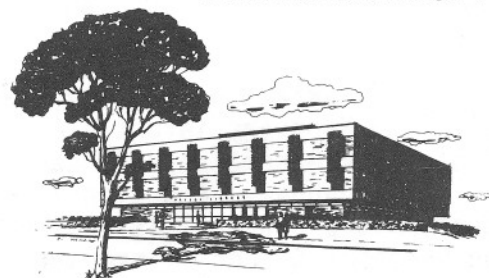


LELAND CARR NAMED TRUSTEE EMERITUS

Leland W. Carr, Jr., a charter member of the Board of Trustees who resigned December 31, has been given trustee emeritus status by his former colleagues.

The OU board at its January 28 meeting passed a resolution honoring Carr and naming him Charter Trustee Emeritus. The Lansing attorney was appointed to the board in August of 1970. His term would have expired in August of 1978. Governor William Milliken will name Carr's replacement.

Carr is a partner of the firm of Anderson, Carr, Street & Hornbach in Lansing. He is university attorney and vice president for legal affairs at Michigan State University.

BOARD APPOINTS DEMONT AS DIRECTOR OF CENTER

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has appointed Billie DeMont, assistant provost, as director of the new Center for General and Career Studies.

The January 28 action is effective immediately. The center is a new administrative unit approved by the board on December 5, and it provides a single governing structure for five academic units. These units are New-Charter College, the credit evening program, the Department of Learning Skills, and the Career Development and Bachelor of General Studies programs.

In other January 28 personnel actions, the board approved the appointment of David Albert Mortimer as visiting assistant professor of education and approved the reappointment of Shera Moore Farnham as visiting instructor in the library.

Daniel Frank Ring, library, was promoted from instructor to assistant professor.

Richard L. Rubin, mathematical sciences, has had his paper, "Multipliers on the Rigid Motions of the Plane and Their Relations to Multipliers on Direct Products," accepted for publication in the Proceedings of the American Mathematical Society.

EWING PRESENTS MATH PAPER

Richard E. Ewing, mathematical sciences, presented a paper entitled "Determination of a Source Term in a Linear Parabolic Partial Differential Equation" at the recent fall meeting for the Society of Industrial and Applied Mathematics in San Francisco.

In addition, a paper entitled "The Locations and Strengths of Point Sources," jointly authored by Ewing and John R. Cannon of the University of Texas at Austin, has just appeared in Volume 1 of the Pitman Research Notes in Mathematics series entitled Improperly Posed Boundary Value Problems.

ART OF PRE-COLUMBIAN AMERICA ON EXHIBIT

Oakland University's Meadow Brook Art Gallery will display the "Art of Pre-Columbian America" in a February 15-March 26 exhibit. The public is invited at no charge.

The exhibit will open on February 15 with a 3 p.m. lecture by Cecelia Klein, art and art history, speaking on "Toward a Pre-Columbian Aesthetic." The lecture will be in room 124 of Wilson Hall, one floor below the gallery.

The contents of the exhibition have been selected to represent a wide geographical area and to represent the rich variety of art produced by the Central and South American cultures.

The exhibit contains 89 pieces selected from the collection of the American Indian in New York City and from five private collectors in the New York and Detroit areas.

A comprehensive exhibit catalog has been prepared for gallery visitors, which includes essays by Klein and by James Dow, sociology and anthropology.

THREE ENGINEERING SEMINARS SCHEDULED

The School of Engineering announces that three seminars in applied mechanics and applied mathematics will be held in Dodge Hall beginning February 10. The seminars are jointly sponsored by the General Electric Foundation and Oakland University.

The dates of the seminars and their topics are: Tuesday, February 10, "Fiber Reinforced Composites," conducted by Allen C. Pipkin, professor of applied mathematics, Brown University; Tuesday, March 16, "Conservation Laws in Elasticity of the J-Integral Type," Richard T. Shield, professor and head of theoretical and applied mathematics, University of Illinois; and Tuesday, April 13, "Measurement of Complex Moduli in Visco-Elastic Materials," by Robert Plunkett, professor of mechanics, University of Minnesota.

All seminars will be held in room 202 of Dodge Hall at 3:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served at 3 p.m. preceding the seminars.

TEPLEY IN COLLOQUIUM

Norman Tepley, physics, presented a talk to the Physics Colloquium at Wayne State University on December 4, 1975. His talk "Hearts and SQUIDS" explained the physical origins of magnetic signals arising from the human heart and described progress in his research on magnetic measurement of the condition of the heart.

ACADEMY TO TOUR SCHOOLS

The Studio Company of Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art will be touring to eight S.E. Michigan Schools from February 9-19. The production is a montage of scenes from Shakespeare's comedies performed by a small company of actors playing a variety of roles. Director Alexander Gray has chosen scenes from "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "The Tempest," "Twelfth Night," "The Two Gentlemen of Verona," and "The Taming of the Shrew."

The public and Oakland University community will have an opportunity to see a performance of the touring production on Friday, February 6, at 8:15 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall on the Oakland University Campus. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$1.

CAMERON AWARDED FUNDING

John B. Cameron, art history, has been awarded a \$3,500 O.U. Research Fellowship for the period January-September, 1976. Cameron will be on leave from the university during that period and will continue to investigate "Notre-Dame de Beaujeu and Romanesque Sculpture in the Lyonnais," a project he has been working on for several years.
