URBAN AND TEACHER CORPS STAFFERS TO RECEIVE TRAINING HERE

More than 150 members of urban and teacher corps teams from scattered parts of the country will participate in a three-week institute here June 23-July 11 to receive adult leadership training. It is one of four such institutes under the federally-funded Project REAL, which stands for Resources for Education in Adult Leadership. Rod Righter (education) will be the director, and he will be assisted by nine members of the education department staff. Participants will include urban corps members from Minneapolis, Washington, D. C., New York City, Chicago, Toledo, Pontiac and Detroit, and teacher corps staffers from Hampton Institute in Hampton, Va., Ohio University, the University of Louisville, the University of Kentucky, and the University of Minnesota. Their study will emphasize selected local communities and the problem of rural migrants.

KENNEDY IN IRELAND

Henry Kennedy (political science) flew to Dublin, Ireland, Thursday to spend two weeks watching the windup of the national elections. His trip was made possible by a grant from Earhart Foundation, which had given him earlier support on his doctorate studies in political science in the field of British government and politics. His dissertation was completed in his ancestral home of Belfast, Northern Ireland, and was adapted into a series of newspaper articles there entitled "Ulster Under Fire."

BLACK ARTISTS FEATURED

The Pontiac Black Cultural Center is presenting an art exhibit Thursday through Sunday in honor of its first anniversary. The show will be open to the public from noon to 9 p.m. daily. The center is located at 491 South Sanford, at the corner of Wilson Avenue. Black artists whose works will be shown are James Dudley Strickland, James DeWitt King, Jr. Lester Johnson, and Charles W.
