DUTTON TO LEAVE; APPLETON ASSUMES POST

Thomas Dutton, vice chancellor for student affairs, is leaving OU to accept a position as vice chancellor for student and curricular affairs at the University of California at Davis. Faculty, staff and students will have an opportunity to bid farewell at a reception in his honor on Tuesday, July 14 at 3 p.m. at Trumbull Terrace. In case of inclement weather, the reception will be held in Lounge 2 of the Oakland Center.

Chancellor O'Dowd has announced that Dr. James R. Appleton, presently dean for student life, will assume the leadership of the program in student affairs under the title of acting vice chancellor for student affairs and dean of students. It will be recommended to OU's own Board of Trustees when it is organized that Dean Appleton be appointed to the vice chancellor position on a permanent basis.

DRUG CONFERENCE HERE "Drugs: The Medical, Legal and Social Implications for Youth," is the topic of the second annual state-wide colloquium on youth to be held here Saturday, July 18, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Gold Room of Oakland Center. William Lucas, Sheriff of Wayne County, will serve as keynote speaker at the conference sponsored by the Special Projects dept., division of student affairs. The drug problem will be discussed in panel and workshop sessions. Also speaking are Thomas Plunkett, Oakland County Prosecutor, Detroit City Councilman Ernest Brown and Dr. William Burton, former Wayne County coroner and now Medical Examiner for Oakland County.

He will be responsible for financial planning and analysis for all of the housing and food service activities on campus as well as other administrative responsibilities with the residence halls. Mr. Whiters will receive his MBA from Western Michigan University in August.
