# 1,000 YEARS OF POLISH CULTURE ON DISPLAY

An art exhibit depicting more than 1,000 years of Polish cultural history is on display at Oakland University. The public is invited at no charge.

The February 17-April 2 exhibit is sponsored by the OU area studies program and the university's Kresge Library with the assistance of Mitchell and Zofia Kafarski of Bloom-field Hills.

Zofia Kafarski arranged and directed the exhibit that includes books, world-famous posters, art pieces, 16mm films, and narrated slide presentations. Most of the materials are being supplied by the Polish government. Most of the artifacts are from the personal collection of the Kafarskis or from the Polish government. Several Polish-American artists will participate.

The formal opening of the exhibit was held February 23 in the Oakland Center. Attending were the Honorable Wojciech Jaskot, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of the Polish People's Republic; the Polish cultural attache; members of the area Polish-American community; and OU students, faculty, and staff.

The exhibit will be on display in the Art Lounge of the Oakland Center from February 20 through February 28. It will be moved to the main entry of the Kresge Library and shown there from March 8 through April 2. Oakland Center exhibit hours are 8 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday; 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Friday; 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday; and 2-11:30 p.m. on Sunday.

\$100,000 GRANT TO FUND STUDENT INTERNSHIPS

Oakland University has received a \$100,000 grant from Oakland County to support a student internship program in county government.

Participants must be of junior, senior, or graduate level status at OU and be permanent residents of Oakland County.

Some 30 students are being interviewed and placed for the winter semester explains Harvey Hohauser of the OU Urban Affairs Center. Hohauser is program manager for the internship project.

Placements are available in the county's personnel department, public information office, manpower department, law library, management and budget office, and the planning and physical development department, among others. The student interns will work 20 hours a week and at-

The student interns will work 20 hours a week and attend regular OU classes. The pay rate is \$2.98 an hour for juniors and seniors and \$3.75 an hour for graduate students.

OU SENATE MEETS THURSDAY

There will be a meeting of the Oakland University Senate on Thursday, February 26, at 3:30 p.m. in rooms 128-130 Oakland Center. The agenda will be concerned with second readings on motions from the Academic Policy Committee and the Academic Budget and Planning Committee. A conference on "Youth Employment" is being conducted at Oakland University today, February 24, in the Oakland Center.

The day-long program is co-sponsored by the Oakland County Youth Assistance Office, the university's Human Resources and Development Area and Manpower Institutional Grant.

John Conyers, Jr., U.S. Congressperson, Detroit, will keynote the program. Topics to be explored throughout the day include youth rights, occupational trends, and career-development programs. The closing session will be a panel discussion on how to start and maintain a local youth employment service.

## DAVID MAGUIRE TO LECTURE ON THURSDAY

The president of one of the nation's most widely publicized experimental colleges will present a free public lecture at Oakland University on Thursday, February 26, on "The Future of Undergraduate Public Education."

The speaker will be David Maguire of the State University of New York College at Old Westbury. The 1 p.m. talk is in the Sunset Room of the Oakland Center.

Maguire, a graduate of Yale University Divinity School, is a specialist in modern religious thought. Long active in the Civil Rights Movement, Maguire was one of the original "freedom riders" in 1961 in Montgomery, Alabama, and he is a permanent trustee of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Social Change in Atlanta, Georgia.

Thomas Lyons was a presenter at the recent MAME II Fall Conference held at Boyne Mountain. The meeting, "Media Aide--Replacement or Co-Worker?" examined the specific roles of professionals and para-professionals in libraries and media centers. The more than 800 conference registrants represented a cross section of the library/media profession-school library/media specialists, library educators, instructional technologists, and administrators at school district, county, and REMC levels.

MCMASTER SELECTED BY COUNCIL

Maureen McMaster, freshman, has been selected corresponding secretary of Area Hall Council. She was appointed by council president, James A. #### MICHAUD PUBLISHES ARTICLE

Paul Michaud, history, has published an article entitled "The Bureaucrat" in <u>Varieties</u> of Man and Society: Social Science <u>Reader</u>, edited by Alfred Feinstein. Michaud's article, adapted from a lecture delivered at Wayne State University, traces historical developments which led to the emergence of the bureaucraticplanning system and discusses aspects of the bureaucrat's selfdefinition and relations with other persons, using an idealtype mode of analysis.

## 'ROLLING STONES' EXAMINED IN ARTICLE

James Graham and Roy Kotynek, history, have contributed an article to Thomas J. Volgy's anthology, <u>Ex-</u> <u>ploring Relationships Between Mass Media and Political</u> <u>Culture: The Impact of Music and Television on American</u> <u>Society</u> (Tucson: Institute of Government Research, 1975). Their contribution, "Dialectics of Alienation in Contemporary Pop Culture: The Rolling Stones," grows out of their mutual interest in the relationship between contemporary history and general studies, which they are exploring with other faculty in New-Charter College. This article constitutes the first in a collection of essays on which Graham and Kotynek are collaborating toward teaching and writing about "Media and Consciousness: Redefining the Sixties."

### ENGINEERING LECTURE BY TORONTO PROF

Prof. W. Murray Wonham will give the next Sigma Xi seminar on Thursday, February 26, at 5 p.m. in room 203 in Dodge Hall of Engineering. The title of his talk is "The Internal Model Principle of Control Theory." All are welcome. The talk will be mathematical in nature and will deal with the basic question that feedback regulators (control systems) must in some sense incorporate the model of the dynamic system they are controlling. He will also propose a "categorical" version of these ideas in the spirit of general systems theory.

Wonham is a nationally recognized expert on control theory and has won several prizes for his research papers. He has held teaching and research positions with Purdue University, the Research Institute for Advanced Studies (RIAS), Brown University, and NASA.

J. Harold Ellens, speech communication, has read the following professional papers recently: "Humanization of Man in the Antique World," Philosophy Club, OU, January 6; "Psychological Processes and Christian Experience in Psychotherapy," Institute of Religion and Mental Health Annual Convention, Atlanta, Ga., January 24-26; and "The Concept of Man in Western Rhetoric From Paul to the Present," Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis, Grand Rapids, February 1 and 21. He will read "Anthropology and Psychotherapy: A Correlation of Models" to the Christian Association for Psychological Studies, Washington, D.C., on February 28.

PIRGIM, the Public Interest Research Group in Michigan, is sponsoring the state-wide Safe Energy Initiative (SEI) on the OU campus.

By getting eight percent of the voters in Michigan to sign a petition, the SEI will give voters the opportunity to decide on the November ballot whether the state will have safety standards for nuclear power plants.
