Federal Employees Advised to Return 'Gifts' to Goldfine

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two federal workers. He said he was not a bit sorry for what he's given so far.

"It's about time the rug goes back," Moulder said.

Goldfine had acknowledged he deducted the cost of the rug as a business expense.

Goldfine set off a political bombshell Thursday by stating he sent the Christmas gifts to the White House and Capitol Hill employees. Some received checks of up to \$150 and many were on the Christmas list for seven years, the subcommittee said. One of Adams' secretaries was on the list.

Subcommittee members John E. Moss (D-Calif.) and John B. Bennett (D-Mich.) said they want fuller explanations of what Goldfine had in mind.

Moss said public officials should ship Goldfine gifts right back to the sender if they were listed as deductible items.

Find Tot's Body Floating in Lake

Son of Detroit Family First Holiday Drowning Victim in County

Michael Parrino, 2 years old, of Detroit, drowned this morning in Commerce Lake.

His body was found floating in shallow water by a sister along the south shore of the lake at about 9:30 a.m.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Parrino, of 5556 Chististancy Rd., Detroit, was one of five children. He was the first drowning victim in the county this holiday period.

The family was swimming near their cottage at 2840 Woodbury St., Oakley Park, when the tot was discovered. Attempts by sheriff's deputy Robert W. LaLonde and members of the Commerce Township Fire Department to revive the boy failed.

He was dead on arrival at Pontiac General Hospital at 10:20 a.m. Death was officially listed as due to drowning by Deputy Coroner Dr. H. L. Riggs, although marks on the boy's head indicated he may have fallen into the water and struck his head on some object.

Death Is Taking No Holiday, Toll Zooms Upward

Heavy Traffic Claiming Many; Safety Council Appalled by Record

Holiday traffic deaths zoomed upward along the nation's highways today.

The National Safety Council, fearing a toll of record proportions, issued a fresh appeal to drivers to slam on the brakes during the remainder of the three-day Independence Day observance.

The NSC has forecast a record high of 410 deaths during the 78-hour period. But, as the half-way mark approached, the weekend toll was running far ahead of estimates.

The mounting toll also was leading record tabulations for the three-day Memorial Day holiday period.

"Unless there is a definite improvement on traffic safety, the nation is headed for a new three-day July 4th weekend record," said Ned H. Dearborn, NSC president.

"We are appealing again to the nation's drivers to slam on the brakes."

Earlier, apparently distressed by the record clip, Dearborn called the toll "an alarming figure."

The previous three-day weekend toll for a July Fourth observance was 407 deaths in 1955. A four-day holiday period claimed a record 491 in 1950.

With a forecast of hot and muggy weather, State Police expected record crowds to jam into lakes and parks. The peak accident period is expected Sunday night when motorists head for home.

Last year 20 persons were killed over the Fourth of July weekend in Michigan. In a comparable three-day non-holiday weekend last month, the state counted 21 accidental deaths including 8 in traffic and 11 drownings.

Repaving Will Close Elizabeth Lake Road

Beginning at 6:30 a.m. Tuesday, Elizabeth Lake road will be closed to traffic for at least five days for repaving.

Traffic Engineer Theodore M. Vanderstempel said that motorists should use W. Huron street as a detour.

Affected will be that portion of Elizabeth Lake from Telegraph road to Johnson street, Vanderstempel said.

The \$40,000 repaving job is to be undertaken by the A & A Asphalt Paving Co., of Birmingham as part of the city's 1958 improvement program.

Vanderstempel believed the job would be completed Saturday.

Blast Wrecks Many Homes in Portland Area

Loud Roar Awakens Most of Oregon City in Early Hours

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—A fireworks plant exploded with the fury of a bomb on the outskirts of Portland early today. One child was killed, at least 20 persons were injured, and a score of homes were wrecked by the blast.

The charred body of a child, first believed to be a girl, was found in the wreckage of the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Howe. The Howes, who lived directly behind the big storage plant, were hospitalized for treatment of cuts and burns. A minister at the hospital said they had been asking about a missing child.

Of those hospitalized, eight — including the Howes — were held for treatment. The others were given first aid and released.

The Signal Fireworks storage plant—two buildings 100 feet long—blew up with a thunderous roar that awakened most of the city at 1:45 a.m.

The explosion smashed doors and windows of a nearby motel and lifted off part of the roof. Debris from the wrecked plant and houses covered the streets around them.

The heaviest damage was confined to a two-block area around the plant, but smashed windows were reported 30 blocks away.

Elderly residents of a nursing home a block away were removed temporarily from the building. Some were in a state of shock.

Fire Marshal Dale Gilman said there was no way of knowing immediately what caused the explosion. Howard Grohs, Portland, owner of the plant, could not be reached immediately.

HAVANA (UPI) — U.S. Consul Park Wollam was expected to return today to the mountain hideout of rebel leader Raul Castro in another effort to free 45 Americans and Canadians kidnaped last week.

It was Wollam who flew into rebel territory by helicopter last week and won the freedom of four Americans and one Canadian.

But arrangements for release of the others collapsed mysteriously Thursday and further helicopter flights were banned.

Holiday Traffic Reduced by Rain

County Has No Deaths Thus Far; Heavier Travel Expected

Cloudy skies and scattered showers have kept traffic flow below expectations on county highways during the first half of the three-day Independence Day weekend, area law enforcement authorities reported today.

State Police and Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies reported no major traffic tie-ups since noon Thursday.

Throoper Lyle Tucker, at the Pontiac Post, said today that "even the parks and recreation areas have been relatively uncrowded."

"Traffic has been moving steadily and no bumper-to-bumper conditions have been reported," he added.

Although there have been several injur y accidents reported, none have been serious and there have been no traffic fatalities recorded since Thursday.

State Police at the Redford Post said traffic began picking up considerably this morning on U. S. 16 and will continue to get heavier if the weather remains sunny today.

Authorities expect the homeward rush to create the weekend's heaviest traffic tomorrow afternoon and night. They urge vacationers to leave early for home and avoid rushing.

Scour Pacific for Survivors

Three Airmen Rescued, Recover One Body, Five Men Still Missing

HONOLULU (UPI) — Planes and ships scoured a patch of Pacific Ocean 600 miles southwest of here today for the plane mates of three Air Force men who were plucked from the water yesterday after their C134 went down.

The three rescued survivors said at least one other man was alive in the water after the crash. They said they heard his cries and saw a light flashing in the distance. But they never made contact with whoever it was.

The rescued airmen said two others got out of the plane alive but died in the water before the rescue.

Besides the three survivors, one body was recovered and five men were missing.

"It doesn't look too good for the others now," an officer said when they were not located among the floating debris where the three survivors were found.

The three crewmen pulled out of the water by a helicopter from the carrier USS Boxer were being treated for shock and minor injuries in the flat-top's sick bay.

The Navy's amphibious squadron seven, including the transports Cavalier and Cavalero and cargo ships Mathews and Merrick, was diverted to the search.

The destroyers Ingersoll, Spronston and Ammen, and the Coast Guard cutter Winnebago were also in the area.

Numerous Air Force and Coast Guard planes from Hawaii and Johnston Island criss-crossed the water along with the Boxer's helicopters and planes. The weather was good.

Rebels in Tripoli Hit for 3rd Day

United Arab Republic Officials Expelled by Lebanese Government

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Government batteries bombarded rebel positions in the port city of Tripoli for the third straight day today in an effort to flush out Syrians the army said were hiding in No Man's Land.

In Beirut, the government—angered by United Nations reports denying "massive" Syrian infiltration—retaliated by expelling seven United Arab Republic embassy officials and employees.

The Tripoli fighting was concentrated again in the No Man's Land separating the rebel-held old parts of the city and the government-held new city. Bulldozers in between were being reduced to rubble by the tank and mortar fire.

United Press International correspondent Robert Egby, who has watched the fighting from the Hotel Hakim headquarters of the U.N. observer teams, quoted rebel leader Rashid Karami as describing the barrage as "the worst since the war started."

Egby himself narrowly escaped injury when a stray bullet whizzed into his hotel room and embedded itself into a wall.

Canadians Have 3.8 More Babies Than Americans

OTTAWA, Ont. (AP) — The four-child family is becoming common in Canada. This is in contrast with the 1930s when a two-child family was the vogue.

Latest available figures show Canada had 28.7 births every year for every 1,000 of population against 24.9 in the United States.

Really large families are on the wane, but the middle-size family is taking up the slack.

Canada's edge over the United States comes partly because Canadian women continue to bear children into mature years.

In 1954, there were 232.4 births in the United States for every 1,000 married women aged 20-24, and 114.7 in the 30-34 age group.

The comparable figures for Canada in 1955 were 222 among women aged 20-24, slightly lower than the American figure, but 158.2 among the 30-34 group.

Youths Arrested Near Accident

Narrowly Miss Deputy; Charged With Having Beer in Auto

Three area youths were arrested by Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies on charges of possession of beer last night as their auto barely missed striking a deputy at the scene of an injury accident, the department reported today.

The youths were identified as William T. Cochran, 19, of 325 E. Shadbolt St., Lake Orion; Donald H. Sweeney, 17, of 569 Valencia St.; and Ralph W. Chittick, 18, of 3301 Baldwin Rd., Orion Township.

Deputy James W. Stites was directing traffic around the overturned car of a Detroit man, Michael E. Taskay, 50, of 2405 E. McNichols Rd., on Orion road, a mile east of Adams road, in Oakland Township.

As he flagged down westbound car with his flashlight, he said a car driven by Cochran bore down on him not heeding his signal.

"At the last moment I jumped to the road shoulder," Stites said. "The car swerved to the shoulder and when it came to a stop I had one hand on the hood."

The accident victims, Taskay and his brother, Stanley, 55, were treated for injuries at Pontiac General Hospital and released.

Plane Is Forced Down Near Novi, None Hurt

The pilot of a small plane made a crash landing when forced down by bad weather in Novi Township. Paul Briggs, 24, of Battle Creek set the plane down Thursday along the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad right of way. Neither he nor his passenger, Roger Dorey, 24, of Chicago, was injured.

The accident was reported to state police by the crew of a C & O train which spotted the wrecked plane.

Tries to Sail Wood Raft to Hawaii

REDONDO BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Devere Baker is a hard man to discourage.

After 12 years and three failures he leaves again today for Hawaii on a drifting wooden raft, the Lehi IV.

"I'm trying something different this time," the 42-year-old former shipyard owner said yesterday. "The Lehi will be towed 150 miles offshore to the Humboldt Current that oceanographers know will take us straight to Honolulu."

That has been his trouble on the three previous attempts, he said. "We never got into that current." He planned to leave about noon today.

Why is he making the trip? To help prove his theory that early inhabitants of this hemisphere drifted on other currents across the Pacific from Asia.

The Hawaiian voyage will be only a shakedown cruise for the big expedition: To drift from the Persian Gulf across the Indian and Pacific oceans to Central America — showing that people from the Middle East could have settled Central America.

Baker's other raft efforts were flops. Lehi I is still drifting. It was last reported 400 miles off Tahiti. Lehi II drifted to Mexico and Lehi III never really got started.

He sold his shipyard 12 years ago to finance his ocean trips and to prove his theory.

No Longer Facing Electric Chair

Confession Frees Father of 7

JEFFERSON, Ga. (AP) — For the first time in nearly two years the shadow of the electric chair no longer darkens the life of a slim, mild-mannered South Carolina house painter and father of seven children.

James Fulton Foster, 40, of Greer, S.C., is still in jail at Jefferson, but now he can count the days until his release.

Authorities say it will be per-

haps 10 days before legal technicalities are cleared up.

The door to freedom was opened for him yesterday when Charles Paul (Rocky) Rothschild, a 33-year-old former Cairo, Ill., patrolman, confessed killing a Jefferson merchant.

Foster twice was sentenced to die in the electric chair for that crime — in September, 1956, and again this June. Both times appeals delayed his execution.

Rothschild signed a 2,500-word statement at Columbia, S.C., where he is serving a 5-year burglary conspiracy sentence. In the statement he detailed how he planned the robbery that resulted in the slaying of 60-year-old Charles Drake in June 1956.

The former patrolman said Foster's death sentence "has been constantly on my mind and conscience."

"What Foster means to me can be stated from the following Bible verse: St. Matthew, 5:10, 'Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: For their's is the kingdom of Heaven.'"

"Foster has definitely been persecuted," he continued. "May God return him to his wife and family and may he live a long and happy life."

Rothschild named A. D. Allen, a used car dealer at Winder, Ga., as the finger man in the case. Allen now is in Federal Prison at Atlanta in the first year of a 5-year liquor case sentence.

Alfred Quillian, solicitor general (prosecutor) of the Piedmont Judicial Circuit, said he would seek indictments against Rothschild and Allen at the August term of the county grand jury.

Foster appeared dazed when brought into a news conference at which Rothschild's confession was announced.

"I don't know what to say. I'm dumbfounded," he said as he grasped the hands of Sheriff John B. Brooks of Jackson County, attorneys and other well wishers.

Girl, 13, in Satisfactory Condition

Close Hole in Her Heart

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A Clinton Township, Mich., girl was reported in satisfactory condition today after a two-hour operation which closed a cavity in her heart.

Sharon Zalewski, 13, was still on the critical list at Texas Children's Hospital. Her heart was pumped mechanically for 12 minutes during the delicate operation Thursday.

Surgeons and her parents are hopeful the operation will permit the junior high school honor student to run and play by fall. "Prayers are the most important thing now," said the mother, Mrs. Donald Zalewski. "It's all in God's hands."

The Zalewskis returned to their hotel room yesterday for rest after spending nearly 48 hours at the bedside at the nearby Methodist and Children's Hospitals, part of Houston's 100 million dollar Texas Medical Center.

Mrs. Zalewski said Sharon asked about her dog that was flown here Thursday, inquired about Ricky Nelson, her favorite singer, and said she would like to have news from home.

Pilot 'Grounded' at Nike Base

Almost Blasts Belle Isle

DETROIT — A civilian pilot who landed in the middle of an Army Nike-Ajax anti-aircraft base on Belle Isle two days ago was still trying to get off the ground today.

Henry Merritt, 36, Center Line, landed his single engine plane at the base Thursday when bad weather closed in on him. He was greeted by 20 soldiers and placed under arrest. The plane was ordered held until it could be checked by intelligence officers.

Soldiers told Merritt he could have blasted out of the Detroit River the whole of Belle Isle where the Nike launching site is located near the children's zoo, amusement parks and picnic grounds.

Merritt said he running out of gas on a return flight from Homestead, Fla., when he spotted the concrete strip covering the missile storage area.

"The Army pulled me from my plane," Merritt said. "They were very excited and told me I had landed on some missiles which were underground. They said I could have blown myself and the whole island out of the river. Then I got excited too."

Merritt was released after questioning by Army security personnel. At first he was told he would have to wait until today to take his plane off the launching area.

Yesterday the Army changed its mind and gave Merritt clearance. He jumped into the plane, gunned the motor and started. He no more than got off the concrete when he hit a hidden ditch and flipped over. The plane was a total loss. Merritt skinned his knee.

Soldiers said Merritt was very lucky.

Drug Salesman Poisons Four

Executive Then Takes Hypodermic Injection; Police Find Note

GLEN RIDGE, N. J. (AP)—A drug salesman, perhaps brooding over his mother's health, poisoned her and the three members of his immediate family yesterday. Then he killed himself with a hypodermic injection.

Authorities said Thomas MacDowell, a drug company sales executive, apparently had let his Brazilian-born wife in on plans to wipe out his loved ones.

She, her two young sons, MacDowell and his mother were found dead in their modest home in this wealthy, suburban community. All but MacDowell were dressed in night clothes and were lying on beds.

"I am sorry for what I'm doing," said a note from MacDowell found on a living room desk.

"I love my wife and children dearly but I think in the long run they'll be better off."

A note asked God's forgiveness. But police would not say whether it gave any motive for the killings.

Massachusetts law for such over-sights Goldfine's firm could be subject to a \$1,058,836 fine, Mott said. He added that the state income tax laws provided a penalty of five dollars a day for every delinquent day.

This could mean that Goldfine would be subject to an additional \$2,210 fine plus interest on tax due at six per cent, Mott said.

State Tax Commissioner Joseph Healey later disclosed that his office was investigating Goldfine's tax position with the state. But he termed the investigation "routine" and added that such probes were often made when a person like Goldfine came under a federal inquiry.

He refused to comment on Mott's radio report.

The explosion, heard more than 10 miles away, aroused the city and brought people by the thousands. Police and firemen had lines set up as far as four blocks away holding back the curious while they fought the fire and searched through the ruins.

Christian Meet Nears in Tokyo

Delegates Will Gather From Many Nations for August 6 Opening

Preparations for the World Convention on Christian Education, which opens August 6 in Tokyo, are now in full swing. Dr. Nelson Chappel reported on his recent return from Japan.

A minister of the United Church of Canada, he is general secretary of the World Council of Christian Education, sponsor of the meeting which is to be held at Aoyama Gakuin University.

Fifteen hundred Japanese delegates have registered already, he reported, and 2,000 hotel rooms — most of them air-conditioned — have been reserved for overseas guests. Among them, about 700 from the United States and more than 125 from Canada have registered to date. Hundreds of others are expected from Europe, Asia and Africa.

Cooperating closely in the plans, the National Christian Council of Japan is preparing a resource book on the conference theme, "Jesus Christ, the Way, the Truth and the Life." About 80 per cent of all Christians in Japan are represented on the Council, Dr. Chappel said.

Find Low Wages Keep Most Ministers in Debt

The fact that two-thirds of Protestant ministers are in debt and many of their wives must take jobs to help support their families has at last been set down in black and white. These and other startling findings appear in a study to be published in the fall based on a questionnaire sent to clergymen of nine major Protestant denominations.

The Rev. Dr. F. Ernest Johnson, who headed the study group which made the survey for the National Council of Churches' Department of Church and Economic Life, noted that the public is under the impression that ministers' salaries are substantially augmented by allowances. This, he said, is not the case.

Lowest paid are ministers in New England churches who average \$4,018 a year—\$400 less than the national average. In the Southwest, where the highest salaries were noted, the top average is \$4,654 a year. Allowances for housing and travel may bring in an average \$1,468 more a year, the survey shows, but other factors offset its making much difference in the minister's budget.

Too often the parsonage is old and too large, resulting in high heating bills. A minister who has to use a car but no travel allowance must take as much as \$1,600 a year out of his own pocket for its upkeep. In addition, the increasing costs of living, medical treatment and school and college for

School Approves Compromise Religious Training OK'd

OMAHA (AP) — Next fall suburban Westside High School will give another trial to a compromise religious program falling somewhere in between "released time" and no official public school recognition whatever of religion.

Under the "released time" formula, schools frequently allow students to spend one hour of school time a week studying religion at classes held by Protestant, Jewish and Roman Catholic organizations off the school premises.

Development of the procedure has been studded with friction in and out of courts, with opposition

based on claims it encroaches on the traditional separation of church and state. Since a Supreme Court decision in 1952 upholding it, however, the method has become increasingly popular, with an estimated 3½ million pupils taking part. Much of the program's growth has occurred in the Eastern states.

The compromise system at Westside has cleared the way for some religious training for its students and at the same time won praise for firmly maintaining separation of church and state. It works this way: Wednesday is "church day" at Westside, a rambling school in a rapidly growing Omaha area. There are services in nearby churches before classes and Westside teachers are asked to keep Wednesday evenings free of activity. They are also asked to keep Thursdays free of tests that would require Wednesday night study.

"What we are doing is being sure that there is one day a week that students will have a chance to attend their own religious activities if they want to," Supt. C. L. Retschdorf explains. "We are being very careful that we are not participating in what the churches do with that time."

Executive secretary Sol Littman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith feels "school authorities are to be congratulated for the scrupulousness with which they maintain separation of church and state."

Rauch-Split Technique Creates Studio Level

By JOHN O.B. WALLACE

A cheerful and practical union of ranch and split level planning distinguishes design X-13 in the House of the Week series.

An architect's desire to break from the traditional location of the recreation or family room in ranch house designs was responsible for its creation.

Heretofore, Architect Herman H. York says, conventional locations for a recreation room or family room in ranch homes have been either the basement or, more recently, those areas adjoining the

kitchen, dining room or living room.

To lift this room from its conventional setting and place it in a position of greater utility, the architect incorporated some structural techniques of split level planning into basic ranch design.

From this combination came a studio room, located over the garage. High above the ground level,

House of the Week design X-13 has a total of 12 rooms, counting the baths, on two levels as follows: main floor — living room, dining room, kitchen-dinette, three bedrooms and two baths; attic floor — two bedrooms, bath and studio room. The overall dimensions of the house are 52 feet 4 inches by 63 feet 10 inches. A minimum plot 70 by 100 feet is recommended. The habitable area of the main level has 1,895 square feet. The studio level has 1,112 square feet.

the studio or family room has a cathedral-type window wall arrangement, a wood-burning fireplace, a built-in bar and liquor cabinet and a high cathedral ceiling.

STUDIO ON SEPARATE LEVEL
By creating a higher but uniform roof line and locating the garage several risers below the main living level, the architect was able to achieve a split level structure above the garage and the main living area.

This arrangement puts the studio room on a separate level, half a story above the main living quarters. The arrangement also provides an expansion area on this level.

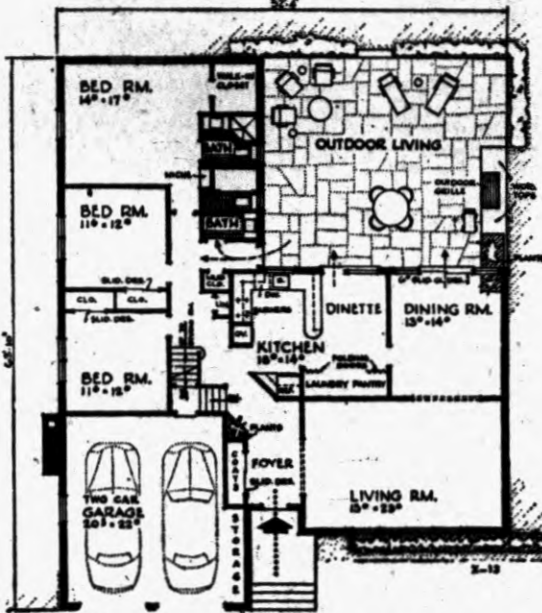
The architect believes his planning has resulted in "one of the most interesting innovations in ranch design in recent years." The expansion area includes two extra bedrooms, four additional closets and a third bath.

Located as it is away from other areas of the house, the studio room could be used for a variety of activities—by children or as a recreation room, by teenagers for parties and games, and by adults for both informal and formal entertaining.

"It also affords," says the architect, "excellent accommodations and maximum natural light for the growing army of amateur painters in this country who long have dreamed of a room of this kind."

The studio is only one of many features enhancing this new design.

The main level has a living room, dining room, kitchen with dinette, three bedrooms, two baths and a garage. An outdoor terrace occupies a prominent part of the main area.



MAIN LEVEL — The main level of design X-13 is shown in this floor plan. The studio-attic area, not shown, has two bedrooms, a bath, fireplace, storage area, four closets and the large studio room.

The outdoor patio is directly accessible from the dining room, the kitchen-dinette and the bedroom wing. The main bath is adjacent to the patio entrance so that it may be conveniently reached from the outdoor area as well as the secondary bedrooms.

This area also has a mud closet. The outdoor living area is shielded by the house itself on two sides and a high hedge on the open sides.

Occupying one corner of the patio is an outdoor grill, complete with work tops and cabinet storage space. The grill joins a planter unit which projects itself into the dining room.

The kitchen-dinette is a model of efficient planning. A window over the sink provides a clear view of the rear terrace for supervision of children at play. The U-shaped arrangement of the units sets the work area apart from the dinette.

The laundry-pantry area is only a step away from the kitchen; yet it can be concealed by folding, louvered doors.

For the studio, the architect suggests wood paneling in pecky cypress with matching bar and back bar. Wood paneling in vertical boards is recommended for the entrance foyer.

Exterior materials include brick veneer on all sides with wood shingles in the gable ends and on the dormer. Asphalt shingles are used for the roof and the outdoor terrace and walks are of flagstone.

Kitchens are beginning to look more and more like the control room on a rocket ship, but there's one old-fashioned idea housewives agree will always belong in a well-designed kitchen:

A window over the sink.

As one delegate to a recent women's congress on housing in Washington summed it up: "Even though you have to be indoors, a window lets your thoughts be out of doors."

If your kitchen doesn't have a window over the sink, it's possible today for a modern window unit to be installed without extensive remodeling.

These wood window units come from the factory with frame, sash, and hardware preassembled. They are nailed into an opening in the wall, painted or stained, and are ready for use.

Casement and awning windows are ideal for kitchens. They can be opened without stretching over the sink or cabinets.

If you are considering reroofing with asphalt shingles, have them put down over the old shingles. This will provide extra insulation and extra protection against the elements at no extra cost.

ing chairs, upholstered in brown, are placed beneath the windows. Diners can see the lake.

Although the kitchen is in the center of the house and has no windows of its own, it is an extremely light room. Recessed ceiling lights and a skylight make it that way. The day we took pictures was rainy, but the room wasn't dark.

This corridor type kitchen has a number of unusual features. Like the rest of the house, it is brown and white. Walls and Formica counters are white. Cupboards and doors are walnut. The cupboards have white pegboard fronts. Above the oven are two marble shelves for hot dishes.

Under the built-in range there are pull-out shelves for cooking utensils. There's a special drawer for sugar and flour. All around the range is a cutting board. Next to the refrigerator, where it gets heat, is a towel dryer.

When Mrs. Mattson works at the double sink, she can look out over the low cupboards and right through the living room windows. This view from her kitchen was a must when the house was in the planning stages. On the living room side of this divider wall there are more cupboards for hobby supplies.

Behind the kitchen is a sky-lighted laundry. One wall of this room is lined with cupboards and storage closets. The sink is built into a Formica topped unit.

The bedroom area can be closed off completely from the living area. It contains two bedrooms, one for thirteen-year-old Merry Ann and nine-year-old Sherry, the other for Mr. and Mrs. Mattson.

The girls have their own bath. It is all white with turquoise accessories.

Their bedroom can be two rooms. It has two doors and a folding wall. Stationary walls are white. Closets have walnut doors. The curtains which serve merely to cut the glare of the sun are blue with a seascape design.

Their windows have the same wooded view as the living room. Window sills are marble. Merry's half of the room shows that she loves horses. Sherry's half is devoted to the ballet.

The master bedroom has high windows on the street, curtained in white. On the other side of the room are sliding glass doors to the owners' private porch. Spreads on the twin beds are gray and yellow plaid.

They have a large dressing room with a skylight and their own private bathroom.

The lower level of the house is unfinished. There are three large rooms which give ample space for storage, a hobby room and a recreation room. Outside the glass wall of the latter room is a stone patio. This is the room where the Brownies meet during the fall and spring.

Mrs. Mattson has a tiny greenhouse in one section of this level. A portion of the south wall juts out and has a glass roof. She has a way with plants, especially African violets, and loves her little greenhouse.

Ed Johns of Detroit was the builder of the Mattson house. James W. Conn, A.I.A. of Southfield was the architect. The Mattsons have lived in their house since March of 1957.

Believe It or Not!

A kitchen stove of hardwood plywood is one of the many unusual features of a "House of Tomorrow" built recently near Long Beach, Calif. The plywood kitchen range houses magnetic coils which set up eddy currents in the cooking utensils. This does the actual cooking. The utensils are suspended two inches above the surface of the stove by means of magnetic repulsion, and the wood range never gets hot.

Maybe One Coat Will Do

Perhaps your neighbors can't see it, but you are in a position to know whether or not your house needs painting. Do it before defects begin to show. Likely one coat will do it at this time, instead of two coats required for weather-worn surfaces.

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
