

Board accepts gifts; approves salaries

The Oakland University Board of Trustees accepted \$600,417 in gifts and grants at its June 2 meeting.

The largest single source of funding was the Oakland County Manpower Programs Division which contributed \$155,588 to support the Oakland County-Oakland University Student Internship Program.

Among other grants were five awards from the National Institutes of Health totaling \$153,177; \$100,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor for the School of Education for a Manpower Development Higher Education System; \$76,761 from the Public Health Service to the School of Nursing for Teaching Ethnic Diversity in a New Program; and \$60,000 from the Matilda R. Wilson Fund for restoration and lighting projects at Meadow Brook Hall.

In other action the board: Reappointed George L. Gardiner dean of the Kresge Library; approved the constitution of the Oakland University Senate; approved a recommendation to establish a master's program in medical physics; approved a \$257,000 salary and benefit package for non-union employees. The package includes a 4.98 per cent increase on the compensation base, which is equivalent to a 6.2 per cent increase on the salary base. The increase affects 220 employees, including union-exempt police sergeants, exempt clerical-technical employees, and administrative deans.

Research laboratory approved

Oakland University is establishing a clinical research laboratory on campus with equipment transferred from the Frank E. Fitzsimmons Experimental Surgery complex in Pontiac's Clinton Valley Center.

Establishment of the laboratory and creation of a temporary site for it were approved June 2 by the Board of Trustees. The laboratory is used for animal experimentation. It will be housed in a renovated campus farm building on Lonedale Road.

The board also approved a fund-raising program for a new, permanent building to house the laboratory and possibly an auditorium and administrative offices on the southwest corner of campus.

The laboratory equipment is being donated to the university by Dr. Donald Dawson who heads the Pontiac Medical Science Laboratories, Inc. (PMSL) and the Oakland Medical Center.

Four A&S grads win awards

The prestigious Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson Awards and the newly established Human Relations Awards were presented to four graduates of the College of Arts and Sciences during commencement ceremonies June 4.

John M. Shacklett of Auburn Heights and Annivory Calvert of Detroit were selected for the 1977 Wilson Awards.

Shacklett, a political science major, and Calvert, a psychology student, were chosen by the Wilson Awards Committee and received a gold medallion and \$200.

Shacklett was praised for his work with the University Senate, University Congress and the Village Project, an attempt to renovate one of the Wilson barns into a student cultural center. Calvert was praised for her "warm, humane, and perceptive work with a variety of groups."

The first recipients of the Human Relations Award were Robert Thornton of Detroit and James A. Cummer of Clio.

The Human Relations Award will be presented to one or more undergraduates who have made an outstanding contribution to the betterment of human relations at Oakland. The award will not necessarily be presented every year, but only when evidence of an outstanding contribution have been made.

Thornton and Cummer were cited for their work as co-founders of Project Unity, a student group formed to promote racial harmony on campus. The two were also active in Area Hall Council and University Congress. Thornton was also a member of the Association of Black Students.

In presenting the award, Oakland University president Donald O'Dowd said, "In particular, Project Unity has demonstrated how much two strong individuals working in partnership can accomplish. We recognize your work with gratitude and we wish you well as you move into a world that needs your sense of social concern very much indeed."

Bingham attends conference

Jane S. Bingham, education, attended a two-day conference on global education sponsored by the Mid-America Program for Global Perspectives in Education, a project of the Social Studies Development Center at Indiana University. The meeting involved 40 Midwest educators in discussions for adding a global perspective to the K-12 curriculum.

Students study abroad

A gift from the Japanese Society of Detroit will subsidize in part transportation costs to Japan for three students who will represent Oakland at Nanzan University in Japan during the next academic year.

The Japanese Society of Detroit is comprised of some 25 Japanese companies with branches in the metropolitan area.

The three students representing OU in Japan are: Richard Arno, English, from Royal Oak; Wendell Bowman, management, from Mt. Clemens; and Arthur Kohn, philosophy, of Walled Lake.

The exchange program was expanded from two to three students because of great student interest in both countries.

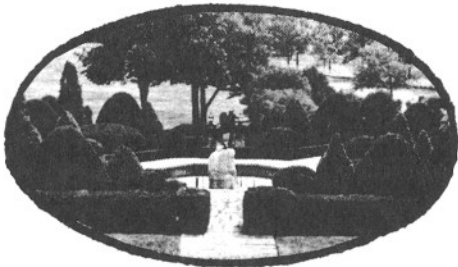

Engineers strive to take chill off

William Sharrard, director of plant operations, has some good news and bad news about the heating and cooling systems at Oakland.

The good news is the computerized system can be more efficient and save energy for OU. The bad news is some buildings may be uncomfortably cool or warm this summer, as engineers attempt to manipulate the new control system.

Many buildings on campus are serviced by a 'reheat' system, Sharrard says. Reheat systems use air which is cooled by fans to a temperature low enough to adequately cool rooms on a 'design day'—the hottest day normally expected for the area.

The design day temperature for the Pontiac area is 95 degrees. If the temperature outside is lower than the design day (which it has been for the past few weeks) extra energy would have to be applied to reheat the cooled air in order to make rooms comfortable.

Since the Pontiac area can expect only 13 days of temperatures above 90 degrees from May 15 to September 15, large amounts of energy would have to be used to satisfy room conditions.

So, although it seems energy is being wasted by over-cooling some rooms, it is not, Sharrard says. In order to save energy this summer, it will be necessary to have some overheating and some overcooling. But attempts are being made to modify the system, Sharrard says, to keep discomforts to a minimum.

Services held for Prof. Brace

Memorial services will be held today for Richard M. Brace, history, at 4 p.m. at St. John Fisher Chapel on Walton Boulevard. Brace died Sunday, June 5, of an apparent heart attack in a suburb of Paris, France. He was 61.

Brace joined the faculty in 1965. He was a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, the author of numerous works on the history of France, Europe, and Algeria, and the recipient of many professional honors.
