ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT ISSUES PROGRESS REPORT

Dear Alumni of Oakland University,

It is an honor and pleasure to serve you this year as your president. The purpose of the Oakland University Alumni Association is to foster continued alumni interest in the growth and development of the university. We do this through a variety of ways: alumni activities, raising money, encouraging friends to attend the university, and promoting the various programs of the institution.

One of the more important events that has already occurred during my tenure as president of the Alumni Association has been the recognition by the alumni board of "affiliated" alumni groups. These groups are being developed to support particular programs in the university. The first such group, an Engineering Alumni Society, should be chartered shortly and several others should follow in the months ahead. It is our hope that you will become active in one of the affiliated groups and the Alumni Association itself.

Our major annual event - Wilson Weekend - was a very successful and happy occasion this past fall. Approximately 200 alumni took part in the square dancing in the Riding Ring, and we were honored by the presence of several distinguished faculty and staff. The square dancing was spiced by several side attractions, such as a kissing booth, horseshoes, a buffet dinner, and plenty of carmel apples. Wilson Weekend is being scheduled earlier for 1974 to coincide with a university open house. The open house, celebrating the university's 15th birthday, will be September 29, so our Wilson Weekend events will be arranged for the same weekend. Please reserve that weekend for returning to campus.

We take special pride in the accomplishments of the 1973 Fund Drive. We exceeded our goal of \$6,500 by several hundred dollars, and we added 100 persons to the list of

contributors. One of the most gratifying developments has been the growth of the Pioneer Club. This organization is made up of alumni who contribute at least \$50 to the Fund Drive. Most of these people also devote a lot of their time in support of the Alumni Association and the university. The membership of the Pioneer Club stands at 46, compared to 19 a year ago. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each Pioneer Club member for his/her support and service.

We are already planning the 1974 Fund Drive, and Judy and Don Moran (both 1963 graduates) will chair the Fund Drive Committee. Our primary goal is to increase the number of contributors. While we are a young university with few 'rich' alumni, we hope that you can spare some money to help buy books for the library, encourage undergraduate research, or loan money to a student in need.

We do other things besides raise money. In the works for this year are a golf outing, the 1964 class reunion, our women's luncheon, and Wilson Weekend. For next year, we hope to develop a summer alumni college. We encourage you to attend these alumni events, to become involved once again with the university as it matures.

I would like also to issue a special invitation for you to attend an Alumni Association Board meeting. On May 13, the board will hold a meeting and Dr. Philip Johnson, Dean of Graduate Studies, will talk to us about the future of the graduate program at Oakland.

On behalf of the Alumni Association Board, best wishes for 1974, and we hope to see you during the year.

O.U. ACHIEVES RECORD ENROLLMENT

Record fall and winter term enrollments are enabling Oakland University to exceed its state-budgeted enrollment total for fiscal 1973-74, President Donald D. O'Dowd announced.

Oakland, budgeted by the state legislature for 7,779 fiscal year equated students (FYES), should not top that figure by 100 students or more, O'Dowd said.

The 1974 winter enrollment is 9,125 headcount students compared with 8,365 students in winter, 1973, O'Dowd said The enrollment this fall was 9,638 students, an all-time OU record.

"Oakland's continued growth in the face of generally declining enrollments can be attributed to various factors," O'Dowd claimed. Among them are new undergraduate

curricular options, a growing evening credit program, an expansion of the graduate programs, and the institution's location in a rapidly growing area of the state.

"We are convinced that Oakland will continue to grow throughout the decade," O'Dowd said.

O'Dowd also reported an increase in residence hall occupancy with 1,176 student housing contracts this winter compared with 1,150 in the fall. There is normally a drop between fall and winter terms. "The energy crisis may have helped dorm occupancy, but we feel that our new residence hall programs have helped this situation too," O'Dowd said.

A student ride pool first begun three years ago has been expanded to serve faculty and staff. There are currently 29 university pools and they have helped beat the gasoline shortage thus far, the president said.

FUND DRIVE EXCEEDS GOAL; PARTICIPATION SOARS

The 1973 fund drive is over the top with money still coming in, Elaine Petz, director of alumni relations, has announced. The goal of \$6,500 has been surpassed with \$7,012 in hand as of Jan. 18, Miss Petz said.

Chief beneficiary of the drive will be the Kresge Library. A total of \$3,614.50 in alumni gifts has been earmarked for the library and undesignated funds of \$1,385.50 have been added to that total for a \$5,000 library contribution. This sum will be matched by the Friends of the Kresge Library to bring the gift total to \$10,000, Miss Petz said.

Other highlights of the fund drive include an increase in Alumni Association membership from 204 to 304 and a 137 percent increase in the number of Pioneer Club members. The Pioneer Club, composed of alumni donating \$50 or more, increased from 19 members in 1972 to 46 in 1973.

"We are proud of the way the alumni have responded to our 1973 drive, both in terms of money pledged and in terms of participation," Miss Petz said. In addition to raising or exceeding the \$6,500 goal, a secondary target was increased participation by alumni. "We went from 204 members in 1972 to 304 in 1973, an increase of 49 percent, and I am as pleased with this figure as I am with the dollar total," Miss Petz said. 
WILSON WEEKEND DRAWS LARGE TURNOUT





Conboys help recruiting effort

They are mentioning Oakland University's name in Cheboygan, thanks to the efforts of two OU alumni, Jim Conboy and Sue (Hay) Conboy, both class of 1968.

Establishment of New Aid Fund

A fund has been initiated to assist students interested in foreign study. It is called the Don Iodice Grant-in-Aid for Foreign Study, in honor of the educational contributions Mr. Iodice has made toward the development of the superior language program offered at Oakland University.

The grant-in-aid would be open to any student who:

- is a language major;
- has completed his sixth semester of language training;
- can demonstrate proficiency in listening comprehension and speaking at a level which will allow his enrollment in an intermediate level language program at a foreign university;
- is registered for a summer language program of at least six weeks given in a foreign university;
- demonstrates some need for the grant-in-aid.

The grant-in-aid may amount to $\frac{1}{3}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ of the costs, including transportation, but would not, in any case, exceed \$250 - \$400 per student.

Applicants will be interviewed and recipients chosen by a committee of language department staff. More than one grant may be awarded each year; however, that will depend on the amount of contributions to date each year.

The Don Iodice Grant-in-Aid for Foreign Study fund establishment has been initiated by two of our alumni, Jill and Doug Bastian. If any of you would like to support this fund, make checks payable to Oakland University, designate them for the fund, and mail them to the Alumni Relations Office.
