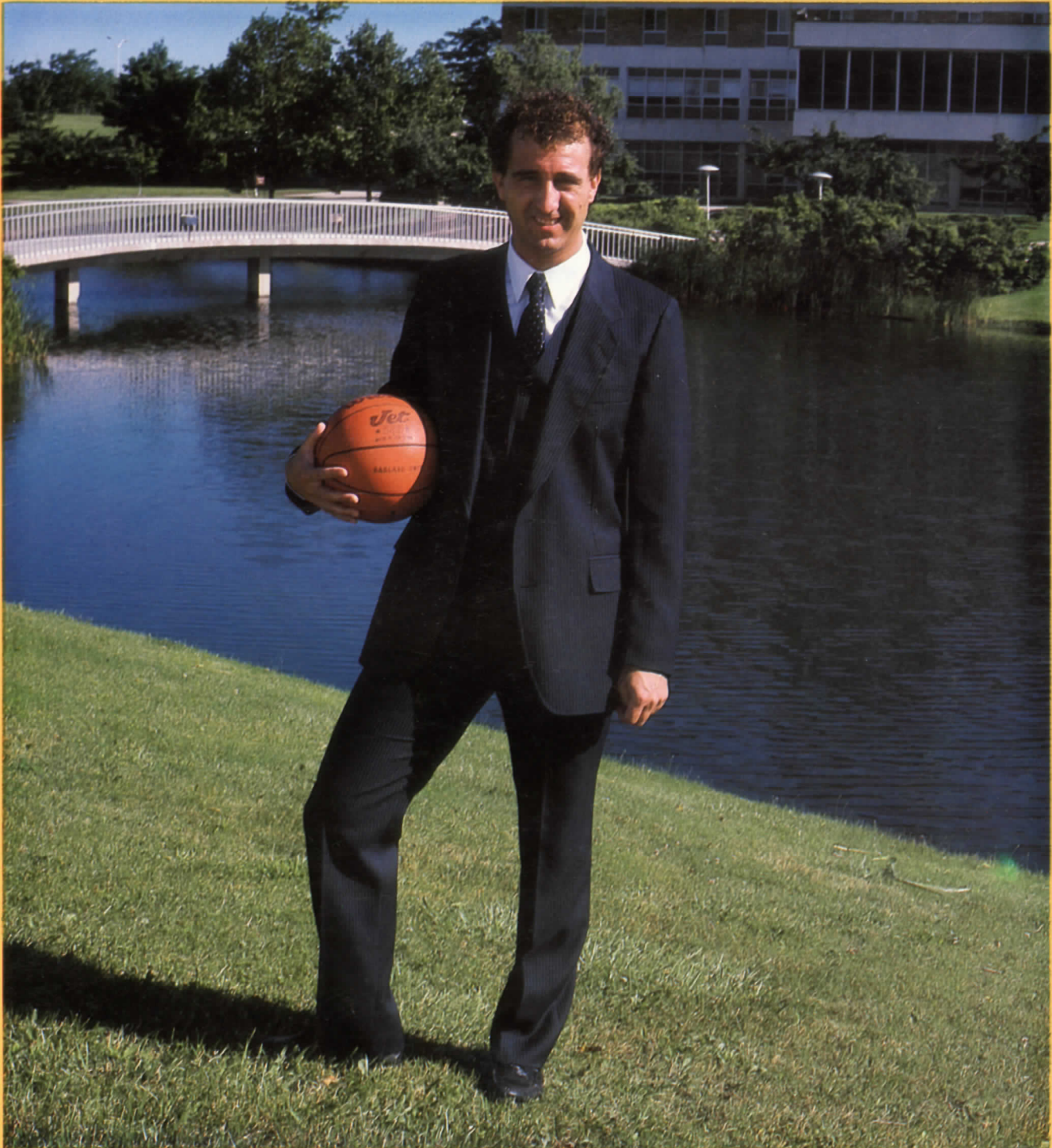

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ABOUT OAKLAND UNIVERSITY

In 1957, the late Alfred G. and Matilda Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre Meadow Brook estate to Michigan State University to establish a college in Oakland County.

Oakland University was founded in 1957 as a branch campus of MSU, with 570 first-year students. By the mid-1960s, it had evolved into a medium-sized university and in 1970 became an independent, state-assisted university. It now offers more than 70 undergraduate programs and more than 30 graduate programs, and enrolls about 12,000 students.

OU's distinct instructional programs — the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Economics and Management, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Health Sciences, School of Human and Educational Services and School of Nursing — offer a diverse curricula of general education and career preparation courses. Virtually all of these courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants.

The Honors College, a division of the College of Arts and Sciences, meets the educational needs of highly motivated students. The Division of Continuing Education meets the needs of nontraditional adult learners through evening and extension programs.

Academic support facilities include such notable entities as the Eye Research Institute, the only major eye research center in the United States not affiliated with a medical school; the Meadow Brook Health Enhancement Center, which provides health maintenance/health improvement and cardiac rehabilitation community outreach programs; and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, a unit of the School of Engineering and Computer Science that utilizes high technology manufacturing methods.

And OU's professional arts programs annually attract thousands to the campus. OU has received national recognition and local kudos for its Meadow Brook Theatre, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, Meadow Brook Hall and Meadow Brook Music Festival, the summer home of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

OU is located 25 miles north of Detroit, in the small town of Rochester. OU's modern campus, which houses the university's many academic and public service programs, is located on a beautifully wooded site — much of it still undeveloped.

Oakland University is committed to excellence in all phases of its extensive educational mission. Intercollegiate athletic competition contributes significantly to this goal. The university has a fine tradition

All are committed to preparing their team members for peak performances in their sports and in their personal and professional lives.

Recognition of the interrelationships between the type of academic pursuit necessary in the classroom and the effort, skill and knowledge needed to physically perform at the national level is the strength of the Oakland University athletic program. We invite all interested parties — be they athletes, supporters or spectators — to participate in furthering our goal of providing access to excellence.

ATHLETIC STAFF

Dr. PAUL HARTMAN

Athletic Director



In his career as an athletic director, one which has spanned three decades and covered four different institutions, Dr. Paul Hartman has been one to make visible changes wherever he has been.

As athletic director at Plymouth State College in New Hampshire, his first position, Hartman started a football program with enthusiastic student support. Fifteen years later, a running back named

Joe Dudek put that program on the national map with his bid for the Heisman Trophy. In his second post, at Florida International University in 1974, Hartman began a women's golf program. One of the first women's scholarship award winners was Pat Bradley, who later became the first \$2 million winner on the Ladies Pro Golf Association tour. Hartman did not begin the basketball program at his next stop, the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, but one of his athletes there, Terry Porter, drew national attention as an NBA draftee from a non-scholarship school.

The programs Hartman has instituted at Oakland University are not as visible as some at his former schools, but they have been plentiful. This past year the department began a Varsity "O" Club for former athletes, brought back baseball as a varsity sport, and made several changes in the Lepley Sports Center — ranging from a refurbishing of the locker rooms and equipment area to renovation of the offices and the addition of the Pioneer Lounge, which will be used for

conferences and athletic receptions.

"I don't think any one person does one certain thing," said Hartman. "I depend on the president to answer our needs, so maybe the best thing I have done is to adequately translate our needs to the president.

"There are many ways to be an administrator and I choose to be one that's more of a facilitator. I look at my job as more of a service job. I try to keep people happy because I believe a happy family, or a team concept, is healthy."

Previously Hartman had developed additional summer camp programs, created a new season ticket plan and instituted a Hall of Honor for exceptional Pioneer athletes, as well as introduced the first athletic team banquet. Additionally since Hartman's arrival, there has been a large changeover in the coaching staff, as well as in the department's support staff.

Now in his fourth year at Oakland, the veteran athletic administrator still sees more changes for OU on the horizon.

"A lot of our goals involve getting our building and office area improved (much of that has happened in the past year)," says Hartman. "I am working on a proposal for a new facility that will hopefully be presented to the president by Christmas. The approximately \$15 million proposal will include a new field house and aquatic center."

"I would also like to see us expand our program and add more women's sports. Sixty percent of our students are women, yet we offer them only four sports," he concluded.

Hartman, Oakland's third director of athletics, succeeded Corey Van Fleet in June of 1983. The only other AD was OU's founding father of athletics, Hollie Lepley.

A graduate of Ohio State University and a native of Columbus, Ohio, Hartman lives in Rochester with his wife, Jane.

ANDY GLANTZMAN

Sports Information Director

In his second year as Sports Information Director is Andy Glantzman. Andy joined the Pioneer staff in August, 1985 after six years in the University of Detroit's sports information office. This Brooklyn, New York native has won a pair of publications awards from CoSIDA, most recently for last year's OU soccer media guide. Glantzman earned a bachelor of science degree in athletic administration from St. John's University (NY) and a Master of Business Administration at U of D. He and his wife, Kim, live in Southfield.

RON FORBES

Business Manager

Entering his 17th year at Oakland, Ron Forbes serves as business manager for the athletic department. A graduate of Western Michigan University and a native of Royal Oak, he also handles ticket distribution and receipts for the Pioneers.

SANDY JORDAN

Head Athletic Trainer

Sandy Jordan is beginning her fourth year as head athletic trainer at OU. Jordan came from the University of Detroit, where she spent a year as assistant trainer. This native of Rochester, New York spent four years as a student assistant at Lock Haven State College while earning a bachelor of science degree in health and physical education, with a specialization in athletic training. Prior to going to U of D, Jordan was a graduate assistant at Edinboro State College where she received a master of education in administration degree.

TOM VanVOORHIS

Marketing and Promotions

Tom VanVoorhis handles marketing and promotions for the athletic department. Among his duties are selling advertising for Pioneer publications, arranging special game and sports camps promotions and scheduling speaking engagements for the coaching staff. This retired General Motors public relations and marketing employee is a graduate of the University of Michigan.

BOB TAYLOR

Women's Basketball Coach



Bob Taylor, Oakland University's new women's basketball coach, knows the secret to coaching success — recruiting and the idea that good players who are good people make good programs. It's a formula that worked for the first-year Pioneer mentor in his efforts at Lake Superior State — a team he built into a Midwest power in three years — and it's the formula he has begun to utilize in his short time at Oakland.

Taylor will have five newcomers joining the eight veterans on this year's squad. Two of the new players were signed in the fall and the other three were inked by Taylor upon his arrival. Straight "A" students and first-team All-Staters Dawn Lichty and Amy Atkinson came from the prep ranks, while JUCO All-Stater and former world class speed skater Kim Klein joined OU from Delta Community College — this gives Taylor a solid recruiting class.

It was this ability to recruit quality athletes and people that attracted the OU Director of Athletics, Dr. Paul Hartman, to Taylor. "Bob is a fine young man who emphasizes scholarship as well as athletic skill in the young ladies he recruits," Hartman said. "He has a proven track record that shows he can win in this conference. We are confident that our program will be extremely competitive under his leadership."

The 29-year-old Taylor was the head coach at Lake Superior State for the past three years, guiding the Soo Lakers to a 52-32 mark. Last season, LSSC was 24-5

overall, and 14-2 and second behind Saginaw Valley in the GLIAC. Taylor's squad was the number one seeded team in the Great Lakes Region in the NCAA Division II Women's Basketball Tournament and finished the season as the seventh ranked team in the country. At LSSC, Taylor took a program, that had never finished higher than fourth in the GLIAC, and guided it to 13-15 and 15-12 seasons his first two years. His tremendous success in 1985-86 was with a squad comprised primarily of freshmen and sophomores.

Taylor, who will also serve as the men's tennis coach, is excited about his move to Oakland. "I left a great job at Lake Superior State, but I moved in to a great situation here," Taylor said. "Oakland is a school with a very strong basketball tradition and history and a better location for building a consistent winner."

Taylor is a native of Sparta, MI, and attended Sparta High School where he starred in both basketball and tennis. He earned two letters a piece in both sports at Grand Rapids Junior College and Arkansas Tech, where he also earned a bachelor of science in social science in 1980 and began his coaching career as an assistant coach. He then became the head coach at Boyne City High, where he led the Ramblers to a two-year mark of 37-10 and a spot in the Michigan Class C top ten.

Taylor, who has been involved in camps for both men and women, is co-director of the Michigan All-State Basketball Camp for Girls held in Traverse City. The college division representative of the Michigan Basketball Coaches Association is single and lives in Rochester.

QUOTING BOB TAYLOR

How do you think the three-point shot will affect women's basketball?

I don't think there will be a big effect right away. It might help us win a game here or there, or help with a comeback, but I don't think it will change our strategy. We won't change our shot selection to run a play for the three-pointer.

You were a successful recruiter at Lake Superior State. Will that be easier or harder here at Oakland?

I think it will be the same — when you recruit somebody, you like to think you have a good product. I had a good product at LSSC and I have a good product at Oakland. The fact that there are more players in this area — and that we have a chance to see and evaluate these players — will be the biggest advantage of being here.

What is the toughest thing about recruiting today?

The toughest thing is evaluation of talent because there are so many players that are so good. There is often only a fine line between players, so evaluation is essential. Playing in the fall, as we do in Michigan high schools, makes it tough because there are so many outstate teams that recruit here against us. The biggest thing we are trying to stress at Oakland is *staying home*.

What do you look for in a recruit?

Athletic ability, scholarship and attitude. We then look for somebody whom we think might be happy in our particular system. I think there are three reasons why a kid is happy — she has a solid academic program, she is happy with her social situation and she is in a solid athletic program.

What is your primary recruiting area?

I'd like to recruit metro-Detroit as much as possible because there is a vast wealth of talent in the tri-county area. We recruited the entire state while at Lake Superior and I plan on doing the same here.

SHAWN CLEMONS

Assistant Coach



When new women's basketball coach Bob Taylor started looking for an assistant coach, he knew he wanted to find one with a solid basketball background. He achieved this with the hiring of Shawn Clemons.

Clemons' background includes four years as a varsity basketball starter, camp work in both Arizona and New Mexico, and contact as both a player and coach with Arizona State's coach Julianne Simpson and with Greg

Bruce, a former Notre Dame assistant who is now the head coach at Portland State.

Clemons was a two-year starter and captain at Howard Junior College, in Big Springs, Texas before moving on to Arizona State. At ASU, Shawn was a part of the 1980-81 and '81-82 Sun Devil squads that went a combined 46-18, includ-

ing 25-7 in her senior year when she captained the squad. Clemons' best year was her junior campaign, averaging 7.9 points and 4.7 boards per contest.

After earning her bachelor's degree in physical education from ASU, Clemons joined Greg Bruce's staff at Thunderbird High School. She has worked basketball camps at Arizona State and Eastern New Mexico Universities and served as the Director of Summer Recreation for the City of Clayton, New Mexico.

"I think Shawn will add a lot to the staff," coach Taylor said. "She has good experience and has worked under solid coaches and people. She was an outstanding player in both a tough league and a competitive program, and I think she will relate well to the players and be a positive recruiter for OU."

Clemons, who will also serve as intramural director and summer camp coordinator at Oakland, is married and lives in Rochester with her husband Don, who serves as strength coach for the NFL Detroit Lions.

TAYLOR LOOKING TO RETURN LADY PIONEERS TO PAST GLORY

During the Dewayne Jones years, the Oakland University women's basketball squad was the dominant force in the GLIAC — undefeated in league play for two years. Over a five-year stretch covering three different coaches, OU was 62-8 in GLIAC games. In the past few years OU has fallen from the top of the GLIAC, suffering just its second losing season in history last year. During that time, a young coach named Bob Taylor was turning a Lake Superior State squad into a GLIAC contender, taking a senior-less squad to within one game of the title last year. Taylor's next task is to do the same at Oakland.

"I think we'll be in a situation where we can win a lot of games, but *can* doesn't mean *will*," Taylor said. "We have the opportunity to win if things break well for us and we play well together. Sometimes a new coach comes in and there are personality conflicts; if we can avoid these and mesh well, we could do very well."

Taylor, the replacement for Sue Kruszewski who resigned in March, will have eight returnees to form the nucleus of his unit. Just two seniors, guard Kellie Hill and center Lisa Quinn, remain on the squad giving him a young unit around which to build. Four full-time

starters and a pair of part-timers are back from last year and all eight returnees averaged over 11 minutes per contest.

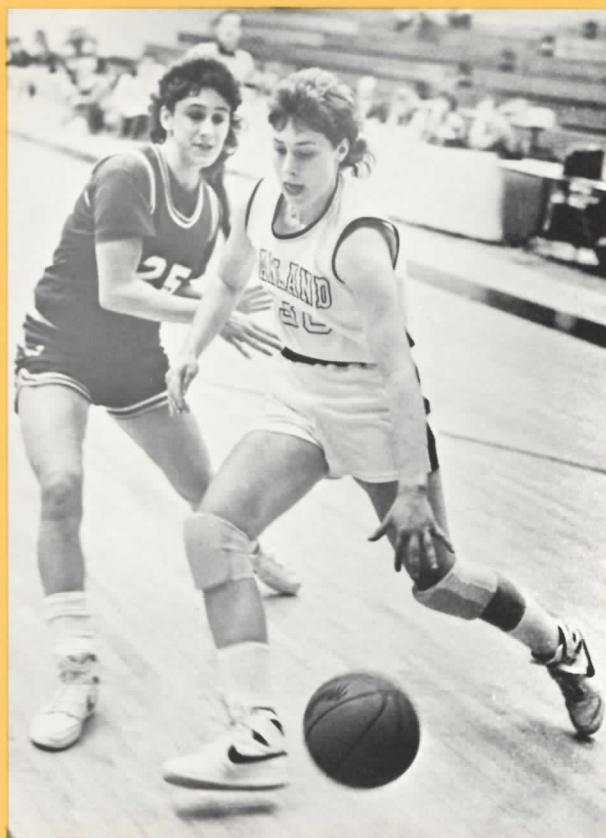
Quinn and juniors Sarah Knuth and Margaret Boyle started every game they played last season and combined for 35 points and 17 boards per contest and a season-long total of 210 assists. Knuth, a second-team All-GLIAC choice, led OU with a 13.1 scoring average and added nearly five boards per contest. Boyle averaged almost 12 points per contest and had a team-high 148 assists, earning honorable mention from the GLIAC. Quinn, one of the top rebounders in the league, hauled down 8.7 boards and scored 9.9 points per contest. The fourth full-time starter is junior Sonja Pearson, who began 24 of her 28 games played and carded averages of 8.4 points and 6.4 rebounds.

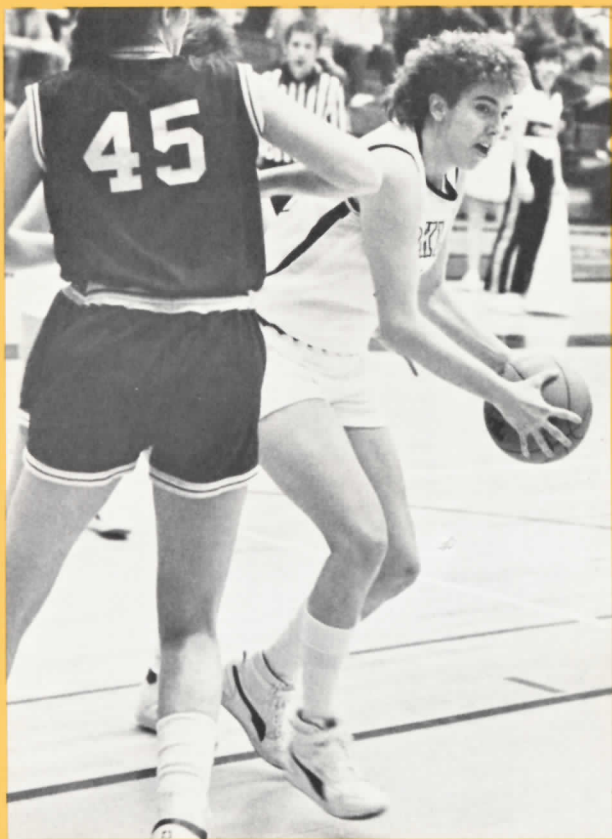
Sophomore forwards Leah Fenwick and Celeste Sartor showed a great deal of promise last year, splitting their time at power forward. Sartor averaged 4.2 points and 3.2 boards, while Fenwick had averages of 4.1 points and 4.3 rebounds. Fenwick was especially effective during the season's last eight games, ringing up double-figure averages in both categories. Junior Kim

McDowell, at 6-4, showed tremendous improvement during her sophomore campaign, averaging 4.7 points and 3.5 rebounds, blocking 44 shots and asserting herself inside. Hill did a steady job when spelling Boyle and was a consistent free throw shooter.

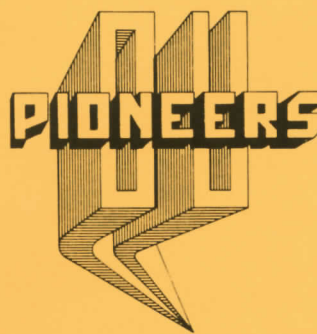
The future of the program lies in Taylor's ability to recruit — something he had no problem with at Lake Superior State. Upon his arrival at OU, the Pioneer coach immediately flexed his recruiting muscles, inking three solid additions to go along with the pair signed earlier by Kruszewski. Dawn Lichty and Amy Atkinson, both of whom played in the Michigan High School Coaches Association Class B-C-D All-Star Game, should get a lot of early playing time. Lichty, a 5-6 guard, was selected as the game's MVP and is a solid scorer and ballhandler. Atkinson, like Lichty a first-team All-Stater, is a deadly outside shooter, joining Lichty as an outstanding classroom performer as well. The third Taylor-signee is junior college transfer Kim Klein who averaged 23 points per game at Delta C.C. to earn JUCO All-State honors — her experience will be a big plus for OU. The two early signees were Debbie Delie, a bruising 6-0 inside player who can score and throw her weight around under the boards, and guard Audra Craig from the outstanding Flint Northern basketball program.

"I believe our new players will have a chance to make an immediate impact," Taylor said. "When evaluating our weaknesses, I felt we needed improvement in quickness and outside shooting. These new players will certainly help in those areas."

Taylor's rebuilding job has already begun with a solid recruiting class. Combined with a good nucleus, he has a strong squad to work with for the 1986-87 season. A fresh start, continued improvement from the returnees and a positive contribution from the freshmen could start Oakland back up the road to the top in year one of Taylor's program.

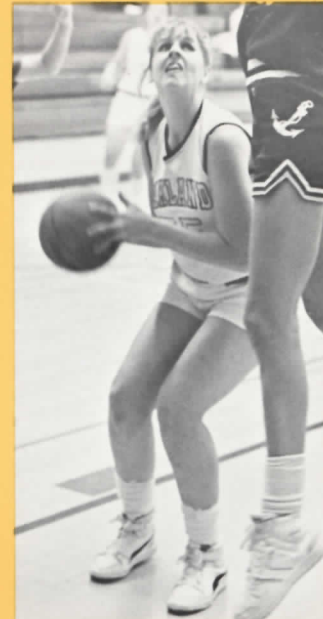

Did an excellent job as OU's starting center last year . . . has a good chance to hold down that spot again in her senior campaign . . . one of OU's most consistent players a year ago . . . a strong rebounder who patrols the middle well both offensively and defensively . . . averaged 9.9 points and 8.7 boards per game last season as one of only two Pioneers to start all 28 contests . . . averaged 9.9 points and 9.1 boards in GLIAC play . . . was third in the league in rebounding . . . shot 77% from the free-throw line overall, 75% in the league . . . had career-highs of 21 points and 19 boards, both set at Hillsdale . . . had seven games in which she was in double-figures in both scoring and rebounding . . . averaged 3.6 points and 3.5 boards as a sophomore reserve forward . . . those figures were up from her 2.4 point, 2.7 rebound averages of her freshman season . . . was an All-State selection as a senior at Clawson where she averaged 20 points and 15 rebounds per contest . . . earned various honors in softball and volleyball as a prepster . . . majoring in political science.

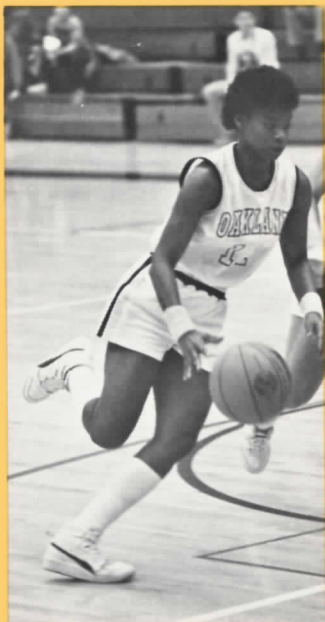

A talented performer who did a strong job as OU's starting point guard in her sophomore campaign . . . averaged 11.9 points and led OU in assists with 148 and in steals with 75 . . . earned honorable mention All-GLIAC honors based on a 12.7 league scoring average (11th in the GLIAC) and 77 assists (fourth in the loop) . . . improvement in her outside shooting and overall consistency could make her an outstanding player . . . scored a career-high 27 points and added eight assists in a victory over Wayne State, earning GLIAC Player of the Week . . . was selected to the All-Wisconsin-Milwaukee Tournament Team . . . passed for a career-high 11 assists against Indiana-Purdue at Fort Wayne . . . averaged 3.1 points and had 31 assists as a freshman . . . suffered a slump from the free-throw line last year, canning just 53% of her charity tosses after hitting 75% from the line as a frosh . . . helped Saginaw Buena Vista to a 44-14 mark in her last three years as a prepster . . . averaged more than 20 points per game and shot better than 50% from the field as a senior to earn All-State honors after being named honorable mention as a junior . . . also earned letters in softball and track . . . majoring in elementary education.



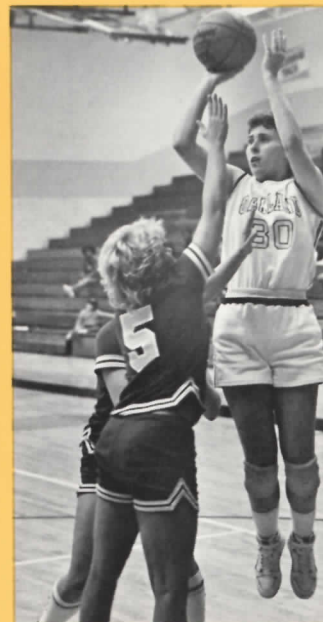
