DEARTH IS HEAD OF MEADOW BROOK PROGRAMS

Robert A. Dearth, a senior staff member at Oakland University, has assumed administrative responsibility for the university's Meadow Brook Festival, Theatre, and Art Gallery.

The announcement of Dearth's new responsibility for the university's professional performing arts programs was made by OU President Donald D. O'Dowd.

"We are delighted that Bob has agreed to take on these additional responsibilities," O'Dowd said. "He is a creative, energetic person, and his experience in advertising and at the university has put him in the position to make major contributions to these vital and distinctive functions of the university."

O'Dowd indicated that Dearth, 54, would continue his present assignment as Executive Director to the Oakland University Foundation and President's Club. Dearth is also responsible for coordinating the university's private fund-raising program and for special assignments from the president. Most recently he served as general chairperson of the university's successful 15th birthday celebration which drew more than 8,000 persons to the campus.

The responsibility for the performing arts program was previously held by John De Carlo, the university's vice president for Public Affairs. De Carlo had asked to be relieved of responsibility for the performing arts programs and the University Relations department in order to devote more time to his other responsibilities as secretary to the Board of Trustees, the university's liaison with state government, and coordinator of the university's legal activities. The University Relations department was shifted to the Office of the President under the direction of William W. Connellan, assistant to the president.

BOLLINGER RETURNS TO MEADOW BROOK STAFF

Frank Bollinger, a member of the Meadow Brook Theatre administrative staff from 1968-72, is returning as tour director for the theatre's "Outreach Project" grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts.

The \$99,180 grant will enable Meadow Brook Theatre to tour "See How They Run" in outstate Michigan communities next March through April.

Bollinger was recently associated with the Wolf Trap Farm Foundation. He was Meadow Brook Theatre public relations director from 1968-70 and managing director from 1970-72.

Named assistant to Bollinger was Mary Ellen Gall. Miss Gall comes to OU from New Jersey where she was a member of the Department of Speech at Kean College.

OU EXPERIMENTS WITH UNDESIGNATED PARKING

With the endorsement of the University Parking Commission, President Donald D. O'Dowd has announced that the university will experiment with an "undesignated" parking system for a three-month period.

The trial, which begins Monday, November 4, and concludes Friday, January 31, will permit persons with valid parking decals to park in any lot previously designated for faculty, staff or student use. The only exceptions will be paraplegic parking, the ride pool lots and the trailer home parking behind Hannah Hall.

Parking between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. will be permitted in Lots M and N behind the residence halls and in half of Lot O behind the Sports and Recreation Building.

The trial is designed to test the premise that undesignated parking will increase parking utilization and decrease enforcement costs and problems. The parking commission, chaired by Commuter Services Director Rosalind Andreas, will evaluate the experiment and make a recommendation to the president by January 15 on the value of a permanent undesignated system.

The commission will hold university-wide discussions during the trial period and welcomes comments from individuals at any time during the experiment.

DOW'S MEXICAN RESEARCH FORMS NEW BOOK TOPIC

James Dow, anthropology, is the author of a new book entitled Santos y Sobrevivencia: La Religión Pública de los Otomíes de la Sierra de Puebla. The book is being published this spring in Spanish by the Instituto Nacional Indigenista, the institute

of the Mexican government concerned with research and development in Indian areas. The book is a cultural-ecological analysis of the variations in religious organization within a peasant area of Mexico and it is based on ethnographic field work done by Professor Dow, in the northern Sierra de Puebla of Mexico, between 1967 and the present.
