Eighteen new full-time faculty appointments were approved by the Board of Trustees on August 24, effective immediately.

Newly appointed in mathematical sciences were assistant professors David J. Downing, Jean E. Roberts, and Stephen J. Wright.

Alphonso R. Bellamy was appointed assistant professor of management, Miron Stano as associate professor of economics, and Donald S. Schwerin as assistant professor of political science.

Grant competition closes soon

The 1978-79 competition for grants for graduate study abroad offered under the Mutual Educational Exchange Program (Fulbright-Hays) and by foreign governments, universities, and private donors will close Oct. 7.

Qualified graduate students may apply for one of 550 awards which are available to 53 countries. Most of the grants offered provide round-trip transportation, tuition and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.

Candidates must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the beginning date of the grant, have language ability commensurate with the demands of the proposed study projects, and be in good health.

1977-78 Budget approved by board

The Oakland University Board of Trustees approved a general fund budget for 1977-78 of \$22,963,825 at the board meeting August 24. The figure represents an 11.6 percent increase in operating expenses over 1976-77.

The new budget does not include a tuition increase. University officials said a favorable legislative appropriation, current tuition and fee levels, and a general fund surplus from the last fiscal year will be sufficient to support the increased spending and provide a balanced budget.

Most of the 11.6 percent of \$2,393,316 increase in operating costs for 1977-78 will be absorbed by higher costs of running the existing program. Inflationary increases include salary and wage adjustments and staff benefits, and \$178,600 in utility increases.

The budget is derived from the following sources: state appropriation, \$15,301,400; tuition, \$6,308,000; student fees, \$231,500; indirect cost recovery, \$349,000; miscellaneous revenue, \$380,000; extension and school services fund balance, \$113,000; balance in general fund, \$280,925.

The drive will be supported by representatives from all sections of the university. Vice chairpersons volunteering their services include Lewis N. Pino (academic/administrative faculty unit), Tom Lyons (faculty unit), Dave Collins (AFSCME unit), Judy Wharry (UAW/CT unit), Bill Connellan (administrative-professional unit), and Joe Euculano (student organizations unit).

This year's campaign will provide financial resources for more than 46 private, non-profit agencies who serve the needs of citizens from the Pontiac-North Oakland county area.
