DEGREE PROGRAMS, CO-OP HOUSING APPROVED BY BOARD

The OU Board of Trustees Wednesday, May 2, approved a new undergraduate degree program in human resources development, a master of arts in history degree program, and authorized a transfer of jurisdiction of another program, a B.S. in elementary education, from the College of Arts and Sciences to the School of Education.

The Board also accepted \$182,745 in gifts and grants to the university. The funds have been received since the last trustee meeting in March.

Included in the sum was a grant of \$140,000 from the U.S. Office of Education to support an early childhood education program offered by the School of Education.

Other gifts and grants include \$16,200 from the National Science Foundation to support undergraduate research participation in the biological sciences, and a \$9,219 grant from the NSF to support undergraduate research participation in chemistry.

Students have the option of a cooperative housing program at Oakland University for the 1973-74 year following action by the Board of Trustees. The Board approved a housing rate of \$650 per student for the year for those eligible to join a new Anibal House cooperative housing program. The fee is based on double occupancy rooms and does not include a food contract with the University. Anibal House is a small, cottage-type residence on campus with a capacity of 96 students. Those electing to live in the cooperative housing project would be asked to perform four to six hours of custodial maintenance assignments each week at no pay.

A resolution regarding the procedure for reporting the results from the sale of securities, and appointments, leaves of absence, terminations and other recommendations from the Employment Relations Office were passed as presented.

Board Chairman Otis M. Smith and President Donald D. O'Dowd officially welcomed Ruth H. Adams as the newest member of the Board.

OU RECEIVES \$188,505 IN ACTION OPERATIONAL GRANT

Oakland University has received a \$188,505 grant from ACTION, the federal government's citizen volunteer corps, to support a University Year for ACTION program. The grant was announced Tuesday, May 1 by U.S. Congressman William S. Broomfield.

The funds enable OU to place 40 students for one year as full-time workers in university-sponsored community service projects. The students will each receive a year's academic credit and be paid for their work. OU is the only school in Michigan to receive a UYA grant for its students.

George Fukushima, OU's program director for UYA, said the programs will deal with the Latino drop-out problems at all school grade levels, the unemployed and underemployed, and juvenile delinquency. A majority of the volunteers will work out of Pontiac, with other target communities including Waterford, Royal Oak and Royal Oak Township, Southfield, Hazel Park and Ferndale.

Student training is now under way and the 40 volunteers will begin their duties June 1, Fukushima said. The UYA has two basic objectives in its program, to alleviate poverty through application of a university's resources to the problems of poor people, and to assist universities in experience-based learning.

CHOIR, DANCE CAMPS SCHEDULED

A choir camp featuring noted guest conductors, June 26-July 9, and a two-week summer dance camp, July 2-15, will be held for area young men and women at OU, Raynold Allvin, director of summer music programs, has announced.

The choir camp is open to those from grade nine through the age of 21, Allvin said. Instruction will include music theory, full chorus, madrigal and ensemble singing, sight reading, listening skills, and voice and diction training.

Guest conductors include Paul Salamunovich, specialist in Renaissance music and assistant to the famed Roger Wagner; Paul Hill, director of the Paul Hill Chorale which performs regularly in the Washington, D.C. area; and Gil Jackson, a member of the faculty at Pontiac Central High School. Allvin and John Dovaras, director of the OU chorus, will also conduct during the choir camp.

The two-week summer dance camp is for boys and girls between 8 to 16 years of age. The participants will be divided into age groups and study ballet, modern dance, folk and jazz dance, and dance composition. Guest teachers with various specialties will provide instruction.
