## Adult Counseling Center Opens

The Adult Career Counseling Center (ACCC) operated by the School of Human and Educational Services has begun operation in room 147 of O'Dowd Hall.

The facility was established to provide a free computer-based career guidance system for area adults (any persons over 18) who are students, unemployed or seeking a career change.

A line item in the current OU budget contained state funds to be used for the purpose of promoting economic development and retraining unemployed persons in the area. A portion of those funds went for the purchase of six computer-based systems. One is housed in the Office of Career Advising and Placement, one in the Office of Evening and Extension Programs and four units (Discover II systems) are in the ACCC.

### OU Hosts NCAA

OU will host the Great Lakes Region NCAA Division II women's basketball tourney March 11-12.

The Lady Pioneers, with a record of 23-3, will play in the championship game at 7:30 p.m. on March 12. The Pioneers, fifth ranked nationally, were seeded out of the March 11 qualifying game (Dayton vs Butler) which will also be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Hollie L. Lepley Sports Center. Tickets for the March 11-12 contests are on sale in the CIPO ticket office and at the sports center at \$3 general admission and \$2 for students.

### Board Meets

The OU Board of Trustees will meet March 16 at 7:30 p.m. in Lounge II of the Oakland Center.

The ACCC offers the Discover II on microcomputers to help adults learn about their interests, skills and related values, possible occupations, and educational and training opportunities.

In addition to the computer-based information, users can receive personal assistance from a graduate student in guidance and counseling. These services are all free.

In addition, there can be a referral to the Continuum Center, the OU Psychology Clinic or an off-campus source, if desired.

Howard Splete, professor of education and ACCC coordinator, says the center is not an employment service but that it can be of great aid to persons who need help in sorting out their values and career options.

## Faculty Lecture, Publish

Egbert W. Henry, biological sciences, has been awarded \$4,500 by the National Institutes of Health, Department of Health and Human Services, to supervise the Minority High School Student Research Apprentice Program during the summer, 1983. The students (three) will be selected from the sciences classes of area high schools and will spend eight weeks during the summer in the laboratories of several NIH grant recipients in biological sciences (Virinder K. Moudgil, Asish C. Nag, John R. Reddan, Arun K. Roy and Nalin J. Unakar).

### History Scholarship

The Department of History is offering a one-half tuition history scholarship for fall of 1983 and winter of 1984 with applications due March 15 in the department office, room 380 O'Dowd Hall.

An applicant must submit a written application indicating an intention to major in history (or already be a major), certifying completion of 60-92 credits including the current semester, and agreeing to enroll for a minimum of 16 credits in history courses during the two semesters of the scholarship. The application may include a personal statement and must include an official copy (transfer and OU) of college transcripts. Two letters of recommendation from faculty members in any disciplines should be submitted directly to the Department of History.

In awarding the scholarship, evidence of high academic achievement and commitment to the study of history will be taken into account and evidence of financial need may be taken into account.

- Routine physicals, physician's visits for diagnosis/treatment of acute illness at the faculty-staff rate in the Graham Health Center.
- Access to the Katke-Cousins Golf Course with greens fees charged at the rate in force for faculty and staff.
- Kresge Library three-week borrowing privileges for materials in the circulating collections and building use of non-circulating materials.

• Access to the Hollie L. Lepley Sports Center in accordance with the schedule for faculty and staff, faculty/staff ticket prices for athletic events, with a family privilege card issued upon request.

• A 30 percent discount for classical series tickets, 20 percent discount for the classical half-series or 20 percent off for pairs of individual tickets to classical concerts at the Meadow Brook Music Festival.

• Faculty/staff rates for public tours of Meadow Brook Hall, the Christmas Walk and Concours d'Elegance, and free touring of the hall if the retiree brings paying guests. After 20 years of service to the university, the retiree will receive a lifetime Ambassador Card for free touring.

• Meadow Brook Theatre discounts of 10 percent for performances on Tuesdays, Wednesdays or Thursdays.

# Remodeling Project Near

# Enrollment 11,001

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved an engineering and design contract and authorized the university to seek a low bidder for a \$348,000 remodeling project in Hannah Hall of Science.

Funds for the remodeling were provided by the State of Michigan and will enable the university to construct needed additional chemistry laboratories in the science hall.

The architectural firm of Hoyem-Basso Associates, Inc. of Bloomfield Hills was awarded a \$23,740 contract for full engineering and design services, and Robert J. McGarry, vice president of finance and administration, was authorized to obtain bids and award a contract for construction. Both actions came at the February 16 meeting of the OU Board of Trustees.

The project will convert unequipped space into properly furnished science laboratories (approximately 50 new student stations) and support facilities.

University officials said the many new applied chemistry programs that have been developed in the health related fields include environmental health, industrial health, medical technology, medical physics and physical therapy. The chemistry laboratories in Hannah Hall of Science were adequate for a student population of about 4,000 while the university now has a student enrollment of more than 11,000 and many more science programs than were available in the curriculum earlier.

The remodeling is expected to begin in April with a target completion date of next winter.

Oakland University winter semester enrollment is 11,001 headcount, down 1.4 percent from winter a year earlier.

David C. Beardslee, director of institutional research, reports that there are 9,196 undergraduates and 1,805 graduate students enrolled. Their total credits equal 3,790 fiscal year equated students, down 1.1 percent from last winter.

The statistics show an all-time record senior class of 2,375 students with 2,371 juniors, 2,076 sophomores and 1,786 freshmen. There are 588 students who are in "other" categories like post bachelor, or second undergraduate degree.
