

Family Near as Dulles' Condition Gets Worse

WASHINGTON (AP)—John Foster Dulles' condition is worse. His family has gathered here in the city to be close to him.

In addition to his wife and brother, Allen, who heads the Central Intelligence Agency, they include his three children and three sisters.

The former secretary of state,

weakened by the cancer that has spread through his body, contracted a mild case of pneumonia last weekend. Friday State Department Press officer Lincoln White said:

"Mr. Dulles' pneumonia has not completely resolved. There has been some further decline in his general condition."

Dulles, 71, entered Walter Reed Army Hospital last Feb. 12.

In 1956, an operation had removed a cancerous growth in the colon.

This February, in the course of a hernia operation, Army doctors discovered that the cancer had spread.

They gave Dulles huge radiation

treatments, both with a giant X-ray machine and by injecting radioactive gold salts into his abdomen.

In April Dulles left the hospital briefly for a stay in Florida. For a time it even appeared that his tremendous powers of recuperation and will to go on would prevail.

Then on April 12 he returned to the hospital.

The doctors reported the cancer had spread to his neck.

On April 15 President Eisenhower, with great reluctance, announced Dulles' resignation as secretary of state.

Dulles reportedly forced Eisen-

hower's hand in the resignation, so that the way would be clear for Christian A. Herter to take over as secretary and carry on the duties Dulles had borne for six years.

It was in a voice betraying his emotion that Eisenhower told a small group of newsmen that

Dulles now is "incapacitated for carrying on the administrative load" of his office, "in addition to assisting in the making of policy."

Eisenhower said at that conference that the latest medical findings on Dulles' condition "are not of the kind that make him help-

less." And he announced he was keeping Dulles on as a consultant on foreign policy.

Eisenhower frequently has conferred with Dulles during the last few weeks.

At Walter Reed Army Hospital Dulles' condition was reported unchanged this morning.

Ike Flies to Colorado for Visit of 24 Hours

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower flies to Colorado today for a 24-hour visit. He plans to tour the new Air Force Academy and call on his ailing mother-in-law.

Eisenhower will greet the Air Force Academy's first graduating class and get his first on-the-ground look at the school which nestles at the eastern edge of the Rocky Mountains.

Accompanying the President from Washington for tour are Air Force Secretary James H. Douglas and Gen. James D. White, Air Force chief of staff.

Also going along are the President's son and daughter-in-law, Army Major and Mrs. John S. Eisenhower, and their four youngsters. The President's grandchildren are David, 11, Barbara Anne, 9, Susan, 7, and Mary Jean, 2.

Eisenhower is expected to remain at the academy for at least a couple of hours. From there the party will fly north to Denver, a 15-minute hop.

MAMIE WENT AHEAD

Denver is the home of Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John S. Doud, who was 81 last Wednesday. The First Lady already is at the Doud residence. She arrived earlier in the week by train.

During the weekend the President and other members of the family will stay at Denver's Brown Palace Hotel, which was his headquarters during the early part of the 1952 political campaign.

All of the Eisenhowers plan to fly back to Washington Sunday. This will be the President's

General Fund at Modern Low but Aid on Way

Fast Revenue Handling May Meet This Week's State Payroll on Time

LANSING (AP)—Michigan's general fund balance today was down to its lowest level in modern history. But help is on the way. Two major revenue-producing taxes fell due yesterday.

The fund was almost flat and well over 100 million dollars in current obligations were piled up against it and the nearly broke state school aid fund as the State Treasury closed its books for the weekend.

The general fund is expected to scrape bottom through next week and maybe beyond, but between 32 and 34 million dollars in franchise taxes beyond amounts already collected fell due yesterday.

Ordinarily, the franchise collections, based for the general fund, would slowly flow in over the next six weeks, but emergency processing measures are expected to get the bulk of them on deposit by the first week of June. Sales tax processing will take about 10 days.

It was still anybody's guess whether the machinery could turn fast enough to meet next Thursday's \$3,100,000 payroll on time.

Before money can be accumulated for that purpose, the present plan is to rush out the first 13 millions taken into the general fund to complete payment of the \$3,500,000 May 15 installment of primary school interest money.

At worst, Thursday's payroll was not expected to be delayed more than a few days.

After that, the next big hurdle is to catch up on past due payments to the three major state universities in time to avoid missing month-end faculty payrolls at the University of Michigan and Michigan State.

The treasury is \$19,600,000 in arrears to the three schools, nine millions to the U. of M., \$7,400,000 to MSU and \$3,200,000 to Wayne State University.

However, an allocation of a little more than six millions by May 27 or 28 would be enough to tide them over most immediately threatening financial shoals.

Of the nearly 80 millions owed for various local school purposes, 13 millions will be taken care of within a week under present plans.

Another 37 millions or more can be met before the end of the fiscal year June 30 through

In British Dictionary Hepcat Makes Grade

LONDON (AP)—The cat that bent her roll-on getting hep in the espresso has at last gained official recognition in Britain.

Cat, hep, roll-on a two-way stretch; and espresso are all included in the latest supplement put out by the authoritative Chambers British Dictionary.

Ten years ago these words would have meant little to people who rely on the dictionary for their English. Had they described the cat's dilemma with words then at their command, they likely would have said:

"A young lady with an addiction for jazz music suffered a disarrangement of her clothing while performing a vigorous dance in a coffee house used by the younger set."

This is a measure of what is happening to the English language, but as a spokesman for Chambers said, "We must keep up with the times."

Chambers—despite its international distribution—is printed and published only in Britain. For 58 years, its tomes have been hauled down from bookshelves over the world to throw light wherever English is spoken.

Not until now, however, has the reader been able to get the definitive view on words like stereophonic, bebop, jive, cha cha, square and sweater girl.

Judge Jails Industrialist for Nonsupport of Children

A Detroit industrialist was behind bars at the Oakland County Jail today as Oakland County Circuit Judge William J. Beer continued to crack the whip on fathers who refuse to pay for the support of their children.

Harvey S. Freeman, 37, of 29553 Lochmoor Ave., Farmington Township, strolled into the friend of the court's office yesterday afternoon and surrendered himself. He was dressed ready for jail and carried a kit of toilet articles.

Donald A. Tews, enforcement attorney for the office, then escorted Freeman, owner of Independent Engineering Co., 4550 W. Boston Blvd., over to the courtroom of Judge Beer.

Judge Beer immediately found Freeman, father of three young boys, guilty of being in contempt of court and ordered him committed to jail for 90 days.

In explaining the sentence, Judge Beer said: "Where I find a man is willfully disobedient of support orders I have no other recourse than to send him to jail."

Freeman appeared before Judge Beer Monday. The judge gave him until 3 p.m. yesterday to pay \$550 in back support payments and \$500 in attorney fees, or go to jail for 90 days.

The judge said earlier when Freeman appeared before him he stated he had gross earnings

But 'Package' Not Acceptable to Soviet Union

Khrushchev Accuses Allies of Propaganda Attempt at Geneva

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today Russia will not reject the Western Geneva plan out of hand because it contains some points that can be discussed.

The actual plan, however, is not acceptable to the Soviet Union, Khrushchev said.

The Soviet leader said the Western powers know their "package" plan is not acceptable to Russia but said they submitted it because they wanted to provoke sharp Soviet criticism and then blame the Soviets for the failure of the Geneva foreign ministers conference.

Khrushchev spoke at a ceremony during which he was awarded the Lenin Peace Prize today.

Delegates to the East-West foreign ministers' conference in Geneva fanned out across Europe during a weekend recess today, leaving technical experts to work on proposals for easing the deadlock that developed during the meeting's first week.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter flew down to Rome for the day for policy talks with Italian leaders, and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville flew to Paris for the weekend.

HERTER IN ROME
Herter's special Convair Metropolitan landed there at 10:38 a.m. (5:58 a.m. EDT). The secretary was welcomed at the airport by U.S. Ambassador James D. Zellerbach, Foreign Minister Giuseppe Pella and other officials.

West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano remained in Geneva today—he is scheduled to dine with Herter tonight—but he was expected to leave late tonight or early tomorrow for Zurich to visit friends.

East German Foreign Minister Lothar Bolz flew to Berlin last night, and West German press secretary Felix von Eckardt left early today for Bonn to brief Chancellor Konrad Adenauer on developments.

Civil Defense Chief Urges Cooperation

City Receives State Disaster Plan

Copies of Michigan's new \$250,000 civil defense disaster plan were distributed in Pontiac yesterday, with Ralph H. Sheehan, state director of civil defense, encouraging "a spirit of cooperation, coordination and understanding" to make it work.

The plan, two years in the making, provides Michigan cities and counties with a uniform civil defense preparation guide to follow for the first time in the state's history.

It breaks Michigan down into five command control areas, with Detroit, Lansing, Grand Rapids and Flint being pinpointed as the target areas an enemy most likely would bomb.

Pontiac was designated as a secondary target in the plan.

The plan outlines the duties of a city and county department should a bomb or missile hit.

More than 50 Oakland County civil defense officials and volunteers turned out Friday to collect copies of the plan and hear project planners, including Robert R. Boyer of Pontiac, explain the workings of the plan.

LIST CATEGORIES
The 250-page plan outlines suggestions for civil defense preparations regarding attack warning, communications, intelligence, police, welfare, engineering, transportation, radiological, fire, rescue, manpower, health, medical, and mortuary, legal, emergency information, training and schools.

Two years ago the federal gov-

ernment appropriated the quarter of a million dollars to finance the Michigan plan.

Boyer, who traveled the state putting together his section of the plan, said a major asset of it will be its uniformity in assuring that should an attack come all communities would be operating under the same plan.

Boyer said he discovered in his travels that one county CD director was the communications aspect of civil defense, paying little attention to other phases, while another director was placing the emphasis on first aid.

WILL WORK
"This plan will work if they want to make it work," Boyer said. Sheehan informed CD leaders that to qualify for federal funds

— to be used on a matching basis in order to carry out the suggested outline — a written plan to fit into the state program must be submitted to (Continued on Page 2, Col. 6)

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Pushes 'Musts' in Message

Dems Return Fire as President Lists Critical Legislation

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower challenged the Democratic Congress this week to quit stalling and get on with his "must" legislative program. Otherwise, he said, the country will suffer.

After fuming Democrats fired their return barrage it was a guess whether either side had gained a point. But the political mills ground more furiously.

Eisenhower demanded in an extraordinary message that Congress deal promptly with higher gasoline and other highway user taxes for urgent pay-as-we-go federal highway aid; with mortgage insurance financing to keep home construction from collapsing; and with measures to ease the costly tax burden imposed by the surplus wheat program and the farm price support program in general.

"Lack of action is making the problems critical," he declared.

Then, in a fast-pounding press conference, he asserted that for the good of the nation he not only wants his fiscal 1960 budget balanced but also enough reserve revenue to start reducing the staggering public debt.

This would rule out all Democratic spending programs.

As of May 8 the debt stood at an astronomical \$284,824,191,180. It was tapping the taxpayers for more than 8 billion dollars a year.

BILL STALLED

The Democratic housing and mortgage insurance bill has been stalled for weeks in the House Rules committee by a conservative coalition comprised of the committee's four Republicans and two of its eight Democrats.

Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Texas) commented tartly that he had been saying for some time "that if we could get one Republican vote on the committee, the House would be able to consider the bill."

Rep. Leo Allen (Ill.), senior Republican on the committee, said he supported the President's plea but "would not drop his opposition" to a Democratic provision to expand public housing and to other outlays going beyond Ike's budget.

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark.) of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, renewed his opposition to the gasoline tax hike and noted pointedly that Eisenhower had been unable to find a single House Republican willing to introduce the highway financing bill.

Mills said some other method of financing—displeasing or not to Eisenhower—would be found.

Assistant Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.) bristled over the President's budget remarks. "I would state," he said, "that the President has presented six annual budgets preceding this one, and each Congress did its share, and a little more, in reducing his high requests."

Mansfield said that as for the wheat problem, Ike's Department of Agriculture has refused to cooperate with Congress in submitting a general farm bill.

The House Agriculture Committee poured fuel on the flames by approving a two-year, stop-gap bill to cut back wheat production but without substantially reducing the farmers' income. Ike doesn't like it.

each Oakland city of 10,000 or more population.

Both Oakland County, Pontiac, and many other larger Oakland cities already have workable civil defense outlines, for which little revision is expected to be necessary to fit the state proposal.

With obvious reference to Ohio Sen. Stephen M. Young's suggestion that federal funds for civil defense be abolished, Sheehan told yesterday's gathering in the Supervisors' Room:

"I have little time for these people who say in this nuclear age that we should roll over and play dead."

CD IN ACTION

He referred to this week's tornado-like winds which caused considerable damage in Ann Arbor, and the part of civil defense workers play — even in peacetime.

"There's your civil defense program in action," Sheehan said.

He said where ever he has gone in the state explaining the new outline, praise has been heaped upon the State Civil Defense Department for providing guide lines for the first time from which municipalities and counties can build their plans.

"There's a sense of uniformity and belonging for the first time," the state director said.

He urged city and county directors to study the state outline "thoroughly" before suggesting any adjustments. If it is discovered that adjustments are needed, they should be made on a state-wide basis.

The state model was drafted so it can fit into national civil defense plans, Sheehan said.

The five command control areas dividing Michigan consist of (1) the Upper Peninsula; (2) the western half of the Lower Peninsula; (3) the geographical center of the state; (4) the northeast section of the state along with the Thumb Area, and (5) the Detroit metropolitan area, including Oakland County.

Each of the five areas would designate an area civil defense coordinator who would join with state officials to map preparations during the pre-attack, attack, and post-attack phases.

Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko were expected to spend the entire weekend in Geneva.

The conference's first week revealed that East and West are diametrically opposed in their positions on the key issues under discussion, but diplomatic observers said there still appears to be some hope of compromise.

Attendance at the secret meetings proposed by the Americans would be limited to the four foreign ministers, plus two advisers each. Even conference secretaries and interpreters would be excluded.

The meetings which have been held so far have been nominally closed, but press spokesmen for all parties concerned have rushed to tell newsmen what happened as soon as each session adjourned.

The Western Big Three are planning on a summit conference, probably in mid-July and possibly in San Francisco, despite the present deadlock in the foreign ministers talks here, it was reported today.

Authoritative sources said the West believes Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is so anxious for a chance to negotiate with President Eisenhower that he is willing to pay the price of progress here which the West has set as the prerequisite for a summit conference.

Sunny Skies Chase Cold From Nation

Sunny skies, blessed with a welcome rise in the mercury, hugged most of the nation today.

Remnants of a midweek cold curtain that draped over vast areas of the country were still pronounced along the northern tier.

Widely scattered showers also interrupted the warming trend.

An invasion of warm southerly winds cut off the flow of cold Canadian air in the Rockies and Plains.

Early morning temperatures were up at least 10 degrees from the previous corresponding period from Montana eastward across the Dakotas into Iowa and Minnesota.

The Great Lakes was the cold spot with Grand Marais, an upper peninsula community of Michigan, locked in the freeze box with a 23.

ANCHORAGE LOW 49

Anchorage, Alaska showed an early 49 contrasted to a 45 at Detroit and 44 at Chicago.

Livestock warnings were posted by the U. S. Weather Bureau as the cold lingered in the Wyoming, Utah area.

A few flakes were compounded with snow at Binghamton, N. Y.

And, a strange phenomena brought snow over central Philadelphia Friday in 57 degree temperatures. The flakes vanished as they touched ground. The Weather Bureau explained there was freezing temperature in the clouds and most of the snow changed to rain in its downward flight.

Scattered light showers fell during the night from the lower Great Lakes eastward across New York State into New England.

Isolated thunderstorms also were reported in the Plains states. Showers also dampened the Pacific Northwest.

Final Arguments Wednesday

Mother Aids Alvea Defense

Testimony in the first-degree murder trial of Raymond L. Alvea hit at a part of the prosecution's case was completed yesterday with Alvea's mother taking the stand.

Final arguments in Alvea's second trial will be heard in Oakland County Circuit Court next Wednesday. His first trial ended in a hung jury, with Oakland County Circuit Judge William J. Beer dismissing the jurors after they were unable to reach a verdict following a week's deliberation.

Alvea, an ex-convict and combat Marine Corps veteran, is charged with the Aug. 1 slaying of Anthony Jasinski, 51-year-old caretaker for the Illegitims Nursery, Inc., 22951 Northwestern Highway, Southfield.

The prosecution contended that Alvea stabbed Jasinski to death, burned his clothes in an incinerator in his mother's home and then disposed of the ashes.

But Alvea's mother said she cleaned the incinerator herself, several days before the killing, just before going on a short vacation.

Alvea has denied the fatal stabbing.

The dealers and the association were charged with antitrust violations in an indictment returned in U.S. District Court here yesterday. Stringari said Detroit area Ford dealers "intend to exhaust all legal remedies to protect their rights."

"Neither the association nor any of its individual members has engaged in any price fixing," he said.

"Over 44 Ford dealers were questioned under oath by the grand jury and their testimony strongly contradicts the indictment. Furthermore, a study of the business records definitely shows that no conspiracy existed at any time."

Arraignments are scheduled for June 1.

Woman Dem Pokes Fun at GOP Hopetuls

DENVER (AP)—A Democratic party women's leader said today the Democrats have so many presidential nomination eligibles that she's almost sorry for the Republicans having to choose between "just a well-known millionaire and a well-known cocker spaniel fan."

This was Katie Louchheim, vice chairman of the Democratic National Committee, speaking to a Western states' Democratic conference and the Colorado Federation of Jane Jefferson Clubs.

Her jibe at the GOP's presidential prospects was aimed at Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, a very wealthy man, and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Nixon mentioned "Checkers," his family cocker spaniel, to a nationwide television audience Sept. 23, 1952, when he denied any wrongdoing in accepting an \$18,000 political expense fund from a group of California businessmen.

"Checkers," a gift to the Nixon children from Texas, is still a family pet.

In Wake of Atom Smasher Sees Fantastic Discoveries

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower's top scientific advisers predicted today that "numerous and fantastic" discoveries will follow construction of more powerful atom-smashers.

In a special report, they said the accelerators now planned will enable scientists to "see" distances that are to the thickness of a sheet of paper as the paper is to the distance to the moon.

The aim is to use sub-atomic "bullets" to break up even the smallest particles of matter now known.

The report asked for a boost from 85 to 135 million dollars a year in the federal outgo for atom-smashers. This would include the \$100,000,000 Stanford University linear accelerator which the President said in New York Thursday would be given administrative support.

"The practical results that must derive from continued exploration with larger accelerators cannot be guessed," the scientists said. "But if the past is a guide they will be numerous and fantastic. The one thing we have learned to expect from nature is to be surprised."

Rickover suggested in Washington Thursday that identical uniforms would curtail interservice rivalry.

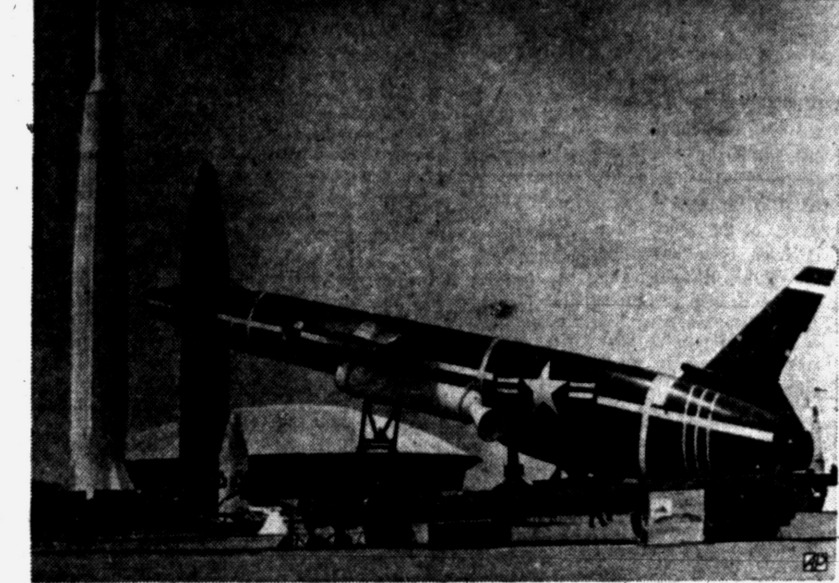
Drives Bird Incubator
