Hunt Mouse Rocket in South Atlantic

Missile Fired With Rodent in Nose Cone

Recovery Boats Comb Ascension Island Area Off African Coast

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—Air Force recovery boats scoured the South Atlantic today for an experimental rocket nose cone and a tiny captive mouse hurled into space in a combination military-scientific missile test.

The Air Force was keeping quiet about the success or failure of the mouse-carrying hybrid rocket, designed as a forerunner of the missile expected to shoot for the moon.

After the firing last night, spokesmen said only that the missile "performed successfully."

There was no mention of the lowly mouse's fate, or of the landing place of the nose cone.

However, there were indications the recovery boats, standing by 1,000 miles from Africa near the Ascension Islands, were waiting daylight before starting the anxious search for the mouse and its equally important carrier.

The mouse and the nose cone were sent into the heavens last night atop the second stage of a Vanguard rocket which in turn was mounted on the first stage of a Thor Intercontinental Ballistic Missile. It streaked southward over the Atlantic tracking range, trailing streaks of orange flame.

MOUSE 600 MILES UP

Air Force officials at Cape Canaveral and the test center's headquarters at nearby Patrick Air Force Base declined to discuss details of the mouse's lonely flight 600 miles above the earth.

But it was believed the mouse was brought from a laboratory and put in the rocket's nose cone in an effort to learn the effects of space flight on living creatures as a step toward eventually putting men into space.

Other living creatures have been fired to high altitudes, but none as high as the captive in last night's missile. Russia's second Sputnik contained a dog, but the Soviets are not believed to have recovered the animal's body.

The hybrid missile, named Thor-Able after the title of the re-entry tests, was the second of its type to be fired. The first, which also contained a mouse, went up on (Continued on Page 4, Col. 4)

Sullenberger's Fate Rests With Board

With denials that he suffers a "persecution complex," Dr. Neil H. Sullenberger last night concluded his hearing and left it up to the Board of Trustees whether he will practice again at Pontiac General Hospital.

Canada Talks in Final Hours

Ike and Diefenbaker Agree on China Trade, Prevention of Attack

OTTAWA, Canada (AP)—The Canadian-American summit conference went into its concluding hours today with agreements nailed down to cooperate on the questions of trade with Red China and prevention of surprise attack.

President Eisenhower and Canadian Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker hoped in a final session to agree on other issues which have strained on friendly relations.

Tomorrow Eisenhower returns to Washington. He will stop at Massena, N. Y., for a look at the St. Lawrence Seaway project—another symbol of Canadian-American cooperation.

The President and Prime Minister announced that their governments will consult fully from now on in attempts to resolve, as they come up, differences arising over conflicting export policies and laws.

DIFFER ON TRADE

Such conflict exists on commerce with Communist China. The United States bans all trade with the Chinese Reds; Canada embargoes only sales of strategic goods.

Canada apparently won some thing of a concession. The point of dispute has been application of the American embargo to Canadian subsidiaries of American firms, the Ford Motor Co. of Canada in particular. Feeder cars from Red China for purchase by Ford of Canada after consulting the parent company in the United States.

Eisenhower and Diefenbaker also agreed that experts of both countries will begin working together on a study of safeguards against surprise attack, especially across the Arctic.

Goldfine Insists He Won't Talk About Checks

Tycoon Tells Probers Reasons for Uncashed Notes His Business

WASHINGTON (AP)—Bernard Goldfine told House investigators today he had showed them \$209,000 worth of uncashed checks so they could see he still had them, and "that's all there was to it."

Adamantly, the Boston millionaire stuck to his contention that a House subcommittee had no right to dig into the reasons why his companies put large sums into bank cashier's and treasurer's checks which, in some instances, remained uncashed for years.

The congressmen are exploring Goldfine's relations with his friend, presidential aide Sherman Adams, and various federal regulatory agencies.

The big question for the committee is whether these agencies were influenced by Adams to give Goldfine preferential treatment. Both Adams and Goldfine deny that.

The Congress members have some doubt in their own minds as to how far they can pursue the matter of \$777,000 in checks, some as old as 1941, that were still outstanding on Pilgrim Trust Co. (Boston) records as of May 7. They have ordered a legal study of the point.

Goldfine brought in yesterday \$209,000 worth of still live checks and said a big chunk of the remainder had been deposited, including the \$232,000 on June 25.

Subcommittee Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark.) noted that June 25 was just after Goldfine had received an invitation to testify.

Weight Strains Old Building State Capitol's Cracking

LANSING (AP)—Michigan's old state capitol building is cracking at the seams.

Cracks have been spotted in plaster covering steel supports under the fourth floor on the west side of the building, just above the Supreme Court offices.

The weight of some 60 to 70 tons of printing forms and metal type is believed to be causing the damage. The material is used for printing laws and other state documents.

John Gafner, state property manager, advised C. J. McNeill, head of the Legislative Service Bureau, who controls the area, that the heavy metal should be removed immediately.

"If any of the supports should give way, it could start a reaction that would have catastrophic results," Gafner wrote McNeill.

Gafner said the fourth floor space is under jurisdiction of the legislature and that failure to remove the metal "would place the responsibility of any structural failure squarely on the legislature."

Reveal Crowd Nearly Lynched AF Officer

Group Says Treatment in Armenia OK Under Military Police

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP)—Soviet civilians threatened to hang one of nine U. S. airmen shot down in Soviet Armenia, and roughed up others, a U. S. Air Force colonel said today.

Col. Dale D. Brannon of Chardon, Ohio, senior officer aboard the unarmed transport plane that went down in flames June 27, said Maj. Bennie A. Shupe of Miami, Fla., narrowly escaped being lynched.

"The rope was attached to a telephone pole and the noose was being placed over his head when he managed to convey to them the fact that he was an American," Brannon told a crowded news conference.

"The group then paused for a discussion. It was at this time that the Soviet military police arrived and took him into custody."

Maj. Shupe said he was badly beaten up by the peasants who captured him.

SAVED BY SHOUT

He added: "Later when they tried to hang me on a telephone pole I shouted 'New York-Chicago' to make them understand I was an American. While hanging preparations were still going on, one man shouted something, I don't know what, but it stopped them."

Brannon said five of the nine airmen aboard the transport received rough treatment from the local population after they bailed out of the burning plane.

"My hands were tied behind my back and I was beaten in the face by fists and later kicked in the body when placed aboard a truck for transport to the local village," Brannon said.

NOT MOLESTED

The four crewmen who landed with the plane and were picked up by Soviet soldiers were not molested, he said.

The abuse by civilians of the other five stopped as soon as they were turned over to Soviet authorities, he said.

Col. Brannon added that the "over-all treatment by local authorities was considerate."

The plane, a C118 attached to this big American air base in West Germany, was on a routine flight carrying cargo assigned to U.S. diplomatic and military missions in Iran and Pakistan.

It strayed over Soviet Armenia in bad weather and was attacked by MIG fighters. The nine haggard crewmen were released to an American representative on the Iranian frontier last Monday.

They were flown back to Wies-

Reputed Crime Chief Appears

Loses Appeal for TV Blackout at Rackets Probe in Chicago

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Rackets Committee prepared a floodlighted reception today for Anthony J. (Tony) Accardo, a camera shy suburbanite who is the reputed chief of the Chicago crime syndicate.

Accardo, who unsuccessfully sought a television blackout of his appearance before the committee, is the first big name on the committee's roster of alleged underworld figures to be called as a witness.

Committee Counsel Robert F. Kennedy did not say whether he expected Accardo to answer questions about alleged gangster penetration of labor-management groups.

In his federal court petition, Accardo protested that TV coverage by a Chicago station might

cause him to "suffer in his standing" in his suburban neighborhood at River Forest, Ill.

Accardo has barely been mentioned thus far in the testimony which has centered on alleged labor "shakedown rackets" in the Chicago restaurant business.

But Kennedy said other witnesses would link him with the matters being investigated.

Also scheduled to testify, as a holdover from yesterday's witness list, was Abraham Teitelbaum, former lawyer for "Scarface Al" Capone and a one-time labor counsel for the Chicago Restaurant Assn.

Fisherman's Shoelaces Keep Him Alive 5 Days

ALAMOSA, Colo. (UPI)—A fisherman who spent five days and nights without food and water on a crumbling Canejos canyon ledge told his rescuers today he would have plunged to his death had he not used his shoelaces to tie his legs around a tree.

John Sanders, 35, of Albuquerque, N.M., was rescued yesterday by mountain-trained soldiers. They scaled a 1,000-foot escarpment and then lowered themselves to the five-foot-wide ledge where Sanders clung.

Sanders' ordeal began July 4 when he and a companion, William E. Garver, 28, also of Albuquerque, slipped on loose rock while searching for Garver's wallet and tumbled down a mountainside.

Garver fell several hundred feet and was killed. His body was recovered Tuesday.

But a slender pine tree broke Sanders' fall. He continued to slip but grabbed the tree and tied himself to it with the shoelaces.

TOO WEAK TO FOLLOW

Don Bewley, 22, an employee of a mountain lodge 15 miles from the rugged scene, reached Sanders Tuesday. Bewley was able to leave the ledge and climb back, but Sanders was too weak from lack of food and could not follow him.

Mountain climbers from Fort Carson, Colo., trained in Alpine techniques, then were called in. They reached Sanders and lowered him to the Canejos River below in a harness fashioned from nylon rope.

Sanders was reported in good condition except for fatigue and exposure.

The soldiers who made the rescue were SPC 3.C. Bruce Hunter of Seattle, Wash.; 1st Lt. Carl Holz of Skokie, Ill.; SPC 3.C. Richard (Continued on Page 4, Col. 1)

30 Servicemen, Canadian Still Held by Cuba Rebels

GUANTANAMO, Cuba (AP)—Adm. Jerauld Wright, commander of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet, was due here today to inquire into the delay in the release by Cuban rebels of 30 kidnaped American servicemen.

Fidel Castro's men freed the last two captive American civilians yesterday, leaving only the sailors and Marines plus one Canadian civilian in the rebels' jungle camps.

The Navy obviously is growing impatient at the delay in getting its men back.

Nineteen civilians have been released so far but no servicemen.

Rear Adm. R. B. Ellis, the base commander, said U.S. Consul Park Wollam had told him he fully expected five sailors to be released yesterday.

Wollam has been in rebel territory negotiating for release of the

captives since shortly after the kidnappings began two weeks ago.

Ellis said the delay in the release of the five "is due purely to transportation troubles."

Earlier he had blamed difficulties in communicating with the widely scattered rebels.

Robert Wiehan, vice consul at Santiago, flew back into the jungle to join Wollam in negotiations. The helicopter that carried him returned with Albert M. Ross, 51, Houston, Tex., and James D. Best, 32, New Orleans and St. Matthews, Ky. Both were in excellent health.

to three weeks" for a stenographic transcript of the proceedings to be prepared and "at least another two weeks" for the board to study the case.

He repeatedly offered the Board's "full protection" to employees of the hospital whom Dr. Sullenberger might call to the stand as witnesses against the medical staff.

"I hate to put my friends' jobs in jeopardy, although several of them have expressed willingness to appear," said Dr. Sullenberger, refusing the offer.

"This is between me and the staff, no one else," he observed.

The question of emotional stability was raised during cross-examination by Gillespie, a former judge.

Dr. Sullenberger, who is charged in part with threatening fellow workers during outbursts of temper, admitted he had once used the professional services of a psychoanalyst for a few times on recommendation of friends who were analysts.

"They tell me everyone could

use an analyst, even you, judge," he said.

TELLS SYMPTOMS

Gillespie in turn described the symptoms of what he called a "persecution complex."

"Are you calling me psychotic?" Dr. Sullenberger angrily demanded.

He then recalled that Gillespie had once been a patient of his.

"You weren't so bothered by the possibility that I might be a mental case that you wouldn't consult me as a patient yourself, were you?" he asked.

"I'm always the first to say there's a little something wrong with me," continued Dr. Sullenberger, who has freely admitted that he easily loses his temper.

"But there's not a single person in this room who's perfect."

Gillespie then reviewed Dr. Sullenberger's career during the past few years and observed that the surgeon had "not stayed very long" at any one hospital.

"Did you have personality clashes everywhere you went?" he asked.

"Not to my knowledge," answered Dr. Sullenberger, denying that he ever "did any violence" to anyone at Pontiac General or elsewhere, except in one case where, he had to defend himself.

hearing." When Brewer protested, Dr. Sullenberger countered with: "I'm not arguing. I realize you would not give me the courtesy of letting me argue."

SAYS PATIENTS COERCED

During his defense, Dr. Sullenberger stated that his former patients had been "coerced and solicited" after his suspension.

He charged that an attorney who represented the staff had urged one patient to file a malpractice suit against him and a doctor had called up another patient "to offer to operate on her personally."

Mrs. Sullenberger was called to testify about an incident that occurred when she was present in an operating room to watch her husband operate.

She said she had been granted official permission to enter operating rooms previously and knew how to avoid interfering with the sterile conditions necessary during surgery.

Of the nurse who turned in a report on the incident, Mrs. Sullenberger said, "She was growing more bitter by the moment. The operation was taking longer than expected and she seemed quite unhappy that she had to stay late."

When Dr. Sullenberger requested the nurse's help, "she just kept sitting on her stool without moving," Mrs. Sullenberger testified.

The nurse, Mrs. Thelma Ritter, was one of 14 witnesses who testified for the staff against Dr. Sullenberger.

The other defense witness, Rex J. Bailey, of 1930 Woodland Ave., Sylvan Lake, testified about a conversation he said took place between Dr. Sullenberger and an intern "four or five weeks ago."

Cool Canadian Air Mass Pierces Great Lakes Area

A cool wedge of Canadian air pushed down across the Great Lakes early today, piercing a cushion of warm, moist air and scattering thunderstorm stuffings throughout the region.

The only other major weather activity, heavy thunderstorms pelted the southern Atlantic states and the Gulf Coast, depositing almost two inches of rain at Cross City, Fla.

Effects of the cool Canadian invasion were felt as far west as the Central Plains. Thunderstorms and showers ranged from Omaha, Neb., where almost an inch fell, to the shores of Lake Michigan where half-inch deposits were common.

Weather experts blamed a continuing flow of warm humid air from the Gulf of Mexico for the heavy rains in the South.

Midnight temperatures in the lower Colorado River valley were highest in the nation for the second night in a row, dropping just slightly below the 100-degree mark.

Inn Fire Arson, Prosecutor Says

But Officials Confer in Effort to Place Blame for Blaze

"There is no question in my own mind that the Caribou Inn fire was a case of arson," said Oakland County Prosecutor Frederick C. Ziem this morning.

"The big question," Ziem added, "is who was responsible for the March 4 blaze."

Ziem issued this statement following a three-hour meeting Wednesday afternoon with his Chief Assistant George F. Taylor, Det. Willis Myers, of the State Police fire marshal's office, and Milton F. Cooney, Clarkston village attorney.

Examined were numerous photographs taken of the 125-year-old village landmark following the fire. Investigation by State Police arson squad members proved, Ziem said, that the fire was "of a incendiary nature."

Another meeting will be held this afternoon in Ziem's office with Cashan P. Head, attorney for the Finnish Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of Calumet.

Head, in an answer to a legal suit filed by inn owner Ernest A. Felice to collect insurance claims, implicated Felice in the fire. "We want to go over what he knows about the fire and compare this with what we have," the prosecutor said.

Any possible criminal action might be forthcoming soon after this afternoon's meeting, he stated.

Say Goldfine Failed to File U.S. Tax

BOSTON (UPI) — Industrialist Bernard Goldfine, who has not filed a 1956 state income tax return, also failed to submit a federal tax return for the same year, according to the district director of the Internal Revenue Service here.

Director Frank J. Cavanagh said yesterday Goldfine's returns were filed faithfully from 1950 through 1955 and the textile tycoon had asked and received a filing extension on his 1957 return. None was filed, Cavanagh said, for 1956.

He said it was against its policy to disclose Goldfine's reason for asking the 1957 extension, which runs out in five days.

The director also disclosed that 1957 income tax returns for the Boston Port Development Corp. and the East Boston Co., two Goldfine firms, had not been filed but added that they may be running on a fiscal year basis.

Earlier this week, State Tax Commissioner Joseph P. Healey said Goldfine had not filed a 1956 state income tax return and payment on the 1955 tax was received only a month ago. He received upon request an extension for filing last year's tax, as with the federal government.

Healey also said that his department was conducting an investigation into all of Goldfine's tax affairs with the state.

flight." Even so, the MIG fighters fired upon the American plane "with the apparent intention to shoot it down."

The American transport was hit on the wing tanks just behind the left, No. 2, engine and fire broke out immediately. Orders were given to abandon the plane. But because of the severe flames and heat, only five of the crewmen were able to bail out.

As the plane was landing in flames, the Soviet fighters made another firing pass. The aircraft on which the C118 landed was under construction and had only 2,000 feet of useable runway.

The pilot Maj. Luther W. Lyles of Savoy, Tex., was able to stop the plane shortly after running off the end of the strip. Because of the danger of explosion, the crew members abandoned the burning plane as soon as it stopped.

While the men were being questioned by Soviet authorities: "We were not subjected to physical mistreatment. We were given adequate medical care. We were interrogated by personnel who spoke good English and who appeared friendly."

The five airmen who were roughly treated by civilians said they were in the hands of the peasants for two or three hours before being handed over to military authorities. Those who received treatment in addition to Col. Brannon and Maj. Shupe were:

Maj. Robert E. Crans of Macon, Ga., airman Earl H. Rosmer of St. Louis Park, Minn.; and airman Peter N. Sabo of Chicago.

Sabo said the peasants tied his hands despite painful burns suffered in the flaming aircraft on his right arm.

Asked whether they resisted the beatings, Col. Brannon and Maj. Shupe replied together: "How can you with your hands tied in the back?"

Maj. Shupe added: "I tried my best to keep them away."

April 23 but the test failed and there was no statement from the Air Force. The nose cone was not recovered.

15,000 MILES PER HOUR

Scientists were hoping for better luck this time. A recovery would mean the first realistic test of a ballistic missile cone at intercontinental range and velocity. The Thor-Able was fired 5,500 (nautical) miles at a speed of about 15,000 miles an hour.

If the test proved successful, it might also prove the "Thor-Able" combination would serve as the first two stages of the three-stage rocket the Air Force will send toward the moon in the near future.

The thundering bird was launched by the same team of Douglas and Air Force technicians which will fire the moon rockets.

There was no doubt that the initial part of the missile's flight was a success. Hundreds of curious beach residents saw the 90-foot rocket hesitate for a second after its liquid fuel was ignited, then begin climbing into an almost cloudless sky.

Two minutes and 40 seconds later, while it was still in full view, the first stage dropped off and the rocket spurted toward the southeast.

HOLDS SIGNAL DEVICE

The missile's knob-shaped nose was rigged with signaling devices to aid ships in locating it when it came down. If it returned through the earth's atmosphere without burning up, the United States would have a nose cone for ICBMs capable of delivering bigger nuclear payloads further and more accurately.

For the mouse, the trip was equally important. If it survived the effects of such space hazards as cosmic rays and the weightlessness caused by the lack of gravity, the knowledge would help

greatly in preparing to send larger living things into space.

Still, another purpose of the test was to give the Air Force an idea of how well the combination of Thor and Vanguard states perform as the first two stages of the planned three-stage moon rocket.

The Air Force has received authority to attempt three probes in the vicinity of the moon, and the Army has obtained permission to try at least one.

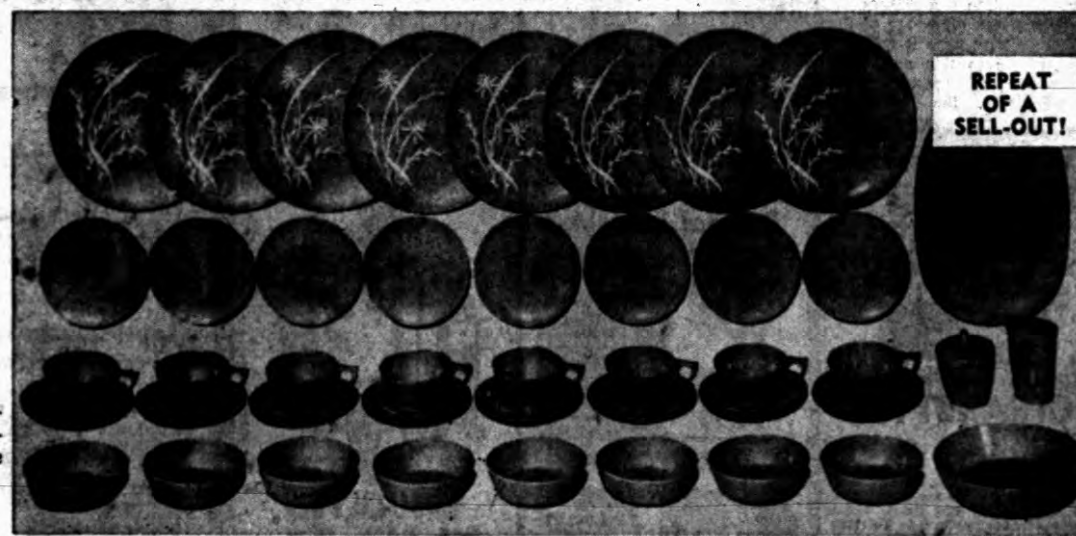

Negative Electric Charges Found in Cancer Cells

By ALTON BLAKESLEE

LONDON (AP) — British scientists have found a curious and apparently dangerous electricity in cancers.

The healthy cells stick together and don't go wandering off. But cancer cells seem to develop strong negative electric charges. This could make them repel other cells, so they move about freely and spread to start cancers elsewhere in the body.

This electrical action was described in a report today to the seventh International Cancer Congress by E. J. Ambrose and G. Easty of the Chester Beatty Research Institute in London.

They have been studying cells growing in tissue culture. The cells are kept alive and growing in glass tubes or plates. The cancer cells gained increasingly strong negative charges as a tumor developed and as it became more invasive or able to spread, the scientists said. The negative charge became stronger than that of healthy cells. The cancer cells could be made to stick together by adding certain chemicals which carry a positive electric charge.

The research is helping to explain the chemical nature of changes taking place on the surface of cancer cells. It might even prove useful as a method someday of stopping the spread of cancers.

Among other reports to today's session of the cancer congress: The experimental antibiotic Actinomycin D produced a slight but definite improvement in about a fifth of 54 patients with various forms of cancer. The benefits were temporary, reported Doctors C. T. C. Tan and Joseph H. Burchenal of the Sloan-Kettering Institute in New York.

Mitomycin C, an antibiotic discovered in Japan, and several other drugs can cure leukemia in mice which is caused by virus, Sloan-Kettering Doctors Kanematsu Sigura and C. Chester Stock said. The drug is not yet available for human use.

Mice that fight with a defense against leukemia. This happens in a strain of mice susceptible to this blood cancer. Females ordinarily die when they are 270 days old and the males when 305 days old.

The males of this strain fight but if kept from fighting they die as early as the females. Those males allowed to fight live two months longer on an average.

Fighting perhaps stimulates the adrenal gland and the production of adrenalin, according to Dr. Paul Lemonde of the University of Montreal.

Dying Father Longs to See Missing Son

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP) — John Werzinger Sr. is waiting for his son.

He doesn't have long to wait. The 64-year-old man is dying of cancer, and he knows it.

Four of his sons, a daughter and 10 grandchildren have gathered about Werzinger in his home here.

But one son is missing. John Werzinger Jr., 36, left Jersey City a year ago to work as a civilian guard at a military establishment in El Paso, Tex. He wrote his mother last month that he was giving up the job, and his parents have not heard from him since.

Werzinger's family appealed to newspapers to publish the story in the hope that John will read it and return home.

He has only a few days to do it.

Purring Motor Runs Smoother Without Visitor

IRVINGTON, N.J. (AP) — George Franks motor purred rhythmically yesterday but George knew his car engine wasn't running.

Franks lifted the hood and reached for a cat hiding between the motor and the fire wall. But it wasn't as easy as all that.

The cat scampered to the safety of the chassis cross bar. While a crowd gathered and offered advice, George crawled under the vehicle and shooed the cat away. But the cat took up a position between the splash pan and a crossbeam under the fan.

Police came; also more and more kibitzers. They couldn't get the cat out but found they could operate the car without injuring the animal.

The party transferred operations from in front of Franks' house to a service station down the street.

The service station mechanic put the car on a lift, removed the splash pan, tugged on something else and out came Mr. Cat. He charged Franks \$1.

2 More Letters Called Fakes

Soviets Say They Have Received More Mail From U.S. AF Crew

LONDON (AP) — The U.S. Embassy has denounced as fakes two more letters to the Soviet Embassy purporting to reveal details of an American bomber crew's plan to drop an atomic bomb off Britain's North Sea coast.

The Soviets said one of the new letters attacking American nuclear defense plans came from the same writer who a week ago wrote that he would pilot the bomber.

This time, they said, he wrote that the bomb would be dropped by July 12 and that "we hope this will be sufficient to show the Western capitalists the terrible thing with which they are playing."

The writer of the second letter said he was a member of the bomber's crew, according to the Soviets.

The Soviet Embassy released only photo copies of the letters, refusing to let Scotland Yard examine the originals for clues. The Soviets have conceded the letters probably are a hoax but publicized them nevertheless.

When the first letter was made public, the U.S. State Department called them Soviet propaganda forgeries. An unemployed British farm worker who was discharged by the Royal Air Force for mental instability said he wrote the first letter but later denied it.

A Canny Facsimile

DENVER (AP) — Police impounded a car for not displaying a brake and light inspection sticker. It had a sticker—a red one that looked like those issued by the state, but it had been cut from the label on a pork and bean can.

Ask Immediate Halt of N-Tests

Reds Renew Demand for U.S. Agreement at Geneva Science Talks

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has demanded again that the United States agree that the Geneva conference of nuclear scientists work for an immediate, universal suspension of nuclear weapon tests.

The East-West conference, which began July 1, is restricted to seeking ways to detect violations of any ban on tests that might be agreed on at later political talks.

A week before the Geneva meeting got under way, the Soviets threatened not to send a delegation unless the United States agreed in advance that a halt to atomic weapon tests was the goal of the conference.

The United States said that would be putting the cart before the horse. It insisted the scientists could only talk about practical means of detecting atomic tests. The Soviets sent a delegation anyway.

In a sharp note last night the Soviet Union accused the United States of trying to justify its refusal to end nuclear tests by claiming that effective control of a test ban was impossible "even though it is now clear that such control is quite feasible."

Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed the note to U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson Jr. in reply to an American note of June 30. The State Department had no comment, but officials said they were not impressed by the new Soviet blast.

The Soviet note accused the United States of side-stepping "a definite reply whether it agreed that the meeting of experts should be devoted to solving the question of universal and instant suspension of nuclear weapon tests."

Major Earthquake Shakes Alaska Area

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — A sharp earthquake described by a seismologist as one of major magnitude, shook wide areas of southeastern Alaska last night but caused very little damage. There were no deaths or injuries.

Dr. Don Tocher, seismologist at the University of California at Berkeley, said the quake, which he said was a major one, was centered in the Gulf of Alaska.

Dr. Charles Richter of the California Institute of Technology Seismological Laboratory at Pasadena said had the quake occurred in a populated area it would have caused a disaster.

The U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey office at Sitka, 100 miles southwest of Juneau, timed the first sharp jolt at 10:17:13 p.m. Minutes later there were two sharp aftershocks and the ground quivered off and on for hours later.

The quake sent residents of Juneau, Sitka and Petersburg, 125 miles southwest of Juneau, streaming into the streets. The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.'s main Alaska communications cable was cut at Lena Point, just north of Juneau, and communications to cities north of there were temporarily cut off.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here is the accounting Bernard Goldfine gave House investigators yesterday of the total \$776,879.16 worth of his uncashed bank treasurer's and certified checks as shown on Pilgrim Trust Co., Boston, records as of last May 7:

\$89,035.89 — Check bought in 1941, 2-3: "I just don't recall what was done with them and we have no records going back that far so I haven't been able to find out."

\$389,371.86 — deposited since May 7 and therefore not outstanding now.

\$209,871.41 — The checks "I have in my hand" bought by Goldfine companies, held by them, and never used.

\$50,000.00 — A 1956 check to Meinhard Co. as security for a loan.

\$30,000.00 — to the Pilgrim Trust Co., which Goldfine testified about last week.

Sub total \$774,279.16

Also these checks to individuals: \$2,000 — Brickley, Sears and Cole, presumably Goldfine lawyers.

\$300 — to a person named Hann, not immediately identified.

\$250 — to a James Bruton, not immediately identified.

\$50 — to Eileen Griffin, whom Goldfine identified as a secretary to the late Massachusetts Gov. Paul A. Dever. Dever also was associated as a lawyer with Goldfine after he left office in 1952.

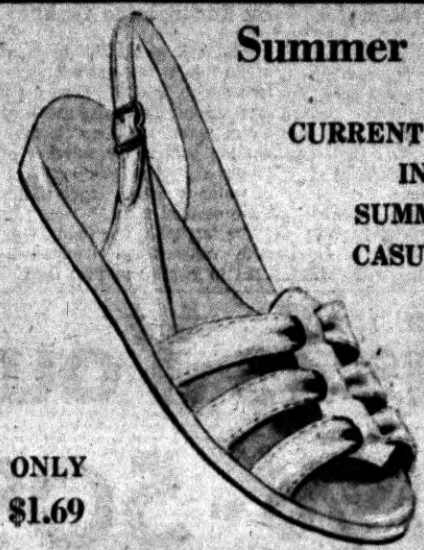
