GUADALAJARA SITE OF SUMMER CREDIT PROGRAM

OU will offer its first summer program in Guadalajara, Mexico, July 7-August 11 in cooperation with the Instituto Cultural Guadalajara. Students will live with Mexican families as part of their living-learning experience and receive 8 credits.

James Dow, instructor in sociology-anthropology, and Kathryn McArdle, associate professor of Spanish, will teach special courses at the Instituto Cultural. Subjects will be taught in Guadalajara or on special "field term" programs. Most will be taught in English. The program is sponsored by the OU Latin American Studies faculty.

Cost of \$450 includes tuition, room and board. Contact the Summer Program in Mexican Studies, 321 Varner Hall.

RICHARD CONRAD IN RECITAL

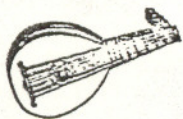

COLLEGIUM CONCERTS PRESENT LUTE DUETS, "MUSIC FROM LORENZO'S TIME"



A concert of lute duets and other music from 16th century Europe and Elizabethan England will be presented on Wednesday, April 11, in Varner Recital Hall at 8 p.m. The program will include the world premiere of a modern work for two lutes performed by Lyle Nordstrom, OU assistant professor of music and director of the school's Collegium Musicum, and Robert Polansky, OU senior lute major. Admission is \$2.00 adults, \$1.00 students.

In a second concert, Monday, April 16, Lorenzo di' Medici, one of the most illustrious Italian art patrons of the Renaissance, will be honored by the Oakland University Collegium Musicum. "Music from Lorenzo's Time" is at 8 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall. Admission is \$1.00 adults, \$.50 students.

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES
MEET MARCH 28**

*At its Wednesday, March 28 meeting, the OU Board of Trustees authorized OU to work through state or federal channels, whichever approach proved necessary, to obtain status as a guaranteed lending institution. Such status would enable OU to borrow money and then serve as a lender to students who are unsuccessful in securing other forms of financial aid, including a guaranteed loan from a bank.

*Also approved by the Board was a \$21 a term hike for either the spring or summer terms bringing costs to \$331, and a \$64 yearly increase for students in residence during both the fall and winter terms. New costs are now \$1,290 a year. Additional living options will continue to be available to OU students. University officials said the increases absorb only part of the rising costs to the University of food service contracts and other residence hall expenses.

*A total of \$132,826 in gifts and grants was accepted by the Board. The sum represents contributions to the institution since the Board's last meeting in February.

Grants and indirect costs of \$109,667 were received by two professors in the School of Engineering for separate research projects. They are: David Evans who received \$67,300 from the National Science Foundation for research entitled "Statistical Tolerancing Methods and Applications" and Joseph derHovanesian who received \$30,617 from the National Institutes of Health to support "Use of Moire Techniques to Measure Corneal Topography" and an additional \$11,050 for indirect costs related to the research.

V. Everett Kinsey, director, Institute of Biological Sciences, received a \$13,448 grant from the National Institutes of Health for a "Cooperative RLF Study Oxygen Therapy for Prematures."

*Changes of status, sabbatical leaves of absence and a career development leave were approved for various OU personnel at the Board meeting.

Fifteen faculty members were granted sabbatical leaves with full or half pay. Manuel Pierson, dean, Student Services, was granted a career development leave to complete work on his doctoral dissertation at Wayne State University.

Changes of status included Karl D. Gregory from associate professor of economics and management to associate professor and acting chairman of the Department of Economics effective January 3, 1973, through April 27, 1973, and Hollie Lepley, from a 12-month basis to a 10-month basis as professor of education and coordinator of physical education effective Aug. 15, 1973.

Sabbatical leaves were approved for the following faculty: John V. Barnard, history; Max Brill, psychology; Richard Burke, philosophy; Thomas Casstevens, political science; Jack Cumbee, Jr., philosophy; Jon Froemke, mathematics; Daniel Fullmer, linguistics; John Immerwahr, philosophy; Donald Morse, English; Marion Orton, mathematics; James Ozinga, political science; Joan Rosen, English; Karen Sacks, anthropology; David Shantz, psychology; and Richard Tucker, history.

*Approximately 50 students attended the Board meeting. Three of them acting as unofficial spokesmen for the group presented a co-op housing proposal to the Board during the new business session of the meeting. The spokesmen said 220 students had already signed a questionnaire indicating interest in a co-op housing arrangement. The advantages, they said, would be less cost to the student, a sense of responsibility and a sense of community. A committee of Board and administration members will look into the feasibility of such an arrangement.

*In another action, the Board approved a littering ordinance.

The Afram Jazz Ensemble under the direction of Marvin Holladay, assistant professor of music, will present its final concert for the winter semester, Friday, April 13 at 8 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall. Students, \$.50, general admission, \$1.50.

Marvin Holladay will appear in concert, Tuesday, April 17 at 8 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall.

Holladay, who plays a variety of instruments including the alto and flute, will perform with Marcus Belgrave, trumpet and flugelhorn; Ali Jackson, bass; Bert Myrick, drums; and Jerry LeDuff, conga drums. The program will include various musical periods in jazz from blues to free improvisational settings. The concert is open to the public at \$2, students \$.50 with an identification card.

Norman Susskind, chairman of the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures, has announced the grant of \$960 by the OU Alumni Association to his department. Susskind says the grant will be applied to the purchase of a sound stretcher and compressor which can record speech at either slower or faster rates without changing the pitch.

ALL BACH PROGRAM

An all Bach program performed by 22 OU voice students with the Instrumental Ensemble of Oakland University will be presented Thursday, April 12 at 8 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall. The concert is under the auspices of the Department of Music and Richard Conrad, instructor in voice. The program will include arias, duets and trios from the Magnificat, St. Matthew Passion, the Christmas Oratorio and other sacred and secular cantatas. There is no charge for admission.

SUNDAY POPS SERIES STARTS JULY 1

The schedule for the popular Sunday Pops Series at Meadow Brook Music Festival, which will run for eight weeks from July 1 through August 19, was announced last week by W. W. Kent, managing director of the Music Festival.

*Conductor Sixten Ehrling will lead the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in the July 1 concert on which Peter Nero will premiere his new composition for solo piano and orchestra. Peter Nero and His Trio will play in concert during the second half of the evening.

*Arthur Fiedler, conductor of the Boston Pops, will appear again this season on July 8, to conduct the Detroit Symphony in a program of celebrated pop favorites. His guest artist will be the young Latin American pianist Alegria Arce.

*An all-Gershwin evening with Andre Kostelanetz and pianist Leonard Pennario is planned for July 15.

*July 22, the youthfully-oriented National Ballet of Washington, D.C., will present a major classical ballet, "Cinderella," based on the Prokofiev score.

*Conductor Mitch Miller returns to Meadow Brook again this summer on July 29.

*American composer and conductor Morton Gould will make his first appearance at the Festival on August 5. He will feature, along with guest flamenco guitarist Carlos Montoya, an evening of Iberian-American music.

*Guest conductor Richard Hayman is making his initial appearance at Meadow Brook on August 12. The title of his concert, "Three B's" refers to the contemporary "B's": Bacharach, Bernstein and The Beatles.

*The concluding Sunday, August 19 Festival program, is still to be announced.

CINDY LIVINGSTON NAMED TO POST
