SEMINAR SET ON PRIVACY ACT

The new Family Rights and Privacy Act that affects student and parent access to school records will be explained in an Oakland University seminar Saturday, Jan. 18.

The program designed for parents and elementary and high school teachers is entitled "Everything You've Always Wanted to Know About Student Records but Were Afraid to Ask."

Sponsors are the students and faculty in guidance and counseling and the university's Conference Department.

Topics include "Student Records - The Law and its Implication for Parents and Teachers," "Between Parent and Teacher" and "Records Without Fear."

The Family Rights and Privacy Act went into effect Nov. 19. It is also referred to as the Buckley Amendment after its sponsor U.S. Senator James L. Buckley of New York. The act gives parents of elementary and secondary school children the right to inspect their children's school records and it gives students enrolled in post high school education the right to see their own educational files.

The seminar will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Oakland Center.

FINAL COUNT SHOWS PROJECT UNITY WITH \$3,168

Project Unity raised \$3,168 for the area needy final reports show. In addition; some \$200 worth of clothing and \$100 worth of food goods were collected. The university community and area merchants were solicited for contributions.

**SPANISH COURSE SET
FOR DOCTORS, NURSES**

Doctors and nurses in Oakland County and surrounding areas will have the opportunity to improve their relations with Spanish-speaking residents of the area thanks to Spanish 105 & 106, Spanish for Doctors and Nurses.

The special course is designed to bridge the communication gap existing between members of the medical profession and patients who speak little or no English.

Mariano Pallares, instructor of Spanish and Portuguese in the modern language department of Oakland University, conceived the course. He points out that in the Pontiac area alone there are over 5,000 Spanish-speaking residents who often refuse medical treatment because of cultural and linguistic barriers.

Pallares said, "Our aim is to diminish as many of those barriers as possible so that the treatment of patients is facilitated. Hopefully, the better understanding will create a more humane and less frustrating relationship between doctor and patient."

The course, which was offered successfully as a pilot project during the 1974 Summer Session, will be offered again through O.U.'s credit Evening Program in cooperation with Pontiac General Hospital. Spanish 105, 2 credits (taught the first 7 weeks of the semester) and Spanish 106, 2 credits (taught the second 7 weeks of the semester) will meet Tuesdays and Thursdays, 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the Nursing Classroom number 1 at Pontiac General Hospital.

Registration and book sales will take place the first day of class, Tuesday, Jan. 7, at the hospital.
