



Attorneys rule out conflict of interest

University attorneys have decided that there is no legal reason why members of the Board of Trustees cannot vote on a university policy on investments in South Africa

The opinion, delivered at the April 18 meeting, clears the way for a board vote on the issue. An ad hoc committee of the board will be formed to make a policy

recommendation to the full board at a special meeting to be set sometime in May.

Trustees with varying business and investment interests were concerned that they might be unable to vote on the issue under state conflict of interest laws. It was determined there were no conflicts.

At the March 21 meeting of the board a

report was received from an earlier university ad hoc committee that had been formed to consider the South Africa investment question. That committee recommended that OU prudently divest itself of holdings of companies doing business in South Africa.

The university ad hoc committee recommendation and other options were discussed at length during the April 18 meeting. Representatives of the university ad hoc committee, student groups, and a non student representative of the African Liberation Support Committee were present to voice their opinions on the issue.

Organizations honored

Sixteen student organizations were honored recently during Student Organizations Recognition Night. Kathy Abraham, coordinator for student organizations, and intern Marie Brown presided over the awards ceremony.

Winning awards for the most innovative programs were: the Psychology Club for ESP Day, Sigma lota for Pride Week, Delta Alpha Sigma for the Super Toga Party, the Yearbook Committee and Creative Writers for media involvement, the Health Consciousness Society for the Spring Run-Health Fair, and Repolitik for the forum on South African Apartheid.

The most diverse programming award went to the Jewish Students Organization, most original publicity campaign to the Order of Liebowitz for the Nova IV Science Fiction convention and the Society of Automotive Engineers won the most organized membership drive award.

The most organized September programming award went to the Intrepid Souls and GDI Society for Ice Breakers '79 and the

most extensive off campus programming award was given to the Slavic Folk Ensemble.

The most extensive cooperative programming award went to the OU Programming Society and the award for the Most Outstanding traditional event was given to the Meadow Brook Ball Committee for the annual Meadow Brook Ball.

A final special presentation was made by Mary Sue Rogers, University Congress president, to the Pre-Law Society as the most promising new organization and the award for organizational excellence was presented to the Association of Black Students and the Pre-Law Society.

Year-end accounting schedule set

The schedule for closing university accounting records for 1978/79 has been established. All financial data to be included in this year's business must be submitted by the dates specified.

Accounts payable: Invoices dated on or before June 30, 1979, for goods and/or services received during 1978/79 must be submitted to voucher audit by Monday, July 9 for inclusion in 1978/79 business. Claims for travel reimbursement which are to be charged to 1978/79 cannot include expenses incurred subsequent to June 30, 1979.

Payroll: Salaried employees will be paid June 29; labor, for pay period June 11-24, must submit time sheets by June 25, and will be paid June 29; student employes, for pay period June 18 to July 1, time sheets must be submitted by July 2, pay date will be July 6; MBPAC employes, for pay period June 25 to July 1, time sheets must be submitted by June 25 and pay date will be June 28.
