Authorization for the University to continue expenditures in the absence of the final appropriation bill

President O'Dowd requested approval from the Board to grant the President and his representatives the authority to expend funds for the 1971-72 fiscal year within the limits permitted by law. The Legislature has authorized state agencies to continue at their current expenditure levels until such time as the 1971-72 appropriation bill is enacted.

In the absence of a specific appropriation bill and University budget, the following resolution is proposed:

"RESOLVED,

That in the absence of a 1971-72 legislative appropriation for Oakland University, the President and his authorized representatives have the authority to meet all necessary financial obligations of the University within the limits permitted by law."

Moved by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mrs. Kyes, the resolution was adopted.

Request for Extension of Collective Bargaining Agreement with A.F.S.C.M.E.

The Personnel Office has negotiated an Extension Agreement with Local 1418, Council No. 7, of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees of the current collective bargaining agreement. The current agreement expired June 30, 1971 and the parties are recommending Board approval of an extension on the following basis:

- 1. The Agreement is extended to midnight August 2, 1971.
- 2. During this extended period there will be no strike, work stoppage, slowdown, picketing, boycott, or other interference by Union or union-represented employee who is subject to this Extension Agreement and no lockout by the Employer.

3. Further extensions of this agreement can be made upon the mutual agreement of the Employer and Union if negotiations are not completed by August 2, 1971

It was moved by Mr. Carr, seconded by Mr. Lewis, that the collective bargaining agreement be extended under the conditions set forth above.

Motion carried.

Approval of Additional Ordinance Provisions

President O'Dowd recommended the adoption of the following proposed amendment to Section 2.02 of the Ordinance, making it clear that the excessive use of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on campus.

2.02 Alcoholic Beverages. No person shall use or possess any alcoholic beverage on the campus except in permitted areas as established in this section. The lawful possession and the lawful and moderate use of alcoholic beverages shall be permitted in the private areas of University housing facilities including rooms, suites, apartments, and private homes and during scheduled and official University activities at the Meadow Brook Festival grounds, Sunset Terrace, Meadow Brook Club House, and Meadow Brook Hall. The use of alcoholic beverages shall not be deemed to be moderate if it causes material impairment of the senses, judgment, or physical abilities of the user, or if it is used in association with a disturbance of the peace or other disorderly conduct.

It was moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Morris, that Section 2.02 of the Ordinance be amended as recommended. Motion carried.

- Mr. Howlett submitted information amending Section 3 of the University Ordinance, attempting to incorporate the state law provisions relating to disorderly conduct. The following section would incorporate the state law provisions, but it was the recommendation of Mr. Howlett that the previously passed Section 3, together with other sections of the public safety ordinance, would be sufficient to control personal conduct on campus.
 - 3.04 <u>State Law Provisions.</u> No person shall engage in conduct which would deem him to be a disorderly person as defined by the Michigan Penal Code, which shall include the following categories:

July 10, 1971

Any person of sufficient ability, who shall refuse or neglect to support his family; any common prostitute; any window peeper; any person who engages in an illegal occupation or business; any person who shall be drunk or intoxicated or engaged in any indecent or obscene conduct in any public place; any vagrant; any person found begging in a public place; any person found loitering in a house of ill-fame or prostitution or place where prostitution or lewdness is practiced, encouraged or allowed; any person who shall knowingly loiter in or about any place where an illegal occupation or business is being conducted; any person who shall loiter in or about any police station, police headquarters building, county jail, hospital, court building or any other public building or place for the purpose of soliciting employment of legal services or the services of sureties upon criminal recognizances; any person who shall be found jostling or roughly crowding people unnecessarily in a public place; shall be deemed a disorderly person.

After a brief discussion, it was moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Carr that Mr. Howlett's recommendation be adopted and that the amendment not be adopted. Further consideration will be given to the subject of the control of personal conduct on campus at a future date in order to determine the adequacy of existing ordinances and regulations. Motion carried.

Approval of Candidates for Degrees of B.A., B.S., M.A., M.S., and M.A.T.

President O'Dowd requested Board approval of the candidates for the degrees of B.A., B.S., M.A., M.S., and M.A.T., which are on file in the Office of the Secretary.

The Graduate Council has approved the master's degree candidates and the University Senate has approved the candidates for bachelor's degrees. It is requested that the approval be retroactive to April 21, 1971, in order to provide our graduates with the same State Board of Education certification date as other state university graduates. By utilizing the April date, this avoids a delay in certification for teaching and assists the graduates in obtaining employment.

Moved by Mr. Katke, seconded by Mrs. Kyes, that the degrees be awarded to these candidates and that the date be retroactive to April 21, 1971. Motion carried.

Mr. Obear brought to the attention of the Board that Mr. Mark Platt received his degree posthumously.

Confirmation of Honorary Degrees Awarded at June 5, 1971 Commencement

President O'Dowd requested confirmation of the honorary degrees awarded at the commencement exercises of June 5, 1971. At the May Board meeting the President was given informal approval to proceed in the selection of candidates and the following distinguished individuals were selected:

Mr. William H. Baldwin, President of The Kresge Foundation. The Kresge Foundation has been vital in the development of Oakland University. The Kresge Library, the Baldwin Pavilion, and the Meadow Brook Music Festival were all made possible by the generosity of the Foundation which Mr. Baldwin heads.

<u>Professor C. L. R. James</u>, Federal City College, Washington, D.C. Professor James, a widely-traveled, 70-year-old professor, is an expert on Caribbean history and politics. Active in political affairs in Africa and the Caribbean, Professor James has been at Federal City College since 1968.

<u>Dr. Myron Tribus</u>, Senior Vice President, Research and Engineering, Xerox Corporation. Dr. Tribus, former Dean of the Thayer School of Engineering at Dartmouth, served in the Nixon Administration as Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Science and Technology before assuming his present position at Xerox last year.

<u>Dr. Clifton R. Wharton, Jr.</u>, President of Michigan State University and commencement speaker. President Wharton was named to the presidency of M.S.U. the day Oakland requested its independence and was supportive of our efforts to achieve independent status. Prior to 1970, Dr. Wharton was Vice President of the Agricultural Development Council, Inc., a nonprofit organization supported by the Rockefeller Foundation.

Dr. Wharton and Professor James received Doctor of Humanities degrees, while Dr. Tribus was awarded a Doctor of Science degree, and Mr. Baldwin a Doctor of Laws degree.

Moved by Mr. Carr, seconded by Mr. Katke, the awarding of these honorary degrees was approved.

Authorization for Repair of Sports and Recreation Building Roof

President O'Dowd requested Board approval for the establishment of a project budget and the selection of a contractor for the replacement of the roof on the Sports and Recreation Building above the swimming pool area. It is recommended that the Board adopt the following budget, to be paid out of funds available in the IM Building Improvement budget.

It is recommended that the low bid from Firebaugh & Reynolds Roofing Company be accepted.

Mr. Smith inquired about the original contractor's liability and the construction bond on this building. Mr. Swanson advised the Board that there was a bond on the project and that the University's interests are protected by this action.

Mr. Swanson indicated that there is apparent disagreement between the original contractor, installer, and the roofing supplier as to liability. Mr. Smith suggested that all parties be joined in a suit in order to protect the University's interest. The Board was further advised that it would take approximately 15 days to repair the roof.

It was moved by Mr. Saltzman, seconded by Mr. Katke, that the recommended project budget and low bidder be accepted. Motion carried.

<u>Authorization for Repair of North Foundation Hall and Construction of Oakland Center Stairwell</u>

President O'Dowd recommended approval of the renovation of the fire-damaged area in North Foundation Hall, as well as improvements in the Oakland Center, in

compliance with fire safety recommendations. The open staircase adjacent to the Meadow Brook Room must be enclosed for fire safety measures.

The funds for these projects are to be provided out of the Alterations and Improvement Account, as well as from a special budget established for fire safety improvements and will be encumbered first from the 1970-71 fiscal year to the extent that funds are available. The project budget recommended is as follows:

Authorization for Repair of Foundation Drive

President O'Dowd recommended approval of the project budget for the reconstruction of Foundation Drive from Squirrel Road east to North Foundation Hall. The work would include asphalt pavement, drains, and concrete curbs.

Bid specifications were developed by Giffels-Webster, Inc., of Pontiac, Michigan, and bid proposals were received on July 9 from the following:

The bid proposals have been reviewed by our consulting engineer and by our Physical Plant staff, and it is their recommendation that the contract be awarded to Boardman Construction Company in the amount of \$17,700.

It is also recommended that the following project budget be approved, to be paid for out of the funds made available by Senate Bill #1183, Act #46 Public Acts of 1970 in the amount of \$21,000.
