Provost Donald D. O'Dowd will serve as a panelist and speaker at a three-day convocation November 8-10 at the new campus of Ohio University at Lancaster, Ohio. The convocation will focus on problems inherent in educating commuter students. O'Dowd, one of six persons invited to serve on a panel which will discuss various topics all three days, will open the first day's session by giving a symposium address on the subject, "The Teaching-Learning Process in the Context of Higher Education".
