Show's star says fame hasn't changed her

When Jenna Lewis of TV's "Survivor" walks into TGI Fridays, a young girl does a double take and then turns to her friend and starts whispering very obviously. According to Lewis, this kind of thing happens all the time, but she still doesn't consider herself a In front of mostly full Pioneer

food court, Lewis and Detroit Free Press TV critic Mike Duffy spoke at OU last night about the scoop on reality TV.

Since Lewis returned from the "Survivor" island about six months ago, she has been traveling around the country for give OU the scoop on reality TV publicity events, a reunion show and meet-and-greets, but the OU event was her first real

This might sound like something a celebrity would say, but Lewis insists she's still the same girl as before she left.

"I did something fun and I was on TV for it," Lewis said. "It doesn't change my thoughts of myself. I'm the girl that still gets up in the morning and eats cereal when I'm in my slippers and bleary-eyed, and I'm the girl that still stubs her toe walking in the hallway. No, I'm not a celebrity, not at all.'

Celebrities or not, the cast of Survivor made a hit show. Reality TV has been growing in popularity over the past few years, beginning with MTV's The Real World. Soon after, shows like Road Rules, Who Wants to be a Millionaire and Big Brother were reeling in viewers. Survivor became the new big deal, but Lewis never expected it to become so huge.

"I thought people might tune in and be like, 'What are these stupid Americans subjecting themselves to?" Lewis said. "It was groundbreaking, I knew that, so that's why I was interested in it."

On the whole, Lewis agrees with reality TV because of the fact that it's more real than any

scripted show. However, she said that she would never have tried out for The Real World; it was the competitive aspect of Survivor that drew her in.

"Besides the physical content, you have to vote out

She said, however, that there are misconceptions people might have about what really happens on reality shows as opposed to what is shown on TV.

For example, most people don't realize that there was a production tent just yards down the beach that had "do not cross" tape bordering it. If a cast member crossed the lines, they would be immediately disqualified. Also, all of the cast members had to sign a \$4 million contract saying that they would not reveal the winner to anyone.

It's things like these that Lewis spoke about to OU

"I really want people to understand sort of what they don't see," Lewis said. "A lot of the emotional aspect is what I really want people to get."

Other than that, Lewis said that they did a "fair representation" of what really happened.

As for Survivor 2, Lewis is unsure that it will be as

SS number key to theft

Identity theft hit close to home when OU student Timothy Evans was arrested this summer for allegedly using the names, dates of birth and social security numbers of two students in a scam against the MSU Credit Union. He is awaiting trial in the Oakland County Jail.

Identity theft can happen to anyone, anywhere.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice officials, criminals can easily steal one's identity by watching someone punch in a credit card number on the telephone or an ATM personal identification number. Some criminals search garbage cans for old receipts, bank statements and credit card statements.

Even the internet can give criminals access to private

information. "The ability for people to get credit cards online and through the mail is dangerous," said OU Police Lieutenant Mel Gilroy. "The technology shift had put a twist in fraud."

With this information, criminals can literally assume one's identity by making false applications for loans and credit cards, fraudulently using telephone calling cards, and, in the case at OU, allegedly making fraudulent withdrawals from bank and checking accounts.

"Someone used my Social Security number to get credit in my name. This has caused a lot of problems. I have been turned down for jobs, credit, and refinancing offers. This is stressful and embarrassing. I want to open my own business, but it may be impossible with this unresolved problem hanging over my head," said a consumer complaint to the

False alarms annoy dorms

False fire alarms this term

have rustled resident students out of bed and irritated many. Three residence halls have had false fire alarms. Hamlin

Hall has had two false fire alarms out of four alarms. Vandenburg Hall has had seven fire alarms, three were false. In Van Wagoner House, two of three fire alarms were false.

Mel Gilroy, OU chief of detectives, said, "The problem with students pulling fire alarms is that other students will begin to take the alarms casually and in the possibility of a real fire, this could present tremendous danger."

Fires in both Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey and Hiedelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, claimed three lives and injured 50 students. Surprisingly, the incident could have been lessened had students respected the fire alarms, authorities

said afterwards.

Residence Halls Council circulated a letter to all students living on campus. The letter urged students to stop setting off false alarms, because if there was a real fire, some students may take the alarm as a

Brandi Barwick, sophomore, elementary education, said, "This angers and annoys me, because I have to get up in the morning and someone has nothing better to do but play. I also expect college students to be more mature.

At this point no action has been taken to decrease the number of false alarms, according to Residence assistants and hall directors have been instructed to observe any suspicious

activity within the halls. OUPD urges anyone who has information about who is responsible for setting false alarms, please bring it to the attention of a resident assistant, hall director, the university housing office of OUPD.

OUSC stands ground on green space

The grass is always greener on the campus side and Student Congress wants to make sure it stays that way. On behalf of feedback from the student body, congress stood firm on its save-the-green-space resolution at its meeting at 4 p.m. Monday.

In the reading of Resolution 01-02, OUSC stated, "Let it be resolved that the OU Student Congress does not support the proposed expansion site of a Research and

Development Park, (amendment) or any further development of that land, as stated in the draft of the OU's Master Plans.'

This pronouncement was made in response to the much ballyhooed master plan for future campus construction that has been the cause of heated student concern and controversy.

Student congress legislator Desmond Van Houten announced that the intention of this resolution is to specifically negate the loss of



- There are over 100 different types of brain tumors, making effective treatment very complicated.

Cancer linked to phone use

"Cancer", it is a word we fear and yet in the near future over 80 million Americans could be diagnosed with brain cancer.

Today, anywhere you look you can see people talking on their cell phones. You hear the ringing in classrooms, malls, and restaurants. You see people chatting in their cars and walking down the street.

The FDA stated that "Current scientific evidence does not show any negative health effect, but some recent studies suggest a possible link between mobile phones and cancer, and warrant follow-up."

Tests done by Dr. George Carlo, chairman of Wireless Technology Research, have shown that the rate of death from brain cancer among cell phone users was higher than that of people who do not use cell phones.

Also the tests showed that benign tumors of the auditory nerve were 50% higher in those who reported using the cell phone for more than six years, and the risk of rare neuro epithelial tumors on the outside of the brain were more than doubled in cell phone users.

Dr. Lennat Hardell, a Swedish doctor who studied phone habits of brain tumor patients, found that those who use their phones on the left side of their head had a predominance of tumors on the left side, those who used the phone on the right side had a predominance of tumors on the right side.

In a recent report done by 20/20, we learned that the problem lies in the fact that cell phone conversations are possible CANCER continues on A8 through microwaves. The cell phone transmits a microwave signal from the Cellular Service Rate Plans antenna to a tower, often miles away. The farther away from the tower, or if

the phone is in a car or building, the more power is needed to make or keep the connec-

"The concern is that these microwaves have the potential to alter our DNA and our tissue," stated Ian Harvey, journalist for the Toronto Sun.

"Depending on how close the antenna is, as much as 60% of the microwave radiation, is absorbed by and penetrates the area around the head. Some reaching an inch to an inch and a half into the brain," reports Brian Ross

According to Harvey these microwaves have shown to cause symptoms ranging from memory loss, headaches, change in sleep patterns, change in blood pressure, to full-blown tumors.

Cellular providers offer many options

Choosing a cellular service carrier can be confusing and annoying. With all the rate plans and hidden costs it's hard to decide whom to go with. Planning and a little research can alleviate some of the stress.

important to remember when looking for a wireless phone company. Don't just pick the first wireless carrier you hear about, pick the one that can best fill your needs.

According to Wirelessadvisor.com, selecting a wireless phone service carrier and getting signed up for service can be broken down into six simple steps.

First of all, think about where, how and when you will use your wireless phone. Next, think about how much you want to spend each month for wireless service. Then you must determine which companies provide wireless service in your area. Next, investigate each carrier's calling plans, rates, features and phones. You also must match a plan to your needs and budget, and finally, sign-up for service. In Southeast Michigan, the options are numerous.

Verizon Wireless has a unique option called the Single Rate. Single Rate plans range from \$35 - \$200. The \$35 plan includes 150 minutes. Plans go up to \$200, which includes 2,000 minutes. The rate stays the same whether the minutes are used or not, so choosing this service for emergency purposes is not the best idea.

Additional minutes start out at 25 cents and go up to 40 No single wireless carrier is best for everybody. That's cents per additional minutes used. With a two-year service agreement there is no activation fee, but a one-year service agreement has a \$25 activation fee. All plans include caller ID, call waiting, call forwarding, three-way calling, voice mail and no answer/busy transfer.

VoiceStream Wireless offers four rate plans. The basic plan includes 300 minutes and costs \$39.99. The next plan includes 600 minutes at \$59.99, 900 minutes at \$89.99, and 1,500 minutes at \$139.99. Additional minutes start out at 25 cents and go to 35 cents.

Whatever service you choose it will include first incoming minutes free, voicemail with message alert, built-in paging, caller ID, conference calling, call waiting/call hold, 10 cent VoiceStream calls, detailed billing, emergency calls, customer care and directory assistance. If you plan to use

your phone often, VoiceStream offers a generous amount of minutes for inexpensive rates.

For emergency use only, Ameritech has a plan to check. Basic service costs \$9.95 plus 35 cents for each minute used. Additional plans include rates starting at \$19.99 for 50 minutes and go up to \$139.95 for 2,000 minutes. The company also offers extras, but the costs climb, except with the \$39.95 for 300 minutes plan. Ameritech has a flat rate for additional minutes used, which is 35 cents. Ameritech does offer a good variety of plans, but does not offer the extras

AT&T Digital One Rate has many benefits including national coverage, no roaming charges, no domestic wireless long distance charges, and lots of great features included with the plans. The monthly rate starts out at 450 minutes for \$59.99 and goes up to 2,000 minutes for \$199.99. With features like call waiting, call forwarding and caller ID. Additional minutes are 25 or 35 cents, but there is no charge for long distance, regional or national roaming.

Nextel offers rate plans starting at \$39.95 for 150 minutes and go up to \$199.95 for 2,000 minutes. Rate plans include caller ID, three way calling, call hold and call waiting. Additional minutes are 25 cents. Long distance is a flat rate of 15 cents and roaming is free.







Q. What should I do with my money to ensure that I have enough for retirement? Are there particular companies I should absolutely have in my portfolio? -- D.G., via the Internet

A. A recent census statistic revealed that only one out of every 10 Americans of retirement age today is financially able to TRULY retire. As in, financial independence. That means not waiting for a Social Security check, not hoping that such and such stock "will just hit \$110 for me." Not waiting or hoping for any-

We suspect that an infinitesimal percentage (some percent of a percent) of all people between the ages of 0 and 65 presently enjoy tue financial independence. We know this because we've met many of you, all across the country! (By the way, thank you for lending your knowledge and experience to others every day via our online forum.)

For the rest of us, we are left with some important questions:

* How much money do I really need to save by the time I retire?

* How can I ensure my money lasts as long as I do?

* Where should I invest both before and after retirement?

Of all the stocks out there (and there are more than 9,000 to choose from), which are most suitable for "retirement investing?" Which do you think will most likely be doing business successfully in 25 years? That is the sort of metric we would use for stocks in a retirement portfolio. It's actually very similar to the approach taken by another fellow investor: Warren Buffett. Which of the companies on our public markets today will be vital and valuable businesses in the year 2025?

We admit that we cannot claim with near certainty that any single company will be around and thriving in 2025. Some will argue that business is changing so rapidly today that what we think of as the "1950s predictability" no longer exists in our world at all. Indeed, perhaps we cannot say with 99.9 percent certainty that any company in the entire world today will compound annually at a rate of 12 percent or higher over the next 25 years.

Regardless, we must still invest if we hope to achieve financial independence. For money that you don't need to touch for at least five years, or even 10 years or longer, the stock market is the place to be. There is no other investment vehicle within the last 100 years that has outperformed stocks over the long term. Not bonds, not real estate, not certificates of deposits, and certainly not Beanie Babies.

As we've stated before in this column, the best place for an investor to start is with an index fund (we partially like the S&P 500 index fund). Putting your money into one of those buys you portions of 500 of the largest companies in the United States. And you're guaranteed to match the returns of "the market," as measured by that index.

After that, be a forward-thinker! Consider what businesses you think will be there (and profitable) in the long-haul. WHAT NOW?

Investing saves students cash

Does the future determine what will become of us, or do we determine what will become of our future?

For many students, just getting through each day is task enough, let alone planning for the future. But the truth is, even destiny sometimes needs help, and investing in the present could help secure the future.

In an interview with several local financial experts, it was discovered that being out of the market can actually be more risky than being in it.

Some of the experts felt people have a tendency to wait for the "right time" to invest in the market, and that can be a big mistake. It's referred to as "chasing the market." This investment technique doesn't work well due to the rapid changes that continually occur. The experts also agreed that "investing is not about 'timing' the market, it's about

'time in' the market."

Expenses at college level can have students scrambling to afford their daily investing on a tight budget?

Our experts 'offered several simple ways that students can get started in brokerage house of choice, the next step investing:

"Students might consider cashing any savings bonds they have, and investing those funds for bigger returns. They might also want to consider moving some of their savings account funds, which on average only earn about 2 percent, to some type of money market plan. They can get started with as little as \$25, and can make weekly or monthly deposits."

So, where does the money-wise student go for advice? Our experts agreed that there are two options, banks and brokerage houses; and they agreed on the fact each one has different advan-

can also be a bit more impersonal. When guarantees in the market, it's a bit of a you invest with your bank, there is usually more of a personal relationship and coffee-fix, so how does a student begin the convenience of having one person handle all of your banking needs."

Once an investor finds their bank or is to choose what they want to invest in. The obvious choice these days seems to be tech stocks, which have been the big market kahuna for quite some time now. The experts we talked to offered some

"I feel that tech stocks will continue to do well, but are leveling off to some degree. Some new hot stocks coming up in the next year will be defense stocks, home construction and the bigger technology companies, but as I said, things

do change rapidly in the market." What exactly are the risks in this rapidly-changing market, and how can a would-be investor plan wisely?

the performance history of your chosen stocks and companies, as well as the history of the market. The market throughout history has averaged a 10 percent interest rate."

Knowledge of the inherent risks involved can make one feel that the market is no place for those who are faint of heart, or in this case, wallet. Our group of experts agreed, stating unanimously that "The market can pay off well in the long run, but people should not invest funds which have an immediate cash-flow affect on their lives. It's better to utilize whatever funds they can

Recount leading to national changes

Federal Trade Commission, last year.

"Someone is using my name and Social Security number to open credit card accounts. All the accounts are in collections. I had no idea this was happening until I applied for a mortgage. Because these "bad" accounts showed up on my credit report, I didn't get a mortgage," according to another consumer complaint to the FTC.

In 1998, Congress passed the Identity Theft and Assumption Deterrence Act which prohibits the use of another person's identification to commit any unlawful act that constitutes a violation of federal law or that is considered a felony under any law. The offense carries a maximum of 15 years in prison, a

The Department of Justice website offers tips to protect against identity theft. Rule number one, individuals should never give out personal information to anyone they don't know or trust. Also, people should request a copy of their credit report on a regular basis. Finally, everyone should keep and maintain careful track of his/her financial records.

"Don't use your social security number as identification, don't even carry it," said Gilroy. He also expressed concern that social security numbers are now required to be on college applications, typically for financial aid reasons.

When asked for a social security number, the Federal Trade Commission recommends asking four simple questions. "Why do you need my social security number? How will my social security number be

fine, and forfeiture of personal property used in the used? What law requires me to give you my social security number? What will happen if I don't give you my social security number?'

OU students are not only cautioned against carrying their social security cards, but also their student identification cards, since OU uses social security numbers as student identification numbers.

Students have the option of changing their ID numbers by filling out a form in the registrar office, 106 O'Dowd Hall. To make the switch, student must bring a picture ID and their social security card.



Covering chaos

n election night last Tuesday people who were tuned into the major media outlets were confused by the news sources calling the election prematurely.


A lot of Americans were left wondering why the media was in such confusion about who won the election that night and how the presidentelect is actually decided.

By 3 a.m. Eastern time all of the major TV networks and internet news outlets had announced Bush as the winner.

Neal Shine, a professor of journalism and a veteran Detroit Free Press reporter and editor for 46 years, said the media's inaccuracies that night were caused by the pressure of the major media outlets to be the first one with the information.

"If it comes down to being first or being right, being first always wins out," Shine said. "The need to be first directly conflicts with the need to be accurate.'





Also, Shine said that the networks ignored common sense and expert advice not to announce a winner because networks didn't want to be the ones who didn't release what all of the others were.

Assistant professor of political science John Kelly, a former state senator, is a member of the electoral college in Michigan. According to him, the media should not have called the election until the electoral college voted.





New website offers a place for students to express creativity in a variety of ways

Attention all artistic and creative people of cyberworld. A new website, nibblebox.com, is a channel to display the talent of college students interested in creating broadband internet entertainment.

Nibblebox.com, whose advertisement frequently runs in the Life Section of The Oakland Post, encourages aspiring filmmakers, animators and game designers to submit content for the site. In return, Nibblebox may provide some students with tools, funding and mentoring to create and deliver innovative video, radio and animated content for the Web.

The site showcases short, episodic programming (webisodes), 24-hour a day college radio and local mini-sites created by Nibblebox student affiliates.

The webisodes, also called "nibbles," are funny and irreverent, and designed for an audience of 18-24 years-old.

One of these nibbles, "Virtual Rob," has already generated buzz among the online crowd. Created by three film students from University of Southern California, "Virtual Rob" is being hailed as the first "Clickable

Browers to the site can choose Rob's movements in 40 ways from various points in his virtual off-campus apartment. Students get to pick the outcome of his everyday situations, like Rob getting in a heated confrontation with his next door neighbor, or preparing to go on a virtual

his or her creativity on Nibblebox. There is a careful process in determining the pro-

jects the site wants to develop. To submit a web project, the creator must attend a school affiliated with Nibblebox. So far more than 107 colleges are affiliated with the site, including NYU, Yale, Columbia and OU.

The student then submits an idea for review by the Nibblebox programming board. If it's approved, it goes through the site's development cycle, and the student is assigned a mentor who gives advice. The student is also given equipment, like cameras and lighting, plus up to \$5,000 in funding to create his or her short film. The final product runs on Nibblebox, and the creator is paid \$500 an episode. The keep the filming equipment.

The mentors are famous producers, actors and actresses,

You've heard it on the radio and now it's time to purchase it for your own personal music library.


Lifehouse is here and ready to stimulate your senses with its debut album No Name Face.

Blink' CD alive with disappointment

It's the feeling you get on Christmas morning when you wanted a new bike, a Playstation Two or whatever you had your heart set on and you got a sweater instead.

This is the feeling you may get from the new Blink-182 CD, The Mark, Tom, and Travis Show. If you are expecting a full new Blink-182, buyers beware, this CD is full of live versions. Looking for new tracks? Don't hold

your breath, you may be disappointed. Blink's new disc is a live CD that was recorded in San Francisco on November 4 and 5 in 1999 at The Bill Graham Civic auditorium and The Universal Amphitheater. The CD includes 20 music tracks as well as 49 tracks of these guys talking on stage and

goofing around between songs. By no means is it bad, actually it is pretty good, but it is about time for a new Blink-182 CD. This live version just doesn't cut it. It's not very impressive if a band can release only live versions of it's bigger hit songs.

The CD also claims to have six previously unreleased tracks and while the CD does have six songs never on a CD before, three of them are not exactly what you would call real music. "Family Reunion," "Blew Job," and "The Country Song" are just the guys "singing," (more like gloating and fantasizing) about sex and swearing. They are not exactly what you would call real songs.

The other three new tracks are "Peggy "Wendy Clear," and Overboard." The first two songs are live renditions that are not on any album but could be heard echoing in the sold out venues Blink played this summer. They are pretty decent songs, but not Blink's best work. The latter is the only studio track on the CD, "Man Overboard." It is the newest offering that is getting plenty of airplay on modern rock stations and is currently number two on the Billboard Modern Rock Chart. It is a hit single, "Dammit."

Grizzly men win second straight exhibition game versus G.T. Express

Kampe's team prepares for U-M, MSU match ups this weekend

One can almost smell it in the air; Basketball season is upon us once again, and the men's team is out to prove that last years conference title wasn't just beginners luck.

OU played its second exhibition game on Friday night against the G.T. Express as the team captured its second straight victory. Mychal Covington was almost flawless in his shooting performance as he went 10-11 from the field to help him reach 22 points on the evening.

The G.T. Express held an early lead, 22-12, midway through the first half. OU then went on an 11-2 run over the next three minutes. Jon Champagne made a jumper to pull within one 24-23. The teams went back and forth with baskets at both ends leaving the G.T. Express up by three. Freshman Mike Helms hit a three-pointer to tie the game 33-33. As the first half ended the teams tied at 43 points a piece.

OU came out hot in the second half scoring first off a layup by Dan Champagne. The Grizzlies continued on its run and took a 51-43 lead. Once the Grizzlies held the lead, they never looked back and defeated G.T. Express 109-93.

"We played really well, we just need to keep improving and keep getting better," said junior Dan Champagne.

Following Covington's game high 22 points, was junior Brad Buddenborg with 20 points, six boards, and three assists. Freshman Kelly Williams added 18 points and four rebounds. Helms scored 17 points and grabbed six boards while Jason Rozycki rounded out the double-figure scoring with 15 points and dished out seven assists.

"We worked out the rough edges," said Rozycki. "We have a tough weekend ahead of us and we learned what we need to work on before we play U of M and MSU.'

OU has a chance to face Michigan in its season opener this Friday with hopes of turning the tables on the Wolverines from a year ago. While Sunday will be equally challenging, if not more, as the Grizzlies face the Spartans of Michigan State.

"We have played in some big games and we are ready for Michigan and State. If we play to our potential and capitalize on their mistakes, any-


thing can happen," said Champagne. The test of time awaits the Grizzlies as they gear up to face the challenge brought upon them. If the exhibition games are any indication as to what the future holds, OU is on the right track to defend the conference title. Come Friday, OU will be in the driver seat to possibly win arguably the biggest game in OU's basketball history.

"Its possible, winning is possible. Anytime you have two teams go head to head with each other things can happen. We are ready for this weekend, it should be as exciting to watch as it will be to play in," said Champagne.

"It should be fun, and there is nothing better than playing in front of a large crowd, especially a crowd that is giving you the momentum. It makes an impact having that home court advantage," said Rozycki.

The women's basketball team started its 2000-01 season right where it left off from last year...victorious. Last Wednesday OU downed the OGBM Legends 91-87 in exhibition play in the O'rena.

Leading the Grizzlies offense was sophomore Katie Wolfe with 28 points and seven rebounds. Right behind her was senior Beth Zeone recording 14 points, eight rebounds, and seven assists. Junior transfer Lori Kipp had 13 points and four assists while senior Jamie Ahlgren rounded out the double figure scoring with 11 points, three boards and three assists.

With the loss of one of its top players in junior Sarah Judd, (out with a knee injury), the Grizzlies had hold of a 39-36 lead at the half. Coming out strong in the second half, OU led by as many as 18 points, but slowly saw that number dwindle in time.

"Once you get a lead it's hard to keep it," said Wolfe. "We have to learn not to slope down and keep the momentum on our side.'

It came down to the last seconds of the game, 42 to be exact as Ahlgren hit two free throws to give OU a two point lead. OGBM's Wanda Ford came back to score on the Grizzlies with a layup and ran down the clock to 23 seconds to tie up the game. As anticipation filled the air, Wolfe scored the winning basket for OU with 14 sec-

onds left on the clock.

"I knew that we needed to score and I was in good position, so I got the feed, posted up and put the ball

Soon after, Kipp was fouled and sank two free throws with five seconds left to secure the lead and victory for

"When I made those two free throws, it not only secured my lead, but also let me prove myself and gave me more confidence," said Kipp.

The Grizzlies need that confidence as they get in full swing of the upcoming season. The team travels to Omaha to take part in the Nebraska tournament this coming weekend. Although they will face five opponents this season that were in the top 35 last year, OU has set its eye on the prize in the Mid-Con once again.

"I think we feel comfortable with each other," said Kipp. "I feel I can play with everyone on our team, and if things go this smooth and we work hard and together, we will do well."

The women are ready to face the fierce competition that awaits as many teams look for redemption against the Grizzlies. With four starters returning, including three Mid-Con selections, OU should be tough. Even the newcomers are ready to face the challenge.

"We all know that we need to step up, everyone is working well together, and we all want to win the Mid-Con again," said Wolfe.







Second City revue brings Detroit, big business scandals to stage

Watch out Ford and Firestone, Detroit's not going to let this blowout slide. Proof is definitely in the production at Second City Detroit's 19th review, "19th Nervous Breakdown.

Though some may recognize these words as having escaped from the oversized mouth of Mick Jagger in the 70s, this show only steals the title-well, possibly the theme, too.

The breakdowns it refers to are enacted in a series of maniacal spoofs such as the recent antics of Detroit big businesses (Ford Motor Company) and governmental agencies (Detroit Police Department).

"Initially I was turned off by the overdone Firestone stuff, but soon I found myself hysterical," said one patron from Sterling Heights.

The show opens with an African-American man silently taking the stage. Suddenly, a Caucasian man dressed in a Detroit cop uniform runs out, shoots him four times and then yells, "Freeze!" as his body hits the floor. Yes, Detroit is definitely not going to take this craziness lying down.

The seven cast members act out a series of skits, much like "Saturday Night Live." The six-member cast not only performs the skits but also co-wrote them. Most of their shows largely base its funny focus on hometown issues and concerns such as the Firestone scandal.

As the "Boyz" in the Grosse Pointe "Hood" the cast performs a rap song dedicated to the hardships "livin' up in the" G.P." With many of the actors originating from the metropolitan area, they pull off the local humor skits with a lunacy only true Detroiters can know and love.

But city humor isn't the only thing on display. The two-act show also takes its own route in comic relief. Cast member Maribeth Monroe brought some female Jim Careyisms into the show in her portrayal of a football coach directing a Shakespeare play.

Detroit native Marc Warzecha plays a raving man with an unusual sexual attraction to his dining room chairs.

Still others portray a Latino couple that own a "Taco Hut" who make love in the tortilla flour to add a little Latino pas-

The cast pokes fun at sportscasters, rich suburbanites, religion, Old Country Buffet, Abercrombie & Fitch, Canadians, Latinos, Caucasians, Middle Easterners - even the Notorious B.I.G. Everyone is a target.

Those who are tired of hearing about the presidential election will be happy to know that not one word was mentioned about any of the candidates.


"I was just glad they didn't get into anything Bush/Gore related," said one patron.

Trailblazer photographers display work at DIA

Keeping with the current trend to be reflexive and thoughtful as we leave the 20th century behind, the Detroit Institute of Arts (DIA) has put together an exhibit entitled "A Decade of Acquisitions 1990-2000:

Occupying the cozy Albert and Peggy DeSalle galleries, visitors are able to familiarize themselves not only with the curatorial styles of photography in the 90s, but also get a brief history of the photographic processes. Literature is available to explain how early photographs were made, such as the daguerrotype and salt print processes.

One section of the exhibit highlights this early period, documenting some of the first landscape, motion, and portrait photographs taken. William Henry Fox Talbot, an English photography pioneer from the late 19th century, is represented by his photograph of Chinese porcelain articles. A delicate salt print taken in 1844, the photo is covered by felt so that direct light does not damage and deteriorate the image.

Another noteworthy trailblazer in the exhibit is a small collection of images from Paul Anderson, who experimented with the printing process, using dyes and paper. The soft edges of his figures take on a nostalgic look, even in photos taken as late as the 40s.

OU students responded to some of the photographs that had a more modern feel to them.

Carrie Distelrath, elementary education, senior, found a favorite pho-

tograph, gelatin silver print, "Drugstore, Detroit" 1955.

"I really liked the Robert Frank because you can see how Detroit has changed over the years in the photo. There's a tension here because it's before the riots," said Distelrath.

Stan Chelsea, psychology and East Asian Studies, senior, liked the striking image of a Haitian man's face emerging from what seems like an abyss by American born photographer W. Eugene Smith. Only the distraught face of the subject is allowed any light in the black and white

Appropriately titled "Madness," Chelsea comments, "Not only did he get the face, he's also conveyed the loneliness of the moment. His isolation clearly shows through, it's very strong."

Maria Ranjo, East Asian Studies, senior adds, "I see a lot of mysticism and a sense of voodoo culture. If you know anything about voodoo, you immediately feel it, but even if you don't, you can still easily understand the fear that can surround a person."

Ranjo was interested less in torment, however, than the innocent joy that is portrayed in her favorite from the collection, a black and white photo by American photographer Wendy Ewald. Titled, "Sarfin and His Friend Salan Balak. Trust School for Street Children, Vichya, India," the candid shot lets the viewer in on the mischief of two young Indian boys as they chase each other.

Ranjo said the photo spoke to her.

"I responded a lot to the natural quality of the photo. The contrast is beautiful and so is the light coming from the corner. It's just a day to day event captured in the afternoon light," Ranjo said. "It reminds me of Dorothea Lange (whose work is also featured in the exhibit) or one of the photojournalists in the 50s. The candid aspect really impresses me and stylistically, the way that the camera is angled is really nice. The photo can be looked at from any angle. The faces are just, there.

It's fluid. It's not forced," she said.

And while there are many striking documentary images, the exhibit does a good job of representing the different purposes of photography. Upon entering the gallery, four black and white portraits by Armenian photographer Yousut Karsh greet the visitor. Not only are the carefully composed images photographed in a very heavy manner, the personalities of the subjects are equally weighty since they happen to be Andy Warhol, Georgia O'Keefe, Joan Miro and Pablo Picasso.

The intimate photos remind one of the inseparable relationship that artistic media had with each other in the 20th century. Warhol himself found joy and inspiration in photography.

Another nice thing about this collection is the clear effort to purchase not only the big names, but also artists that may not be familiar to everyone, but are still relevant to today's photography scene.

America's photographic enfant terrible of the 70s and 80s, Robert Mapplethorpe, is represented by two very UN-controversial studio photos of a Calla Lily, but they are juxtaposed with lesser-known artists like local photographer Lisa Spindler, who has yet to reach the

The partnering of past and present and of instantly recognizable and unfamiliar images in the collection leaves the lasting impression that much of the art of the 90s tried to do: emphasize diversity and multi-

Since each photographer, process and genre are represented by so few images each, it's hard to feel like you've really sunk your teeth into anything too deeply. Overall though, these recently acquired photos show that the DIA has worked hard to build its photography collection in the last decade with a multifaceted approach.

"A Decade of Acquisitions 1990-2000: Photographs" is currently on view at the Detroit Institute of Arts. The exhibition will run until March 4th, 2001. The exhibit is free with paid admission to the museum. Suggested ticket prices are \$4 for adults and \$1 for children. Students receive a discounted price when showing student ID.
