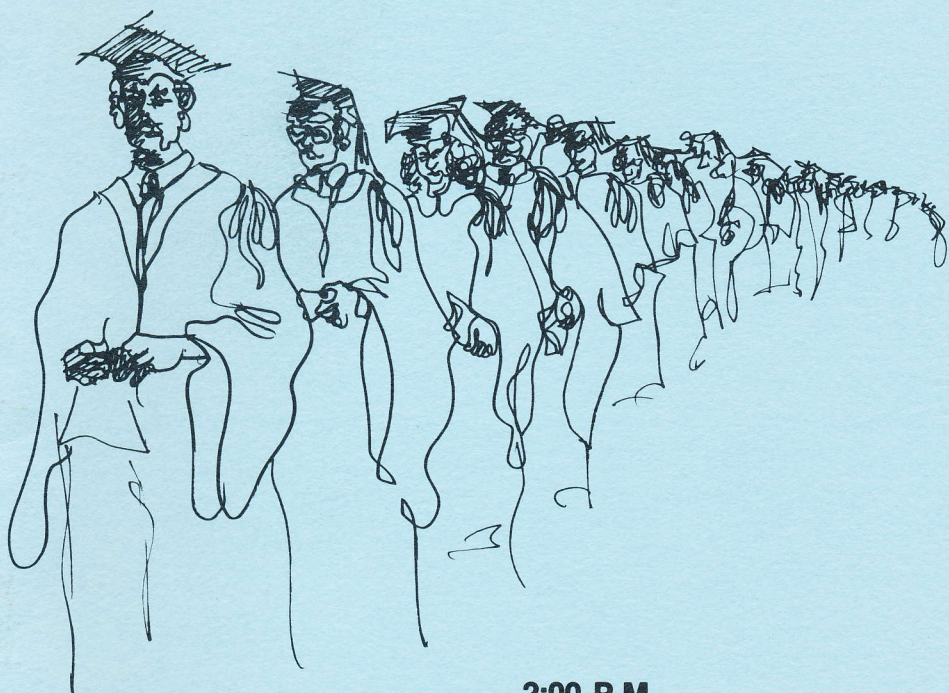

On Academic Regalia

An edifying note contributed by a
certain anonymous doctor of philosophy

On at least two solemn occasions during the academic calendar—spring and fall commencement—the faculty of the university publicly displays its full academic regalia and participates in the liturgy of processional and recessional, that curious coming and going that symbolizes the ceremony of commencement. The purposes of commencement are well known, but the reasons for the peculiar garb of the celebrants and their odd order of march are often as obscure to the audience as they are, in fact, to the faculty itself. This note may serve to explain academic dress and the professional pecking order it costumes.

Contemporary academics are descendants of clerical schoolmen in the universities of medieval Europe. Like the clergy, members of the bench and bar, and other learned professions, the medieval scholar clothed himself in heavy robes to stay warm in unheated stone buildings. Like all members of an hierarchical society, the medieval faculties rejoiced in visible insignia of rank. These outward signs of accomplishment and authority were tailored into the robes. Although the need for such voluminous garments to keep the scholar from freezing is long past, the use of them as emblems of dignity remains.

You will observe that all caps and gowns worn by our faculty are black, with certain disturbing exceptions. Black was the color adopted by mutual agreement among American universities at the end of the nineteenth century. In Europe each university has its own distinctive gown, varying in color and cut from all others. A European academic assemblage is a far gaudier occasion than its counterpart in America. Recently, certain universities in this country rashly broke the agreement and authorized robes in their own colors: for example, the crimson of Harvard and the green of Wayne State may be seen in our ranks. This unsuitable spontaneity has been frowned on by sister institutions, yet the mavericks not only persist in their madness, but gain adherents to their ranks with each passing year.

There are three basic academic degrees: the baccalaureate or bachelor's degree, the master's degree, and the doctorate. A special style of robe is prescribed for each. The bachelor's gown is sparsely cut, neat, but a bit skimpy and unadorned, as befits apprentices. The master's gown is still simple, but fuller, sports a sleeve of extraordi-

nary design impossible to describe, and has a hood draped from the shoulders down the back. Once used to keep the frost from the tonsured heads of medieval clerks, the hood now is solely a badge of a degree of scholarly achievement. The master's hood is small and narrow, but displays the colors of the institution that awarded the degree. If you knew the colors of American universities, you could easily identify whence came our masters. The doctoral robe is the most handsome of academic raiment. Generous of cut, of fine aristocratic stuff, it is faced with velvet and emblazoned with velvet chevrons on the ample sleeves. You will note that most of the velvet facings and chevrons are black, but that some are of other colors. According to personal taste, the doctor may display the color of his doctoral degree on his sleeves and facings: light blue for education, pink for music, apricot for nursing, orange for engineering, and many more. The royal blue of the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) is the most commonly seen in a liberal arts institution such as Oakland. The doctor's hood is the most elegant of all academic appurtenances. Large and graceful, it is lined in satin with the colors of the university that awarded the degree and is bordered with the color of the degree itself. Most academic costumes include the square cap called a mortarboard; the doctor's tassel may be either black or gold—tassels of all other degrees are black and stringy.

To instructed eyes, the order of march in the processional and recession reveals the standing of individuals in the institution's formal hierarchy. In the processional the order of entrance into the hall is, quite fittingly, from most junior to most senior. The baccalaureate candidates enter first, followed successively by the masters and doctoral candidates with the whole separated from the faculty by a decent interval. In the faculty order, the instructors precede the assistant professors who in turn are followed by the associate professors. The august full professors bring up the rear. After a respectful distance come the deans who in turn are separated by a significant space from the awful majesty of the platform party, the president, the vice-president, and the members of the board of trustees. All remain standing until the board is seated. After the ceremony the order of recession is the reverse of the processional. The greatest dignitaries steam out of the hall first, with the artfully organized ranks of priority wallowing in their wake.

It is hoped that these notes may make more intelligible the spectacle you are witnessing today. A discerning intelligence may detect in it many clues to an understanding of the academic profession as it confronts the ambiguities of the future with ancient wisdom and dignified confidence.

You honor us, Lew Ayres, by accepting the Degree of Doctor of Humanities, *Honoris Causa*.

PROFESSOR HARRY BOBER, we recognize you for your distinguished scholarly works on medieval art and your role in founding the International Center of Medieval Art. Further, your respect for creative energy and artistic merit, regardless of its cultural background, has made you, in your own words, "a discriminating accumulator."

Most importantly, since your first visit to our campus in October of 1962, you have encouraged our aspirations in art and art history. The mutual admiration and affection between Harry Bober and the late John Galloway are reflected in your gifts to the university art collection and in your support as John's successors contribute new insights into medieval art and architecture.

Harry Bober, you honor us with your friendship and your continuing witness to all that is honest and beautiful in our common past. Please accept, with our gratitude, the degree of Doctor of Humanities, *Honoris Causa*.

HAROLD A. COUSINS, native son of Pontiac, we honor you today for your long and distinguished record of service to this region and, specifically, to the City of Pontiac and to Oakland University.

After 28 years at General Motors you ventured into business on your own with the same sort of verve and vigor that characterized your earlier work. Running a thriving business was not enough; you continued to work as volunteer and patron in support of scouting in this area, the YMCA, and a whole series of related community activities. Most visibly in recent years, you served as the first chairman of the Pontiac stadium building authority which overcame monumental problems to make Silverdome a reality.

Your special interest in Oakland University has been expressed in your hard work on the Steering Committee of the Oakland University President's Club and your substantial and continuing support for the Meadow Brook Festival and the Meadow Brook Theatre. Your contributions to the Katke-Cousins Golf Course can be described only as magnificent.

Harold Cousins, your contribution to the quality of life in Oakland County will be remembered and cherished. In recognition of your dedication, we proudly confer upon you the degree of Doctor of Laws, *Honoris Causa*.

PROFESSOR KENNETH A. MEADE, your first career began in 1925 with the teaching of physics at Central High School in Kalamazoo. After service on the faculties of General Motors Institute and Lawrence Institute of Technology, you returned to General Motors where you served for many years as manager of educational relations. In 1967, you came to Oakland University to develop a series of special programs for the Division of Continuing Education. Our School of Engineering then claimed you. In engineering, you built an elegant teaching laboratory in statics and dynamics as an aid in the teaching of engineering mechanics. You quickly became a friend and trusted counselor of our engineering students. In addition, you continued to serve the larger community in such roles as member of the Board of Governors of the Cranbrook Institute of Science and Vice-President and Secretary of the Thomas Alva Edison Foundation.
