic priests, are still missing, the official news agency Antara reported today.

MUSKOGON (UPI) — Florida couple were arrested yesterday in a cottage filled with loot allegedly stolen during a two-week crime spree in Muskogon County. Police from seven police agencies in the county raided the cottage along Lake Michigan and arrested Frank Wysocki, 26, and his wife, Ida, 38. They gave their address as Baldwin, Fla.

WASHINGTON (U-P) — The Department of Housing and Urban Development has approved a \$298,408 grant to the Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority to help buy 219 acres of land in Brownstown and Berlin townships, Wayne and Monroe counties. The land would be used for park, recreation, scenic and conservation facilities.

DETROIT (U-P) — Elmer Jackson, 35, a suspended night attendant at the Wayne County House, pleaded innocent yesterday to charges of assaulting an inmate of the home last June 7. The 15-year-old youth, who has been released from the home, said Jackson, without provocation, had hit him several times with his fist.

LANSING (U-P) — Gov. Romney, proclaiming Nov. 11 as Veterans' Day in Michigan, urged citizens to "continue our prayers for our fighting boys in far-off Asia that they may be returned home safely and soon, their mission having been successful."

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — While his tactical drive was ed, a conservatively dressed young man robbed the Mayfair branch of the First National Bank of \$1,400. Unaware that an armed robbery had been committed, a cab driver dropped his fare three blocks from the bank and received a 70-cent tip in addition to the \$2 on the meter.

NEWPORT (U-P) — An 11-year-old boy was fatally wounded in the stomach yesterday when his brother's 32-gauge shotgun accidentally discharged. Dead is Paul Edwin Jaworski, son of Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Jaworski of Newport. Monroe County Sheriff's men said the boys had just returned from hunting and the older one, Dennis, 17, was employing his gun when it fired.

LANSING (U-P) — By proclamation of Gov. Romney, Thursday is Marine Corps Day in Michigan. Nov. 13-19 is Quality Control Week and Nov. 18-24 is Farm-City Week.

BOSTON (U-P) — A state representative has proposed what he terms a "brown coat" amendment to Massachusetts' 3 percent sales tax law. Rep. Alfred R. Shilling proposed a \$200 ceiling on tax-exempt clothing. "If a person can afford a dark mink coat," said Shilling, "he or she can afford to pay the 3 per cent tax on it."

DETROIT (U-P) — Two bandits bound porter William H. Johnson, and ransacked a West Side cocktail lounge. But before leaving, they asked Johnson for his employer's telephone number. Minutes after the bandits left, bar owner Chester Lawrence received a telephone call informing him his porter was tied.

body, but its content was not released by investigating officers.

Mrs. Howey told sheriff's deputies that her husband received a telephone call just before leaving for work.

She stated to officers that the phone conversation apparently concerned recent vandalism done to the Howey mailbox and others in the neighborhood.

Mrs. Howey, who is a teacher at Lake Orion Junior High School, reported that her husband had been receiving harassing phone calls relative to the mailboxes vandalism.

She said the calls charged that Howey was responsible for the young Hinton girl getting into trouble with the law.

Capt. Leo Hazen said yesterday that Howey, an employee of General Motors Corp. Truck & Coach Division, was not the one in the neighborhood who complained about the vandalism.

Hazen said, in fact, that when a deputy questioned Howey he declined to identify those responsible, although he reportedly had caught them in the act.

Considered an average student at Lake Orion Junior High School, young Charlotte was questioned Tuesday afternoon just before her death about the vandalism Monday night.

Sheriff's deputy Donald Winkler questioned the girl, according to Hazen, outside her home about area mailboxes being sprayed with paint.

'ADMITTED PART'

Hazen said the girl at first denied the vandalism, which included two other girls, but finally admitted a small part in it.

Winkler reported that Charlotte agreed to tell her parents. Winkler told her she would return later and talk to them.

A girlfriend, however, called a girl friend who had implicated her in the Halloween hijinks. Hazen said she reportedly wanted the friend for telling on her to shoot herself. The friend did not take her seriously.

Charlotte was found dead of a gunshot wound early that evening. She was lying on a bed with a rifle beside her.

The neighborhoods of the suicide victims are about a half-mile apart.

Firemen Save Man in Home

A \$350 fire blazed on careless smoking nearly claimed the life of a Pontiac Township man in his home yesterday.

Joseph Kooper, about 37, of 595 Calgary was found lying unconscious on the floor of his home by township firemen who entered the burning house about 1:45 p.m.

Fire Chief Carl Shingee said Kooper — alone in the house — was dragged outside from a bedroom and resuspended when given oxygen.

Kooper was taken by ambulance to Pontiac General Hospital, but a hospital spokesman said, his injuries did not require admission.

"It was close," Shingee said. "Another five minutes and we might not have been able to save him."

The fire, which Shingee said was started by careless smoking, was brought under control in about 10 minutes by township firemen and completely extinguished in less than an hour.

Damage to the house was estimated at \$1,500 and to the furniture and other items at about \$2,000.

There are down to earth tips such as how to drive and pull a nail and about pliers and screwdrivers.

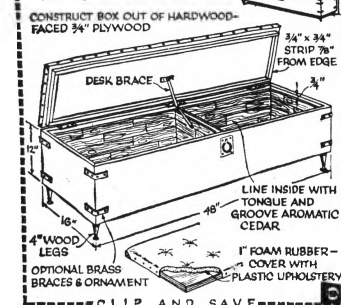

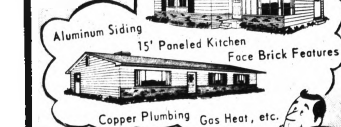

FNMA Changes Purchasing Steps



The Federal National Mortgage Association recently announced a change in its purchasing procedures under which lenders can sell qualified FHA and VA mortgages to FNMA under its Secondary Market Operations.

Under the corporation's new requirements, the maximum amount of a mortgage may be as much as \$55,000 for each family residence or dwelling unit if the FHA insurance commitment or VA certificate of reasonable value covers proposed new housing and the insurance or guaranty is dated on or after October 19, 1966.

Previously, if a mortgage on proposed new housing exceeded \$17,500, there was a requirement that a standby commitment be obtained before construction commenced.

Now, such mortgages may be purchased on either a standby or immediate purchase basis.

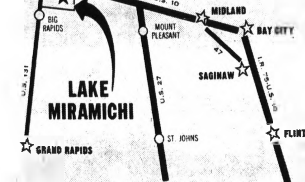
