PRELIMINARY ANNUAL REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARIAN

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## I. A YEAR OF INCREASING DEMAND FOR BOOKS \& SERVICES

As the University grows, the use of public service facilities in the library, and the demand for a larger and better book collection show a predictable increase. Student enrollment rose this year from 3,896 to 5,094 , an increase of nearly $31 \%$ over last year. New undergraduate and graduate programs have been initiated, and programs established in previous years have been further developed. It is not possible, given the present library budget and staff, to satisfy all of the legitimate demands for library materials and services. Unfortunately, the gap between what is possible and what is desirable appears to be widening.

One accepted method of measuring library growth is that of comparing the expenditure per student for all library purposes and for book fund expenditures. Table I compares expenditures per student over a three year period. From $1966 / 67$ to $1968 / 69$, expenditures per student for all library purposes (state funds only) has declined from \$144.75 to $\$ 120.39$. Expenditure per student for books and periodicals, (state funds only) has declined from $\$ 62.92$ to $\$ 32.75$; and expenditure per student for all books and periodicals (state, grant, and gift funds) declined from $\$ 71.19$ to $\$ 56.83$. The years compared are those in which new graduate programs have needed unusual library support, certainly more than in previous years, when a less sophisticated, largely undergraduate collection was the immediate goal.

The pattern of book budget expenditure is also a matter of concern (See Table II). Over the same three year period, that portion of the book budget derived from state funds has declined from $88.4 \%$ to $57.7 \%$. Of the total expenditures for books for the three years combined, less than $70 \%$ derived from state funds. The apparently increasing reliance on grant and gift funds, an unpredictable source of revenue, is likely to have unfortunate results for the library collections. Unlike state funds for books, which may be expended for any sort of library material, grant and gift funds are almost always restricted for the purchase of books and periodicals in a broad or specific subject area, or for the purchase of special types of material. As a result, if the present trend continues, the nature of the library collection will in part be predetermined to favor some subject areas in ways which are not necessarily consistent with the University's academic programs and purposes.

Each year, the library's continuing commitment for periodical subscriptions and standing orders increases, as new subscriptions are placed. This regularly increasing encumbrance must be charged to unrestricted state funds. Unless state funds for book purchase are substantially increased each year, monies available for new purchases will certainly decline, and library growth will not keep pace with the growth of the University.
II. PERSONNEL

From $1966 / 67$ to $1968 / 69$, student enrollment rose more than $62 \%$, from 3,143 to 5,094. For the same period, full time salaried positions in the library rose by only $22 \%$, from 32 to 39 . Unfortunately, moreover, because of the national shortage of professional librarians and the regional shortage of clerical-technical personnel, many budgeted positions remained unfilled for each of the three years surveyed. On June 30, 1967, there were 27 filled positions (out of 32) and on June 30 , 1968 , there were 32 filled positions (out of 35). Projections would suggest that as of June 30 , 1969 , only 33 of the 39 positions budgeted for this year will be filled. Of the six positions expected to be vacant, four are for professional librarians and two are for graduate library assistants.

Again, because of the difficulty in filling budgeted full-time positions, the library has had to recruit part-time personnel on all levels, and progressively to increase the corps of student assistants. Nevertheless, funds allocated for the salaries and the labor budgets (combined) have not been spent out in any of the three years under review. (See Table III, p. 7). If the sum left unspent in the salaries budget for three years were available today, it would be sufficient to fund a year's appointment for an additional eight to twelve professional librarians.

## III. PERFORMANCE

Problems resulting from a shortage and a turnover of staff continued throughout the year, and acted to restrict service to the public and to limit the flow of materials to the shelves. Nevertheless, the performance of the staff in all areas of the library operation has been highly creditable.
(a) Division of Technical Services

## 1. Acquisitions Department

This department, responsible for bibliographic identification, ordering, receiving, and record-keeping of a variety of sorts, will by June 30, 1969 have handled a volume of material costing $\$ 289,510$ (projected), an increase of $26 \%$ over last year's book budget expenditures. New policies and procedures have been established for the handling, maintenance and identification of rare books, and a program has been set up for the acquisition of out-of-print books. The Order Section has for some months been working with the Computer Center to re-program purchase, payment and other statistical data in a form compatible with the new 360/40 computer.

## 2. Catalog Department

Last year, the number of books cataloged was more than double the number cataloged in the previous year. This year, in spite of a substantial increase in the percentage of difficult materials processed, the production of cataloged books rose from 13,382 to 17,868 , an increase of $34 \%$ over last year.

## 3. Serials Department

This department, which has suffered more than any other unit in the library from personnel shortages and staff curnover, (and is at present without a Head) has nevertheless managed to keep up to date in adding completed periodical volumes to the collection. Whereas last year, a backlog of some 600 volumes was processed, in addition to volumes currently received, this year there was no such backlog. As a result, periodical volumes added stand at about the same level as last year. Approximately two hundred new subscriptions were placed during the year, bringing the periodical titles regularly received to 2,136 (See Table V).
(b) Division of Public Services

Following a continuing trend, service to users shows a statistical increase in almost all areas of library service (See Tables VI to XV'). Circulation of books increased by nearly $9 \%$, from 98,243 to 107,035 . Door count increased by $20.4 \%$, from 262,865 to 316,518 . Xerox copying increased by $10 \%$, from 98,935 pages to 108,860 pages. Use of performing arts facilities increased by nearly $25 \%$.

The reasons for the decrease in interlibrary loans since last year are difficult to determine. It may be that faculty and graduate students are making greater direct use of the three major academic libraries in Michigan than they have in the past. The decrease in guest cards issued is the result of a policy decision to restrict library service to most non-Oakland users.

## IV. THE BOOK COLLECTION

Projections indicate that library holdings on June 30, 1969 will consist of 132,181 cataloged books and related library materials, and 50,536 units in microform (reel, card, or fiche). The problems related to the counting of microforms in library holdings were analyzed in last year's

Annual Report, prp. 9-10. There is still no consistency among academic libraries with respect to the relation of microforms to "volume" count. Sone libraries count microform units as volumes. Some do not. Until this controversial issue is resolved on the national level, ethical considerations would seem to favor the recording of the two figures separately, without reporting a figure for total holdings.

The collection continues to improve in quality. Again this year, special efforts have been made to strengthen the library's holdings of research material in support of new and developing undergraduate and graduate prograns. A selected list of major monographic purchases is attached (Table XVI, p. 20 ) as well as a list of significant periodical backruns acquired (Table XVII, p.24).

The Matilda R. Wilson Memorial Collection of reference and bibliographic works continues to grow in size and excellence. Funded from student gifts, it is a credit to the University and to the students who made it possible. Other gift funds have enabled the Library to purchase several significant book collections. The Bass Collection, (consisting of several hundred volumes purchased from the estate of George A. Bass) is especially notable for first editions and collected works of standard English and American authors, for a number of autographed copies, and for many examples of extremely fine binding. In the course of a trip to England and Ireland, the University Librarian acquired a small but choice collection of Anglo-Irish literature from the library of the Irish poet and verse dramatist, Donagh MacDonagh; some good runs of scarce English and Anglo-Irish periodicals, and a substantial number of out-of-print books from many English book shops. Finally, the most important collection ever to come to Kresge Library was acquired this year. This notable acquisition is the Lincoln and Civil War Collection of William Springer, the well-known Michigan collector and newspaper publisher. Mr. Springer's collection, developed over a period of forty years, contains about 1,600 monograph volumes, (many of them rare); approximately 800 pamphlets; several signed Lincoln documents; and a variety of prints, broadsides, periodicals, medals, and Lincoln mementoes. The purchase of this fine collection was made possible through the generous gift of Mr. Benjamin H. Anibal.
