

Detroit Mother Strangled in Rape Attempt

DETROIT—A 46-year-old mother of three was found strangled by a "man in white" last night between two houses a few doors from her home on Detroit's East Side.

The victim was Mrs. Elizabeth Moughler, her body in the snow five doors from her home. She was walking to a movie theater shortly after 11 p.m. when she was seen by a neighbor's complaint.

The medical examiner's office said the woman apparently died of strangulation. An autopsy was being performed, but they said it was apparently attempted rape.

NEAR GILLESPIE SITE

Mrs. Moughler was attacked about two miles from the scene of the still unsolved Jan. 11 Ann Gillespie sex-murder.

The 46-year-old woman was beaten to death and raped in an alley while walking home from a movie Jan. 22, 1953.

Patrolmen Vern Knack and Robert Pilar were about to ring the doorbell of a housewife who reported "a disturbance" when they noticed "a flash of white" between the houses.

Pilar chased the man, but he eluded him. Knack discovered the woman's body between the houses. She was already dead.

Lt. Det. Richard H. Miller of the homicide bureau said, "It looks like another Gillespie case all over again."

Miller said the woman's clothes were ripped and disarranged.

Her son, Kenneth, 14, and a daughter, JoAnn, 22, had become worried when she failed to return and went looking for her.

Kenneth said he checked the theater and learned his mother had left. The boy said he usually accompanied his mother but stayed home last night.

The patrolmen were sent to investigate a disturbance on a complaint of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Coffer. Mrs. Coffer was about 11 p.m. she heard a man's woman arguing in front of their flat.

She said she saw a man drag-

ging a woman along a hedge between the houses.

"I went down to the front porch and looked between the houses," Coffer said. "But I didn't see anything. Then I went back upstairs and called the police."

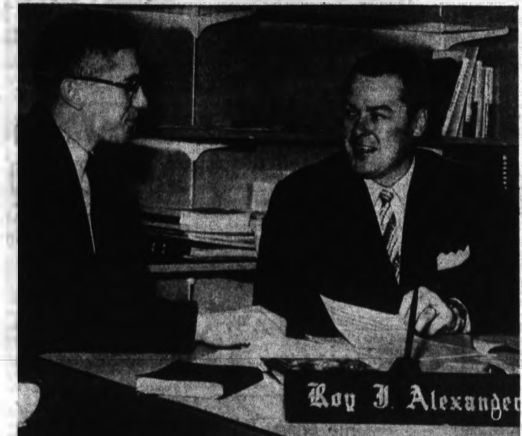
SUSPECTS

Det. Miller said three suspects were brought in for questioning because footprints in the snow led to their homes near the scene.

"We probably can't hold them very long," Miller said. "We're just checking out all possible leads. There were no eyewitnesses."

The victim's husband, Wilbur, 48, was at work at a Plymouth automobile factory at the time of the murder. He and two of his three children went to the morgue to identify the body. Police said another son is in Germany in the Army.

Tar No Longer at Sea Car-Train Crash Takes 2 Lives

The sailor glancing at the newspaper his Michigan buddy was reading as their ship, the U.S.S. Des Moines, patrolled Mediterranean waters.

The headline "Michigan's Revolutionary College" caught his eye, and 22-year-old Neil Smith of Fall River, Mass., wanted to know more.

Smith, then a petty officer aboard the cruiser, was about to be discharged. He planned on a college education but hadn't picked a campus.

The story sparked his interest in that "revolutionary college"—Michigan State University Oakland—so much so that he decided to see for himself.

And, although it's a long way from the Mediterranean to MSUO, the bespectacled Smith turned up as the campus Thursday.

Now a civilian and working in his father's restaurant in Fall River, Smith flew here at his own expense. For two days he talked to teachers, students, deans and counselors and inspected the institution's facilities.

His tour completed, Smith flew home last night, leaving behind an application and \$10, a nonrefundable application fee.

"I'll see you in the fall," he promised MSUO officials before he departed.

Smith wrote the university last fall for more information. He finished his four-year hitch as a communications technician five weeks ago.

He plans to start at MSUO this fall.

"I like the idea of a university that tough and that asks more of its students," Smith said. "And I favor the emphasis on liberal arts instead of job training."

Adams Scores Scholle Suit

De Gaulle Fires Algiers General; Citizens Angry

Jacques Massu Is Hero in Territory; May Get New Assignment

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle had a face-to-face meeting today with paratrooper Gen. Jacques Massu, the man he fired Friday night as commander of the Algiers area.

Massu's backers in Algeria reacted with a call for a general strike.

As De Gaulle and the hero of European settlers in Algeria talked, French combat troops and police armed with tommy guns patrolled the streets of Algiers on the alert for serious trouble.

Algiers merchants hurriedly shuttered their shop fronts. They said the strike order was issued by armed territorial guards, the militia of Algiers citizens.

Presumably De Gaulle and Massu discussed the beretted general's next assignment, which is expected to send him far from rebellious Algeria.

The hawked-on Massu, sporting his combat beret, left De Gaulle's office after a 45-minute session. He declined to make a statement.

Massu was dismissed after a newspaper interview— which he later denied—in which he was quoted as criticizing the leadership of De Gaulle and his Algerian policies.

Massu was recalled to Paris Tuesday by the French president and allowed to keep his heels.

In Algiers, Delegate-Gen. Paul Delcros took to the radio to urge calmness among the residents.

"I know what this great soldier represents to you, and I pay him tribute," he said.

Delcros termed the dismissal regrettable, but added: "We must understand that authority must be maintained. The government will not retreat."

He warned that violent reaction to the dismissal might bring chaos to Algeria.

Massu is the hero of the European rights-wingers in Algeria. The news of his being fired from his Algerian command spread swiftly when newspapers hit the streets this morning.

The general strike began in the suburbs of Bricout and Bab-el-Oued.

Do Tranquilizers Cost Too Much?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate investigators promised today to determine whether any state mental hospitals are doing without needed tranquilizer drugs because they can't afford them.

The Senate antitrust subcommittee got a hint that the cost of the drugs might be too high for some state institutions in testimony yesterday from Dr. Henry Brill, deputy commissioner of the New York State Mental Hygiene Department.

Brill said the tranquilizers were not too expensive for New York. But he said he could "readily imagine such a situation" elsewhere.

Sen. Philip A. Hart (D-Mich.) said the subcommittee would investigate further to find out if tranquilizers were being priced out of the market for state hospitals.

Brill testified that tranquilizers cost New York \$750,000 a year. The subcommittee is investigating prices in the drug industry.

Hearings were scheduled to resume Tuesday with testimony from H. H. Hoyt of New York, president of Carter Products, Inc., which makes the tranquilizer known as miltown.

Dr. Helen E. Lehmann, a prominent psychiatrist, told the subcommittee yesterday that people could become addicted to the use of tranquilizer drugs.

Lehmann, chief psychiatrist at Verdun Protestant Hospital in Montreal, said large doses of miltown, sold under the trade name of Miltown, could be dangerous.

Apportionment Public Issue, Local Dems Told

Attorney in Audience Objects to Comment Before Court Action

Atty. Gen. Paul L. Adams last night was criticized for publicly airing his views on August Scholle's Senate apportionment suit before the State Supreme Court has had a chance to rule on it.

Adams, speaking to the Bloomfield Democratic Club, said if the people think the present apportionment is wrong they, and not the court, should change it.

For airing his views publicly before the court has heard arguments on the case, the Democratic state official was taken to task by Theodore Sachs, Detroit attorney for August Scholle, state AFL-CIO president, who filed the suit.

It asks the court to declare a 1963 amendment freeing senatorial districts was unconstitutional in that it deprived citizens of equal protection of the laws.

Sachs, who denied that Scholle sent him to the meeting to hear what Adams had to say, said he was "shocked" to hear the subject he had chosen.

"OUT OF PLACE"

He also said Adams "was out of place" and was violating ethical codes by discussing a court case outside the court.

"I think it was my duty to do so," Adams said. "Scholle has certainly expressed his views freely, especially in the labor press."

During a question and answer period following Adams' remarks, he said he was not interested in himself, and commented, "Needless to say I disagree with what you've said."

He asked the official why he wouldn't support his move for an early hearing so that if the court declares the amendment void, the Legislature could reappoint a slate in 1960. Adams answered that (Continued on Page 2, Col. 7)

City Official Gives Answers

Details about Pontiac's civil defense sirens—how they operate and how they are to be interpreted by the public—were forthcoming today from City Hall.

Robert A. Stierer, assistant city manager and assistant Civil Defense director, included the details in answers to six questions raised recently by The Pontiac Press about the city's civil defense system.

Stierer gave these answers to The Press' six questions about the sirens:

Q. Should the siren sound once morning of 10 a.m., what procedure should be followed?

A. This is not a test time for sirens so the person should turn

because of a short circuit. Radio and television stations (which would be off the air in case of a real emergency) would advise listeners if the sirens were set off accidentally or not.

Q. In the case of a real emergency, where would the public take cover?

A. People at home should take cover in the basements or home shelters. People who are in factories or office buildings or outdoors in downtown Pontiac should take cover in basements or in reinforced first-floor areas away from windows.

Q. Would an unannounced siren warning automatically mean an air raid?

A. No, not automatically. It could mean an alert or an attack but it could also mean a defect in the controls or a test. Tests are always well publicized in advance.

Q. Are there any special signs that will be given by the sirens?

A. There are two signals. One is a wailing tone that rises and falls. The other is a steady blast. The steady blast is an alert signal and should be interpreted as meaning an attack is possible or on the way. At this point, everyone who can should turn on the radio to the nearest station for official information and directions. The steady blast means attack is imminent (usually less than a half hour away). Everyone should take cover immediately in the best shelter available.

Q. If when the steady blast sounds you are in a building where there is no prepared shelter, go to the basement or an interior first floor but it could also mean a defect

Bonsal Leaving Cuba for Good?

HAVANA — U. S. Ambassador Philip Bonsal, who flew from Washington only 13 days ago, returns today for "consultations" about this week's unprecedented outbreak of anti-Americanism in the semi-official Cuban press and radio.

Authoritative quarters here say it may be "a long time" before Bonsal returns. Some responsible informants believe his recall may be permanent.

President Eisenhower, Secretary of State Christian Herter, John Foster Dulles and Bonomi all have been the targets of personal attacks in the current anti-American campaign.

Premier Fidel Castro himself has accused the United States of "racism." Cuba.

In Washington, President Eisenhower conferred with Herter today on the developing crisis in U. S.-Cuban relations.

Herter was reported to have a number of issues to discuss with the President during his January 28th visit.

Herter was also expected to discuss the Cuban situation with the President's top aides.

Herter and his aides apparently have been uncertain about what to do about what they consider insulting and erratic behavior by Castro, who has combined a campaign of seizure of U. S.-owned plantations with a propaganda drive against the United States and its leaders.

At a congressional committee Thursday, Herter said that attacks made by Castro on the United States were "insulting."

Castro's "personal vendetta against the United States" was also mentioned.

A 33-year-old Birmingham attorney last night kicked off his campaign for the Democratic nomination for Oakland County prosecutor after the Bloomfield Democratic Club announced its support.

George J. Fullerton of 3813 Midway Lane, Bloomfield Hills, was named the first local Democrat to announce his candidacy for a county office.

A graduate of the University of Detroit School of Law in 1952, Fullerton has been associated with a Detroit law firm since 1953 when he was admitted to the bar.

Since 1957 he has been in private practice, with an office recently opened in Birmingham.

Mr. William A. Clemmons, chairman of the Bloomfield club, emphasized that endorsement of Fullerton was being made by the club and not by the county committee.

The committee usually re-evaluates from endorsing candidates until after the primary.

In his first campaign speech, Fullerton, an Air Force veteran, said he would seek the nomination Aug. 2 on a platform of (1) making sure people in the county are protected from criminals, and (2) making sure that the prosecutor not prosecute cases where there isn't enough evidence to warrant sending them to court.

He is a 1944 graduate of Pontiac Central High School and graduate of the University of Chicago. He is married and has a wife Ruth and a four-year-old son.

If the court orders an early hearing he will comply.

Sachs told newsmen the attorney general was "reeling" on his earlier promise to appear at an early showing. Adams denied any such promise, either by letter or verbally.

"It is a fact," he said, "that I am not appearing."

Sachs continued.

Stated to discuss the Scholle case and constitutional convention question, Adams dwelt entirely on the first, not, he said, because Sachs was in the audience.

He sidestepped a question about his position on the so-called convention issue by saying it was no question for the Supreme Court to decide. He added, however, too was a question citizens "would have to grapple with" like the apportionment issue.

Noting that the people by petition have the right to match the change apportionment if dissatisfied, Adams said the state's current political wrangling between Republican and Democratic makes "other avenues tempting."

"I submit," he said, "that if the court goes down this avenue as an arbitrator where something is being plucked out of the 14th amendment, then we will end up with a reversal of the judiciary rather than by the people."

He quoted U. S. Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter as saying the "court should not attempt to enter into a political field."

"It is exactly that today in this case," the speaker said.

"It is something we must decide ourselves," he added. "We must have to say what sort of government we want to live under. The people are the fundamental legislators."

He prefaced his remarks by saying since he believed members of the club along with other citizens would eventually decide the question, he was not making a statement.

Admitted that present apportionment "are unfair and don't give voters proper representation" but he did not intend to file an endorsement affidavit said was not the issue in the Scholle case.

Spears Still Silent on Earlier Crash

Airliner-Bomb Rumor Doubtful

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Airliner crash that killed Julian Frank and 33 other persons was not caused by a man-made explosion according to the evidence so far from an autopsy on the body of the heavily insured New York lawyer.

Informal sources said the continuing autopsy had produced no evidence thus far of powder burns or any other explosion.

The sources emphasized that these tentative conclusions could be changed by microscopic examination of parts of Frank's body and of the plane which crashed near Badin, N.C. Jan. 6 killing all aboard.

But, the sources said yesterday no conclusive evidence that the DOB was destroyed by "wildfire" means had been found yet.

The Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) and FBI have not yet determined the cause of the crash.

Airport officials and Eastern Airlines officials first said the trouble was occasioned because cockpit signals lights indicated the nose wheel of the plane had not locked.

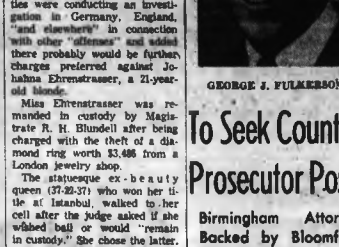
As the plane circled, airport personnel said their visual checks indicated the landing gear was operating satisfactorily.

She waived examination yesterday before Municipal Judge Maurice E. Finnegan and was released on bond. She will be arraigned in circuit court next Monday.

Miss King admitted embezzling the dental surgeon's patients when writing the amount the patient should have been charged in the office account books.

Hoogheverf told police he became suspicious when his practice dwindled.

He called authorities Thursday afternoon.

A check of the doctor's accounts from Feb. 1959 showed receipt slips totaled \$2,500 more than the figures in the ledger, Emery said.

Miss King was hired by Hoogheverf in July 1958. She was laid off last November but returned to work this week.

"It is exactly that today in this case," the speaker said.

"It is something we must decide ourselves," he added. "We must have to say what sort of government we want to live under. The people are the fundamental legislators."

He prefaced his remarks by saying since he believed members of the club along with other citizens would eventually decide the question, he was not making a statement.

Admitted that present apportionment "are unfair and don't give voters proper representation" but he did not intend to file an endorsement affidavit said was not the issue in the Scholle case.

"It's not whether districts are fair or unfair. Rather it is the question of whether the state in the future have right to decide what kind of representation and government they want to have. It will be decided for the people by the Supreme Court of Michigan."

On the outside, the psychiatrist said, a month's supply of the same prescription will cost the patient double the cost to the hospital.

"Patients are released who will be fine on the outside," he said, "as long as they remain on the drug... and they must remain on it in order to stay out of the hospital."

Cold Whips Nation Florida Crops Threatened

Florida farmers fired up their mudpots today in a desperate effort to save their winter vegetable crops from a bitter cold wave which covered the eastern half of the United States.

The mercury dipped to 38 in Miami and 19 in Gainesville yesterday to mark the coldest Jan. 28 in Florida history. The Weather Bureau issued a dreaded two-day forecast:

"Little change."

The weatherman predicted lows of 38 today along the coast, 35 tomorrow and 32 the day after.

Warren Johnson, chief of the Federal-State Fruit Warning Service at Lakeview, said most of the Florida growers came south to escape the cold played today on their winter crops.

Georgia expected its lowest temperatures of the year — a chilly 15 degrees above zero.

Readings as low as 10 degrees below zero were common throughout the Midwest and along the eastern coast.

The Weather Bureau said temperatures would warm slightly today over the Northern and Central States, but the eastern half of the nation could expect at least one more day of the bone-chilling cold which followed a murderous snow-country storm earlier this week.

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Miner Pulls Jokes With Rescuer

ELY, Minn. (AP) — A hardy miner who joked through a 18-hour ordeal 1,500 feet underground was rescued unharmed Friday night after being trapped by a tide of mud in the east cavern of Pioneer Mine.

"Thanks Howie," whispered Joseph Mishmash, 30, to his life-long friend, John "Howie" Sayovitz, the first to reach him after rescue squads drilled and blasted through a 16-foot wall of solid iron ore.

Sayovitz, choked up with emotion, was unable to speak as Mishmash squeezed past him in the three-foot wide rescue tunnel and crawled to safety. Rescuers slapped him on the back and piled him with coffee and sandwiches and other food from their lunch buckets. Mishmash had been without food or water since 8:30 a.m. when a mudflow sealed the bottom of the vertical shaft in which he was working. Rescuers reached him at 11:25 p.m.

"I knew they were coming," Mishmash told friends on the surface. "I've worked in rescue squads myself and I didn't mind they were moving slowly. They had to be careful. I wouldn't be here if they weren't."

Most of what we all said was written off by the Russians as sheer fabrication—lies, if you prefer—but we were hopeful that when the next — and the next — and the next Americans said the same things, the ideas might begin to take root. At least they might raise questions in Russian minds.

The Kremlin teaches that the Russians are the most fortunate people on earth and enjoy the greatest existence there is. The deception can't last forever. But the big brass will die trying.

Cheap Punks Active
This outbreak of swastikas is strictly the work of about three elements.

Basically, I think it's Communist inspired, with a few "practical pranksters" aiding and abetting and perhaps a very tiny percentage of bigoted and slap happy hooligans bringing up the ignominious rear.

Probably in Germany some left-over Nazis had a hand, and part of the "plot" may have been to discredit the ADENAUER government, just on the eve of the proposed summit meetings. By and large, the meaning had no significance and less intelligence. At the same time, it is highly offensive and the perpetrators should be handled summarily. There are times when you don't have to be tolerant over intolerance.

If the genesis really were Russian, the Commies are cute enough to realize that subtle plots like this often "catch on" and sweep across nations and even oceans. The UAW said its International Executive Board had voted unanimously to "follow the sound policy of non-involvement in the activities of any candidate seeking the nomination of his party for the presidency or vice presidency."

"This policy of non-involvement by the UAW or its International officers in no way infringes on the rights of individual members of our Union to exercise their constitutional right to work for the candidate of their choice," the statement said.

Shipbuilders Hit by East Strike

More Than 17,000 Men at 9 Bethlehem Plants Seen to Be Affected

QUINCY, Mass. (AP)—Work on a billion dollars worth of ship construction—including three nuclear-powered vessels—halted today as a strike by Bethlehem Steel Co. shipbuilders spread along the East Coast.

More than 17,000 workers at nine Bethlehem plants were expected to be affected by the walkout, which began Friday at Hoboken, N.J., and jumped to West Milton, N.Y., and Quincy today. Some 12,500 employees already were involved in the dispute.

A spokesman for Local 5, Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilders, said the full impact of the strike might not be felt until Monday because only skeleton forces work weekends in some areas.

He said other Bethlehem plants expected to be affected are at East Boston, Mass., Sparrows Point, Key Highway, and Baltimore, Md., and Brooklyn and Staten Island, N.Y.

HALTS CRUISER
The strike halted construction in Quincy on the 250-million-dollar cruiser Long Beach, the destroyer Bainbridge, and the frigate Luce. Each is nuclear-powered. Work also ceased on the cruiser Springfield, being converted into a missile carrier, and on five tankers. Some 71,000 workers were affected in Quincy.

At Hoboken, more than 1,000 men walked out of the Bethlehem yard. In West Milton, N.Y., 250 workers struck, halting production of the prototype hull for the destroyer Bainbridge, being built at Quincy.

Minor violence occurred at the Quincy plant shortly after midnight when two newsmen attempted to enter the yard to talk with supervisory employees. Pickets pushed the newsmen back through a gate and tore up notes taken by one reporter. Peaceful picketing then resumed.

Ordained on March 19, 1938, he came to the United States for post graduate studies at the New Brunswick Theological Seminary. After serving several churches in the East, he was transferred to San Francisco, Calif. Elected Titular Bishop of Troadus in 1955, he was consecrated a bishop in Pittsburgh, Pa. on Nov. 3, 1955.

Bishop Polykarpus has written several books and speaks Greek, ancient and modern, English, French and Turkish.

SAGINAW—Pontiac Central took another giant stride toward its 2nd straight Saginaw Valley Conference basketball crown here last night.

A dead-end defense, superb rebounding and a well-balanced offense—these were the ingredients that propelled the unbeaten Chiefs to a 57-46 triumph over Saginaw High in this showdown fight for 1st place.

Aside from the very early stages of the game, the Chiefs were ahead all the way as they hurdled the 2nd pretender to their Saginaw Valley throne in as many weeks—both on the road.

Central's vitally important victory completed the 1st round of the league schedule and the Chiefs now hold a two-game cushion over their nearest rivals as the title chase enters the final round.

The win was No. 5 in the conference and 7th all-time for Pontiac, Michigan's 1st-ranked Class A outfit in this week's Associated Press high school poll.

Saginaw, now 43 overall, fell into at least temporary possession of 2nd place with a 22 record. The Trojans play host to Flint Central next Tuesday evening in a rescheduled contest.

Flint Northern's Arthur Hill was winners in Friday's other Valley games as they tied for the runner-up spot at 32. Northern crushed winless Bay City Central, 65-39, and the Illinois Milled Ship Central, 58-56.

Pontiac's switching man-to-man defense really stifled coach Larry Laeding's firestorm attack. Not once did the racehorse Trojans succeed with a fast break.

Just like a week ago at Flint when the Chiefs whipped Northern, big George Fed and muscular Bill Pritchett controlled the backboard to take the spotlight away from Saginaw's 1-3 rebounding punch. Thompson and Jerry Tillman.

Fed practically smothered Tillman and held him to a stingy five points, all in the second half. Thompson, the league's leading scorer, hit two figures, was the game's individual scoring leader with 19 points, nine of them at the foul line in 10 attempts.

The Chiefs had excellent scoring balance. Dennis Harbert was in control late in the 4th quarter, set the pace with 14 points, followed by Pritchett's 11, Fed's nine and eight apiece for Phil Babeja and Bill Hayward.

Agile Henry Robertson, seeing his first heavy duty since recovering from a broken wrist, was impressive while contributing seven points and he looks like a sure-fire replacement for Haywood.

Haywood, a mid-year graduate, played the final game of his prep career yesterday and bowed out on a high note. He ably assisted on the boards and limited John Ramzy, who logged 20 against Bay City Monday Tuesday, to only seven points.

Early in the 1st quarter the Trojans held leads of 3-1 and 8-3 and the score was tied twice, 8-8 and 14-14. Pritchett's basket midway through the 1st period gave the Chiefs a 15-7 edge and Saginaw never caught them again.

After Pritchett's bucket and a free throw by Fed, scores of 27, 12-10 and 14-12 were as close as the Trojans could get in the 1st half. They never came closer than six points in the 2nd half as PCH pulled steadily away.

The Chiefs held quarterly margins of 14-10, 27-18 and 41-28. Late in the 4th stanza Central's lead swelled to 57-39, then coach Art Van Ryzin emptied his bench with two minutes remaining and the Trojans scored seven straight points to make the difference look more respectable.

PCH concludes its three-game Valley road trip next Friday at Arthur Hill. Three of Pontiac's last four league games will be at home.

When you live in one of the first finished homes in a new subdivision, you must feel a bit like the pioneers of several hundred years ago—a bit lonesome for more people.

While parts of Rochester Meadows subdivision where the Clarence R. Gault family lives are completed and filled with many families, their own street has some unfinished houses. But they're happy they decided to move to this new home. Previously they had lived in Royal Oak and Troy.

Although their 67 foot lot is only 112 feet deep, it backs up to Parke Davis property and gives the Gaults a feeling of living in a rural area. Holtzman-Silverman has built all the homes in Rochester Meadows.

Young Douglas will start school next September. Kerry, the only girl, is nine, while Bob is fourteen.

There are a number of things Mrs. Gault likes about her new house. She likes the way the wall that slopes off the front vestibule provides an inside wall for the

piano. She likes having two other walls that will take large pieces of furniture.

SEENY LARGER

The room is light with two large windows on the front and a small one on the side wall. These are all draped in white semsheer material. Walls are white and the textured carpeting beige. These light colors make the room seem larger.

The slipcover on the sofa has a white background with aqua, black, red and gray designs. There is a club chair upholstered in ivory brown fabric and a lounge chair in beige brocade. Tables and the spindle are blonde wood. Behind the club chair is a pole lamp, painted aqua, with brass fixtures.

In the dining room the floor is flecked tile, browns on white. At the sliding glass doors there are floor length turquoise fiber-glass draperies.

Furniture in birch in contemporary design. Under the wide leafed table is an aqua rug. One wall is papered above the dado. The aqua is repeated, along with

pink and black on a white background. The glass topped china cabinet is placed on this wall.

Mrs. Gault's kitchen is long and narrow. All utilities but the wall oven are lined up on one side. This oven is cleverly placed in a dead space over the stairs. The wall on that side of the room is in brick paper.

Birch cupboards are set in white frames. Mrs. Gault says she has plenty of storage space. Counter tops and splash backs are white formica flecked with gold.

Gault is putting in a recreation room and a half bath in the large basement. He has already walled off a good-sized storage room. The laundry room will be separate from the play area.

It paints the bathroom is yellow and white. The wallpaper has an unusual design of gold and silver beads of gold on a white background. Pictures are white.

Window and shower curtains are sheer, with a pebble-like texture in the material. The vanity has a storage base of

birch and a ceramic counter top.

Kerry's bedroom has the palest of pink walls and a pink shag rug on the floor. The bobtail bedspread is white, as are the curtains and vanity skirt. The curtains have a very feminine print—a little old-fashioned girl holding a cut and flowers—all done in pink and gold. At one side is Kerry's large doll house.

The hall closet has several different features. First of all it has floor-to-ceiling sliding doors so that the top is as accessible as the lower part. One side has no shelves and is used for cleaning tools.

In the boys' room the walls are Philippine mahogany. Bright pennants are lined up on the closet doors. There are quaint old weather vane, mugs and roosters on the curtains.

The boys have brown spreads on their twin beds. For their clothes they have a double chest of drawers painted light green. Their desk is blonde.

The master bedroom has white walls. Curtains are off-white with blue and turquoise designs. There are blue and

turquoise throw pillows on the white spread. Scatter rugs are blue.

The exterior of this new little home is red brick with white trim. The Gaults moved in last July. We forgot to mention that Buttons, the dog, also lives here.

Keep Moisture Out

To avoid damage from moisture, tightly seal the spaces between windows and walls. Periodically check these areas and replace the putty when necessary. It will save the expense of extensive repair work.

Questions and Answers

Orchard Often Source of Early Furniture Wood

QUESTION: Every now and then our kitchen sink gets clogged up, then after a while the water goes down slowly and it's all right for a few weeks. Is any special skill needed to remove the clean-out plug at the bottom of the trap elbow? I am fairly certain that's where the clogging is taking place.

ANSWER: It's all right to remove the clean-out plug. But be sure you put a pad or other container beneath it before the plug is unscrewed, otherwise the water and debris in the pipe will run onto the floor. After the plug is off, poke around in the elbow to dislodge any grease or other matter that may be there.

Before putting back the plug, see whether the washer on it needs replacing. When the plug is tightly in place, turn on the hot water and allow it to run for 10 or 15 minutes.

Early European cabinetmakers often went out to the orchard for their wood when some one ordered a new piece of furniture. Thus many pieces that survived on the continent to become household treasures or museum pieces are "fruitwood."

Today "fruitwood" usually means cherry, and sometimes apple or pear. A "fruitwood finish" is a warm light brown color, often seen on French Provincial furniture.

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Housing Talks Open Jan. 25

Representative Albert Rains (D-Ala.) announces that public hearings will begin on Jan. 25 in Washington on his "Emergency Home Ownership Bill." Rains is chairman of the Subcommittee on Housing of the House Banking and Currency Committee.

The Rains bill seeks to prevent a further decline in home building by providing a \$1 billion fund to purchase FHA and GI loans on lower priced housing. Other provisions would lower financing costs to the home buyer to offset what Rains describes as "the seemingly endless upward spiral in interest rates."

A novel feature of the week-long hearings will be the panel of home builders from different parts of the country who will give the committee a firsthand account of how tight money conditions are hurting home building in their areas.

"It is my hope that the give and take discussion and the expert knowledge we will hear from these gentlemen from the grass roots will help the subcommittee to draw up realistic and effective legislation," Rains said.

"The subcommittee will also hear from Martin Bartling, the President of the National Assn. of Home Builders, who will present the legislative views of that great organization," Rains said.

Representatives of labor unions will also be featured at the hearing. "They will undoubtedly tell us how vital a high rate of housing construction is to employment in the building trades and the many industries which supply the materials, appliances, and furnishings which go into a new home," Rains said.

Chairman Rains said he expects the subcommittee to report his bill to the full Banking and Currency Committee at the conclusion of the hearing. The only Michigan legislator on the subcommittee is the Honorable Martha W. Griffiths.

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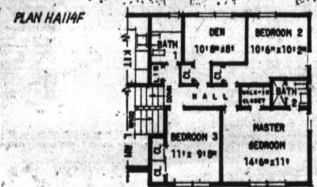
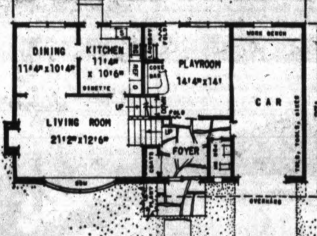
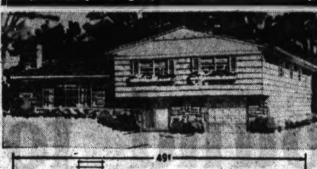

CHICAGO (UPI)—Homes will be equipped for greater efficiency in 1960, judging from the exhibits at the 16th annual convention and exposition of The National Association of Home Builders.

The 800 exhibits shown by more than 400 leading manufacturers featured products and building materials to make the kitchen, bathroom, living room and even the garage more efficient. These were some of them:

A "cuisine center" composed of stainless steel sink with power blender, food mixer, knife sharpener, cutting board and vegetable basket all built-in.

Automatic control panels with electric clocks for use of up to six appliances at a single location.

Cabinets surfaced inside and out with plastic laminates for easier cleaning.

Ventilating hoods for ranges to remove stale air, smoke and odors.

For the bathroom: Glazed tile, mounted on paper-thin sheets which permit the placing of 12 tiles at a time.

Modern wall vanities in decorative styles built-in electric outlets and plenty of space for the whole family's toiletries on three long shelves behind the sliding doors.

Central vents for removing stale air from kitchen and bathroom simultaneously.

For the living room: A combination built-in stereo and television set that allows music to be heard in any room in the house and can also be used for door answering or room-to-room conversation.

Finishing and decorator ideas by numerous manufacturers for transforming the double garage into extra family living space at costs far below equivalent extra-room construction.

Economy-priced newly compact gas-fired furnaces which can be adapted to central cooling.

Trussed rafters that eliminate the need for nails.

Quarter-tone electric heaters designed to warm patio, swimming pool, barbecue and other outside areas.

Electric snow melting units for residential use, imbedded in cement walks and driveways.

Formica-paneled folding door.

Gulls Doomed by Pitched Roof

ISLAND PARK, N. Y.—Long Island's dive-bombing sea gulls don't know it yet, but it looks like they've lost the battle of the flat roof in this oceanic community.

Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Martin are considering having a new pitched roof erected over their contemporary flat-roofed home to fend off the hordes of gulls that have been bombarding the house with fresh excrement day and night for nearly a year.

The new pitched roof would solve the problem because the falling clams will glance harmlessly off to the ground.

The Martins' troubles are the result of the fact that their house is the only one with a flat roof in the entire 500-house community. The flat, hard roof has been the cause of the clams' plagues because the impact cracked open the shell, exposing the succulent meat to the hungry gulls.

For months the clatter of clams and the clamor of the excited gulls kept the Martins awake at night and on edge during the day. Even their German Shepherd pup, Max, suffered. When he barked at the airborne invaders, they disdainfully shelled him with clams, driving him yelping for cover.

Besides getting rid of the gulls, the Martins would enjoy these other benefits of their new pitched roof:

1. More living space. Mrs. Martin would use the new space for a study for her husband.
2. More ventilation. An air space under a pitched roof permits air to circulate through louvers in the gable ends. This keeps the attic spring cooler and lets harmful moisture out.
3. New exterior beauty. A pitched roof can have asphalt shingles in one of many colors available.
4. Wide overhang. This shades the windows from hot summer sun and protects them from rain and dirt.

If you are installing panelling in your basement, it's wise to prime the backs and edges of the panels so that moisture can't get in and cause the wood to warp.

More Comfort From New Foam

You may not sink any deeper into the cushions of your new upholstered furniture, but you'll soon be sitting in new, long-lasting comfort. Thanks to America's research industry and the ingenuity of a progressive furniture manufacturer, flexible polyurethane foam will soon be replacing cotton batting, rubberized horsehair and many other upholstery fillers.

The relatively new flexible foam material offers many extra advantages both to the comfort-lover and to the economy-minded.

While similar to latex foam rubber in many respects, polyurethane is lighter in weight and lower in cost. Its support effect is resilient rather than resistant. Its uniform cellular structure allows free air circulation and equal support over its entire surface.

In addition, it can be directly molded into custom shapes and easily cut, tested, quilted or worked into either the popular new slat furniture styles or the traditional deeply upholstered pleated designs.

The use of flexible polyurethane in upholstered furniture was pioneered by Robert V. Mathison at the Crest, Incorporated plant in Asheville, N. C. The first polyurethane foam-filled pieces appeared slowly from this small factory in mid-1956. Initially, there were many problems inherent in perfecting the application of the radically new material to furniture. In fact, at that time many larger furniture manufacturers had tried and rejected polyurethane.

Mathison recognized the potential of the inexpensive, lightweight, durable foam and applied for a patent on his application of it.

No More Sticky Drawers

An end to sticking drawers, drawers, uneven, warped surfaces and swollen cabinet doors is within grasp, says Kroeber Manufacturing Co., Naperville, Ill., as a result of a completely new basic furniture construction material called "cushion wood."

It is composed of wood which has been structurally changed through chemical rearrangement of the molecules, the firm says. The result, says Kroeber, is furniture which will not swell on rainy or humid days and will not shrink under dry, over-heated conditions.

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After cleaning, let the brush dry thoroughly—either by laying it flat or suspending it from its handle. Then wrap the brush in heavy paper and store in a cool, dry place.

Home specialists at Allied Chemical's Barrett Division point out that the carport can later be converted into one or two rooms by the home handyman or a local contractor using fiberboard finishing materials.

Plumber's Art Goes Far Back

Unique responsibilities have long been a part of the burden carried by anyone involved in the installation of pipe and pipe controls. England's Elizabeth I, back in William Shakespeare's day, granted the first charter of record to the Worshipful Order of Plumbers, along with a dictum that any Worshipful Plumber who willfully ignored "ye codes" was liable to a hefty fine and a sound thrashing. Many centuries prior, Romans had put their best engineering brains to work on plumbing problems, says the Plumbing-Heating-Cooling Information Bureau.

Known as cleonolites, they constructed elaborately engineered baths and aqueducts. Interested in sanitation, they built the Cloaca Maxima, a huge stone liquid waste tunnel comparable in diameter to some used in smaller cities today.

The Babylonians, Egyptians, Celts and Greeks all understood the art of piping water to where they wanted to use it. Thus throughout history, pipefitting skills and economic progress are closely linked, the bureau points out.

Today the mechanical contractor and the plumbing contractor must have knowledge and experience in many fields. They use seasoned, highly skilled, rigidly schooled tradesmen—plumbing and pipefitting specialists and certified welders.

Pipefitters and plumbers both serve five-year apprenticeship periods. They spend approximately 1,000 hours in classrooms plus 8,000 hours in on-the-job training before they can attain a journeyman's rating. They have to pass written as well as manual examinations before they can qualify.

Custom Made Brush

To paint those hard-to-get-at places behind radiators, heavy appliances and, like, use a small square of 3/4-inch sponge-tacked to the end of a pole or yardstick. Use small nails to hold the sponge on the stick, and sink them well into the sponge.

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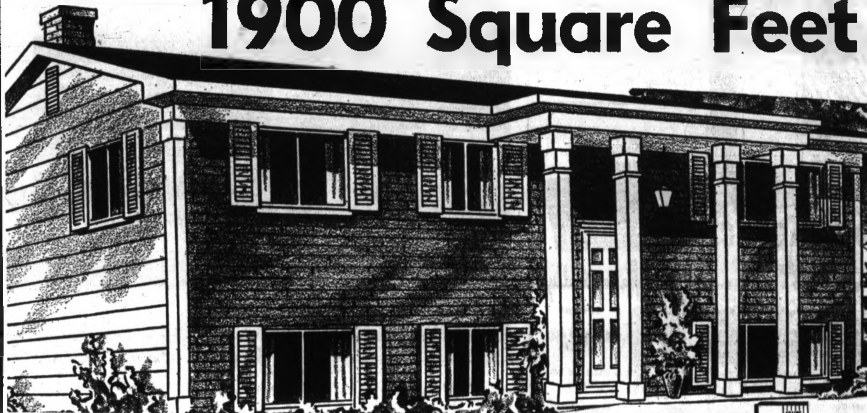


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See Tomorrow's Family Room

Through careful utilization of space, Mr. Nielsen has provided in 800 sq. ft. area sleeping equipment for five persons, a lavatory, a sink with a forty-gallon water storage capacity, food for a two-week emergency period, cooking facilities, storage area for clothing, games, first aid supplies, reading matter, a transistor television set, a central radio and other essentials. A bicycle serves the dual-purpose of acting as an exerciser and at the same time ventilating the room.

The life size model "fallout" structure is cut away to show construction details, such as concrete blocks, ceiling joists, etc. A subdued color scheme of greys, browns, beiges and sky blue makes a soothing background and creates an illusion of space in the overall design.

The "Family Room of Tomorrow" exhibit will tour the country after its initial appearance at the Merchandise Mart.

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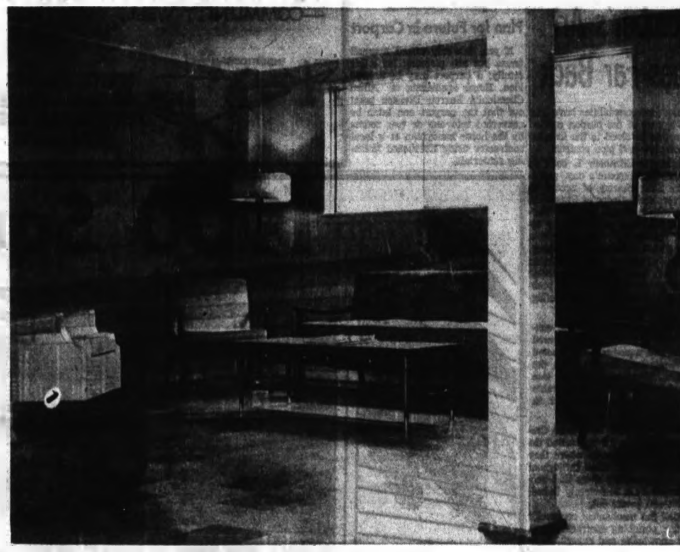

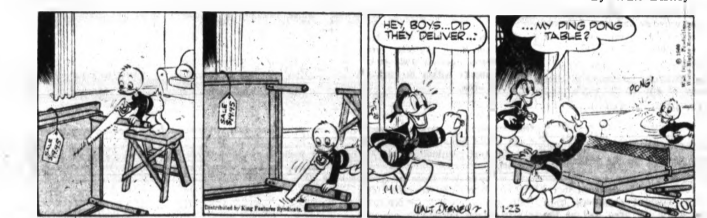
Compacts This Year One-Fourth of Output

Guide Protects Against Bail Ads

Losswell of Chamber Describes Latest FTC Consumer Aid

Tull Losswell, assistant manager of the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce, today called attention to a new guide issued by the Federal Trade Commission to protect consumers against so-called "bait" advertising.

In this practice, which Losswell labeled as "shady," one product is advertised for sale when the true intent of the seller is to persuade customers to buy another product, often at a higher price.

"The primary aim of 'bait' advertising is to obtain leads or to obtain leads at the most while an automatic mechanism switched over to another product supply," said Harlan B. Ritz, assistant division manager for the Oakland County Division of Detroit Edison Co.

The guide lists a four-point advertising code for the protection of consumers. Under the code, advertisers must not:

1. Offer a product for sale when the offer is not bona fide.
2. Misrepresent a product in an advertisement with the intention of later persuading customers to purchase another product by revealing the truth about the advertised "bait."
3. Discourage the purchase of the advertised product as part of a scheme to sell other merchandise.
4. In the event of a sale of the advertised product, attempt to "unsell" the product with the intention of selling other merchandise in its stead.

New Rockfall Strikes at Mine

Further Dims Hope for Rescue of 400 to 500 in Africa

COALBROOK, South Africa (UPI)—A new rockfall forced a halt to rescue operations for some 400 to 500 entombed coal miners.

The rockfall, third to hit the Clydebank colliery since Thursday, further sealed the tomb of the miners.

Officials of the colliery called a halt to the rescue operations, which many of them already considered futile.

The first fall trapped 200 men, but they were later freed. The second killed a two-mile long gallery with 1,000 tons of rock and coal.

NO CONTACT — Mine officials said that between 400 and 500 African and six white miners were sealed in the gallery.

No contact has been made with the men since the second fall cut them off Thursday afternoon 800 feet below surface.

Outside the pithead, hundreds of sobbing wives, children and relatives received the news of the latest rockfall with an almost simultaneous wail of grief.

Faint hopes that remained for rescue were almost extinguished with the new slide.

Mine officials said, however, that there may be an air pocket in the gallery.

They said the miners might save themselves from starving by eating the 70 horses trapped with them.

Carey Suggests \$5 Million for Strike Nest Egg

WASHINGTON (AP) — Labor leader James E. Carey suggested five million unpaid dollars raised for the steel strike as a nest egg for future strikes.

The Steelworkers Union has decided to return the money to the industry that contributed it, Carey proposed Friday, but the union turned it into a common pool and replenish it by contributions of a dollar a year per member.

Under the plan, the money would be used to aid any AFL-CIO union in a nationally significant strike.

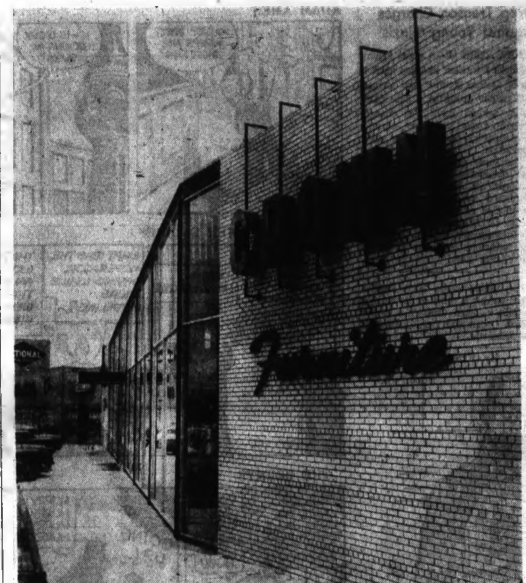
Carey, as president of the International Union of Electrical Workers, was authorized by his executive board to use \$300,000 of TUE money for the plan. About \$300,000 is being returned by the Steelworkers.

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Supervisors to Push County Home Rule

Of prime interest to Oakland County's designation which will attend the State Assn. of Supervisors' convention in Lansing next week will be a recommendation on county government reorganization. Expected to be made a part of

the association's 1960 legislative program is a recommendation that counties be given more "flexible" control in government operations as long as it doesn't conflict with state law.

County leaders in the past have said some state laws provide too tight a control on counties, which as a governmental body has no legal right to make laws.

A special study committee examining possible government reform in Oakland County has recommended in a five-point plan released Monday that county home rule be sought of the Legislature.

Flair chased the man, but he eluded him. Knack discovered the woman's body between the houses, she was already dead.

The headline "Michigan's Revolutionary College" caught his eye, and 22-year-old Neil Smith of Fall River, Mass., wanted to know more.

Smith, then a petty officer aboard the cruiser, was about to be discharged. He planned on a college education but hadn't picked a campus.

The story sparked his interest in that "revolutionary college" — Michigan State University Oakland — so much so that he decided to see for himself.

And, although it's a long way from the Mediterranean to MSUO, the bespectacled Smith turned up on the campus Thursday.

Now a civilian and working in a fishery's restaurant in Fall River, Smith here at his own expense. For two days he talked to teachers, students, deans and counselors and inspected the institution's facilities.

The tour completed, Smith flew home last night, leaving behind an application and \$10, a nonrefundable application fee.

"I'll see you in the fall," he promised MSUO officials before he departed.

Smith wrote the university last fall for more information. He finished his four-year hitch as a communications technician 11½ weeks ago.

Adams Hit on Scholle Case

De Gaulle Fires Algiers General; Citizens Angry

Jacques Massu Is Hero in Territory; May Get New Assignment

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle had a face-to-face meeting today with paratrooper Gen. Jacques Massu, the man he fired Friday night as commander of the Algiers area.

Massu's backers in Algiers reacted with a call for a general strike.

As De Gaulle and the hero of European settlers in Algeria talked, French combat troops and police armed with tommy guns patrolled the streets of Algiers on the alert for serious trouble.

Algiers merchants hurriedly shuttered their shop fronts. They said the strike order was issued by armed territorial guards, the militia of Algiers citizens.

Presumably De Gaulle and Massu discussed the beretted general's next assignment, which is expected to send him far from rebellious Algeria.

The hawk-necked Massu, sporting his combat beret, left De Gaulle's office after a 45-minute session. He declined to make a statement.

Massu was dismissed after newspaper interview — which he later denied — in which he was quoted as criticizing the leadership of De Gaulle and his Algerian policies.

Massu was recalled to Paris Tuesday by the French president and allowed to cool his heels.

In Algiers, Delegate-Gen. Paul Delcoursier took to the radio to urge calmness among the riotous.

"I know what this great soldier represented to you, and I pay him tribute," he said.

Delcoursier termed the dismissal regrettable, but added: "You understand that authority must not retreat."

He warned that violent reaction to the dismissal might bring chaos to Algeria.

Do Tranquilizers Cost Too Much?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate investigators promised today to try to determine whether any state mental hospitals are doing without needed tranquilizer drugs because they can't afford them.

The Senate antitrust subcommittee got a hint that the cost of the drugs might be too high for some state institutions in testimony yesterday from Dr. Henry Brill, deputy commissioner of the New York State Mental Hygiene Department.

Brill said the tranquilizers were not too expensive for New York. The subcommittee is investigating such a situation elsewhere.

Sen. Philip A. Hart (D-Mich.) said the subcommittee would investigate further to find out if tranquilizers were being priced out of the market for state hospitals.

Brill testified that tranquilizers cost New York \$750,000 a year. The subcommittee is investigating prices in the drug industry.

Hearings were scheduled to resume Tuesday with testimony from H. Roy of New York, president of Carter Products, Inc., which makes the tranquilizer known as miltown.

Dr. Helms E. Lehmann, a prominent psychiatrist, said the people could become addicted to the use of tranquilizer drugs. He called it "a dangerous abuse."

Lehmann, chief psychiatrist at Verdun Protestant Hospital in Montreal, said large doses of miltown, sold under the trade name of Pontiac, could be dangerous.

Apportionment Public Issue, Local Dems Told

Attorney in Audience Objects to Comment Before Court Action

Atty. Gen. Paul L. Adams was criticized last night for his public denouncement of the State Supreme Court for entering "into a political thicket" with the Scholle case testing Senate apportionment.

Adams, speaking to the Bloomfield Democratic Club, said if the people think the present apportionment is wrong they, and not the court, should change it.

For airing his views publicly before the court has heard arguments on the case, the Democratic state official was taken to task later by Theodore Sachs, Detroit attorney for August Scholle, state AFL-CIO president, who filed the suit.

It asks the court to declare a past amendment creating unconstitutional in that it deprived citizens of equal protection of the laws.

Sachs, who denied that Scholle sent him to the meeting to hear what Adams had to say, said he was "shocked" to hear the subject he had chosen.

"OUT OF PLACE"
He also said Adams "was out of place" and was violating ethical codes by discussing a court case outside the court.

"I think it was my duty to do so," Adams said. "Scholle has certainly expressed his views freely, especially in the labor press."

During a question and answer period following Adams' informal impromptu talk, Sachs rose, introduced himself, and commented, "Needless to say I disagree with what you've said."

He asked the official why he wouldn't support his move for an earlier hearing so that if the court declares the amendment void, the Legislature could repropose it itself in 1960. Adams answered that.

What to Do in Defense Emergency

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of articles for Pontiac area residents on defense emergencies to do in the event of an enemy attack or national disaster.)

Details about Pontiac's civil defense (airra)—how they operate and how they are to be interpreted by the public—were forthcoming recently by The Pontiac Press about the city's civil defense system.

Robert A. Stiller, assistant city manager and assistant Civil Defense director, included the details in answers to six questions raised recently by The Pontiac Press about the city's civil defense system.

Stiller gave these answers to The Press' six questions about the airra:

Q. Should the airra sound when sirens are on?

City Official Gives Answers

to Connelrad—640 or 1240 on the radio dial—to learn if there is an official civil defense alert or a lack. Telephone calls to the Police or Fire Department would only jam these wires. If the Connelrad station is not broadcasting, the sounding of the airra may have occurred only accidentally, perhaps.

Q. In the case of a real emergency, where would the public take cover?

A. People at home should take cover in the basements or home shelters. People who are in factories or office buildings or outdoors in downtown Pontiac should take cover in basements or in a reinforced first-floor area away from windows.

Q. Would an unannounced airra warning automatically mean an air raid?

A. No, not automatically. It could mean an alert or an attack, but it could also mean a defect

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Bonsal Letter to Cuba for Good?

HAVANA — U.S. Ambassador Philip Bonsal, who flew in from Washington only 13 days ago, returns today for "consultations" about this week's unprecedented outbreak of anti-Americanism in the semi-official Cuban press and radio.

Authoritative quarters here say it may be "a long time" before Bonsal returns. Some responsible informants believe his recall may be permanent.

President Eisenhower, Secretary of State Christian Herter, the late John Foster Dulles and Bonsal all have been in the target of anti-Americanism in the current anti-American campaign.

"Premier Fidel Castro himself has accused the United States of 'Sovietization' Cuba," in Washington, President Eisenhower conferred with Herter to deal with the developing crisis in U.S.-Cuban relations.

Herter was reported to have a number of issues to discuss with the President during his sudden announcement early morning call at the White House. It was understood the Cuban situation topped the list.

Herter and his aides apparently have been uncertain about what to do about what they consider insulting and erratic behavior by Castro, who has combined a campaign of seizure of U.S.-owned installations with a propaganda drive against the United States and its leaders.

At a congressional committee Thursday, Herter said that attacks made by Castro on the United States were "insulting."

Castro's "personal vendetta against the world" and against the United States has reached the point of no return, says Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.).

Cuba's pro-government newspaper La Caba charged yesterday that the United States is preparing "economic, diplomatic, even military aggression" against this country.

"The only thing lacking is for

the United States to send Marines to Cuba," a front-page Calle editorial said.

The newspaper's campaign which calls itself a "war of attrition" against Castro recast the accused Herter as an American in the line of "threatening" Cuba.

"It is something we must decide ourselves," he added. "We must have to say what sort of government we want to live under. The courts are the fundamental legal institutions."

He prefaced his remarks by saying since he believed members of the club along with other citizens would eventually decide the question at the polls, his "only purpose" in talking on the subject "is to tell you folks—You Democrats—what some of the issues are all I see from you is you can understand and debate this issue yourself."

Admitting that present appointments "are unfair and don't give area proper representation as they should," the state's top law enforcement officer said this was not the issue in the Scholle case.

"It's not whether districts are fair or unfair. Rather, it is the question will the people of the state in the future have right to elect a fair and representative government? We want to have a right to be decided for the people by the Supreme Court of Michigan."

The court, with a Democratic majority, rejected a motion by Adams recently to dismiss the Senate reapportionment suit without further proceedings.

Carey Suggests \$5 Million for Strike Nest Egg

WASHINGTON (AP) — Labor Secretary James R. Carey suggested today a five million unpaid dollars raised for the steel strike by the AFL-CIO as a nest egg for future strikes.

The Steelworkers' Union has decided to return the money to the unions that contributed it. Carey suggested Friday that the union turn it into a common pool and replenish it by contributions of a dollar a year per member.

Under the plan, the money would be used to pay AFL-CIO dues for the union in a nationally significant strike.

Carey, as president of the International Union of Electrical Workers, was authorized by his executive board to use \$300,000 of IUE money for the plan. About \$300,000 is being returned from the Steelworkers.

Cold Whips Nation—Florida Crops Threatened

MIAMI to mark the cold day Jan. 22 in Florida history. The Weather Bureau issued a dreaded two-word forecast:

"Little change."

The weatherman predicted frost along the coast and inland, with a low of 33 expected inland.

Citrus growers said still winds prevented any damage to Florida's fruit, but vegetable farmers said there "definitely" was some damage to the state's multimillion dollar winter vegetable harvest.

"Reports indicate some crops in the Everglades area were hurt rather severely," Warren Johnson, chief of the Federal-State Weather Service at Lakeland, said.

Most of the Florida tourists who came south to escape the cold stayed indoors while frost frosted the beaches and green lawns and turned the warm waters of pools, hotels and sleek convertibles with ice.

Georgia expected its lowest temperatures of the year — a chilly 15 degrees above zero.

Readings as low as -13 degrees below zero were forecast throughout the Dakotas and almost the entire northwestern United States. Low reported temperatures below freezing.

The Weather Bureau said temperatures would warm slightly today over the Northern and Central Plains, but the eastern half of the country would remain no more dry of the bone-tasting cold which followed a mauling cross-country storm earlier this week.

Guide Protects Against Bait Ads

Lossell of Chamber Describes Latest FTC Consumer Aid

Tull Lossell, assistant manager of the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce, today called attention to a new guide issued by the Federal Trade Commission to protect consumers against so-called "bait" advertising.

In this practice, which Lossell labeled as "shabby," an advertiser is alluringly advertised for sale when the true intent of the seller is to persuade customers to buy another product, often at a higher price.

"The primary aim of 'bait' advertising is to obtain leads as to persons interested in buying merchandise of the type advertised," the guide states.

The guide lists four points of advertising code for protection of consumers. Under the code, advertisers must not:

1. Offer a product for sale when the offer is not bona fide.
2. Misrepresent a product in an advertisement with the intention of luring customers to purchase another product by revealing the truth about the advertised "bait."
3. Discourage the purchase of the advertised product as part of a scheme to sell other merchandise.
4. In the event of a sale of the advertised product, attempt to "unsell" the product with the intention of selling other merchandise in its stead.

Prosecutor Says She Changed Her Story on Giving It to Finch

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The prosecution in the Finch murder trial will try to show next week that Carole Tregoff gave authorities conflicting accounts of what she did the night Barbara Jean Finch was shot to death.

To do this, the state will attempt to get the transcript of Dr. Bernard Finch's preliminary hearing admitted in evidence. Carole, the doctor's mistress, was a witness at the hearing.

Finch, 42, and Miss Tregoff, 23, are accused of murder in the slaying of the doctor's 36-year-old wife last July 18 outside the luxurious Finch home in suburban West Covina.

Their trial is in recess for the weekend.

One of the points the state wants to bring out involves a bag which a prosecutor has called a "do-it-yourself murder kit." The prosecution says Finch had the bag with him when he and Carole drove to the Finch home the night of the killing. It contained, among other things, some rope, a knife and bullets.

POLICE CAPTAIN TESTIFIES

One of Friday's witnesses, police Capt. William Ryan of West Covina, said he had talked with Miss Tregoff the day after Mrs. Finch was killed.

"I asked her if she had carried anything up the hill (to the Finch home) in the way of a bag or anything," Ryan said, "and she said 'No.'"

At the doctor's preliminary hearing, Carole testified she had brought up the bag when the doctor asked her to get a flashlight.

Supervisors to Push County Home Rule

Of prime interest to Oakland County's delegation was the fact that the State Assn. of Supervisors convention in Lansing next week will be a recommendation on county government reorganization.

Voter's Approval

Split Over Con-Con Proposal

PLANSING (U.P.)—Republican politicians today sought ways of repairing a down-the-middle split in the constitutional convention issue.

It was the No. 1 concern as the Republican State Central Committee gathered for its first meeting of the election year.

GOP legislators fought unsuccessfully last night to settle the issue, arguing that to threaten the matter now would only deepen GOP divisions and play into the hands of Gov. Williams and Democrats.

Turning aside their pleas, the state committee's rules and resolutions subcommittee—after 30 minutes of hot debate—voted 8 to 2 in favor of a proposal to jointly back by organized women voters and young businessmen.

"You are going to find some unhappy bedfellows in this thing before you're done. I question the wisdom of tying the hands of a Republican office holder," cautioned Sen. John Fitzgerald (R-Grand Ledge).

"If the governor (Williams) says it's good, then we've got to say it's bad? That's not leadership," snorted Rosemarie Herbert, representing Detroit's 16th Congressional District.

In question was proposed endorsement of a plan for a special 1961 convention to revise the state's 1960 Constitution.

It would give Democrats nearly an even break in delegate apportionment whereas under a concurrent proposal before voters in 1962 Republicans were assured of heavy control of any revisionist convention.

An old saw has it: "You've got to spend money to make money." The nine students in the stocks and investments course at Pontiac Central High School's adult division headed that advice Thursday night.

Then they voluntarily agreed to pay the difference, \$2 a head, so the class could go on. In view of the students' sacrifice, the instructor, Harry N. Barnes of 1024 Norwich St., Troy, announced he would donate the text books.

The 1958 plan was a prime Republican issue in the campaign of Paul D. Bagwell, odd-on choice for a repeat governor nomination. A letter from Sen. Frank D. Beadle of St. Clair, GOP Senate majority leader, failed to stem the tide in the subcommittee.

Beadle wrote state Chairman Lawrence B. Lindemer that in his travels he had encountered a "strong" Republican sentiment against con-con, and said it was well known the issue would divide the party.

Beadle said he felt very keenly that to take a firm stand on the issue would alienate a lot of people at the outset of a statewide campaign that looked promising for Republicans.

Car Output Running Way Ahead of 1959

DETROIT (U.P.)—Automobile production in the United States in 1959 is running almost 90,000 cars ahead of 1958 and most of the increase can be attributed to the compact cars and the new Dodge Dart.

The Ford Falcon, Chevrolet Corvair and Chrysler Valiant have accounted for more than 70,000 assemblies in the first three weeks of the year.

Dodge, which does not break down Dart and standard Dodge totals, is up some 15,000 units over last year's pace.

Of the compact only Studebaker-Packard's Lark is running behind last year's figure and even then not by much. Rambler is up about one-sixth.

Swainson Hires Right Hand Man for Campaign

PLANSING (U.P.)—Lt. Gov. John B. Swainson, a Democrat who says he will be running "but I'm not sure for what" in the November election, has hired a new right hand man.

Boyd Benedict, Durand city manager for four years, will begin Monday as Swainson's administrative assistant.

Benedict and his wife have two boys and a girl, the same number as Swainson, and he is 34, the same age as the youthful lieutenant governor.

Swainson, who pays for his administrative aide from his own pocket, had a man in the position until last April but let him go when the expense became too great.

Benedict will handle news releases and various materials for

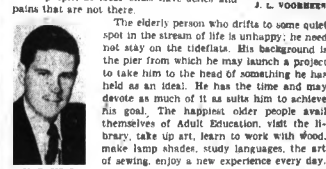
Swainson, prepare schedules and answer mail as well as many other jobs connected with Swainson's campaign.
