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COLLEGIUM MUSICUM SALUTES ITALIAN COMPOSERS

In the world of the arts, the words Renaissance and Italy are almost synonymous. Now the musical aspects of this association will be explored by the Oakland University Collegium Musicum in a concert Friday, November 15.

The public is invited to the free 8 p.m. program in the Varner Recital Hall.

Instrumental music will be featured. A first for the collegium will be Giovanni Gabrieli's music for brass played on the original instrumentation, cornetti and sackbuts. Lute trios of Pacolini, as well as the only surviving lute quartet of Giovanni Terzi, will also be heard.

The program includes the "Aria della Battaglia" of Annibale Padovano, one of the first programmatic compositions of the musical world. This piece depicts a Renaissance battle from the dawning of the day to final retreat. It will be performed with a complete range of Renaissance instruments - viols, recorders, crumhorns, sackbuts, cornetti, and raushfeife.

The concert will also offer vocal music from 16th century Italy with subject matter ranging from carnival songs to madrigals.

FORD RESEARCH EXPERT COVERS MATERIALS CRISIS

E. Dale Compton, vice president, scientific research, Ford Motor Company, will speak at OU today on "The Materials Crisis-Is It Real?"

All interested persons are invited to Compton's 3:30 p.m. talk in Room 203, Dodge Hall of Engineering. The appearance is sponsored by the OU School of Engineering.

The oil embargo of a few months ago has once again emphasized the need for careful conservation of our natural resources, Compton says. "Many materials are now in short supply, and we are increasingly concerned that a material crisis is imminent."

The speaker will present a review of available materials in the context of the needs of the automobile industry with some projection of possible shortages and cost implications for the remainder of the decade.

Compton has served as a scientist at the U.S. Research Laboratory, and as a scientist of the Coordinated Science Laboratory at the University of Illinois, moving to the Ford Motor Company in 1970. He is a Fellow of the American Physical Society and a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

OAKLAND AWARDED SIGMA XI CHAPTER

Oakland University has its first national honorary fraternity, its own chapter of Sigma Xi, the Science Research Society of North America. OU is the youngest university to have chapter status.

Chapter status was granted at the 75th meeting of Sigma Xi held recently in Fredricksburg, Vir. The university had been holding meetings and visiting lecturer programs since 1967 under Sigma Xi club status.

Obtaining chapter recognition allows the university to elect full members to the society.

Attending the national meeting were Michael Sevilla, president of Sigma Xi at OU, J.D. Hovanesian, past president, and Lewis Pino, program chairman.

**MITCH LIVINGSTON NAMED

Four members of the Division of Student Affairs presented programs at the recent convention of the Michigan Personnel and Guidance Association.

**OU GETS TASTE
OF MAD MOUNTAIN MUSIC**

"Mad Mountain Music," a new composition by Clifford Pfeil for contralto, clarinet, cello, and tape was premiered Friday, November 1 by the Cold Mountain New Music Ensemble. Pfeil made the tape this last summer while a guest at the Iowa State Electronic Music Studio (ISMUS), and added the "live" voice, clarinet and cello parts this fall.

The Cold Mountain New Music Ensemble, under the co-directorship of Cliff Pfeil and James Dawson, is new to Oakland University this year. In addition to Pfeil's composition, the ensemble performed works by Henri Pousseur (Brussels electronic music studio), Pauline Oliveros (University of California, San Diego) and Stephen Hansen (a former music composition student at Oakland University).

**BLOOD DRIVES
PRODUCES 263 PINTS**

The third-annual multi-sponsored Oakland University Blood Day produced 263 pints of blood October 30. The record figure was achieved despite the turning away of about 55 people who were ineligible to donate due to poor health.

Blood contributed by the OU community is available to all students, faculty and staff and their immediate families in the event of accident or illness.

**BONUS AWAITS
700 OU VETERANS**

Approximately 700 OU Vietnam veterans are eligible for full or partial bonuses following passage of the special proposition in the November elections, Cleveland Hurst, veteran affairs counselor at OU, announced.

It will be some weeks before the necessary forms are received from Lansing, Hurst cautioned. Veterans may then pick the forms up in Hurst's office and send the completed form and a copy of the discharge papers back to Lansing for processing.

Veterans who served for any period in the Vietnam combat zone will be entitled to a \$600 bonus while veterans who simply served during the war period, 1961-73, will receive \$16 a month up to a maximum award of \$450.

**UNIVERSITY ORCHESTRA
PLAYS AT NORTH HILL SCHOOL**

The Oakland University Orchestra presented two youth concerts at North Hill Elementary School in Rochester recently.

Students heard demonstrations of all the orchestral instruments by members of the orchestra. Conductor David Daniels introduced each composition and gave background information about it.

The program included a movement from the Debussy "Petite Suite" and "Summer Morning by a Lake" by Arnold Schoenberg. 1974 is a centennial year for Schoenberg, who was born in 1874.

Oakland student Michael Lynn appeared as recorder soloist in movements from the Elemann "Suite in A Minor" for recorder and strings.

The program closed with the North Hill students joining the orchestra in singing and playing Woody Guthrie's ballad "This Land is Your Land." The children had been coached in this song by Mrs. Martha Marsh, vocal music instructor. Mrs. Marsh was in charge of all planning for the orchestra's appearance.

Sanford Gottlieb, executive director of SANE, will speak on the "Arms Race and Inflation" in a 2 p.m. lecture at Oakland University Wednesday, Nov. 13.

The public is invited to the free talk in Room 156, North Foundation Hall. Gottlieb appears under auspices of New-Charter College.

SANE is a national peace organization which is working for a reduction in military spending, disarmament agreements and the negotiated settlement of international disputes.

Gottlieb has testified frequently before committees of Congress on military and foreign policy issues, he has presented SANE's views before the platform committees of both political parties, and he has appeared throughout the United States as a lecturer and participant in panel discussions, debates and radio and television shows.
