NOLTE TO LECTURE ON ARTHUR MILLER PLAY Charles M. Nolte, the noted actor, director and playwright, will deliver a public lecture "Arthur Miller and Death of a Salesman" on Monday, December 16 at 4 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall.

Following his public lecture, Nolte will begin rehearsals in preparation for Miller's Death of a Salesman which he will direct for the Meadow Brook Theatre starting January 2.

Nolte is an associate professor at the University of Minnesota and a board member of the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis. He is returning to Oakland after several previous visits. At the Meadow Brook Theatre, Dr. Nolte has staged several successful productions including "The Andersonville Trial," "Inherit The Wind," "The Front Page," "A Streetcar Named Desire," and his adaptation of Sophocles' "Oedipus Rex."

In 1961 his play "The Summer People" was produced in London. His other plays "Alexander's Death," "End of Ramadam," "Sister Heeno's Warm Elbow and The Boarding House" have been performed in the United States and Europe. A commissioned work on the life of Strindberg titled "A Night at the Black Pig" premiered in Minneapolis and was presented in Belgrade, Yugoslavia in 1971.

WHITE IS EDITOR OF WHITMAN SUPPLEMENT

William White, speech communication, has just been appointed permanent editor of the annual Walt Whitman Supplement to The Long-Islander, a weekly established by Whitman in 1838 and still being published in Hempstead, New York. The supplement, which ap-

pears on or about Whitman's birthday every May 31, has been edited by Whitman scholars around the world for the past 15 years and three times, including last June, by Professor White. His most recent publications are an introduction to Gary L. Harmon and Susanna M. Harmon's <u>Scholar's Market: An International Directory of Periodicals Publishing Literary Scholarship</u> (Columbus: Ohio State University Libraries); "Ernest Bramah's <u>Published Letters: A Survey" and an introduction to "Uncle Henry": An Uncollected Ernest Bramah Story," both in <u>Presenting Moonshine</u> (Tacoma, Washington), August, 1974; and "Literary Landmarks: Thomas Wolfe," <u>Literary Sketches</u> (Williamsburg, Virginia), November, 1974.</u>
