ENGINEERING WORK FUNDED The School of Engineering is closing 1970 with two great New Year's Eve presents from National Science Foundation: \$33,300 for a two-year grant supporting research in Statistical Tolerancing Methods and \$26,380 to support a summer institute for college faculty in the area of Modern Engineering Application of Coherent Optics and Holography. David H. Evans is principal investigator for the first grant, which supports research he has under way. The summer institute in Coherent Optics and Holography will be under Joseph Der Hovanesian, project director, and Richard E. Haskell.

HOPE OF ACTIVISM

William F. Sturner (political science/office of the provost) is the author of an article citing benefits of some student activism in the fall issue of Fordham, a magazine published twice a year by Sturner's alma mater. His thesis is that constructive student activism -- the kind that doesn't grab headlines very often -- "represents a challenging model of concern and commitment which should be recognized and heeded, rather than ignored or condemned by those who ignited the urge to act on principle."
