

Hillings Urges All-Out Effort By GOP

Dulles Awaits Israeli Reply to Compromise

Provides U.S. Support for Free Navigation of Gulf; Security in Gaza

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States sought today a quick answer from Israel to an American compromise proposal for breaking the deadlock over withdrawal of remaining Israeli troops from Egypt.

The plan was presented to Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban yesterday by Secretary of State Dulles, reportedly with a request for a prompt reply which could come today or tomorrow.

The compromise would provide for an immediate United States declaration of support for free navigation of the Gulf of Aqaba by Israeli and all other ships, and for American backing of United Nations action to secure Israel against any future Egyptian attack from the Gaza Strip.

Israel had announced it would not withdraw from the two areas until it had assurances that (1) Egypt would not block Israeli ships from using the Gulf of Aqaba avenue to the Red Sea and (2) there would be no more Egyptian raids on Israel from the Gaza Strip.

The United States reportedly feels there is no prospect of getting such commitments from either Egypt or the United Nations.

DELAY DEBATE

The alternative to Israeli agreement to a compromise plan is regarded here as being a showdown over Arab-Asian demands for U.N. sanctions against Israel. Debate on those demands had been scheduled in the U. N. today, but the United States reportedly got agreement for a two-day delay.

Israeli troops occupied the Gaza Strip and the Sharm el Sheikh region on the Gulf of Aqaba during military operations against Egypt last October and November. Six U. N. resolutions have called for Israeli withdrawal.

The two-point U. S. formula was worked out by Dulles and his principal State Department advisers. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

Dems to Choose Big Delegation

Meet Tomorrow to Pick 114 to Represent County at State Convention

A record Oakland County delegation will be formed at the Democratic convention at 8 p.m. Wednesday at the County Office Building, 1 Lafayette St.

There will be 114 delegates picked to attend the state spring convention, 28 more than allowed last year, Chairman Carlos G. Richardson said. The increase is due, he said, to the increase in Oakland County's Democratic vote last fall.

A convention chairman will be chosen and two county candidates will be considered for endorsement, Richardson said.

They are William Harvie of Lathrup and Mrs. Irene Murphy of Birmingham.

Harvie, a road contractor and former member of the State Highway Commission, is running for state highway commissioner.

Mrs. Murphy, a social welfare administrator who served seven years in the Philippine Islands, is running for University of Michigan regent.

The state convention in Grand Rapids Feb. 23 will nominate 10 candidates to run on the party's spring ticket. Posts include: State highway commissioner, superintendent of public instruction, member of the State Board of Education, two regents, and two members of the State Board of Agriculture.

Three supreme court justices will be nominated on the non-partisan ballot.

Kindness for the Kindest of Men



Abraham Lincoln's kindly life was climaxed, at the very end, with one final, touching act of kindness shown him in return.

A young assistant surgeon from the army, by merest chance, was snatched into the center of the drama surrounding Lincoln's last hours.

Charles A. Leale, because he was first to respond to the call for a doctor in Ford's Theater, became the doctor in charge of the case.

Dr. Leale's memoirs give a terse story of the humble gesture of friendship which was a final symbol of human compassion.

Lincoln was a hero to Dr. Leale. Earlier in the evening the doctor had joined a crowd outside the White House to hear the President say a few words about the conclusion of the war.

"I was profoundly impressed with his divine appearance as he stood in the rays of the light which penetrated the windows of the White House," the doctor wrote later.

"The influence thus produced gave me an intense

desire again to behold his face and study the characteristics of the 'Savior of his Country.' I changed into civilian dress and hurried to Ford's Theater."

Dr. Leale was the first person to enter the box after Booth's shot reverberated. He gave first aid but knew immediately that the assassin's blow was mortal.

He directed the distraught knot of men who carried Lincoln across the street through sobbing crowds. Then in the small room where they laid him, he sat in attendance at the shadowy bedside during the remaining hours.

It was Dr. Leale who offered the fallen hero mankind's final, gentle gesture of farewell.

These are his words:

"Knowing that frequently, just before departure, recognition and reason return to those who have been unconscious, caused me for several hours to hold his hand firmly within my grasp to let him in his blindness know, if possible, that he was in touch with humanity and had a friend."

Colors, he said, will be selected to accent a woman's eyes and skin tones, and often to go especially with her fanciest outfits.

The 1957 look, Slater said, will accent wide swirls of curls from the ears up, with the hair falling close to the cheeks on the sides, and brushed up in the back.

Girl Drowns, Pushed in River

12-Year-Old Shoved by Young Schoolmate into Ice-Filled Rouge

DETROIT (AP) — A 12-year-old girl, drowned in a narrow rapid stretch of the icy Rouge River yesterday.

Police said a schoolmate told them he pushed her in and failed in his efforts to rescue her.

Dragging operations continue for the body of Geraldine Galt, a seventh grader at the Ann Arbor Elementary School in Dearborn Township. Geraldine drowned in six feet of water.

Detective Robert Garton quoted an 11-year-old boy as saying he pushed the girl in the water "after she said my brother was stupid."

The boy, whose name is withheld, tried to rescue Geraldine by extending a stick, Garton said, but was unable to reach her. He then went home and told his parents who called police.

Garton quoted the boy as saying: "We were down by the river trying to catch mice. We were on a little island, like, of ice. My brother tried to jump back (to shore) about four feet away. He missed and got his feet wet. Geraldine said he was stupid."

"I said, 'Well, he's smarter than you are'; then she tried to push me into the river. We walked farther and then I pushed her in."

Garton said the girl apparently went under ice and couldn't get back above the surface.

The child was held by juvenile authorities, pending completion of the police investigation.

Addresses 500 From County at Annual Affair

Congressman Appeals to Party to Continue Leading Nation

The political challenge of 1960 was posed last night before an estimated 500 Oakland County Republicans at their annual Lincoln dinner.

Congressman Patrick J. Hillings (R-Calif.) called for an all-out effort to retain national leadership when President Eisenhower no longer can top the ticket.

After censuring Gov. Williams, Hillings put forward a four-pronged program to put Republicans in office.

With a rap at what he called "coat-tail" campaigns . . . "We

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can't use like as a crutch," he said . . . Hillings made these suggestions:

1. Good candidates.
2. Party unity.
3. Enlistment of middle-of-the-road Democrats.
4. Precinct level campaigning.

Hillings stressed by saying: "We should beat the opposition at their own game. In 1956 we were beaten, in many cases, by a better organization."

The 33-year-old congressman, once the youngest member of Congress and now serving his fourth term, sparked the 67th annual banquet sponsored by the Oakland County Lincoln Republican Club at Northwood Inn. There was a capacity crowd.

HILLINGS INTRODUCED

Hillings was introduced by Congressman William S. Broomfield, of Royal Oak. Former Congressman George A. Dondero, of Royal Oak was toastmaster.

Listing accomplishments of the first four years of Eisenhower Republicanism, Hillings called attacks on the President and his top aides "sniping."

He criticized Gov. Williams' charge the Republicans are losing support. "The Democrats are made up of two extreme groups," he said, "the Reuther party and the Dixiecrat party."

"The Republicans, however, are basically the party of the center — we get things done because we" (Continued on Page 2, Col. 6)

Ann Arbor Voters Facing Bus Bonds

ANN ARBOR (AP) — The Ann Arbor City Council last night agreed to ask the voters for authorization and a \$150,000 bond issue to purchase a city-owned bus line.

The Great Lakes Greyhound Corp., earlier notified the city it will suspend its intracity service here on March 5.

The city will request the general obligation bond issue at the spring election on April 1. Voters also will be asked to approve a 1/4-cent tax levy to finance operation of the buses.

Elect President of USW Today

First Time Leadership of Steelmen Challenged —Dues Raise Is Issue

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Members of the United Steelworkers elect a president today. For the first time in the union's 70-year history, the leadership is challenged.

The issue: dues.

Running against the 54-year-old President David J. McDonald is a Pittsburgh district steelworker opposed to a hike in dues from \$3 to \$5 monthly. He is Donald C. Rarick, 37, who works at the nearby Irwin works of the U.S. Steel Corp.

USW members also are voting for other top officers, including district directors. In only a few instances are there any opponents for the slate led by McDonald, who succeeded to the presidency after the death in 1952 of Philip Murray.

Howard R. Hague of Pittsburgh has no opposition for his job as vice president.

However, Secretary-Treasurer I. W. Abel of Pittsburgh is opposed by William Klug of Milwaukee. Wis. Klug is a member of Rarick's "Dues Protest Committee."

The committee was formed after a USW convention last fall hiked the dues. Rarick claimed there was no roll call vote. McDonald said the vote was fair and the raise stood.

The same convention hiked McDonald's pay \$10,000 a year to its present level of \$50,000. Salaries of the vice president and secretary-treasurer went from \$25,000 to \$35,000 annually.

Rarick says he wants those salary increases rescinded, along with lowering the dues.

Rarick has campaigned throughout the country. He has claimed he was offered as much as \$250,000 and a "good job" with the union if he withdrew.

Plan Mental Testing of Accused Sniper

Request for a mental examination of Gary A. Taylor, accused as Oakland County's phantom sniper, was granted yesterday at the arraignment of the 20-year-old factory worker from Southfield Township.

A Feb. 27 date was set for an examination to determine whether there is enough evidence to bind Taylor over to circuit court for trial.

He was arraigned on a charge of assault with intent to murder, in the wounding Thursday of Shirley Eland, 19, of 200 Hickory Grove Rd., Bloomfield Hills.

Oakland County Prosecutor Fred C. Ziem said, "We hope to have psychiatrists examine Taylor within a week. If it is their decision that there is no need for a sanity hearing, Taylor will be processed through the normal criminal procedure."

"If psychiatrists say he is mentally ill, there will be a probate or circuit court hearing to determine sanity or insanity," Ziem said.

Bond of \$50,000 cash or \$100,000 in two bonds was set by Justice Richardson. Taylor's attorney, Gilbert Davis of Royal Oak, protested, but Richardson refused to lower it.

BACK TO HIS CELL
Taylor returned to Oakland County Jail, where he has been since Saturday.

A description furnished police by Miss Eland led to the arrest by Royal Oak police Thursday night, after some 10 persons were shot at, and two wounded.

Ballistics tests showed, according to Ziem, that the slug that struck Miss Eland was fired from the '22 Winchester found in Taylor's car at the time of his arrest.

GM Keeps Auto Race Lead as Big 3 Output Picks Up

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors continues to hold to its somewhat reduced share of the auto industry's total passenger car output.

Of last week's assemblies, put at 144,091 by Automotive News, the GM divisions accounted for 68,990; Ford Motor 42,709 and Chrysler 28,600. The week's total compared with 140,411 cars built by all makers in the preceding week. Of these, General Motors accounted for 68,914, Ford, 41,352 and Chrysler, 28,652.

So far this year the industry has built 214,013 cars compared with 236,017 in the like 1956 period.

Most industry analysts expect total volume to top last year's assemblies within the next few weeks. There is no indication, however, that General Motors is planning an immediate upsurge in its overall total.

Ford and Chrysler, on the other hand, are expected to continue their efforts to add to their percentage of the industry's over-all output. On the basis of current output,

General Motors is taking about 48.5 percent of the factory volume; Ford about 29 and Chrysler close to 20.
