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## BAND TO PERFORM

The University Concert Band will present its first concert of the year at 8 p.m. today (Monday) in 200 Performing Arts. Russell D. Reed is the musical director. He has chosen for the first concert two transcriptions for band, of a concerto grosso by Antonio Vivaldi and of "Danza Finale" from Ginastri's "Estancia." The rest of the program, devoted to works written for band, will include "Brighton Beach" by Latham, "The Sinfonians" by Clifton Williams, "Trauersinfonie" by Richard Wagner, "Hymn to Yerevan" by Alan Hovhaness, and Symphony for Band by Vincent Persichetti. Admission is free.

## ON OVERSEAS STUDY

"Reflections on Overseas Study Programs" is the title of an article by William F. ## OAKLAND'S TEACHER CORPS PROJECT IS OUTLINED

The School of Education reports that Oakland is one of seven universities with fifth-scale Teacher Corps (Urban Corps) programs participating in a special research project funded by the National Center for Education Research and Development of the U. S. Office of Education. OU staffers involved in the project include Jacqueline Loughheed, project director; George Coon, project evaluator, and Betty Michalski, material and research assistant. Here is their capsule description of the program:

Beginning in 1968 the Office of Education funded 10 universities to develop conceptual models for elementary teacher education. The purposes of Oakland's project will be to develop and implement competency-based teacher education programs utilizing the 10 NCERD teacher education models as a resource, and to describe and evaluate the development and implementation process. Educators involved in the program expect the models to provide a framework for:

- (1) instructional and operational role changes for university faculties;
- (2) development of instructional modular support systems with built-in self-pacing strategies to replace the traditional course-locked structure;
- (3) development of competency-based curricula with stated objectives and performance criteria;
- (4) development of continuous evaluation of intern and program progress through systems analysis;
- (5) development of more effective field experiences and instructional techniques, and
- (6) strengthened public school and university cooperation in teacher education.

## FREEMAN IS ELECTED

Jerry M. Freeman (modern languages) presented a paper entitled "Plot Symmetry in Russian Folk Tales" at the seventh annual convention held recently by the Michigan Modern Language Association. He was elected secretary-treasurer for 1971 of the Michigan chapter of the American Association of Teachers of Slavic and East European Languages.
