Counseling professionals learn the ropes at OU workshop

Participants in Oakland University's "Experiential Counseling Methods" are learning group counseling techniques using low- and high-challenge ropes course activities at Seaholm High School in Birmingham. The four-day workshop, sponsored by the School of Education and Human Services, concludes Thursday, August 9, at 5 p.m.

The seminar is designed for counselors, social workers, psychologists and other therapeutic professionals who work with groups. Most of the course is held on the ropes course and involves experiential learning. Participants develop their own personal leadership skills during the program.
