### EDITORIAL

A student caught drinking in the dorms or breaking some social rule should certainly have charges and action taken against him. Social probation, early hours and loss of privileges, and in some cases removal from the dorms are all logical punishments. But being told that he can not attend classes any more and that he loses all the time and credits he has earned up until his offense in that semester is absurd.

This method of dealing with wrongdoers reminds me of ancient China where a mother and the family were punished for their relative's misdeeds. Even though the Board of Admissions and the High Office of Propaganda likes to tell us that Oakland is young, revolutionary and open-minded, I can't help but feel that we are quite archaic in our punitive dealings. # ARCHITECTS HIRED FOR DORM 7

The contract to design Dorm #7 has been awarded to Red Stone Architects and Planners. This is the same firm that helped in the building of Fitzgerald, Anibal, and Pryale Houses. 
