# UF Campaign Surges Beyond Goal

## LBJ Faces Surgery Before Thanksgiving

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson faces surgery shortly before Thanksgiving, to remove a small growth from his throat and repair a painful defect in the year-old scar left by his gall bladder operation.

Doctors say his general health is excellent and there is no indication of any serious problem in relation to the surgery.

Today, Johnson heads for his Texas ranch to begin a two-week rest on doctors' orders.

It means the 58-year-old President will be relaxing, not campaigning, in the three days before Tuesday's state and congressional elections.

Before he flies south, Johnson plans to put in "a rather heavy day" at the White House, signing bills and clearing his desk of business.

The operation, in doctors' language, is to remove a throat polyp and to correct an incisional hernia.

It is expected to take less than an hour. Johnson's physicians said the President would be hospitalized for several days.

The Columbia Broadcasting

System said Johnson would enter Bethesda Naval Hospital on Nov. 21. But the White House insisted there has been no decision on where the surgery will be conducted.

The naval hospital is in a Maryland suburb of the capital. "The date has not been picked nor has the hospital been picked," Bill D. Moyers, press secretary, said last night.

Johnson made his medical announcement in the White



House Cabinet room yesterday. While newsmen assembled, Johnson slouched back in his chair and joked about the rigors of the Pacific mission he completed Wednesday night.

Then, matter-of-factly, he read his startling news: "Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. I wanted you to know that my doctors have recommended that I undergo surgery."

## Probe Sought by Broomfield

Hints Illegal Use of Social Security Lists

An investigation into whether Social Security lists are being used illegally for campaign purposes was sought today by Congressman William Broomfield of Royal Oak.

The 18th District Republican said there have been complaints concerning "a number of Democrats, including my opponent," using mailing lists which appear to be based on Social Security benefit rolls.

"If this is true, then this is a clear violation of federal law, and those who break this law should be prosecuted," said Broomfield.

He said a one of his constituents who receive Social Security benefits have complained to him that they have received letters stating that Broomfield voted against Medicare April 8, 1965.

"On April 8, 1965, I voted for Medicare and for increased Social Security benefits for the retired and widows and children," added Broomfield.

VOT ON RECORD

"The vote is in the Congressional Record of that date. It was 313 to 115."

Broomfield said the Republican Congressional Committee in Washington has received "numerous complaints" of letters to retirees containing "similar distortions of Republican congressional voting records."

"These are being turned over to the House Government Operating Committee for investigation," Broomfield said.

## Ambush Evidence Shown

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP)—The United Nations Command produced a bloody glove and blood-soaked bandages today to back up its charge that North Korean Communists brutally killed six Americans and a South Korean south of the demilitarized zone in the closing hours of President Johnson's visit to Korea.

U.S. Maj. Gen. Richard Cicciarella told an emergency meeting of the U.N.-Communist Military Armistice Commission the glove came from a North Korean soldier and the bandages bore markings showing they were made by the Pyongyang Medicine Manufacturing Co. Pyongyang is the capital of North Korea.

"Not satisfied with the murder of our troops," he told North Korean Maj. Gen. Park Chungkook, "your vicious bandits then mutilated their heads with rifle butts, thus turning a vicious crime into an act of savage atrocity."

He said the heads of some of the dead men were smashed "in such savage brutality as to render all recognition impossible."

'A DISTORTION'

The Communists called the U.N. charges a "slandorous distortion."

Park opened the meeting by accusing the U.N. command of 15 violations of the armistice between Oct. 25 and Nov. 3. Cicciarella countered with an offer for an immediate on-the-spot investigation, but Park rejected the proposal.

The North Korean said if the U.N. command continues to violate the demilitarized zone, "resumption of bloody conflict" would result.

## Pontiac Police Force Is Back to Normal

Things returned to normal at the Pontiac Police Department today following an apparent 41-hour work "boycott" in which a large percentage of uniformed policemen and detectives called in sick.

The past three shifts, beginning with the afternoon trick yesterday, only three policemen called in sick. Police Chief William K. Hanger called these illnesses "bona fide."

"We're completely back to normal as of 3 o'clock yesterday," said Hanger. "We're hoping nothing develops to change this situation."

The apparent protest against the city's reluctance to grant police higher wages because of a budgetary deficiency resulted from an impasse in negotiations between the city and Pontiac Police Officers Association (PPOA).

What could have resulted in a crisis because of the manpower shortage was overcome by supervisory personnel who manned desks and patrol cars during the period beginning 3 p.m. Tuesday.

The uneasy truce between policemen and the city will be followed by fact-finding hearings slated to begin Wednesday.

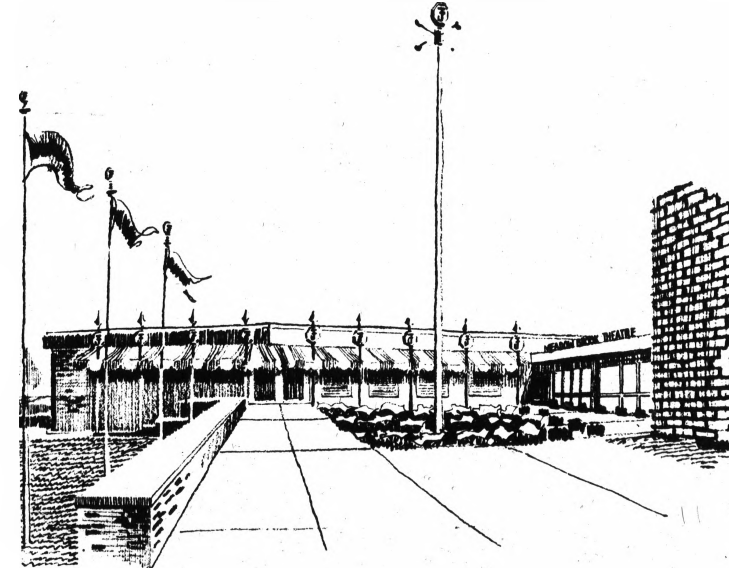

## Mock Vote Results at City Schools

Pontiac high school students have given Democrats good cause to back toward the voting age not only three years but perhaps six years.

All students at the two schools were invited to participate in the mock election, for which voting machines were used.

About half the student body at each school registered for the exercise in democracy.

There was another similarity to the balloting habits of franchised voters — incumbent Secretary of State James M. Hare was the highest vote-getter.

**STUDENT SUPPORT**  
Pontiac Northern students gave him 530 votes to 220 for George Washington, while the tally at Pontiac Central was 474-347.

In the one Republican victory, incumbent Gov. George Romney and Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken received 447 Pontiac Central votes each over Zolton Ferency and John Bruff.

However, at PNH, the Ferency-Bruff ticket won 435 votes to 331 for Romney-Milliken.

The only other race in which the margin varied greatly between the two schools was that for U.S. senator.

**SOAPY A WINNER**  
While G. Mennen Williams swept over Sen. Robert P. Griffin 490-288 at PNH, his win margin was narrowed to 40 votes at PCH.

Students favored incumbent State Sen. Carl W. O'Brien 907-568 over L. Harvey Lodge in the 17th District. For state representative from the 2nd District, they gave incumbent Arthur J. Law a 970-479 victory over JoAnn Tassell.

And they approved the 18-year-old vote issue, 768-244.

## OU Building Work Starts Despite Snow

The ground-breaking ceremony for Oakland University's \$5-million engineering building was held as planned yesterday, although the earth to be turned was well-hidden under a layer of snow which grew deeper as the event proceeded.

The four-story structure, to be connected to the Science Building, was christened the Dodge Hall of Engineering.

Chancellor D. B. Varner noted it will memorialize the great accomplishments of automobile pioneers John F. Dodge and Horace E. Dodge.

He said the 1,400-acre parcel of property given to establish the university in 1957 formerly was the John Dodge estate.

## Italian River Rises Flood Disaster in Florence

FLORENCE, Italy (AP) — The rain-swollen Arno River invades this famous Renaissance city and dozens of outlying communities in a disastrous flood.

In its worst flood since World War II, the muddy waters of the Arno sailed into the historic area of downtown Florence centering around the shop-lined Ponte Vecchio (Old Bridge). Hundreds of residents fled to the upper floors of their homes or hastened to higher parts of the city.

## Reds Leaving Dead Behind

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Communist forces in Viet Nam are not clearing their dead from the battlefield as they once did.

"It's a matter of pressure on them," said one U.S. general. "They still try to get the bodies away, but because of pressure and pursuit by our troops, it is getting tougher and tougher for them to bring it off."

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Viet Nam, referred to this development briefly in a report at the Manila summit conference last week.

**NUMBER RISING**  
"The number of casualties (the enemy) leaves on the field of battle, rather than carrying them off, is rising," Westmoreland said.

## Carpenters Begin Reporting for Work

DETROIT (UPI) — More than 17,000 carpenters began reporting back to their jobs in five southeastern Michigan counties, including Oakland, today, ending a five-week strike that tied up millions of dollars worth of construction projects.

An estimated 5,000 carpenters were working on projects in Oakland County when the strike began.

## County Alters Salary Road Post Unchanged

Agreement to continue all three Oakland County Road commissioners on a full-time basis and to adjust salaries slightly was reached yesterday in a joint meeting of three committees of the County Board of Supervisors.

The ways and means, personnel policies and roads and bridges committees voted 12 to 3 to leave the road commissioner appointment stand next week by the supervisors as a full-time post.

Some county officials had urged that it be reduced to a part-time position.

Presently the three commissioners receive a combined remuneration of \$32,500. Two are paid \$10,000 with one of these eligible for the chairmanship and an added \$1,500. The other member receives \$11,000.

## Spy Scare Hits NATO Nations

# After Arrest in Los Angeles

By United Press International member nations is under investigation.

A spokesman would say only the talks concerned "cooperation and liaison."

Speculation of a spy ring covering NATO members was fired by the expulsions of two Iron Curtain envoys yesterday by Italy and Greece, both of which are members of the alliance.

A Russian was expelled from Italy and a Bulgarian from Greece.

The spy charges were heightened by two arrests in America and Britain of two men linked by American reports in a new security case. Sgt. William Boeckhaupt was in jail in Los Angeles on \$50,000 bond on charges of passing secrets to the Soviet agents.

A self-described former French resistance fighter, William Cecil Malvena, was charged under Britain's official secrets act on Wednesday.

Washington sources linked the two men and said Malvena, a prominent Southern businessman, was the man Boeckhaupt wrote to earlier this year.

Soviet diplomat, Aleksei Malin, was expelled from the United States as a result of the Boeckhaupt arrest.

All of the cases involving the NATO countries were believed to have some common link. The Moscow source said it was an indication of the spy fever gripping nations both in the East and West.

The Moscow newspaper Kommunist Pravda said Sergei Siyryshov, a tractor driver at the Pantheonmonov meat and dairy state farm, caught at least two unidentified spies on the border.

The campaign lasted 23 days.

With the exception of three subdivisions which have community water, city residents have individual wells.

## Dems Mull Effects of LBJ Campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — With President Johnson taking himself of the campaign trail, Democrats in tight races from Massachusetts to California today had to scrap plans, bunting and speakers' platforms. But they insisted they were not giving up hope.

Just what impact Johnson's absence from campaign halls, rallies and parades will have on the election Tuesday no one can say with certainty.

One unmeasurable factor was whether any sympathy for the chief executive — facing surgery after his mission to the Far East — would be reflected in votes for candidates of his Democratic party.

**WORD REFLECTION**  
Another was whether any feeling of anxiety about the President's condition would be reflected in votes for Republicans.

Some political pros, like California's Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, doubt any outsider — even a President — can turn the tide of an election.

And some of the candidates who have been pictured, as on, or near, the ropes and urgently needing help from the Democratic camp say they will do all right on their own.

Brown, who had expected Johnson to campaign for him in California Saturday and Sunday in his uphill reelection battle against Ronald Reagan, put it philosophically:

"In any campaign, I think it is a basic truth that the candidate who is running for an office has to make it on his own. There is no transfer of popularity by others supporting his candidacy."

**"GOING TO WIN"**  
"We are going to win the election whether he comes or not," declared Democratic Rep. Robert B. Duncan, who is in a tough match with GOP Gov. Mark O. Hatfield for a U.S. Senate seat from Oregon.

Brown and House Speaker John W. McCormack of Massachusetts said they had been notified Tuesday that Johnson would not be able to keep campaign dates in their states. McCormack said he learned it

from a White House aide who telephoned from Seoul, Korea. But, in general, the picture was one of shattered plans in some dozen states after the President's announcement Thursday he would sit out the remainder of the campaign to rest up for surgery in about 15 days.

The White House never made official announcement of Johnson's campaign plans. But the word had spread from Bangkok to Boston that he planned a lightning drive to answer candidates' calls for help after he returned from the Far East.

Speakers' platforms were hammered together in Boston, in Portland, Ore., and in Minneapolis. A dam dedication was set in Montana Saturday with three floors of the Northern Hotel in Billings reserved for the President and entourage.

Advance Secret Service men were already on hand in Portland, Kan., had proclaimed Monday a holiday in anticipation of the President's visit.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, an uncertain measure of his own political prestige at stake in the election campaign.

## Phlebitis Is a Misunderstood Disease

Phlebitis (and closely related four-inch elastic-weave roller thrombophlebitis) is a common bandage and get the patient out of bed at once.

Essentially, it is an inflammation of a vein, usually in the leg.

It may be caused by infection or by slowing of the circulation through the BRANDSTATTER affected vein in persons who are confined to bed for more than a few days.

Much disability from phlebitis has been prevented in recent years by getting patients out of bed within a day or two after most operations.

The inflamed vein is tender to touch and the leg is usually swollen.

This acute stage subsides in eight to 10 days.

It may be followed by complete recovery or by some degree of venous obstruction or varicosity.

As with most diseases, prompt treatment at the onset prevents later complications.

At treatment that has saved many persons from surgery is an infusion into the vein of dextran.

To give the best results, this must be started within eight hours of the onset.

### ANTICOAGULANT

Some doctors give an anticoagulant at the same time but it is not needed if the dextran treatment is started soon enough.

During the acute stage, bed rest for a few days with bathroom privilege is sometimes prescribed.

Alternating hot and cold compresses over the tender vein helps to reduce the inflammation.

Progressive doctors wrap the leg from the toes to a level above the tender area with a

If the swelling persists after eight to 10 days of this treatment, some victims prefer to wear an elastic stocking rather than the bandage.

It is often necessary to continue elevating the foot of the

bed and using some form of elastic support for 10 or 12 months.

Swimming or walking in water are the best forms of exercise.

# Pontiac Open Awaits Bowlers

The annual Pontiac Open will be in effect again this year. Any bowler who rolls a total of 600, including his handicap, will automatically move into the semi-final stage of the tournament.

The first deadline for the tournament is just three weeks off with the first qualifying round to be rolled Sunday Nov. 27 at four area sites — Huron Bowl, 300 Bowl, Airway Lanes and Cooley Lanes.

A popular innovation to the tournament last year was the "600 target" for qualifying. It is not taking the \$200 prize.

### INVITATIONAL POPULAR

The Actual's Invitational will again be a prestige part of the tournament, with bowlers being invited on the basis of their average and their actual score in qualifying rounds.

Entry fee remains the same as it has been — \$7.00 with all prize money going 100 per cent into the purse. The entry fee has been the same even though the guaranteed first prize has been raised from \$500 to \$600 to \$800 in recent years.

Entry blanks are now being distributed to most establishments and many of the local houses should have them this weekend.

Many feature awards and prizes are being added to this year's tournament including the "early bird" prize of \$35 which will go to the bowler with the highest total score from among the first 150 bowlers to submit entries.

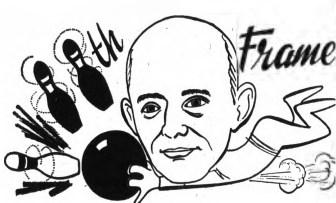

Wayne Zahn of Atlanta rocked the pins for a 230 average in his final six games Thursday and the big set moved him to the top of the heap in the \$65,000 Professional Bowlers Association Championship with a 5270 total for 24 games.

## 'Prof. Higgins' Dignified in Drawing Room or Zoo

HOLLYWOOD — The role has been changed from Prof. Higgins to Dr. Doltite, but the manner is the same — polished, urbane, and a g g i n g ly haughty.

Rex Harrison has exchanged phonetics for the company of animals in "Dr. Doltite," his first Hollywood film since his Oscar-winning "My Fair Lady." Like the letter, the new film is an expensive — \$14 million — musical in which the British actor talk-sings his numbers.

"MFL" put Harrison through a succession of drawing rooms in which he was surrounded by Cecil Beaton finery. "Dr. Doltite" finds him as the hero of the Hugh Lofting children's tales, a man who talks to animals.

Most actors place animals only slightly below children on the list of fellow players they detest working with. But Harrison views the four-legged feathered performers with his usual aplomb.

"Really, I get along quite well with all the beasts," he commented one steaming day at the Century-Fox ranch in Malibu Canyon. Stripped to the waist, the actor was coolly en-voicing a cigar after his lunch.

"Most of the animals have been quite cooperative, within their particular limits," he said. "We did have a bit of trouble with a squirrel on the location in England. It was biting

everyone and acting up terribly. I've phoned the veterinarian to see if he would apply a tranquilizer.

"He said no, that tranquilizers sometimes killed rodents; he suggested a shot of gin would do the job. So we squirted some gin in the squirrel's mouth with a syringe. The squirrel got a bit silly, but it sat on the wall as it was supposed to. It got another shot of gin and became drowsier and drowsier until it passed out. Must have had a terrible squirrel hangover."

Harrison said the most difficult time came when he played scenes inside his house with 300 animals, many of them untheatrical.

Complicating the scene was a song which Harrison had to deliver in the house with 300 animals that declined to react on cue. In "Dr. Doltite" as in "MFL," the actor performs his songs "live." This is in contrast to the usual procedure for film musicals, in which the numbers are recorded first and then lyrics are mouthed by the performers to the playback soundtrack.

**TOOK DOING**  
"It took a bit of doing to convince Warner Brothers that I should record the songs while they were filmed," he remarked. "I also had to convince them here at Fox, but at least I had a precedent to go by."

"It seems to me that a great deal of quality is lost when you merely mouth the words to a pre-recorded. You're so wrapped up in the mechanics of matching the movement to the sound that you lose the intent of the scene."

You stoke up your pipe and your dog comes over, tail-wagging. His ears perk up because now you're muttering to yourself: so he snarls and is willing to go bite that other fellow where it might do some good.

You settle down the mull and think about how the road to Probate Judge is one-way. Voters must elect you over that other fellow with the "name." For the unprepared voter, you study the primary returns. That other fellow swamped you because—and only because—of his name.

You've got to believe that voters were dastled and confused in seeing that "name" on the ballot. You remember his campaign signs that sprouted on fences, poles and trees across the county. The last name was in big, big letters; the first and middle names in small print. When you drove by fast, all you caught was the last name; it sort of sticks with you. Clever.

And what about that middle name "Arthur." Same as his Dad's first. Why until this campaign the boy wasn't known to use it, not even in signing checks. So you've got to believe it was a shrewd, cunning move; calculated to con voters right out of their socks. Make the voter think it's the old man who's running again. Smart.

And you try to understand why the son wants to cling to his pappy's coat tails, instead of standing on his own two feet. You ask, wouldn't it be better for the boy's own sake to work his way up the ladder, rung by rung? Does he want to go through life known as, "Why you're the son of so-and-so."

Besides what guarantee do voters have that the boy is a "chip off the old block?"

Okay, Burt Shifman, you're nodding now. You've got the problem figured out, huh? You'll run the risk of getting voters peeved at you by closing them in on this subterfuge. Nothing's worth sacrificing your integrity, your sense of fair-play, you say. Good thinking! All right, Burt Shifman, you've told the voters about this fellow running against you. He is the son and not the father.

Now if you've done the right thing, Burt Shifman, you'll know it on election day. You'll know it when they count the votes.
