PAID DEPOSITS UP FOR 1974; <u>APPLICATIONS DOWN SLIGHTLY</u> period are 197 compared with 168 last year. Oakland University's total applications for admission for fall, 1974, are 1,374 compared total applications for admission for fall, 1974, are 1,374 compared with 1,395 at this same date a year ago, Jerry Rose, director of admissions and scholarships, has reported. The university's paid deposits for the

Rose said applications of first time in college (FTIAC) freshmen stand at 1,215 compared with 1,316 at the same time in 1973. Paid deposits are 185 this year compared with 168 in 1973.

The FTIAC applications represent about half of the number OU expects to receive for the 1974 fall term, Rose said. Of the student applications handled thus far, 417 include dorm residence compared with 553 at this time last year.

Transfer applications are now 159 compared with 79 in 1973. The numbers are so small at this time that wide statistical shifts can occur in a matter of weeks, Rose said. Twelve transfer students have paid deposits compared with no paid deposits a year ago. Transfer students traditionally do not pay deposits in the same pattern that FTIAC students do. In most cases transfer students do not pay advance deposits at all, Rose said.

PSYCHOLOGY FACULTY AT PROFESSIONAL MEETINGS

Two OU Department of Psychology members, Jean S. Braun and Ralph Schillace, made featured presentations at recent professional meetings. A third faculty member, Virginia E. O'Leary, served in Washington on a grant review committee for the Office of Experimental Projects and Programs, National Science Foundation.

Braun, presented a paper on "The relationship between symptomatology and diagnosis in child psychiatric patients" at a conference on "Psychiatric Problems of Childhood" held Jan. 31-Feb. 2, in New York. The conference was under the auspices of the Eastern Psychiatric Research Association. An enlarged version of Braun's paper will appear in a monograph following the conference.

Schillace, recently presented his research and evaluation findings on "matching" adult volunteers to youngsters involved with the Oakland County Juvenile Court to a conference in Boulder, Colorado. The conference was sponsored by Information Center on Volunteerism.

Schillace also presented a workshop on problem-solving strategies applied to instruction for medical students at the Wayne State Medical School in Detroit. The objective of the program was to help medical school faculty apply instructional designs to facilitate the problem-solving abilities of prospective physicians.
