Season Outlook

Even with the loss of 12 players from his 1976 squad, soccer coach John Motzer is still confident of earning another winning season and hopefully another berth in the NCAA II post-season tournament.

Coach Motzer will have seniors Gerhard Weber (capt.) and Robert Bukari back from last year's team, along with Mark Christensen, Tony Matye, Joe Wilden, Ken Kasper, and Roman Bej.

"Our whole success will depend on how fast our goaltenders come alive," Motzer said.

Among the most promising freshman are Simon Little, the most valuable player at Seaholm, Robert Read, Karim Hammoul, and Andy Lock.

Motzer will also be relying heavily on Tony Hermiz and Bohdan Hrecznyj to repeat last season's 10-5-1 mark.

Hermiz has been pegged as the replacement for graduate Ken Whiteside, the career goal-scoring record holder at OU. Hermiz led all scorers in the North Suburban League in

1976, was named the league's most valuable player, and selected for the Michigan High School All-Star squad.

Hrecznyj earned all-state honors in basketball in high school and was all-conference in football.

Today's Contest

Lewis University brings a 2-3-1 record (not including the last game against Rockford of Illinois) into today's match with the Pioneers. Lewis shut out the Pioneers, 2-0, at Lockport, Illinois in 1976 in the only match up between the two teams.

The Pioneer booters were 5-0 with their last win over University of Toledo. Jumping off to a great start, the Pioneers landed the eighth spot in the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America Mideast Ratings this week.

Oakland scoring has been dominated by two freshmen so far this year. Tony Hermiz and Andy Lock have each scored at least one goal in the first four games. Lock leads the scoring with five goals and six assists and Hermiz has netted six goals and has set up teammate's goals on four occasions.

The Pioneers will host Michigan State on Wednesday, October 12, and then travel to Buffalo State on October 15 for their next two matches.

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Rules of the game

Professional soccer has, until recently, received little attention nationwide, falling under the shadow of other major sports such as football and baseball.

But on the college level, the game has become increasingly popular and has been played on Oakland's campus since 1964. According to the Sports Illustrated guide to soccer, the game originated in England around 1863, when the London Football Association drew up the rules and regulations.

The game is played on a rectangular field between 110 and 120 yards long and 65 to 75 yards wide. Eleven players, dressed in shirts, shorts, stockings, shin pads, and shoes, try to pass a 27" leather ball over the opponent's goal line by using their feet, legs, head, or any other part of their body except their hands or arms.

Play starts when a player takes a place-kick at the center of the field into the opponent's half. Each team must be in their half of the field at that time. The game is restarted after a goal is scored and the teams change sides.

Two persons, each with equal authority, act as referees, and two linesmen act as ball retrievers to avoid delay of the game. The game lasts for one hour and a half, divided into two 45-minute periods. In case of a tie, two extra periods of five minutes each are allowed.

The ball is out of play when it has completely crossed the goal line or touch line, whether on the ground or in the air.

Some terms used frequently in the game are:

OFF-SIDE-A player is off-side if he is nearer to his opponent's goal line than the ball. Unless he is in his own half or there are two opponents nearer to their goal than he is.

FREE-KICK-Can be either direct or indirect, depending on the foul. A direct free-kick is allowed against the offending team for handling the ball, holding, pushing, striking, kicking, or attempting to strike or kick, tripping, charging, or handling by the goalkeeper outside the penalty area.

An indirect free-kick is allowed for minor fouls such as the goalkeeper carrying the ball more than four steps, delay in getting rid of the ball, ungentlemanly conduct, dangerous play, obstruction other than holding, and charging which is not violent or dangerous.

THE THROW-IN-When the ball is put back into play with a throw-in at the line.

GOAL-KICK-When the ball is kicked into play beyond the penalty area after it is passed completely over the goal line by the attacking team.

CORNER-KICK-When the ball is kicked into play from the nearest corner flag-post after it has been played by the defending team over the goal line.

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
