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VARIED FARE SCHEDULED ON LECTERN, SCREEN AND STAGE

This is a busy week for lectures and films on campus. Monday noon the documentary film featured in the Abstention's "Brown Bag" series will be "No Vietnamese Ever Called Me Nigger," in which black veterans of the Vietnam war and residents of Harlem comment on the evils of the war and its relationship to the domestic racial crisis. Then at 2:30 p.m. Prof. Timothy L. Smith of the Johns Hopkins University will speak in 201 Dodge Hall on "Native Blacks and Foreign Whites: Comparative Responses to Educational Opportunity, 1880-1930." Smith is the author of the prize-winning "Revivalism and Social Reform" and of numerous articles on the history of religion, education and immigration in the U. S.

Highlight of the week for some (of us) will be the appearance in the Sports and Recreation Building at 1:30 p.m. Thursday of actress-turned-revolutionary Jane Fonda. Her topic is "Alternatives." There are also five talks in the series titled "Program in Religious Studies" involving several on the campus ministerial scene. See the calendar for times and places. The Classic Film Series presents two works, "Jules and Jim" on Wednesday night and "Shoot the Piano Player" on Thursday night. The Weekend Film Series features "The Thomas Crown Affair."

On the legitimate stage, the ADA Studio Company raises the curtain on The Merchant of Venice Wednesday evening -- and already reports a sellout on two nights. Better check the box office, ext. 3525, to assure yourself of a reservation. You get a cut rate on ticket prices, by the way. Meadow Brook Theatre, meanwhile, is concluding its production of Arthur Miller's The Crucible with a week-long engagement at the Detroit Institute of Arts Theatre. Opening week ticket sales on campus were the highest in the five-year history of the company.

COOPER IS KEYNOTER

Elmer B. Cooper (Urban Affairs) was keynote speaker last week at the California State Democratic Convention held in Sacramento. He took a leave of absence from his university position last year to serve as campaign manager for John V. Tunney, who unseated George Murphy in the race for the U.S. Senate. The convention served to introduce to the delegates four Democratic senators who are being groomed for the 1972 presidential nomination, Edmund S. Muskie of Maine, George McGovern of South Dakota, Fred R. Harris of Oklahoma and Harold E. Hughes of Iowa.

The trip is planned for April 24 - May 1 and involves round-trip air transportation between Windsor and Miami, plus seven days aboard the "Song of Norway," with scheduled stops in the Bahamas, Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico.
