The past academic year: A flurry of activity

After my second year at Oakland University, one particular perception remains with me; it is the same perception I had when I first came to Oakland to chair the department of Music, Theatre and Dance: our performing arts faculty is tireless and extremely effective when it comes to teaching, creative work and artistic spirit.

Recognizing this energy, the Department decided to provide the faculty with more opportunity to perform. We inaugurated a new series last year called Sensory Perceptions which brought the faculty to the stage, often in collaboration with other artists. The eight-part series included three concerts by the new Trio Aventura featuring faculty member Flavio Varani, piano, and two musicians from the University of Maryland-John Fadial, violin, and Beth Vanderbourgh, cello. Also part of the series were two appearances by the Eisenhower Dance Ensemble of which faculty member Laurie Eisenhower serves as artistic director. The group shared its second program with the Pick of the Crop Dance and Music Ensemble from Buffalo, New York. The music of the composition faculty was heard on Impressions and Diversions, performed by a large number of faculty, students, and area professionals. Finally, faculty members Karen Sheridan and Michael Gillespie were directed by Susan Barrett in a raucous and hilarious theatrical production of Christopher Durang's Laughing Wild.

The music area of the department features nine student ensembles plus numerous student chamber groups. The diversity of student performance opportunities includes orchestra, band, and chorus as well as a show choir, jazz ensemble, and an African drumming group. The Department presents, in addition to the dozens of evening music concerts throughout the year, a weekly Tuesday *Arts at Noon*, which provides an opportunity for students to perform on stage in a slightly less formal setting. The music faculty have been maintaining a fever pitch of activity. Basso John Paul White and pianist Flavio Varani are ever expanding their performing careers. Professor White was soloist in Verdi's *Requiem* with the Flagstaff (Arizona) Symphony in April and appeared as Sarastro in Mozart's *Magic Flute* at the Pine Mountain Music Festival in June. Professor Varani, a frequent performer in the United States, South America and Europe, is again holding his International Institute for Chamber Music in Germany this summer and looks forward to his first tour of Japan in November 1994.

David Daniels was on sabbatical winter semester, 1993 to update his publication, *Orchestral Music: a Handbook.* First published in 1972, it has since become a standard resource for orchestral managers and artistic directors throughout the country and beyond. Professor Daniels' current revisions will result in the publication's third edition.

Last year, Lettie Beckon Alston wrote an orchestral work for the Pontiac-Oakland Symphony, which was premiered under the direction of colleague David Daniels. This same piece, *The Eleventh Hour*, was a finalist in the 1993 UNISYS African-American Composers Forum and Symposium. The work was performed on May 2, 1993 on a master series concert of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra directed by associate conductor Leslie Dunner. Her work, *Moods for Piano*, also received its world premiere at the Symposium.

Stanley Hollingsworth, whose musical compositions have also been heard on Detroit Symphony programs, has recently received research fellowship funding to compose a new work for clarinet and orchestra. In honor of Professor Hollingsworth's retirement during the upcoming academic year, the Pontiac-Oakland Symphony is dedicating its program on December 5, 1993 as a tribute to his music and to his 17-year contribution to the cultural life of the department and Oakland University.

I, too, am a composer. A new compact disc of my music has just been released on the ACA Digital label. Performed by the outstanding Atlanta-based chamber ensemble, *Thamyris*, the recording includes four compositions for various combinations of piano, percussion, flute, clarinet, cello, and soprano voice. The project was two years in the making, and features guest artist Christopher Rex, first-chair cellist with the Atlanta Symphony.

Perhaps the most excitement in the department in the past year was occurring in the areas of theatre and dance. A new major was implemented in fall 1992. This program, the Bachelor of Arts in Performing Arts, permits students to specialize in theatre, dance, or music theatre. A liberal arts-oriented degree, it provides students with a foundation in all three disciplines in the department, allowing the students' skills to be broadly developed and encouraging a flexible artistic sense.

In theatre, our Fall Semester theatre production of Caryl Churchill's *Cloud Nine*, directed by Karen Sheridan, was a risk well taken. With scenic and costume design by faculty member Susan Barrett and lighting design by advanced student Eric Rotta, the ten-actor play was entered in the American College Theater Festival. Out of over 800 colleges and universities, Oakland's production of *Cloud Nine* was one of only six selected for performance in the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. (Please see Karen Sheridan's article.)

During the year Professor Sheridan also directed Jim Leonard's *The Diviners*. Professor Michael Gillespie directed *Medea* and a new musical revue, *Broadway Baby!* Three advanced theatre students each directed a one-act play to create an evening called *That's Absurd*.

In dance, we were host to the 1993 American College Dance Festival's midwest regional conference. Twenty-eight schools participated, and performances by our faculty and staff were boldly featured during the week's events. We are especially pleased that Professor Greg Patterson's work was judged one of the best of the festival. (Please see Carol Halsted's article.)

Next year's season again brings many delights to the stage. The season is printed on the following pages. Please come participate in the fun.



OU at the Kennedy Center

It was spring break and everyone who could scrape together the means was as far away from the Oakland University campus as their funds would take them. I was in a living room in Ithaca, New York calling for my messages when I heard the words that pleasantly cut my break short in an instant: "Karen, this is David Young from the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D. C. I am delighted to invite Oakland's production of Cloud Nine to perform here as part of the 1993 American College Theater Festival. There were over 830 productions from around the country associated with this year's festival and the National Selection Committee chose six to perform in Washington. I hope you can be there. Congratulations!"

It was the beginning of the final adventure surrounding Oakland's participation in the American College Theater Festival's silver anniversary year. Hundreds of productions are entered for consideration to be included in the Kennedy Center's yearly celebration of college theatre. Although many schools enter multiple productions each year, Oakland has entered only one every other year, and in May of 1992, months before the actual auditions, we selected Caryl Churchill's *Cloud Nine*.

It was a provocative choice.

Primarily, *Cloud Nine* is a play about love—sounds wholesome enough. But the playwright teaches us swiftly that you can never judge a book by its cover. The Act One characters are easily perceived as frivolous people from a time and circumstances that no longer speak to us. They appear to be Victorians released from a time capsule buried long ago in colonial Africa. But they, along with their Act Two 1980 London counterparts, soon reveal that still waters run deep. The hot Victorian impulses stifled beneath layers of crisp cotton and immaculate linen resemble the early 1980's yearnings bound by restrictive circumstance. Both sets of characters through the course of the play begin to find the courage to go after what they want and the willingness to learn from their mistakes.

The paths this courage takes may not have been to the taste of some of our patrons. But I salute the play's characters mere shadows—who venture the journey. They make choices for themselves and do the best they can in any given moment. They examine and re-examine their lives. I salute, too, the courage of the student actors who allowed themselves inside the lives of people so like and so unlike themselves. Their talent breathed a unique life into *Cloud Nine*. Their laurels in Washington were well-deserved.

We opened at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts on Friday, April 23, 1993 to a sell-out crowd of Oakland alumni, festival officials, and D. C. theatre-goers. The faculty, cast and crew of the touching production of *Voice of the Prairie* from Emporia State University in Kansas were also there to cheer us on. We got acquainted with the Emporia contingent during our stay and they booked a later return for themselves just to be able to see *Cloud Nine*.

After the curtain call that night, the Kennedy Center presented everyone involved with *Cloud Nine* who was in attendance a memento to mark the event. The stage was crowded with Oakland University students, faculty and administration (including Michael Gillespie, theatre area coordinator, and Karl Boelter, chair of the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance). Dean John K. Urice from the College of Arts and Sciences was present to accept the Kennedy Center Medallion for the university. We have much to be proud of and thankful for.

The honor of selection for a Kennedy Center production makes a school eligible for participation in the festival on only the "associate" level the following year. This allows our students the opportunity to compete for the Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship, but we will not be eligible to enter even the regional festival until we've taken a year off.

So, as we face the approaching theatre season, we look forward to a year to concentrate on ourselves again. We are as excited about our upcoming productions as we were a year ago. The theatre faculty will be launching the Sensory Perceptions series this year with Albee's dynamic Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? In November, Inspecting Carol, a rollicking spoof of a company's preparation for their yearly production of A Christmas Carol opens in the Studio Theatre. After the holidays we dust off our doublets and brandish our swords in The Three Muske*teers.* And our musical takes us to Sweden and the complicated romantic follies of *A Little Night Music* in March.

ACDFA Great Lakes Regional held at OU

The American College Dance Festival Association Great Lakes Regional Festival was held March 3-7, 1993 at Oakland University, hosted by the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance. ACDFA is a national organization devoted to encouraging and recognizing excellence in performance and choreography on the college level. Eight regional festivals are held annually where universities come together to share technique and choreography.

Over two hundred students from twentyeight schools in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Virginia, Ohio and Michigan ventured to Oakland to have their choreography adjudicated and take a variety of workshops in jazz, modern, ballet, Pilates, lighting, conditioning and more. The excitement in the hallways during these classes demonstrated the energy level of both teachers and guest artists. Meanwhile, the guest adjudicators-Dan Wagoner, artistic director of Dan Wagoner Dancers and former member of Paul Taylor Dance Company; Laura Glen, artistic director of Laura Glen Dancers and teacher at the Juilliard School in New York City; and Geraldyne Blunden, artistic director of the Dayton Contemporary Dance Companycritiqued over forty-five dances from the twenty-eight schools and selected ten dances which were performed at a Gala Concert on Saturday, March 6. Oakland University was represented at this Gala Concert with a work by faculty member Greg Patterson, titled Without a Choice.

The Great Lakes Regional Festival opened at OU Wednesday evening with an electric performance by faculty from some of the universities attending, and on Thursday evening the Eisenhower Dance Ensemble performed works by Bill Evans, Mark Dendy and Laurie Eisenhower to a very appreciative audience. On Friday evening, 150 of the participants traveled to Detroit's Music Hall to see the world-renowned Pilobolus.

The week was fun, exciting, and full of new ideas and experiences. All who attended—even the weary faculty who hosted the event—felt that something very special had taken place.

A LEADING UNIVERSITY IN SCIENTIFIC DISCOVERY

Scientists said it couldn't be done, but an Oakland University chemistry professor proved them wrong.

Professor Tadeusz Malinski developed a microsensor so small and accurate that it can count molecules of nitric oxide within a single cell. This is a breakthrough discovery that will help doctors understand the effect the gas nitric oxide has on the body. Scientists from Europe and North America are excited about the possibilities, and more than 250 have already called or come to Malinski's laboratory to see his discovery in action.

And how will the microsensor help scientific inquiry? Researchers are anxious to find out how nitric oxide acts when a person has a stroke, for example, and to learn if it can be used to kill cancer cells.

Thanks to Professor Malinski, the day when those answers are known is closer.



We're Number 1: Four Times in a Row

Oakland University has something that no other school in NCAA Division II history has : four consecutive national championships for its women's swimming and diving team.



STUDENT THEATRE EARNS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Students in the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance's production of *Cloud Nine* know what it's like to take their show on the road.

The play was among 800 entered nationally in the prestigious American College Theater Festival, and came in first in its region in competition in Illinois. Oakland's production earned the right to head to Washington, D.C., where in April the performers took the stage at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Only six plays were invited to Washington.

This was the second time an Oakland production has been invited to the nation's capital.

STORM INSPIRES AWARD-WINNING COMPOSITION

Oakland composer Lettie Beckon Alston's (seated at piano) composition, *The Eleventh Hour (The Act of God)*, was one of four finalists in the fourth-annual Unisys African-American Composers Forum and Symposium in Detroit.

The assistant professor of music was the first female composer selected as a finalist, and only the second composer from Michigan to be so honored in the national competition. The pianist drew her inspiration for the piece from the fury of Hurricane Andrew.

The Unisys African-American Composers Forum and Symposium assists in identifying significant orchestral works by African-American composers. The forum was presented by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra Hall and underwritten by Unisys Corp., with additional support from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Michigan Council for the Arts and Cultural Affairs, and the city of Detroit.


