BOARD ELECTS SMITH, SALTZMAN TO OFFICE

Otis M. Smith, chairman of the Oakland University Board of Trustees, and Arthur W. Saltzman, vice chairman, will each serve a second year in those offices, board members voted Monday, Sept. 24.

Smith is an assistant general counsel of General Motors Corporation. He joined the GM legal staff in 1967 after a career in Michigan state government. That career included six years as a justice of the Michigan Supreme Court.

Saltzman is manager of Centralized Industrial Relations Services for Ford Motor Company. He has been with Ford since 1953 and prior to assuming his current duties, he was manager of the Personnel Research and Analysis Department, Personnel Organization Staff.

BOARD APPROVES NEW PROGRAMS, SALE OF LAND

A new teaching major in language arts and revised out-of-state tuition regulations were approved by the OU Board of Trustees.

The new teaching major in language arts results in a B.A. degree in linguistics from OU's College of Arts and Sciences. In addition, through a combination of courses in the College and in the School of Education, a student also receives certification to teach language arts in a secondary school.

The new secondary education major in language arts is being forwarded to the State Board of Education for that body's consideration. Implementation is being sought for fall, 1974.

University rules now state that a student must be a bona fide resident of Michigan for one year prior to initial enrollment to qualify as an in-state student. Out-of-state students who enroll and later qualify for residency may now apply for reclassification. OU used to have a six-month residency rule and students once classified as out-of-state had no option for reclassification.

In other board actions, approval was given to start a University-Community Counseling and Psychological Center under the direction of Edward Rice, director of Psychological Services. The center will be open to all age groups of the public. It will provide a community service and a training center for OU's rapidly growing programs in clinical psychology and guidance and counseling.

The board also authorized the sale of a 3.57 acre parcel of land at the northwest corner of Walton Boulevard and Adams Road. The university will advertise for sealed bids and will accept not less than \$280,000, the appraised value. The board reserves the right to accept or refuse bids. The property is zoned B-2, community-business.

MCMENEMY WILL HELP PLAN NURSING PROGRAM

Miss Agnes Catherine McMenemy, director of the Providence Hospital School of Nursing, has accepted a special appointment to the faculty at Oakland University to help plan a bachelor of science degree program in nursing.

She will serve OU in a consulting role as adjunct associate professor of nursing and assistant to the provost for nursing. She will also continue as director of the Providence Hospital school, OU officals said.

The university, with the help of nursing educators from Providence Hospital among others, is planning a four-year degree program in nursing. In it, Providence along with other hospitals would offer the off-campus practicum experience, and OU the academic training.

UNIVERSITY RECEIVES \$320,500 IN GIFTS, GRANTS

The Board of Trustees of Oakland University has accepted \$320,500 in gifts and grants to the institution. Including grants of \$92,998 from the Pontiac Public School System and of \$81,894 from the Pontiac Motor Division of General Motors

Corporation.

The funds have been received by OU since the board's Aug. 15 meeting. . Major support of \$300,998 was received in the academic programs; \$5,773 for the Meadow Brook Music Festival; \$3,425 for either the Meadow Brook Festival or Meadow Brook Theatre; and \$5,440 towards the Off President's Club.
