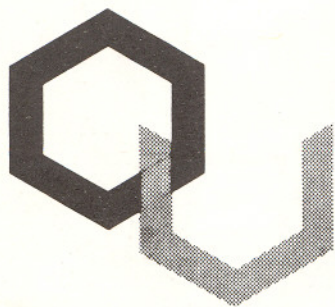

Don Stevens, MSU Trustee, Named OU Labor Education Head

Don Stevens, a highly-regarded veteran Michigan labor relations expert and member of the Michigan State University Board of Trustees, has been named to the newly-created position of Director of Labor Education at OU.

Stevens begins his new duties immediately, according to OU Dean of Continuing Education Lowell Eklund. Stevens has been serving as a representative of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC).

Eklund expressed pleasure at obtaining Stevens, "a solid professional and long-time friend of Oakland," to fill the new position.

Working within the Division of Continuing Education, Stevens will be charged with the design, development and administration of non-credit courses, seminars and conference programs for labor.

Stevens has been a member of the MSU Board of Trustees since 1958 and is a former Board chairman.

Prior to joining the MESC,

Stevens served as a consultant to the Michigan Economic Opportunity Office, and as director of a labor leadership training program sponsored by the Office of Economic Opportunity at the University of Minnesota.

His long affiliation with Michigan's labor movement included positions as director of the Michigan AFL-CIO Education and Community Service Departments, and as vice-president of the Michigan CIO. He is a member of the State Civil Service Hearing Board, and a member of the WSU, University of Michigan, Wayne State Labor Program Service Advisory Committee.

24 Courses Added Ophthalmic/Optometric Program New On CE Winter Schedule

OU's Division of Continuing Education announces a new Ophthalmic/Optometric Assistant Certificate Program and revision in two other certificate programs.

The new program offers courses in medical science background, optical theory and methodology, and business procedures and communications. The program was developed to train aides to perform pertinent office duties delegated by the doctor and to handle optical dispensing.

Those who complete the eight-course program will be qualified to assist ophthalmologists and optometrists in their offices by taking eye measurements, selecting, fitting, adapting and repairing frames.

Evening credit-free courses, beginning the week of Jan. 22, are anatomy and physiology of the eye, medical terminology, psychological communications and medical office procedures.

MEDICAL ASSISTANT PROGRAM REVISED

As a result of recent research among area doctors and their office personnel, the Certificate Program for Medical Assistants has been revised to place more emphasis on office procedures and communications and less on clinical knowledge. The revised program retains the most useful courses from the original program and adds new courses such as medical insurance forms, medical office procedures and psychological communications.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASST. COURSES REVAMPED

The revised Certificate Program for Administrative Assistants helps develop office personnel into administrative assistants who can assume certain important functions and so free an executive for other duties.

TWENTY-FOUR NEW COURSES SLATED

Twenty-four new evening courses will be offered in the winter term beginning the week of January 22, 1973.

New in the humanities are astrology; psychical research; aesthetics; sex role differentiation; women in contemporary society; European travel; introduction to folk music; and fads, facts and fantasies about food.

The University Research Committee is now taking applications for faculty research leaves.

Applications in letter form, describing the scholarly or scientific project(s) to be undertaken will be accepted until 5 p.m. Feb. 2, 1973, in the Office of Research and Instructional Services, 288 Hannah Hall.

The definition of research leaves is published in Article 42 of the *Faculty Agreement, 1971-2*.

Preference will be given to those

faculty members with six or more years at OU.

Each applicant should list the names, titles and addresses of three scholars who are competent to comment on the quality, value and feasibility of the proposed study. The proposal should also state the time duration desired for the leave.

The Research Committee expects to complete the processing of applications before the middle of March.

Fee Begun For Credentials

A fee of 50 cents per set will be charged for the mailing of credentials requested by students/alumni. The fee will be charged after the fifth copy is requested, and takes effect Jan. 1, 1973.

Five OU Faculty Members Get Research Fellowships

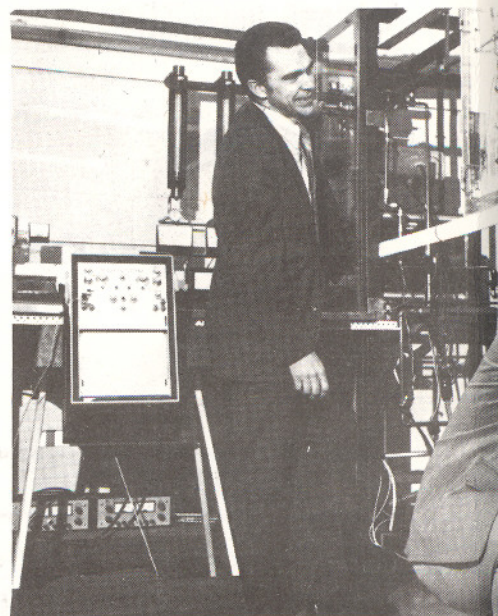
Five OU faculty members are each recipients of \$1,500 OU Research Fellowships in English, chemistry, mathematics and biological sciences.

The grants, running from January-December of 1973, were announced by the University Research Committee.

The Fellowship winners each received \$1,500 stipends and four of the researchers received an additional \$500 each to cover needed supplies and services.

The Committee, supported by monies from the University's general fund, annually awards Research Fellowships to stimulate and encourage research conducted by the younger faculty members of the University. The Committee supports additional faculty research programs during the year.

Research Fellowship winners and their projects are: R. Craig Taylor, Dept. of Chemistry, \$2,000 to support "Lanthanide Shift Reagents in Organophosphorus Chemistry;" Robert Sharpley, Dept. of Mathematics, \$2,000 to support "Study on the Behavior of Operator's;" Robert Hunter, Dept. of Biological Sciences, \$2,000 for research on "Physiological Ecology of Invertebrates;"

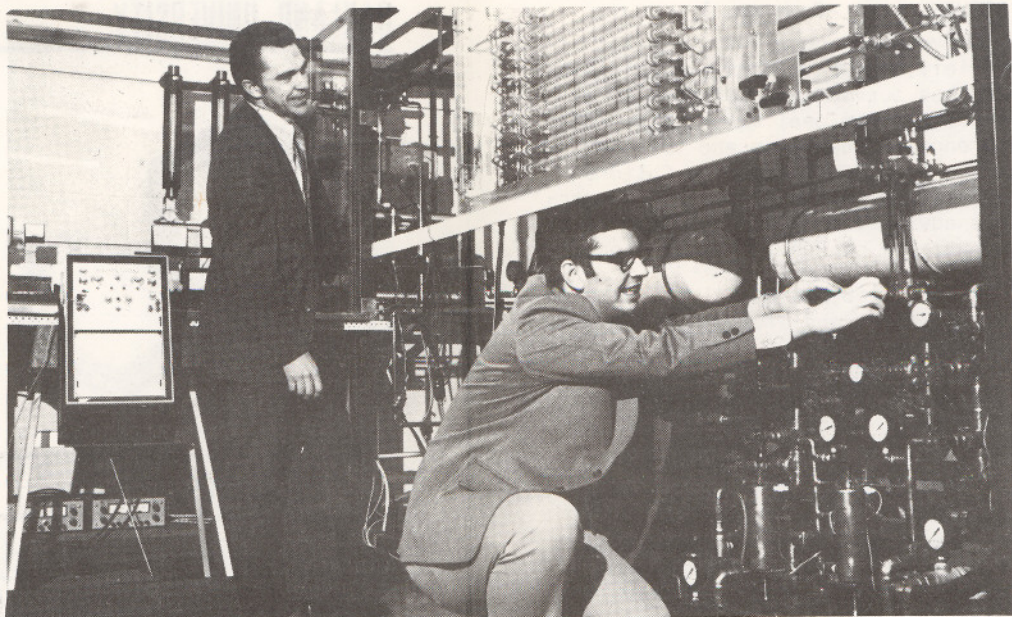

Cagers Win 2 to Make Season Record 4-2

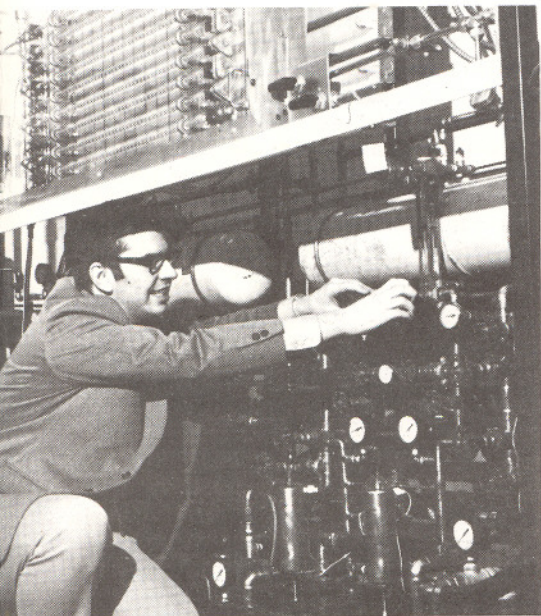
The OU Pioneers upped their season basketball record to 4-2 winning their last two games. After dropping a close 63-60 decision to Hillsdale to square their record at 2-2, the Pioneers blasted Lake Superior State 87-66, then clobbered Adrian 93-68. All three were road games for the Pioneers.

In the Hillsdale game, the Pioneers held a slim 32-30 lead at half time. Down by only seven points late in the game, the Pioneers were unable to cut the deficit to less than three points. Carvin Melson scored 25 points and grabbed 14 rebounds, but there was little support from his teammates.

On Dec. 9, the Pioneers traveled to Sault Ste. Marie and came away with a big victory over Lake Superior.

Oakland dominated the boards 60-38, and also outshot Lake Superior 50 per cent to 38 per cent from the floor.

Oakland continued its fine shooting Dec. 13 at Adrian, as they hit 41 of 77 field goal attempts on their way to a 93-68 victory. After piling up a 47-33 half time lead, the Pioneers continued to dominate in the second half.

ADA Rehearses "The Winter's Tale"

The Academy of Dramatic Art (ADA) has begun rehearsing its annual Shakespeare production to be staged in the Studio Theatre in late January and early February.

This season's selection is the pastoral romance, "The Winter's Tale," one of the last plays Shakespeare wrote at the pinnacle of his life's experience and creative genius.

"The Winter's Tale" will be presented Jan. 26-29, Feb. 1-4 and Feb. 8-11.

Well-known Canadian and American actor/director Joseph Shaw has returned to the Academy from Stratford Festival (Ontario) to direct the play.

Shaw directed the Studio Company's premiere production of Lillian Hellman's "The Little Foxes" that opened the Studio Theatre in October, 1970.

Since that time he has directed two plays at Meadow Brook Theatre, "Life with Father" and "The Boy Friend," and played the lead in Moliere's "Tartuffe," also at Meadow Brook.

Shaw has unique plans for the staging of "The Winter's Tale." He will give it a timeless treatment embodying some of the elements of ancient Greece and some of the traditional Elizabethan qualities with an added touch of modern surrealism.

Because of the popularity of the Shakespeare plays presented at the Academy, groups and organizations are urged to make early reservations for the evening performances, curtain is 8:15 nightly, 6:30 p.m. Sundays.

General admission is \$2, students \$1. With every 25 students a chaperone is admitted free.
