THEATRE SEASON ANNOUNCED

A colorful season of eight plays that range from musical comedy to Greek tragedy will be mounted on the Meadow Brook stage next year. Works by Tennessee Williams, Agatha Christie, Carson McCullers and William Shakespeare are included in the 8th theatre season at Meadow Brook.

*The season will open in October with Carson McCullers' prize-winning play, "The Member of the Wedding."

*"A Streetcar Named Desire" by Tennessee Williams will be staged in November as a tribute to Williams on the 25th anniversary of his unrivalled masterpiece.

*December's production will be the Detroit premiere of a British hit, "How The Other Half Loves," by Alan Ayckbourn.

*Sophocles' "Oedipus Rex" will be brought to Meadow Brook in January in a new adaptation by Charles Nolte.

*A deliberate change of pace will be offered in February, with the staging of Edgar Lee Masters' "Spoon River" adapted by Charles Aidman.

*Shakespeare's delightful romantic comedy, "As You Like It," will be presented in March.

*A superb play of mystery, "Ten Little Indians," by Agatha Christie, will be presented next April.

*"I Do! I Do!" by Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt will conclude the season.

SENATE MEETS APRIL 19

At its Thursday, April 19 meeting, the OU Senate gave final approval to proposals to establish Master of Arts in Teaching in Early Childhood Education and Master of Arts in History degrees. A recommendation for a new system of internal governance

for OU was given its first reading.

An additional meeting of the Senate will be held to vote on allied health professions motions. No date has been set yet. No future meetings have been set to discuss the School of General Studies or the School of Professional Arts.
