OU offering supervision workshops to meet new rule

Oakland University's **School of Education and Human Services** (SEHS) is sponsoring "One-Day Workshops in Counseling Supervision," a training for licensed professional counselors (LPCs) who supervise interns and limited license professional counselors (LLPCs).

The training was developed to meet Michigan **Administrative Rule 338.1752(1)(n)**, which goes into effect January 1, 2005. Workshops are offered on two days, Friday, Nov. 5, and Friday, Dec. 3, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Oakland University.

Elyce Cron, associate professor in OU's Department of Counseling and clinical director of the School of Education and Human Services Counseling Center, will lead the workshops. Cron has more than 20 years of supervisory experience and is former president of the Michigan Association for Counselor Education and Supervision, Michigan Association for Marriage and Family Counseling, and Michigan Mental Health Counselors Association.

Key topics include ethical, legal and liability issues; trans-generational characteristics of supervision; multicultural, ethnic and gender sensitivity; and best and worst supervisory behaviors.

The cost of the workshop is \$99 if registration is received by Friday, Oct. 29, and \$119 after Oct. 29.
