CRISIS CONFERENCES LOOK NEXT AT 'PRESSURES FOR CHANGE'

"Pressures for Change"--from within and without--will be the topic of the second conference of the University in Crisis series, which will be held Wednesday and Thursday. The principal speakers will be Professor martin Trow of the sociology department of the University of California, Berkeley, and Frederic W. Mess, president of the Association of American Colleges in Mashington, D.C. Their lectures will be delivered from 1:15 to 3:00 p.m. on Mednesday in the Gold Room.

From 2:15 to 4 p.m. on Thursday, the topic will be attacked from a variety of positions in a panel discussion to be held in the Vandenberg Cafeteria. Panelists will include President Ness, Elmer Cooper, assistant chancellor for urban affairs; Gerald Faverman, staff analyst with the Legislative Fiscal Agency of the State of Michigan; OU students Jerome Hill and William M. Loafman; John Porter, acting state superintendent of public instruction for the State of Michigan, and Robert E. Waldron, minority leader in the Michigan House of Representatives.

Kenneth D. Roose, vice president of the American Council on Education and a former OU faculty member, will serve as conference coordinator. The "Pressures for Change" conference is designed to present "a reasonably complete report of the various pressures from students, faculty, administrators, trustees, legislators, taxpayers, alumni, parents, government and industry" for changes on university campuses.

BRUBECK MORK DEBUTS

The famed wave brubeck Trio, playing jazz improvisations within a basic classical form, will be featured with the OU Chorus and guest soloists in a special concert at 8:30 p.m. Saturday in the Sports and Recreation Building. With a script based on the Old Testament, the work's principal message is that all men must learn to live together as brothers or die together as fools. The soloists are bass-baritone Achenry Boatwright of New York and tenor Cantor Harold Orbach of Temple Israel in Detroit. The OU Chorus is under the direction of John Dovaras.
